

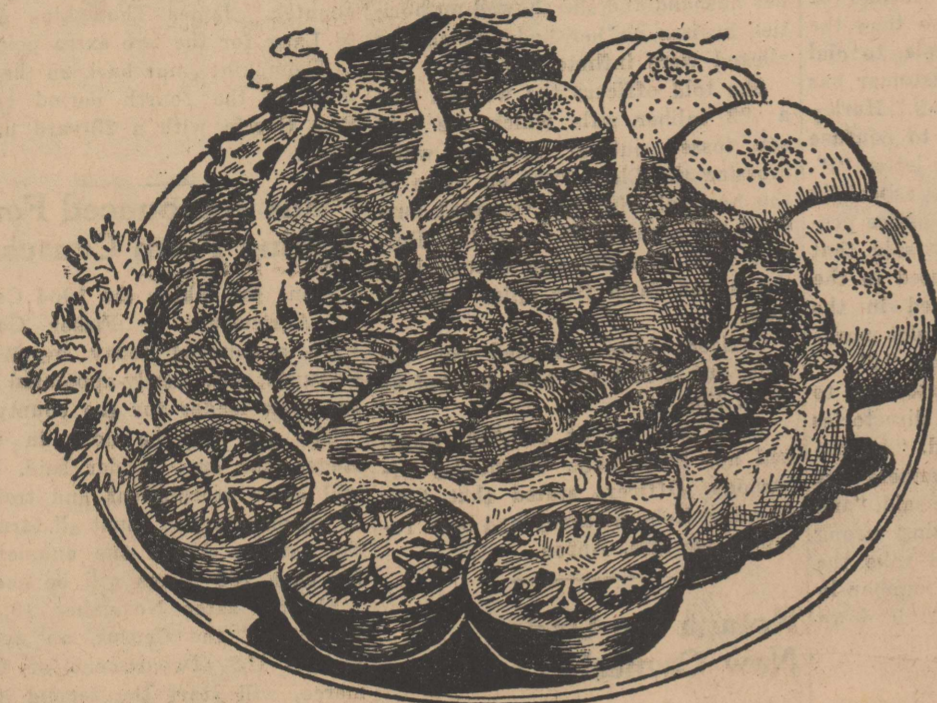

This is a reminder to all of you homemakers that it is the time for year for sending in orders for wind-break planting stock.

The following are a few of the species that are available: red cedar, Austrian pine, Chienese elm, cottonwood, sycamore, and osage orange.

For orders to be valid must be received on or before February 12, 1965, and payment must be remitted with order. Shipment will be made between mid-January and mid-February, and the first week in March.

Forms for ordering the planting stock and a guide sheet for wind-break planting for West exas is available at the local Extension office on the second floor in the Courthouse. Either drop by and call for the form or send a card and we will be glad to mail the form and the planting guide sheet to you.

With deer hunting season just around the corner, hunters may be interested in a new leaflet, "Field Dressing a Deer", now available at the county agent's office.

Since quality venison depends primarily on how the deer is handled from the time of the kill until it is placed in the freezer, field dressing is important.

Leaflet L-634 gives one method of field dressing and skinning a deer. However, any method resulting in a clean, well-bled carcass is satisfactory. Unpleasant experiences with venison usually result from lack of care before the meat reaches the kitchen.

Information in the leaflet has been provided by Wallace Klusman Extension wildlife conservation specialist, and by the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Another publication that should be of interest to hunters and housewives during this hunting season is Extension Bulletin B-987, "Wild Game Care and Cooking." It offers many suggestions for preparing delicious dishes of venison as well as other wild game meats.

This bulletin is also available at the county extension office in the courthouse.

Three factors will determine the efficiency of your cotton stripping operation.

1. Field conditions at harvest time;
2. Machine characteristics and adjustments; and
3. Skill of the operator.

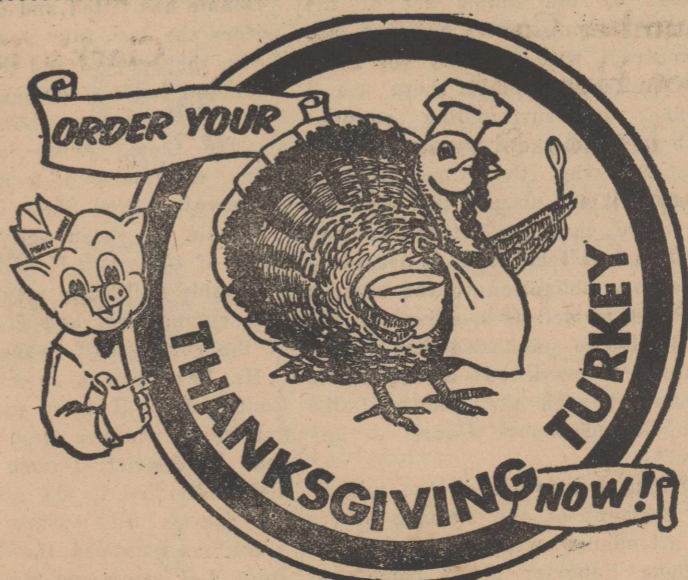
Very important is field conditions at harvest. In damp weather, performance of a cotton stripper will be less efficient than under dry conditions. Extensive testing has shown best cotton stripper performance is obtained when humidity is below 60%.

So, for better grades and cleaner fields delay harvesting until the relative humidity is 60% or less at boll height in the field to be harvested. This measurement can be conveniently made with a dial-type hydrometer -- a relative humidity measuring instrument. Dial hydrometers are available for hardware stores or instrument houses for approximately twenty dollars.

Measuring relative humidity and using this measurement as a guide for scheduling harvesting operations is important. However, also of importance, is condition of the cotton stalk. Strippers are designed to handle comparatively large volumes of dry trash efficiently. But a small amount of green leaves and other green trash can cause a significant reduction in the grade of stripped cotton. For this reason, cotton harvested with a stripper prior to frost should be treated with a chemical desiccant to kill the leaves.

After the desiccant application, delay harvesting for a week or ten days. This will allow leaves and leaf stems to become brittle. Harvest should not be delayed until the main stalk and branches are dead, as this will cause more bark to be accumulated with the cotton, which can cause a reduction in grade.

Harvesting after frost should be delayed until frost-killed leaves and stems are brittle or crisp. Here again, harvesting should be done while the main stalk still has enough sap in it to be limber. Brittle stalks and branches mean more bark in the cotton, but leathery leaves and limber leaf stems mean extra moisture in the harvested cotton which can cause sweating during storage prior to ginning.

New Law Concerning Pension For Veterans

Older veterans in the lower income bracket will be able to receive at least \$100 a month through the new law liberalizing veteran's pensions and providing basic cost of living increase to most pensioners, including widows and children.

The new law, signed by President Johnson, October 13, becomes effective January 1, 1965. The law provides basic cost of living increases of 6.4 percent to most pensioners, higher increases for those with greater need, and the greatest increases, as well as medical benefits, to the most severely disabled veterans. This last category includes those who are permanently housebound and who are blind or need constant need and attendance. The new law also liberalizes the definition of "income" which veterans or their dependents may receive and still be eligible for pension. Those persons who were on the pension roll prior to July 1, 1960, and receive pensions payments under what is called the "Old Law" are not eligible to benefits from the new pension increases. To become eligible for the increases one must change from the "Old Law" to what is known as the "New Law." Everyone should figure out which would be best for them and we can change very easily, to the one that would be most advantageous for the individual.

While the new law does not change the monetary income limitations which were set up in 1960, it allows recipients to exclude certain money when reporting annual income as required by law. (1) 10 per cent of the payments to an individual under any public or private annuity or retirement plan, including Social Security pension. (2) Amounts paid by a veteran for the last illness and burial of his spouse or child. (3) Profit realized from sale of real estate or personal property other than in the course of business. (4) Payments received for jury duty. (5) Exclusion of all of a spouse's earned income, or \$1200 of her in-

come, whichever is greater.

Under the new law permanently housebound veterans may receive an extra \$35.00 per month. Also veterans who are blind or need constant aid and attendance of another person will receive an increase from \$70 to \$100 in their monthly allowance.

The new law permits the VA to furnish physician prescribed drugs and medicines to veterans who receive the aid and attendance allowance, and to increase from \$35 to \$38 per month the death pension paid a child where is no widow. The VA will automatically adjust payments to those now eligible and will notify others of their possible entitlement. The increased amounts will be received in checks to pensioners on January 31, 1965.

Beginning on December 2, I shall be in the American Legion Hall in Rotan each Wednesday all during the months of December and January for the convenience of the ones that are drawing pensions and will have to fill those income cards in. They will be in your envelopes that you get your checks in at the end of this month so please do not misplace them.

This estimate is based on your past electric service usage, or in the case of a new customer, on similar accounts.

To keep the payments balanced, your account is reviewed monthly and yearly. If your actual metered electric usage differs materially from the estimate... due to a new major appliance or unusual conditions... you are notified that a change, up or down, in your monthly payments is needed. You may join at any time. The Equal Payment Plan Year ends with your 12th monthly payment. If at the end of the EPP year you have used more, or less, than the estimated amount, your 12th monthly payment will be increased or decreased to balance the account. To Avoid Wrong Numbers

Be sure you do not confuse a LETTER with a NUMERAL when dialing a call.

Especially when dialing the first two letters of the name "Windsor" (WI), be sure to dial the letter "I", not the numeral "1" (one).

The letter "I" is in the dial slot marked "GHI" — with the figure "4".

The numeral "1" (one) is in the first dial slot at the upper right.
