Heavy Rains Soak Entire Area Sunday

All of Fisher County but a small section southwest of Roby received heavy rainfall Sunday afternoon. Reports give from 2 to five inches over the entire territory. About 2 inches was gauged north of Rotan, 3 to 4 inches east and south and the heaviest west where 5 inches was gauged.

Fred Byerly gauged 3.26 inches. None of the gauges probably got an accurate test as hard winds and a small amount of hail fell in Rotan. The hail was heavier to the west and a number of gardens were badly damaged as well as a small amount of row crops. Most farmers were getting ready to start planting Monday.

Water was driven in several stores and many homes during peak of storm and flooded conditions prevailed in the south section of town. Several Negro families had to be evacuated. Many terraces were damaged and many fields washed badly. Most stock water tanks filled and range land should respond rapidly.

Farmers are waiting for fields to dry before terrace can be repaired and planting started. We have a wonderful season with 6.50 to date for the year compared to 4.46 at this time last year.

Water Line Going Into Final Stages

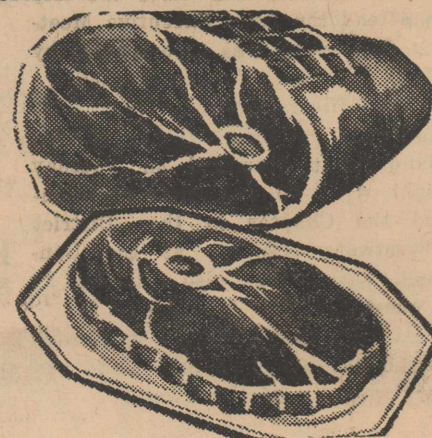
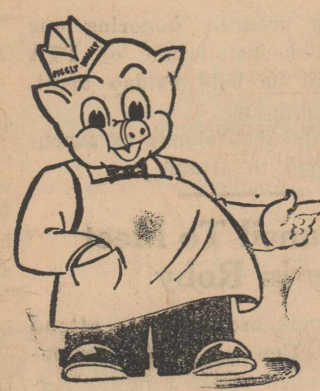

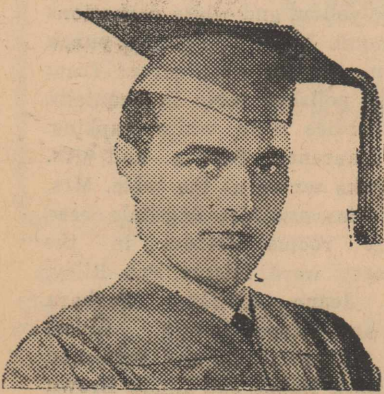

Tribute was paid to Founders of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society at a luncheon of Gamma Tau Chapter held recently at Holiday Restaurant in Sweetwater.

Mrs. T. E. Knapp, chapter president from Sweetwater, presided. Mrs. R. R. Kelly of Throckmorton gave the invocation.

Mrs. C. J. Dalton, chapter chairman of necrology, gave a short

memorial to Mrs. Leon Kidd. Mrs. Dalton said, "During this year we have lost a member. With a small red candle, Mrs. Kidd became one of us. With this red candle, I light from the white paper will ever shine in our hearts as the light of her life goes on before us." Mrs. Dalton closed her tribute by laying a red rose across Mrs. Kidd's signature in the Constitution.

Delila Baird, Chapter chairman of ceremonials, conducted the program and gave the introduction. She said that Delta Kappa Gamma was organized because twelve women recognized a need in the lives of women educators and set about to that need. They had no store of riches on which to draw for material assistance. They asked no support from either foundations or government. They simply proposed to organize the women educators of America through their own contacts, with their own resources, and by means of their own hard labor. She said that the Founder's reward was their joy in seeing their belief a reality. A brief history of the Society was given including its founding May 11, 1929 in Austin.

The Ceremonial was entitled "Let There Be Light". Miss Joe Heathington represented the Spirit of Education. She was dressed in white with a red title ribbon extending from the right shoulder to the waist and fastened with a white rose at the shoulder. Mrs. M. T. Hill represented The Spirit of Delta Kappa Gamma. She was dressed in red with a white ribbon and red rose, the official Delta Kappa Gamma Flower. Mrs. Weldon Callan dressed in black was candle lighter. A large gold candle was lighted to signify the spirit of education. From the glow of this candle the candles of Delta Kappa Gamma were lighted. There were red tapers in standing candelabras.

Founders honored were Mamie Sue Bastian, Annie Webb Blanton, Ruby Cole, Mabel Grizzard, Anna Hiss, Rey King, Sue King, Dr. Helen Koch, Dr. Cora M. Martin, Mrs. Lalla M. Odom, Mrs. Ruby Terrell Lomax, and Lela Lee Williams. Six of the Founders are still living.

As Founders names were called, Mrs. Hill related them to the purposes and symbols of Delta Kappa Gamma. Miss Heathington gave a quotation from literature for each and then said, "Let there be light". Mrs. Callan lighted the candles replying, "And there was light". The purposes of Delta Kappa

Gamma as was stated include: (1) unite women educators in spiritual fellowship; (2) honor women who have given distinctive service in education; (3) protect professional interests of women in education, elimination unjust discrimination; (4) sponsor and support desirable educational legislation; (5) endow scholarships to aid women teachers in graduate study; (6) initiate, develop a continuous program of teacher welfare to improve economic, social, political status of women; and (7) inform membership of current economic, social, political, educational issues, that they may become intelligent, functioning members of a world society.

The table used in the Ceremonial was covered with a white cloth centered with a red scarf bearing the Greek symbols of the Organization. In front of the large gold candle was a brass bowl filled with American Beauty roses. The candle holders were at either side of the ceremonial table. The coat of arms was also on display in the room.

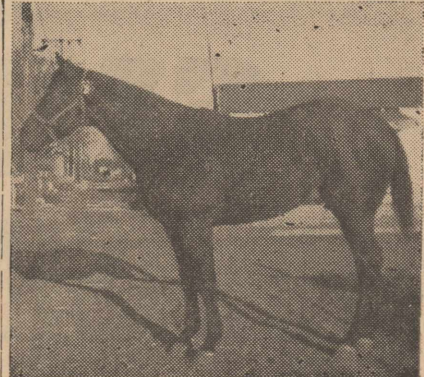
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J. R. Strayhorn gave a tribute to Dr. Blanton as Miss Baird projected the beloved Founder's picture on a screen.

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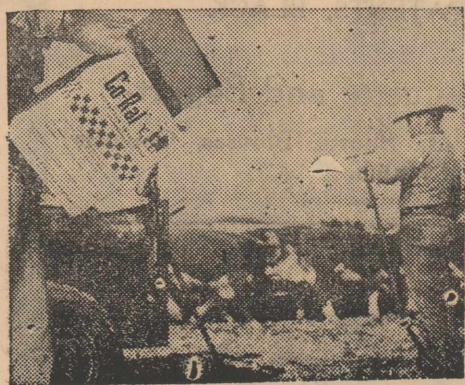
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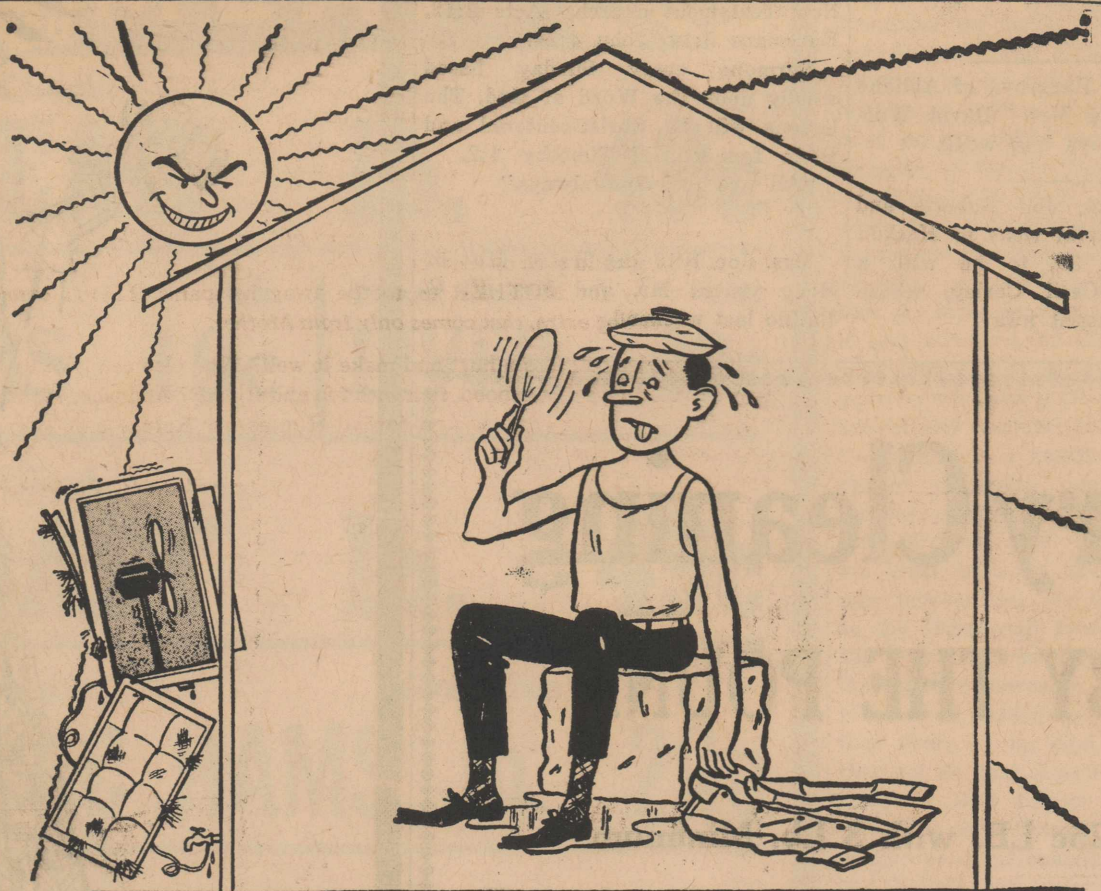


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
