# Dodging An Issue

The U.S. Cicil Service Commission has found a way around the prohibition enacted by Congress against employment of Communists in government service. The Hatch law forbids hiring of Nazis and Fascists also, but the Civil Service Commission is protecting only the Com-

In an order issued secretly Nov. 3, which the commission admits but refuses to publicize, investigators are threatened with "disciplinary action" if they venture to ask any question which would tend to prove Communistic affiliation or sympathy.

That statement is not technically accurate. An investigator apparently is permitted to inquire flatly: "Are you a Communist?" But only enough Communists come into the open to provide the necessary liaison with the public and to supply candidates to run for public office. The rest stay under cover and lie about their Communism, as a matter of frankly stated party policy as well as to avoid the disrepute to which honesty would subject them.

The only way to tell most Communists is by their actions. If their reading is confined largely to party and party line publications; if their affiliations are largely with red front organizations; if they are against all that America and democracy stand for traditionally, and place the interests of Stalin and Russia ahead of those of the United States, then they are Communists.

But under this order, Civil Service Commission investigators are forbidden to ask what prospective federal employes think about capitalism, or about certain historical and current events in which the cleavage between democracy and Communism is clear and distinct.

The investigators are forbidden to ask about membership in organizations which high federal officials of very liberal instinct have described publicly as Communistic. They are forbidden to inquire about reading material that is frankly Communist, as well as about party line publications.



Tito, whose real name is Josip Broz, heads the Yugoslav partisans who recently formed their own provisional government opposed to that of King Peter. The king's government is recognized by Britain, the United States and Russia.




