Utilities Co. Announces Rate Reduction

A company-wide \$1,100,000 annual reduction in electric rates was announced today by West Texas Utilities Company. One hundred and sixty three towns and communities served by the Utilities Company will benefit from the rate reduction.

The revised schedule of electric rates was filed with the City by George Field, WTU Local Manager. The new rates will be effective with meter readings made after August 31, 1964.

These new rate schedules result from a reduction in the Company's income taxes due to recent changes in the federal income tax rates and the increased usage of electricity by present customers, together with greater company operating efficiencies and economies.

"These rate reductions," Si Phillips, WTU President said, "are evidence of our policy of reducing the cost of service to customers whenever we can. The \$490,000 direct reduction in our federal income taxes, plus the improved operating efficiencies of new generating equipment we have recently put into service, as well as the new facilities now under construction, make it possible for us to pass on again real savings to our customers. Based on 1963 sales, the new rate schedules will represent a reduction of about 3 1/2 percent company-wide."

Approximately \$390,000 of the annual savings from the reduced rates will go to residential customers. Phillips said that with the new rates the average residential customer will get about one-third more electric service for his money than he did at the end of World War II.

In addition, the new rates will mean a saving of \$274,000 for commercial lighting customers. The cost of service to combination general power and commercial service customers will be reduced another \$221,000. Phillips said that churches, schools and smaller commercial customers will particularly benefit from this rate change.

Large light and power customers will have a saving of \$140,000. "All customers," Phillips pointed out, "will share in the \$75,000 saving resulting from lowering the fuel clause adjustment factor made possible by improved power plant efficiencies."

In addition to the general reduction which affects virtually all customers, the new rate schedules provide an extension of the residential and commercial electric space heating rate from four to six months. Presently WTU electric space heating customers buy electric heat at a base rate of 1c per KWH.

There will be a "Back To School" party for high school and college students at VFW Hall, Friday, August 28 at 8:00 p. m., sponsored by a group of parents.

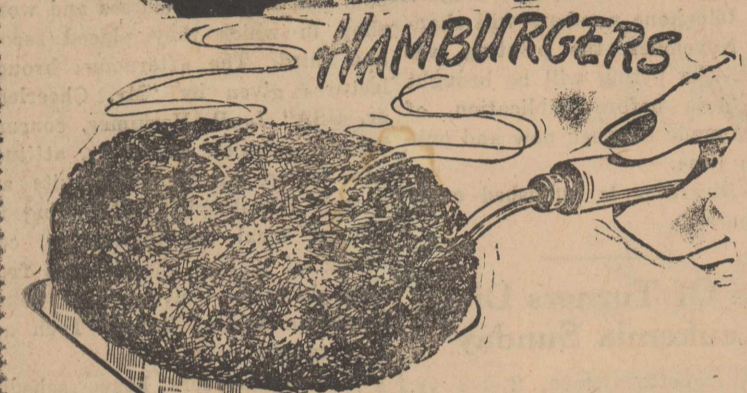

### Record Number of Vehicles Licensed

Austin, Texas -- Texans have licensed 5,832,373 vehicles this year, a new record and a 5 per cent increase over last year, the Texas Highway Department announced today.

Licenses of all types brought in total gross fees of \$120,333,000. Of this amount, \$84,180,000 goes to the state, \$27,862,000 to Texas counties and \$2,310,000 to county commissions. The remainder is allocated for various refunds, transfers and penalties, and duplicate receipt costs.

Harris County leads the 254 Texas counties in total vehicle registrations, with 747,734. Low county is Loving, in West Texas, with 125 registrations.

Following Harris County is total registrations are these: Dallas, 626,323; Tarrant, 338,003; Bexar, 327,595; El Paso, 141,989; Jefferson, 131,955; Nueces, 112,153; Travis, 111,359 and Lubbock, 111,130.

Texas has 261,316 vehicles over last year, the Highway Department said. Gross revenues from current licenses increased by approximately \$5,808,000 over those for last year.

Current vehicle registrations in Texas break down this way: Passenger cars, 4,106,467; commercial trucks, 752,214; farm trucks, 204,263; truck tractors, 50,730; farm truck tractors, 1,261; trailers, 383,735; house trailers, 29,912; motor buses, 1,215; city buses, 1,739; tractors, 1,408; farm trailers, 129,949; machinery, 12,014; disaster relief vehicles, 46; soil conservation vehicles, 17 and heavy oil machinery, 137.

The Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department is responsible for licenses and changes of titles on all motor vehicles in Texas. In addition to its concern with surface vehicles, the division also is administering agency for registrations of motor boats on Texas waterways. There are currently 177,421 motor boats registered in Texas.

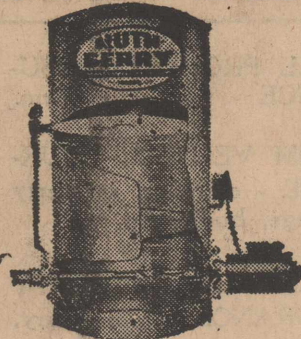

## CITY ORDINANCE

City Livestock ordinance follows as voted by citizens of City of Rotan, April 5, 1960 and passed and approved by City Council immediately following:

An ordinance making it unlawful to keep livestock or poultry within the city limits of the City of Rotan, Texas, without a license; providing regulations for keeping livestock or poultry; prescribing procedures for granting and revoking licenses; providing for inspections; defining the term livestock and poultry; prescribing penalties; providing separability of sections; and providing that such ordinance shall become effective thirty days after its passage.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Rotan, Texas:

Section 1: Then Term "livestock" as used herein shall be construed to mean any horse, mule, jack, jenny, cow, cattle, hog, sheep goat, rabbit, or guinea pig; and the term "poultry" shall be construed to mean chickens, turkeys, geese, ducks and guineas.

Section 1 A: That the term "person," as used herein shall be construed to include both singular and plural shall mean and embrace any individual, corporation, association, partnership, or society, or their agents, servants and employees.

Section 2: No person shall keep livestock or poultry within the city limits of the City of Rotan, Texas without first obtaining and thereafter keeping in force a license permitting him to do so.

Section 3: Licenses shall be granted or allowed to remain in force only when regulations as follows are observed:

A. The livestock or poultry shall be kept within structures or enclosures and not be permitted to run at large.

B. To prevent the same from serving as breeding places for insects and from emitting noxious odors, the manure or dung incident to the maintenance and care of the livestock or poultry shall be removed from structure in a reasonable time not to cause a health menace. The manure or dung so collected shall either be placed in containers or disposed of so as not to cause unnecessary odors or flies.

C. The structure or enclosure within which any such livestock or poultry or confined shall not be less than 75 feet from any dwelling house.

Section 4: The procedure and requirements for the granting and keeping in force of licenses shall be as follows:

A. Any person desiring a license permitting him to keep livestock or poultry within the city limits shall file an application with the City Clerk on a form provided by him for that purpose. Said application shall among other things call for the name and address of applicant, the estimated average number and types of livestock or poultry to be kept, a description of the structures and facilities to be used for the enclosure of the livestock or poultry and for the disposal of the manure and debris incident to their maintenance and care and the distance to the adjacent residence from the outside boundaries of the structure or fence in which the livestock or poultry are to be enclosed.

B. The application shall be accompanied by a fee of the amount of (1.00) one dollar. The funds derived from such application fees shall be used by the City to defray the cost of inspections and other expenses incident to the enforcement of this ordinance.

C. When an application has been filed in due form, the City shall turn the same over to the City Health Officer who shall inspect the facilities wherein the livestock or poultry is to be kept and prepare an opinion as to whether the same are in compliance with the regulations hereinbefore provided.

D. The application with the opinion of the City Health Officer attached shall be submitted to the City Council, which shall then pass on the application.

E. The City Health Officer may periodically on his own initiative and shall upon complaint of the City Marshall or any resident of the City make an inspection to ascertain whether the regulation as hereinbefore provided are being observed. If he finds that aforesaid regulations are violated, he shall prepare and file a statement to the effect with the City Clerk. The City Council shall then give ten (10) days notice by publication of hearing. If after a hearing the City Council finds the aforesaid regulations have been violated, it shall then order the permit cancelled.

Section 5: Any person who violates any provision of this ordinance shall be fined not less than twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars nor more than one hundred (\$100.00). Each day that such violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense.

Section 6: If any section of this ordinance is found to be unenforceable, the same shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections.

Section 7: The City Clerk is hereby directed to make publication of the caption of this ordinance together the penalty provision hereof as required by law; and it is hereby further ordained that this ordinance shall become effective thirty days after its passage.

# Accent on Health

If your son is going to play football, make sure he is properly equipped.

Buying equipment simply on looks may cost your youngster an injury that will last a lifetime.

For proper head protection, select a helmet of shock-absorbing material encased in a rigid plastic shell. A snug fit and protection from "bottoming" of the helmet on the head must be assured. Select face mask, rigid with internal cushioning, that does not protrude farther than one and one-fourth inches from the nose, thereby preventing elbow contact with the eye.

Body protection is essential, too. All pads should incorporate shock-absorbing material, and cover the intended area properly. The fit of the pants must assure effective positioning of the thigh and knee pads.

To insure foot and ankle protection, all players should have their ankles routinely wrapped with non-elastic bandage, two and one-half to three inches in width. Cleats should be kept short, if used. Rubber heels without cleats may be preferred.

Whether it is football on the corner lot or organized athletics, a boy playing contact sports needs a mouth protector as a part of his regular equipment.

If your young son wants a football helmet like the big leaguers, be wary of the low-priced helmets sold as toys. These are not suitable for real play. The suspension or internal padding provides little or no protection on impact. In addition, the edges of these helmets may be sufficiently sharp to cause lacerations.

Helmets to be used in actual play should possess the same protective qualities as those for varsity football. Otherwise, the safety of the wearer can be in serious jeopardy.

Whatever his age, if your youngster plans to participate in football or other contact sports, keep these basic principles in mind when selecting protective equipment; purchase only the best available, make sure it is carefully fitted, wear equipment at all appropriate times, in practice or in games, and make sure equipment is conscientiously maintained.

Football can be fun . . . as long as you're not gambling with unnecessary injury.
