Dear Fellow Texan

Here in a land where the Indians talked by smoke signal not too long ago, we have developed a new method for sending television, radio, telephone and wireless telegraph messages all over the world.

It is done by sending up what we call satellite into space and relaying signals from it to receiving stations at various points on the globe. Hundreds of millions of tax dollars went into the research that makes this modern system possible.

Now, we in Congress must decide whether this great new force shall be turned over to a giant private monopoly or whether it will remain in the hands and control of the people for the general good.

I am a member of a group of senators who introduced a bill for public ownership of the space communications satellites. Private domination by one corporation would block progress on a program so new that its potential power for good is almost beyond imagination.

We are now ahead in space communications because the taxpayers of America paid the research bill. We have spent \$25 Billion of taxpayers' money in research on the space sciences. Therefore, I strongly feel that the taxpayer must retain ownership of the satellites. The taxpayer deserves a return on his money under a program like the government-owned TVA or the Panama Canal Company.

That's why I've joined with a group of senators to support a bill for government control of our rights to space. I oppose monopoly control by one company at the taxpayer's expense. The space communications program is too big for a private corporation to handle. It involves treaties with foreign powers... far too much of a share of the powers of government to turn over to one private corporate monopoly.

American people must hold on to the golden space-age promise in the areas of world peace and good will. The debate in the Senate is over this conflict. The bill I support is in the public interest. In my opinion and in the opinion of others helping in this fight, the private bill we oppose is not in the public interest but would only benefit one special interest.

Telegrams are coming into my office urging me to stand fast. Let me cite a few of these telegrams from private citizens.

From Corpus Christi: "Don't give up the ship in the great give-away." From Dallas: "We're all behind you here." From a business executive in Chicago: "I am heartily in agreement with you." A man and his wife in New York: "Keep up the good fight for public ownership."

Fellow Texan, the public ownership that I propose would not put the United States government in the telephone or telegraph or radio or TV business. The government would merely own the satellite and rent space in the spectrum to all the broadcasting systems and telephone and telegraph companies to let them compete in the true free private enterprise system.

If we create one giant private monopoly we destroy the free enterprise system. Free enterprise means competition and government ownership of the satellite -- with the government sending no messages but renting space in the spectrum to the different competing telephone, telegraph, TV and radio companies -- would maintain the true private enterprise system.

Fellow Texan, I believe the Senate debate is helping to awaken the American people to the promise and to the dangers in world-wide space communications.

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About Your HEALTH



The teeth of Americans contain at least one billion cavities, each a potential source of toothache, dental authorities now estimate. They say tooth decay is so widespread that it involves 95 percent of every person and is still increasing.

A virtually incurable chronic disease which must be prevented if it is to be conquered at all, tooth decay is a particular nemesis of elementary school-age youngsters although all ages are vulnerable to its ravaging pain.

Children are said to develop cavities at about the same ratio as do adults -- approximately one per child per year. But scholarly sur-

veys show that whereas one-third of the adult need for fillings is being met, only one-fifth of the cavities in children's teeth are being repaired.

The reason, Texas Health Department dental officials speculate, is that so many parents still cling to the totally false notion that so-called "baby teeth" are unimportant because they are temporary. The frequent result is that good dental health for children is still relatively scarce commodity.

In an attempt to reverse the trend toward almost universally poor dental health among youngsters -- particularly in underprivileged homes -- the dental division of the Texas State Department of Health gives financial and educational support to dental clinics in selected local health departments around the State.

The addition of fluoride in carefully controlled amounts of public water supplies is known by dental researchers to be efficient deterrent to dental decay. The State Board of Health at a recent meeting reaffirmed its belief that fluor-

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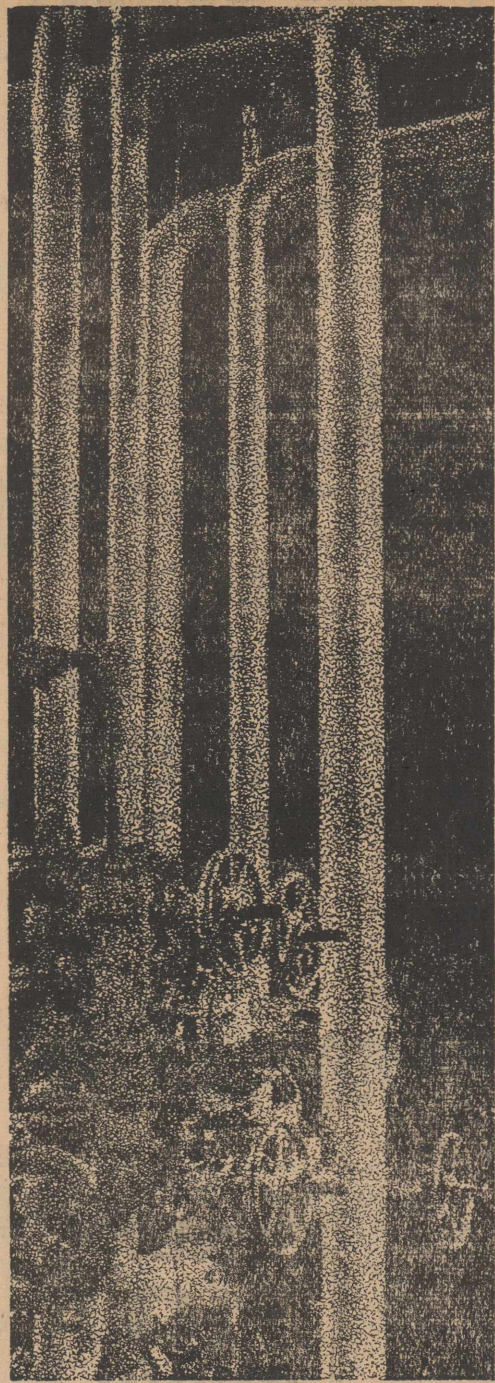
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dation is safe and effective, and recommended that local communities consider the practice wherever applicable and practicable.

There is one positive step all parents can take to avoid the fate of toothlessness among their children, dental scientists agree. It's a simple step, requiring only that youngsters be taken to a dentist for a tooth and gum inspection before being enrolled in school each fall.

Before the visit is over, the dentist will have tutored the youngster in good dental hygiene at home, hoping the habits will take hold and last into adulthood.

When enough children have received such instruction, and make it a part of their daily lives, the blight of tooth decay may slowly fade from the American scene.

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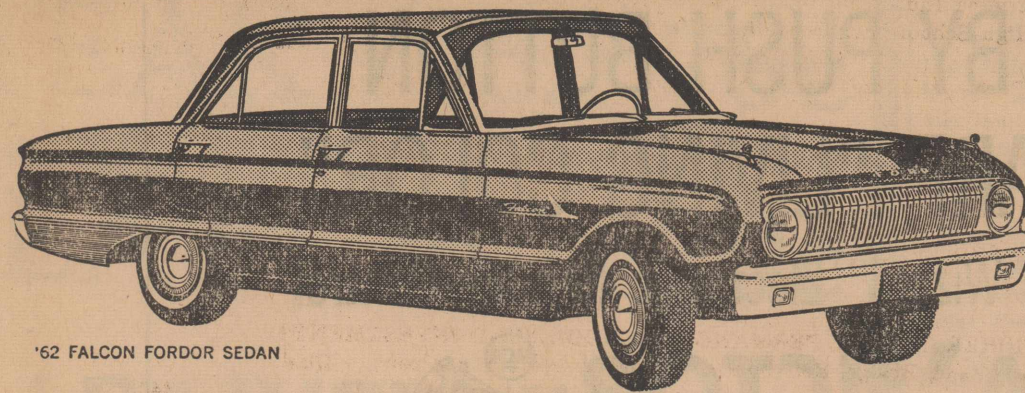
