

"Terrible Defeat" Promised Bulgaria, Rumania And Hungary By Secretary Hull

ASHINGTON — (AP) — The United States, in move to split Hitler's Balkan satellites away from the Axis, Saturday night solemnly warned the governments of Bulgaria, Hungary and Rumania that they must share the "consequences of the terrible defeat that United Nations' arms are so surely bringing to Nazi Germany.

The somber warning came from Secretary of State Cordell Hull on the second anniversary of a declaration of war against the United States by the three governments. It implied an appeal to the peoples of the three nations to

overthrow the "puppets of Hitler" and take their gov-ernments into their own Americans And hands.

Emden Is Plastered With Explosives In **Big Air Raid Saturday**

LONDON — (AP) — American Flying Fortresses and Liberators and accompanying Lightning and Thunderbolt fighters attacked the German North Sea port of Emden by daylight Saturday and in carrying out their mission shot down 138 German planes, scoring a great victory in one of the most intense aerial battles of the war.

Seventeen bombers and three fighters were lost in the attack, which left Emden with flames roaring over a haif-mile square area and towering columns of smoke dwarfing a feeble, wind scattered ground screen miles below with which the Germans tried to obscure the American objective.





Why We Can't Pay

We have pointed out that if the Treasury's proposal of \$10,500,000,000 in new taxes were adopted, there still would remain some \$50,000,000,000 of war-bred income above the total tax take-and yet we have argued that. under present tax methods, the people can not pay an-other \$10,500,000,000 without acute distress.

How can that be? Simple enough.

In ordinary times the income tax is designed solely to raise revenue with a minimum of burden on taxpayers Therefore it bears lightly, if at all, on those with small income, and presses heavily to the pint of virtual confiscation upon those with large income.

While war tax bills have reached down to pull in smaller taxpayers, they have continued to lean heavily upon the ability-to-pay-without-distress philosophy.

But most of the \$80,000,000,000 in new national income has not gone to the wealthy. It has gone to the poor -huge gobs of it to persons whose incomes were negligible before the war, or even non-existent.

By the Treasury's own figures, four-fifths of the national income now goes to persons receiving less than \$5000 a vear.

So we are torn between two understandable desires -first, to take our taxes where they will hurt least, and second, to take them where they will best relieve the pressure upon scarce consumer goods.

We can't do both. The new money, the inflation money, is in the hands of those who have long been the political proteges of government, the traditional havenots

Taxes have been designed to hit the "haves" so hard that a group they now are actually distressed. As a group they literally can not pay what the Treasury asks unless they stop buying War Bonds.

If present taxing methods are used to raise a further \$10,500,000,000 a year or any major part of it, a redistribution of wealth will result. The bulk of the money will come out of War Bond purchases. It will not cut the commodity purchases of the middle classes. In view of current prices these already are cut to the bone.

The desired money can be raised only by taxing increases in income due to the war. This the Treasury rejects sing their 1942 total food producon the convincing ground that it will discourage workers whose output is needed to win the war.

It will, if it is raised by methods such that, by refusing overtime and absenting themselves from work, they can avoid taxation. It will, that is, by traditional tax-raising methods.

- 1. Defrost whenever frost on the freezing compartment is more than one-fourth inch thick. Defrost regularly-once a week is recommended.
- 2. When you defrost, clean interior with solution of warm water and baking soda (teaspoon of soda to three quarts of water).
- 3. Clean exterior with warm soapy water, no scouring powder. Wax exterior occasionally to preserve non-porcelain finish.
- 4. Your refrigerator door should fit properly. Test by closing on a piece of paper. If paper comes out with little resistance, the door does not quite fit correctly. Consult a service man.
- 5. The gasket on the inside of the door should be touched as little as possible since water, grease and dirt shorten rubber life.
- 6. Be sure there is space at the back of refrigerator and on either side, to allow for proper circulation of air.
- 7. Open mechanism should be oiled and cleaned according to manufacturer's directions.
- 8. Call an authorized service man when your refrigerator is not operating properly.





1. Clean lamp bulbs and bowls regularly with a damp cloth. Dry thoroughly before using.

2. Use shades with white lin-ings that reflect light, not absorb it.

3. Keep all lights properly shaded to avoid harmful glare.

Three Former Pastors Of Church **To Participate In Services Sunday**

Special services dedicating the debt-free First Presbyterian Church of Midland will be held Sunday-exactly six years after the attractive building first was used as a place of worship.

Three former pastors of the church will participate in the services, the Rev. Hubert Hopper, pastor, announced.

Capt. W. J. Coleman, pastor of the church from 1931 to 1941 and during whose ministry the building was erected, will preach the dedicatory sermon at a special service at 3 p. m. "The Message of the Church' will be his subject.

"The Ideal Church" was Captain Coleman's subject at the first service held in the new church Dec. 12, 1937

Captain Coleman now is a chaplain in the Armed Forces, stationed at Camp Chaffee, Ark. The church grew from 142 to 307 communicants during his ministry here.

The building was erected at a cost of \$38,000. The debt was retired earlier this year. Rev. Murphy To Preach

At the 11 o'clock worship hour, the Rev. Thomas D. Murphy, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Odessa, will preach. His subject will be "Overcoming the Downward Pull." Mr. Murphy was pastor here from 1927 to 1931. The church was a home mission church when he began his ministry here and it had 24 members. When Mr. Murphy left Midland, the church had become self-supporting and had 142 members



Howards Build Firm Foundation For Schools Get New Good Farming And Good Family Life Interscholastic League Program

Some people on the land feel ney've been treading water these st two years. They're struggling exceed the production goals ney've set, but all the same feel at they're not getting ahead with leir longtime plans

But you don't find this attitude the I. J. Howard family of Val-View community in Midland ounty. Somehow, in addition to ultiplying their production of ar crops they've managed to build firm foundations for good farming and equally good family life. And when I say family life . . . there's lenty of it . . the two parents nd six healthy, likeable children. When the Howards came to their resent place to live they had bout 10 head of beef cattle. This year they had 75 on the place and ecently sold about half that numper. Two years ago the swine poplation was four ... a brood sow and three meat hogs. Now the poplation is 23, including three brood

It's much the same story with chickens. The Howards have a flock f about 200 hens which furnishes hem with fryers and eggs. Year iround they sell about a case of ggs a week, but during some of he more productive months Mrs. loward sold two or three cases. There's been profit in poultry these wo years because the Howards row and mix their own feeds wing mashes and the like.

There's plenty of milk for home or the hogs, Mrs. Howard makes points to burn . . , all except shoe ottage cheese often.

Last year rain was much nore abundant and he produced 20 bales of cotton on 193 acres. Labor being short, Howard and the children chopped 100 acres of the cotton themselves. He says that he hoes one row right-handed and the next left-handed to prevent Of the 530 acres, Howard owns a marter section and rents the remainder from his father, a prominent Martin County farmer. Except for one year spent learning be a barber, Howard has farmed Il his life. He now admits, though that his barbering venture may have been a good investment, for he's been cutting the children's hair for about 14 years. In that ime he figures he's saved \$700 worth of haircuts! Everything about the place has called for work. When they first came the foundations of the house vere exposed by wind erosion, and in one place by the yard fence the sand was waist deep, while at the back door it took five steps to get to the ground. After leveling the ard it took only two. The first step was to level the lawn and start a bermuda sod, then control the drainage in the lot. Recently Howard fenced the windmill so the dump around the tank wouldn't be tramped down. It's a new tank, and not until a good hard rain will he know if it's going to hold. Last year the Howards set out 65 trees and this year 45. They came from Howard's father's place in Martin County There are plenty of vegetables on the place, too. They're grown in the fields, cultivated with a trac-tor, and there's usually a surplus for sale. In late October a halfcre of turnips were "making". In addition, there's a productive frame garden built this spring near the house. This was supplying the fam-ily table earlier this fall. The frame garden is pretty much the responsibility of Mrs. Howard. Although a big family keeps Mrs. Howard busy, she is president of the home demonstration club in her community, vice chairmanelect of the county home demonstration council, and chairman of the exhibit committee. Her husband assumes his civic responsibilities by serving on the school board Thirteen-year-old Lanelle is a -H Club girl, helps about the house, and this summer pulled cotton, hoed, and helped gather the corn. She does most of her own mending and sews for her younger sister, Donna, who is 7. The other children in the family are Bobby, 9, who has a great love for animals and Gaylon, 5, the youngest.
