Heavy Bombers Attack Bangkok

NEW DELHI, INDIA -(A)- RAF and American heavy bombers, flying as one team in huge formations, attacked Bankok, capitol of Thailand, Thursday night and set fires vissible 100 miles away, the Southeast Asia Command announced Monday.

Many hits were scored on the railway station, yards and adjacent buildings and in the arsenal area in this fifth strike at Bangkok, the communique said.



New Britain Base For Pacific Offensive Aim Of 2-Pronged Attack

ADVANCED ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, NEW GUINEA — (AP) — United States Marines swarmed ashore in two simultaneous landings at Cape Gloucester on the western tip of New Britain Sunday to establish a second invasion front on Japan's Island stronghold in the Southwest Pacific.

Following the landings by veterans of the Guadalcanal campaign, General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters announced Monday, both beachheads were firmly established without the loss of a man.

A heavy aerial and naval bombardment accompanied the landings.

U. S. Frigate Named For Casper, Wyo.

RICHMOND, CALIF. - (AP) The U.S. S. Casper, a new frigate in East-Central Wyoming, Monday joined the long list of ships now set for their all-important roles in World War II.

No Need To Worry?

Many persons who are pro-Roosevelt, pro-New Dea! and slow to wrath are worrying now about the tendency toward personalized government in the great democracies, Great Britain and the United States.

The feeling of such persons is exemplified—and this is only one convenient illustration—by Raymond Clapper's recent remark that the "powerful Allied leaders" are 'slipping into a state of oriental arrogance regarding the interest of the democratic peoples in their activities.'

Some of those who have observed the drift seek to console the rest of us by pointing out that there will be another election next year—that so long as, every four years, we have an opportunity to turn out office-holders and overturn policies, we need fear no weakening of democratic processes.

That is not entirely true. We can turn Roosevelt out of the White House next November, effective a year from January 1, if we choose. Some would like to do that, and others would not.

We can get a new smile in the executive offices, new faces around the cabinet table, new voices in the Senate and the House. Personal dictatorship of the perennial variety, like Mussolini's or Hitler's, is not an issue. But whoever is elected President next fall, whoever is elected to Congress, whoever are appointed to secretaryships and policy posts, their hands will be tied in most important war matters. The die will have been cast.
For what? We don't know. Do we like it? How can

we tell, since we don't know what it is?

Are we satisfied with the decisions that are being made for us? Do we want to continue in office the men who are making them? There's no way of knowing.

Roosevelt and Churchill must have secrets, because there are things the Axis mustn't learn until too late. But the high-handedness with which every important parley on the war has been handled is alarming—a highhandedness which has not been limited to military mat-

ters, but which has extended to purely political affairs.

It is becoming about time, if it is not already time, for distinguishing between security matters and politics, domestic and international-for accepting security censorship, and refusing absolutely to play any longer with

political censorship.


