Oral Polio Vaccine To Be Given Sunday

Citizens are urged to get their Sabin oral polio vaccine Sunday, at high school gym. The mass vaccination is sponsored in Rotan by Callan Hospital, Jaycees, Jaycee-Ettes and Calendar Club, with Charlie Woods chairman.

Everyone, regardless of age is urged to take this type I vaccine. A donation is 25c or more is asked to help with program and if enough fund is raised, plans call for the other two types to be offered later. No one will be turned away for lack of donation.

Three doses of the new Sabin oral polio vaccine are mandatory for long-term immunity against one of the nation's most dreaded diseases.

Type I is described as the deadly polio. The second dose, Type III, is the crippling polio and type II is the least serious, medical authorities point out.

The vaccine itself is a pleasantly flavored liquid, designed to appeal particularly to children, who are most susceptible.

Public Health Service officials recommend that the doses of vaccine be given six weeks apart for all persons three months of age and over.

A single oral dose of each type administered six weeks apart will ordinarily be expected to induce immunity to each type of polio virus at least four weeks following its administration.

Type II is administered last because it characteristically produces a longer period of infection than do the other types. Type II would be the logical choice for last administration in any case, since it accounts for only about 1 per cent of the paralytic cases of poliomyelitis in the U. S., the rest being equally divided between Types I and III.

Semester Fees Set For Junior High

At the regular board meeting Tuesday night, September 11, the Rotan School Board approved a two dollar fee per semester per student in grades five, six, seven and eight.

Under the new accreditation standards of the Texas Education Agency which went into effect September 1st., it was necessary during the summer to install and equip a new science laboratory in the Junior High Building. Over eleven hundred dollars has gone into equipment and supplies in this new lab. A teacher's demonstration desk was installed including connection with gas, lights, water and sewage. Students in grades seven and eight will meet science classes in this new lab, do group experiments on their own under supervision of the instructor.

A portable lab which can be rolled from room to room will be equipped from the main science lab and be used in experiments in grades five and six.

The administration and Board feels that in order to replace used materials and broken material and to be able to give the students the best in instructional equipment and aids this fee is necessary.

Co. Judge Gives Budget Report

The Commissioners Court met in Special Session Wednesday, August 29, 1962 and approved the Budget for the Calendar Year 1963. Other business transacted at this Special Meeting was to set the official county tax rate for the 1962 tax roll, which roll provides the taxes for operations in the calendar year 1963.

The County tax rate was set at .95c on the \$100.00 valuation. This is the smallest county tax rate since the tax roll of 1928. The County rate for that year was .95c. The County tax rate for the 1929 roll was \$2.20. From 1941 through 1949 the tax rate was \$1.80. In 1950 the County tax rate began to decline when it was \$1.50. During the past four years the County tax rate has been reduced .25c. Of the 254 counties in Texas, 35 have a tax of .95c. 177 have a County tax rate of over .95c and only 43 have a County tax rate less than .95c. The average tax rate for Texas is \$1.13. Our County tax rate consists of the Constitutional .80c and the special road tax of .15c voted in 1915. The County does not levy any taxes for bond issues. The money necessary to retire the bonds for the building of the two Home for the Aged comes from the operating Public Buildings and Permanent Improvement Fund.

The County is on a cash basis in every respect, except that it does issue R. & B. time warrants for the purchase of machinery and in building of the Rough Creek bridge. The money to pay these warrants comes from the operating funds of the commissioners. There has been only five or six times in the past twelve years that any fund has been in the red and none in the past four years.

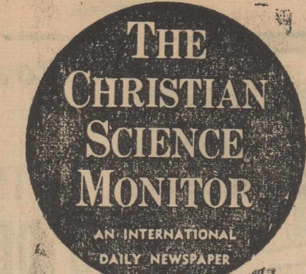

About Your HEALTH

The irreplaceable gift of sight is being lost to one American every 20 minutes.

If that figure, estimated by the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness, holds true for all population segments of the nation, it means four Texans are blinded every day.

September is Sight-saving Month throughout the land.

Even as you read this, some man, woman, or child is standing on the brink of permanent darkness, about to join the 392,500 other Americans who are already enduring the

bleak enormity of blindness.

What causes blindness? There are two major contributing factors: disease and accidents. Neglect exaggerates both of these.

Blindness brought on through neglect really is no worse than that caused by an accident or disease. But somehow it seems worse. It's so unnecessary.

If all children were given a thorough eye examination prior to entering school for the first time, and if all defects were corrected or placed under treatment at that time, a major step in the preven-

tion of blindness in childhood would be taken. One of every four school children are said to need some form of eye care.

But a single examination is not enough. A child grows quickly. His eyes, like every other body organ, are constantly changing. Sometimes the change is for the worse.

At least half of all cases occurring from year to year could be prevented through use of the sight-saving knowledge at hand. For example, some 300,000 industrial eye injuries occur each year. The mere use of goggles would cut the figure dramatically.

As for disease-caused blindness, modern surgical methods now restore or improve vision in 19 to 20 cases of cataract, the leading cause of blindness in the United States.

When parents or teachers observe a child holding reading matter closer than the normal 14 inches from his face, tilting his head while reading, or constantly blinking, all responsible health and medical authorities agree it should be interpreted as a sign of impending eye trouble.

Other conditions which may indicate eye trouble are crossed eyes, frequent styes and headaches, red-rimmed or encrusted eyelids, or persistent water of either eye.

New Ideas In Knit Fabrics

Knit fabrics available by the yard can be sewn into sweater-type separates for fall wardrobes, reminds Mary Routh, clothing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The new knits have more bulk but are supple and easy to sew.

New gauzy woollens have a lacy pattern, are wonderfully warm, and weigh next to nothing. One of these may be your choice for a dress or costume.

Both knits and gauzy woollens need an underlining, Miss Routh explains. This should be of china silk or other light weight underlining fabric.

"When you stitch either of these fabrics, fold a strip of tissue paper over the seam and stitch through it. This will prevent loopy yarns in the knit or weave from catching in the machine," she explains.

If seams in knit fabrics roll, catch edges down, being careful not to let stitches show on outside. Before making fabric button holes or inset pockets in either fabric, stabilize the areas with strips of press-on interfacing. Follow directions with this type of interfacing for fusing it to underside of fabric where needed, the specialist sug-

gests.

For the right fashion effect, knits fit smoothly but not taut. The look of gauzy woollens is essentially

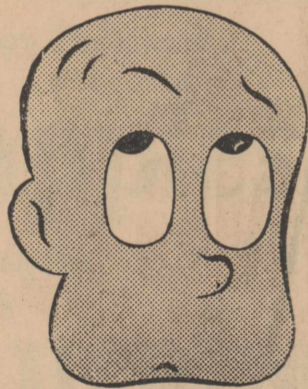

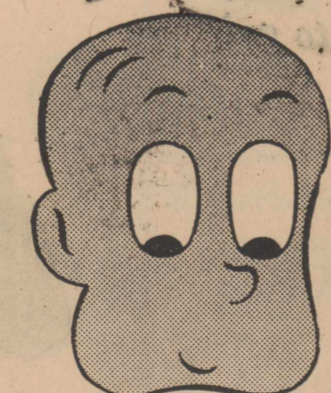
