# Eden Says War To Be Shortened

LONDON — (AP) — Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, reporting to Commons on the Teheran-Cairo conferences, declared Tuesday "the war will be shortened" by decisions reached with Premier Stalin, and again pledged Britain to battle to the final destruction of Japan.

He told the cheering house that Prime Minister Churchill has "still more work to do in the sphere where he is now." Churchill had stayed on in Cairo, meeting last week with leaders of smaller

Quicker defeat of the Axis was insured by the "close cooperation of our military plans" at the Teheran meeting of President Roose-velt, Premier Stalin, and Churchill, Eden declared.

### More Taxes

The issue between the Treasury and Congress in regard to the new tax program is by no means clear cut. Both sides are right and both sides are wrong. We never will get anywhere taking one side or the other undis-

The Treasury is right in contending that as much as 10 billions in new taxes should be raised for the double purpose of helping to finance the war with a minimum of borrowing and of helping to control inflation.

The Treasury is right in arguing that with national income up \$80,000,000,000 and taxes up only \$19,000,-000,000, there is ample new money available with which to finance a further \$10,000,000,000 increase. The most elementary mathematics shows that after meeting the proposed boost, we should still have in excess of \$50, 000,000,000 more income, above taxes, than formerly.

Yet Congress is right in insisting that we can not pay the additional \$10,000,000,000 the Treasury pro poses. We can't, that is if taxes continue to be raised by the old unscientific, ideological, class-conscious hit-and-

When taxation reaches the level now proposed, or even that already attained, it runs into difficulties that weren't particularly important at pre-war levels. Chief among those difficulties are four that interlock, which we have discussed before and probably will feel impelled

to discuss many times more. First is the matter of the distribution of national income in general. Second is the matter of the distribution

of war increases in workers' incomes. These two distributions are as nearly complete opposites as it is possible for them to be.

Third is the social philosophy which underlies taxation for the purpose of financing governmental operations—taxation for revenue. Fourth is the economic philosophy that underlies taxation for the purpose of controlling inflation.

These, too, are almost diametrically opposed and very nearly irreconcilable.

Until both Treasury and Congress are driven to co-operate in finding a scientific, non-political tax formula that recognizes the quasi-irreconcilability of these interlocking problems, we won't be able to pay what the Treasury asks even though there is, in the aggregate. ample free income with which to pay.

This is not uptypical of the type of judgment which has been exercised quite generally in procuring doctors for the armed services.


