Water Pipeline Work Moving Rapidly

Work is progressing nicely on the water pipeline work from Camp Spring to Snyder. Over half of the line was laid at noon Wednesday. The contractor has two crews working on the project -- one at each end. Work on the east end is moving rapidly and much progress is being made in city limits at Snyder. Much tunneling under streets, highway and railroad is being done, which of course takes much more time than ditching etc. in open country.

All right of way is closed on this phase of the water project and without unforeseen difficulties, we should have water from Lake J. B. Thomas flowing in water mains within 30 days. With existing line from Camp Springs to Rotan including the booster pumps will greatly relieve water shortage during even peak periods. The new line from Camp Springs will be installed as soon as the Camp Springs-Snyder line is completed. Work is being done to bring the new line to Rotan north of present line to reach many new consumers.

Water shortage exists daily in the higher parts of town, despite the emergency \$3 per thousand rate set by City Council last week to discourage watering of lawns, etc. During the emergency minimum rate remains without change, so no one is penalized for water for domestic uses.

If irrigation was stopped there would likely be ample water for domestic use over the entire town.

CTY ORDINANCE

An ordinance governing Water Rates for the City of Rotan, Texas; repealing all ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance; and declaring an emergency

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Rotan, Texas:

Section 1: That from and after the effective date of this ordinance, the City of Rotan through its water department shall charge and collect and every consumer of water shall pay for water furnished by the City of Rotan to each such consumer the amounts calculated by application of the following monthly rates to meter readings:

Minimum charge per month for 2,000 gallons or less, \$3.00;

For the next 10,000 gallons in excess of 2,000 gallons per month, \$.70 for each 1,000 gallons;

For all water used in excess of 12,000 gallons per month, \$.65 for each 1,000.

Section 2: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3: The fact that the City of Rotan expects to begin purchasing water from the Rotan Municipal Water Authority in the near future at a cost much higher than the City's existing cost for producing water and that the higher cost of water will jeopardize the financial soundness of the City of Rotan Water Department unless the rates above set out go into effect on the date herein provided creates an emergency which for the immediate preservation of the general welfare of the City of Rotan requires that this ordinance take effect on April 28, 1963, and it is accordingly so ordained.

Unanimously passed by the Board of Aldermen of the City of Rotan on April 9, 1963.

Much Land Needs Rebuilding Now

The following information is released by State-Wide Cotton Committee of Texas, courtesy of Rotan Cotton Oil Mill.

"Millions of Texas cropland acres are starving. Most of this hungry land hasn't had a square meal since it was put into cultivation. Many of these acres will never produce another profitable crop until they are fed. They must have a full meal of crop residue with ample plant food nutrients to restore productivity. This year, thousands of acres will be idled by the Feed Grain Program. These diverted acres offer farmers an excellent opportunity to plant high residue producing crop to improve their fertility.

A well fertilized, thick seeded crop of sweet sorghum or sudan planted on a good seed bed should produce 4000-10,000 pounds of residue (dry basis) with adequate moisture. The residue will provide organic matter needed to get efficient use of water and fertilizer in growing the following crop. To maintain profitable crop production over the years, a rotation must be followed that will insure return of an average of 3600-400 pounds of residue (dry basis annually).

Sweet sorghum or sudan must be returned to the land before the heads mature in order to comply with Feed Grain Regulations. This, also, prevents volunteer grain from becoming a nuisance next year. If cotton root rot is a problem, the residue should be plowed under 6-12" deep with a breaking plow when the soil is dry and the sun shining. Soil and water conservation measures should be established to prevent wind and water erosion.

A high level of soil fertility, combined with good management from start to finish, are essential for profitable crop production."

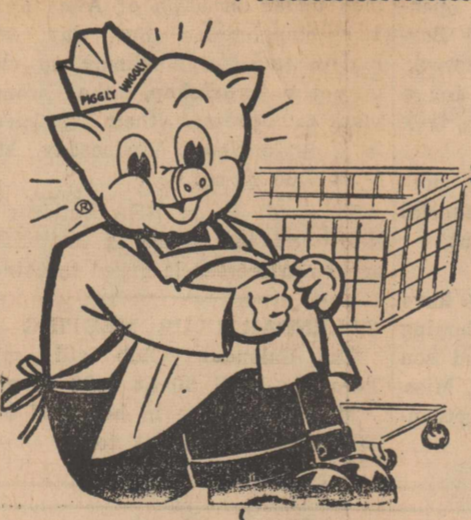

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Recent Conservation Tour Proved Interesting

Last week a group of business men, farmers, ranchers and professional Agricultural workers went on a tour between Rotan and Roby to observe and discuss establishment management of Coastal Bermudagrass.

The group met at the Dwight Lovett farm. Lovett, acting as Master of Ceremonies, introduced the speakers for the tour and briefly summarized what the purpose of the tour was.

At the Lovett farm the group observed a 20 acre planting of Coastal Bermudagrass. Lovett explained where he got his spriggs and how he had planted them. He emphasized the necessity of good seedbed preparation and weed control. At this stop the group were able to see a bermudagrass sprigger and learned how it operated.

The group left Lovett farm and proceeded to the O. B. Cave farm where they observed and excellent stand of Coastal. At this stop Henry Stoneham, Soil Conservationist from Rotan spoke to the group on seedbed preparation, grass sprig sources and methods of planting sprigs. Stoneham stated that the seedbed for planting grass should be as carefully prepared as though cotton were to be planted. He also pointed out that it was very important to use freshly dug sprigs because sprigs that have been dug very long and have not had the proper care taken of them will probably die.

James Norman, County Agent, spoke to the group about fertilizers and weed control. Norman stated that bermudagrass was a high fertility using plant and that soils analysis should be made yearly. Next, he discussed weed control until grass is well established and pointed out that weed control was a "must" if a good cover of grass was to be established quickly.

After a brief question and answer session, Norman introduced Cave Wann, Agricultural Engineer with the Soil Conservation Service, who spoke on quality of irrigation water and proper application of such. Wann stated that due to the salinity in much of the water in the area that a water analysis should be made at least once every year and recommendations followed as to its use. He further explained that proper application of water was very important. He stated that sometimes inefficient applications of water proved more costly than no irrigation at all. After a brief discussion with group, Wann introduced Milburn Cook, Work Unit Conservationist of the Rotan SCS office, who discussed with the group the importance of grass management after it was established. He explained how grasses grow and how they respond to grazing. He emphasized the importance of cross fencing and explained how it would increase production. Following a brief question and answer session, Cook introduced Duane Moss, SCS Agronomist, who spoke on cost of establishing grass and expected returns that could be realized from grazing and harvesting grass for hay.

In conclusion of the tour, Cook introduced such special guests as W. W. Morton, Production Credit Ass'n., from Roby; R. A. Springer, President of Rotan First National Bank; Jim Thomas, FFA County Supervisor from Rotan; Glen Webb, Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District Board Chairman; Alfred Douglas, SOD Supervisor; J. W. Landers, ASCS County Committee and County Great Plains Conservation Program Committeemen, Roby; and Dwight Lovett, OD District Supervisor.

Lovett summarized what had been observed during the tour and dismissed the group. The tour was sponsored by the Fisher County Great Plains Conservation Program Committee in cooperation with the County ASCS, FFA, Extension Service and the Upper Clear Fork Soil Conservation District.

Cook reports that between 50 and 60 people attended the tour and that people as far away as Abilene were present.

County Agent James S. Norman said yesterday that approximately 547 wheat producers of Fisher County would be eligible to vote in the May 21 referendum which will determine the nation's wheat program for 1964.

The producers of the nation will choose between two alternatives offered under the Food and Agricultural Act of 1962; namely, the regulation of production through marketing quotas and acreage controls or fewer production restrictions but with lower price supports.

If two-thirds of the growers vote "yes" in the referendum, the first alternative will be placed in effect by the Secretary of Agriculture. If

more than one-third vote "no", the second alternative will go into effect, the county agent said.

Norman emphasized that all Fisher County wheat growers should take part in the referendum and urged them to have their vote on as many facts as can be gathered on the proposed 1964 wheat program.

The county agent pointed out that in most peace time years during the past four decades, American wheat growers have produced more wheat than could be used domestically or exported for prices satisfactory to the growers. Also that per acre yields have been going up and per person consumption going down. He said that about 600 million bu-

shels of wheat are consumed in the U. S. each year but that about twice this amount was being produced.

The carryover reached 1.4 billion bushels during 1961, he added, but decreased about a million bushels last year.

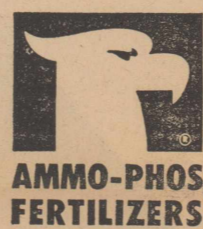

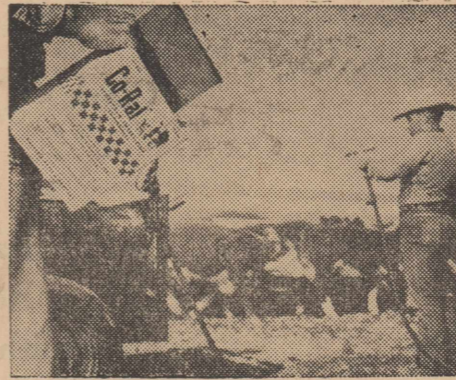

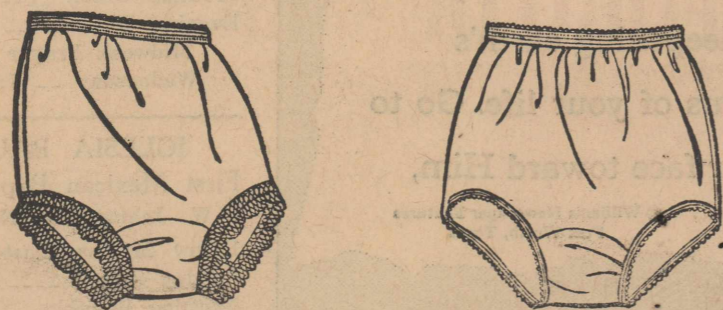

Open Letter To Citizens of Fisher Co.

We have just read with a great deal of interest a publication entitled "It's Time to Consider Snyder". We have worked with many of your citizens for the past year and a half in an effort to create a Junior College for our area of West Texas. We note that many of you are quite interested in developing such an educational facility and have been persuaded, coerced, or used, in an effort to create a college for Snyder.

"It's Time to Consider Snyder" - why? Would it not be better to consider the needs of the entire area rather than the needs of one particular community that has on its hand a school building which they would like very much to sell

to an independent Junior College School District and let them have the responsibility of paying for it.

We have delayed our activities toward the development of a Junior College upon the advise of members of the Governors Study Group which is now making a study of requirements for Junior Colleges in the state of Texas and will shortly be making recommendations to the State Board of Education and the Texas Education Agency. We sincerely hope that if you desire to pay for the college in Snyder as has been requested by the "Committee to Develop a College in Snyder" that this project will go through and will be approved. We feel that a college in this area is definitely needed and we most assuredly believe that our children and your children would benefit from any educational facility.

During the period of time that we were working with your citizens in an effort to create a college for the area many of you contacted by the "Committee to Build a Junior College in Snyder" and urged not to sign a petition of any kind. They pointed out to you that if 10% of your voters in the last general election should sign this petition that in the election that was held, a simple majority was needed to bind the entire county into a Junior College District. There is no difference in the type college we are proposing and the type college Snyder is proposing. In both cases a simple majority will carry the entire district into the college. If 10% of

the voters in the last general election, less than 2500 persons in Fisher County, should sign the petition, that would be less than 250 people. Then the over 5000 voters in Scurry County would carry Fisher County even though 100% of Fisher County should vote against it.

We do not urge that you do not sign the petition. We do urge that you think long and hard about the two sides of the coin that the "Committee to Build a Junior College in Snyder" has offered to you. If you will look closely, I believe you will see that this is a two faced coin.

If, in your belief, as a tax payer of Fisher County, it is more

practical to bow to the dictates of the "Committee to Build a Junior College in Snyder" than to assume your rights as a citizen of the State of Texas, whose statutes say that the location of a Junior College will be left up to a Board of Trustees upon their election, then we certainly urge that you go along and work with this group to put the college in Snyder. However, we feel that the ultimate location of a college should be left up to the Board of Trustees and if you have sufficient number of votes to get a Trustee elected to represent you than you would certainly have a chance of getting the college in Fisher County. The Trustees will

be elected by a majority vote and the top seven persons will be elected. It is up to citizens of Fisher County to make sure that a sufficient number of persons vote for trustees to get fair representation. As you know, you have not been consulted as to the location. You have been told where it will be. You have been told what the tax rate will be, and for all practical purposes, you have been told the name of the college.

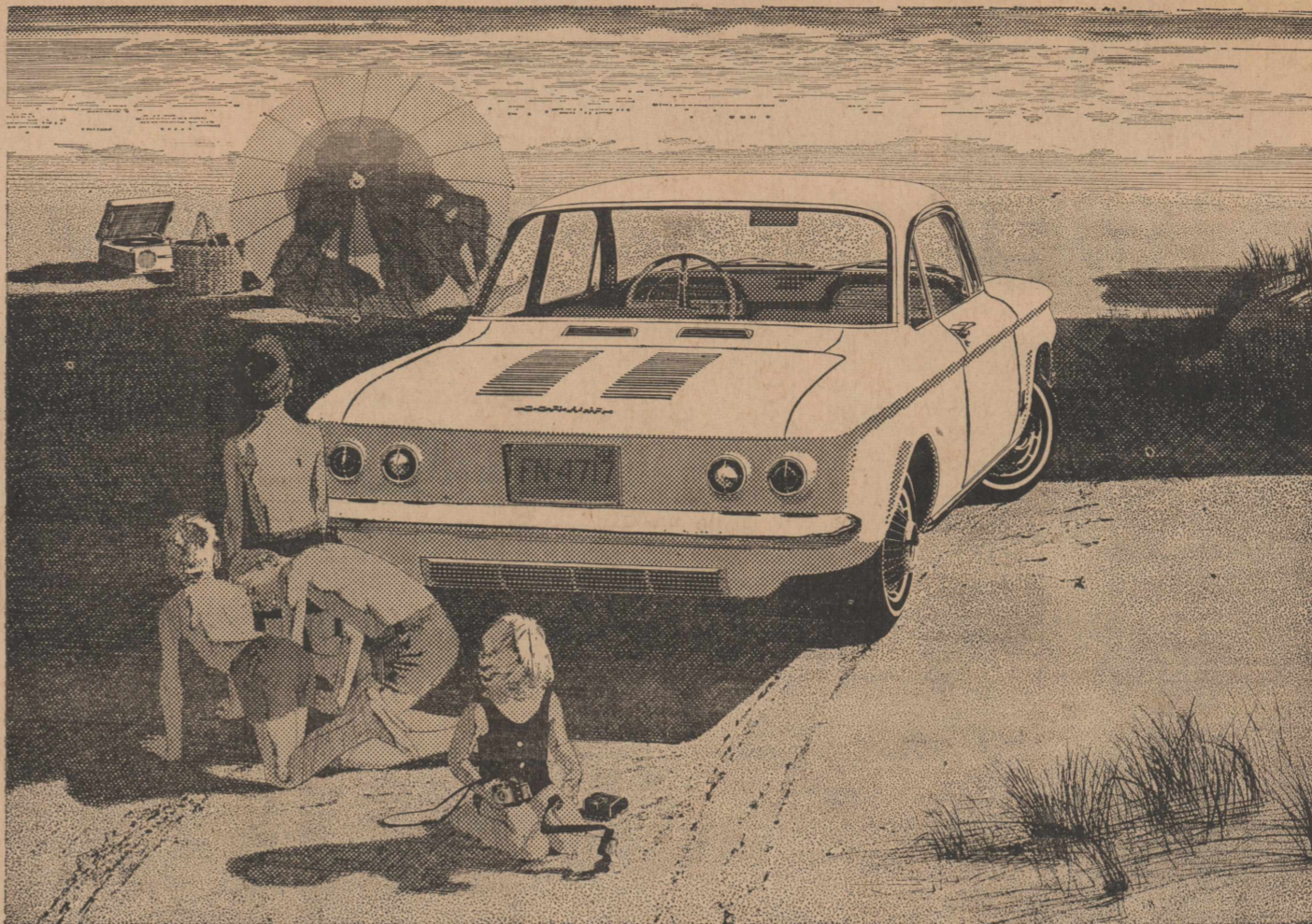
If the citizens of Fisher County elect not to go along with this individual proposal from the "Committee to Build a Junior College in Snyder", we sincerely urge that you work with us in efforts to cr-

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ate a four county Junior College with the location of that college to be left up to the Board of Trustees. In all probability the Junior College might be located on a point where four counties point. It is our thinking, based upon recommendations by specialists in the field of education, that the tax burden would be spread over a far greater area on a four county school district than on a one, or two, or three county district.

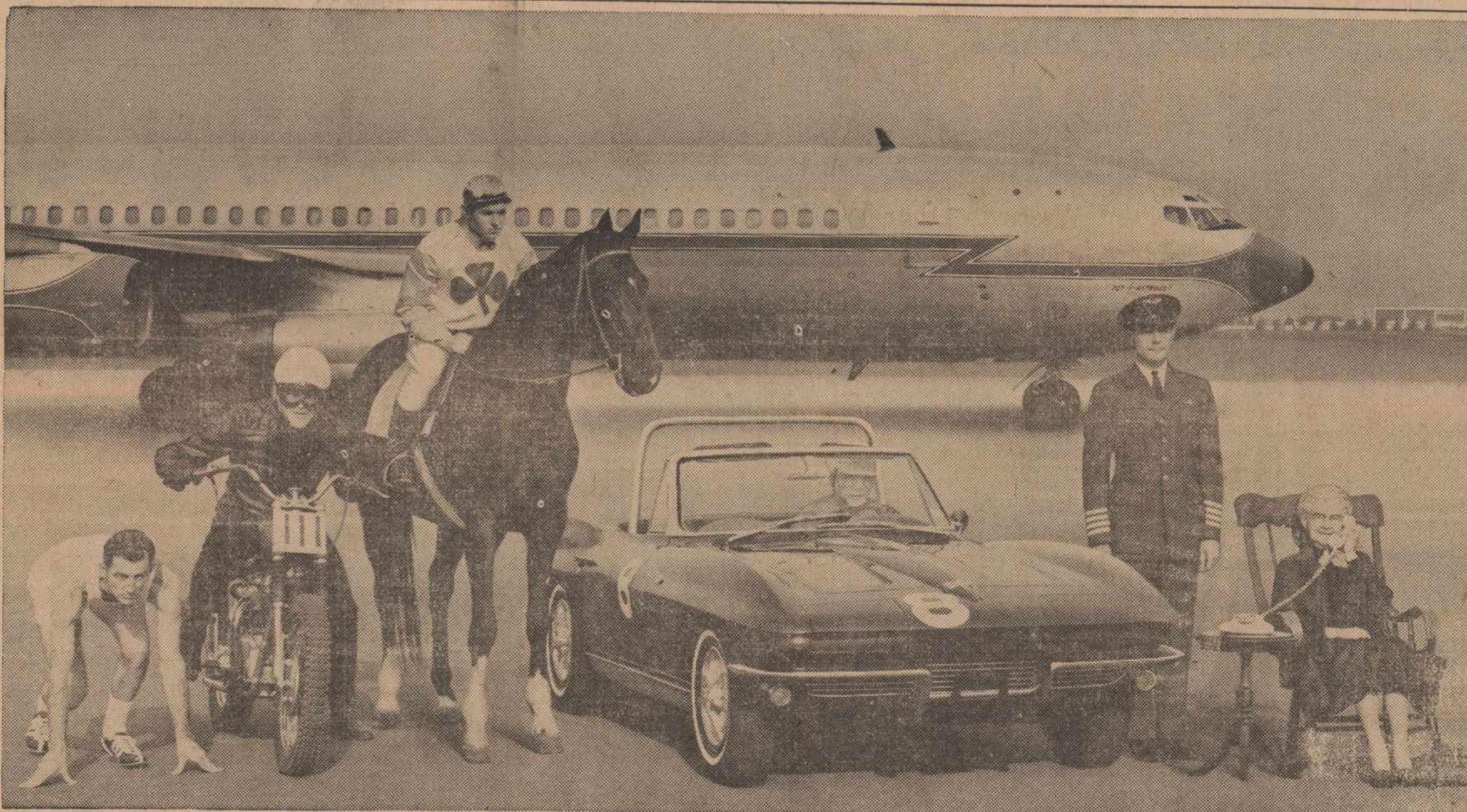
