Rainy Season Opened Sunday Morning

A most welcome rain awoke citizens about daybreak Sunday morning which covered most of this section in amounts from a quarter to an inch of moisture.

About the same time Monday morning, heavier fall was received in all points in the area, in fact from the .95 inch to up to 5 inches was received everywhere but to the North and North East. Here near an inch was gauged. The fall was good east of town and some 2 inches fell Monday west and southwest of Rotan. Claytonville, Longworth and other points had up to 5 inches. Only hail reported with this cloud was at Longworth.

Republicans Take Stand On Important Matters

County Chairman of the 24th Senatorial District of the Republican met in Abilene, Texas, on May 8, and passed the following resolutions: "That the 24th Senatorial District of the Republican Party go on record as favoring the retention of the Texas Right of Work Law, and that Governor Connally be urged to publicly support this bill."

Republicans of the 24th District went in record by passing a resolution favoring retention of the present skip-row planting method as supported by the Rolling Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., as opposed to the method proposed by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and instructed that a copy of this resolution be sent to Senator John Tower.

Republicans of the 24th District passed a resolution deploring the action of the Texas House of Representatives in its passage of HB67 redistricting plan as being a glaring action of gerrymandering, which action points out the obvious need of a two party system in the state of Texas.

The following counties are represented in the 24th Senatorial District: Borden, Garza, Howard, Jones, Scurry, Shackelford, Taylor, Fisher, Haskell, Kent, Mitchell, Nolan, Stonewall.

Representatives from Fisher County are County Chairman, Dr. Maurice, Callan, and County Vice-Chairman, Mrs. Jack Willingham.

District meetings are to be held the week following each State Executive Committee Meeting of the Republican in order that the county and district officers may be well informed concerning the Republican Party.

The District Committeeman from the 24th District is Gene Delaney of Snyder, and the District Committeewoman from the 24th District is Mrs. Mary Doss of Abilene.

Protest Meeting On Change in Skip-Row Planting Held

A large group of farmers and business men attended the meeting Friday night at school lunchroom to protest the proposed change in skip-row planting of cotton in this area. James Springer headed the meeting and with Frank Mitchell, explained the proposed change which would greatly reduce allowable cotton acreage.

The most familiar skip-row pattern followed in Fisher County, as well as other counties affected, is two-in and tow-out. A farmer with a 50 acre allotment on that pattern now plants it on 100 acres. Under the new proposal which specifies a 52-inch planted row instead of the present 40-inch, 77 acres would be used. It is estimated that closer planting of cotton would reduce cotton harvest 50 to 75 per cent in the area.

The new program is designed to cut cotton production, which area farmer say is already cut to the bone.

Mitchell said that he personally opposed the change. He said he felt the state ASCS Committee was opposed to the change in the counties most affected in the area.

Skip-row planting of cotton was pioneered by Fisher County farmers 30 years ago. Mitchell said that most of the skip-row planting of cotton in entire nation was in this 10-14 county area up to 1962. In the three years since, irrigated lands in Arizona and California and the Mississippi Delta country with a resulting great increase in cotton production. Mitchell said this was the reason for the proposed change in skip-row planting. "They can go back to planting every row with irrigation and fertilization but in this dryland area we cannot do that," Mitchell said.

He said the ASCS County Committee had already sent a letter to Washington by way of the State ASCS.

A large number of protest letters were written at the close of the meeting to Gov. John Connally of Texas, Sens. John Tower and Ralph Yarborough and Rep. Omar Burelson and Director, Farmers Programs, ASCS, Washington.

The letters stressed that the economy of both farmers and business would be greatly curtailed if the new plan is put in effect, and would bankrupt many small farmers.

May 22 is deadline for filing protest and anyone that has not written a protest is urged to air-mail to the Director of Farmers Programs, ASCS, Washington, D. C.

Heaviest Rain In Many Years Falls Wednesday

Flood conditions existed for several hours Wednesday afternoon in parts of Rotan following heavy rain and light hail. The fall started about 1 p. m. and continued until after 3 o'clock. Light hail about marble size fell for a short period, causing little damage.

Fred Byerly gauged 3.95 inches in the weather bureau gauge. The 5-inch gauge on top of O. R. Clark building ran over, after the hard rain and considerable moisture fell after that. Other gauges about town showed from 4 to 5 inches.

The entire area received much needed rain. Warren Kennedy reported 2.50 and still raining; Ted McArthur, 2.40; Roland Ray, 1.90; Eddie Williams, 2.00 and Junior Kiker 2.80.

Considerable flooding existed in the west part of town and colored section. H. W. Vittitow home received considerable damage when water flooded a bedroom several inches, other homes in this area. There were also damaged. In the colored section many homes had from 2 to 6 inches of water. Hackberry Creek area had heavy rains which caused much of the flooding. Water ran across highways each direction of town for several hours stopping traffic for a time.

Little League Park was 3 to 4 feet under water at 4 o'clock and water still running in. The old city reservoir dam lacked about a foot running over, impounding a fair sized body of water.

Many fields are badly washed and much work will be necessary before planting can be done.

Fred Byerly, official Weather Observer for 23 years reported this was the heaviest single day rain he had gauged. His previous high was 2.95.

Randy was driver of the motor cart.

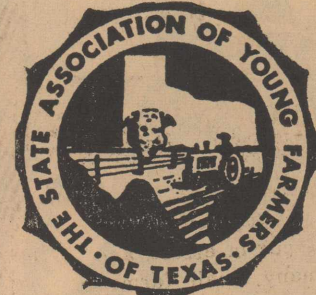
Gem-Mineral Show In Abilene This Week

Unit 13 Well Completed As Good Producer

The oil test on Mrs. Eva Day place, No. 1, Unit 13, has been completed as a 128.07 barrels of oil per day producer.

This is a Le Clair Operating Co. Inc. test, located 4,290 feet from the north and 1,910 feet from the east lines of Section 125-2-H&TC.

Potential tests showed 37 gravity, pumping from four perforations per foot, at 3,928-33 feet treated with 250 gallons of acid.

Next townsite test will be in Unit 21 in southeast part of town. This will probably be drilled in about 3 months.

Father of Neil Wright Dies In Dallas Sunday

T. E. Wright, 87, prominent Leonard citizen and former Fannin County office holder, died in a Dallas hospital Sunday following a brief illness. Funeral services were conducted at the First Presbyterian Church in Leonard Tuesday and interment was made in the Leonard cemetery.

Thomas Edmund McTaggart Wright was born November 22, 1877 on Strawberry Hill in Stamford, Conn., the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Tom Wright and came with his parents to Texas at the age of two, in 1879, settling in the Valley Creek community. He and his family were a part of the original Presbyterian missionary group that established the Valley Creek Community and later, in 1880, established the present town of Leonard.

He was married to Miss Effie Jones, daughter of another pioneer Fannin County family and they were the parents of seven children, four of whom survive. His wife died in 1959.

Mr. Wright was prominent in church, business and political circles of his community. He was a member of the board of Elders of the First Presbyterian Church of Leonard for many years. He was a prominent Valley Creek farmer until his retirement several years ago from that activity and since his retirement he has been active in real estate. For four terms he represented his precinct in the Fannin County Court as commissioner.

Mr. Wright underwent surgery in a Dallas hospital two years ago and, considering his advanced age, made a remarkable recovery returning to his home and conducting his widespread real estate business.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. C. A. Tatum, Sr., of Phoenix, Arizona; a brother, Neil H. Wright of Lubbock; two sons, Neil Wright of Rotan and Edmund Wright of Fort Worth; and two daughters, Mrs. Stapp Maxwell of Alyn and Mrs. B. P. Brents of Amarillo. Also surviving are nine grandchildren and eighteen great grandchildren.

Present Meet Past On Annual Civics Trip

The Texas capitol and Archives buildings, Texas University, the Alamo, Brackenridge Park and the President's ranch were visited by members of the Civics class and their sponsors as part of the groups Civics trip.

During the tour in Austin the group was told that the paneling in the Capitol Building would equal seven miles if it were laid end to end. The building was paid for by selling three million acres of land for one dollar per acre. A bullet-proof, 32-ton door with four locks, and 3 alarms protects the two billion dollars worth of stocks and bonds kept in the vault in the basement. Fifteen thousand red granite blocks make up the building which, when built, was the largest in the U. S., being seven feet taller than the nation's capitol building in Washington, D. C. Paintings in the Senate Chamber were explained by the tour guide. The governor's chamber was also visited. Debates were held by the group concerning windshield inspection and drivers' education.

A 20'x45' mural finished in October picturing the heroes of Texas was featured in the Archives building. Furniture and other antiques were on display, too.

Museums and libraries of Texas University were explored before the group departed Austin.

In San Antonio the Alamo proved to be the main attraction. Many plaques and memorials had been placed there in honor of those who fought and died for Texas. A museum near the Alamo held guns, ammunition, and such things which were found near the battlegrounds. The sunken gardens and the zoo were the main attractions at Brackenridge Park.

On the way home the party stopped by the LBJ Ranch near Johnson City. Though they were not allowed on the grounds they were able to see the main house, the network system set up for important calls, a few cattle, and the American flag waving high above the rest.

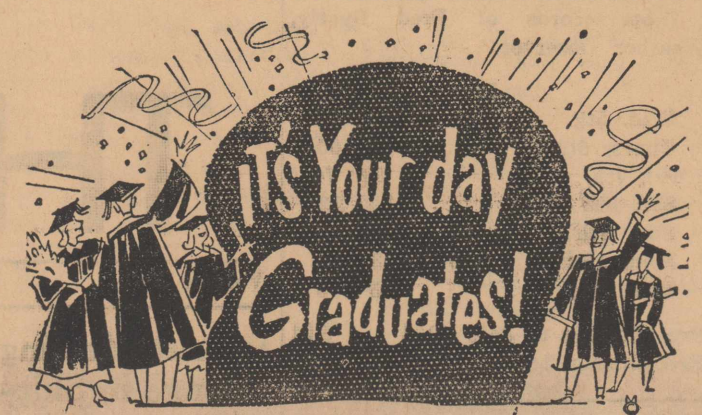

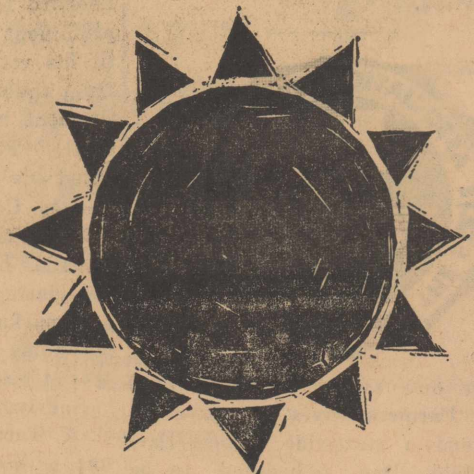
Signs Decorate Halls For Election Week

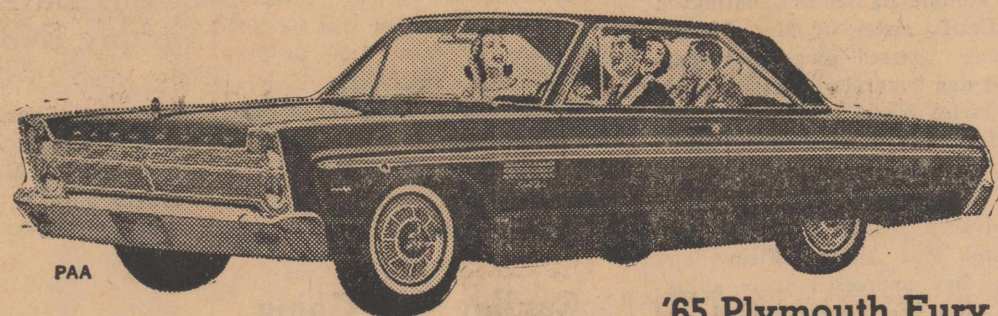

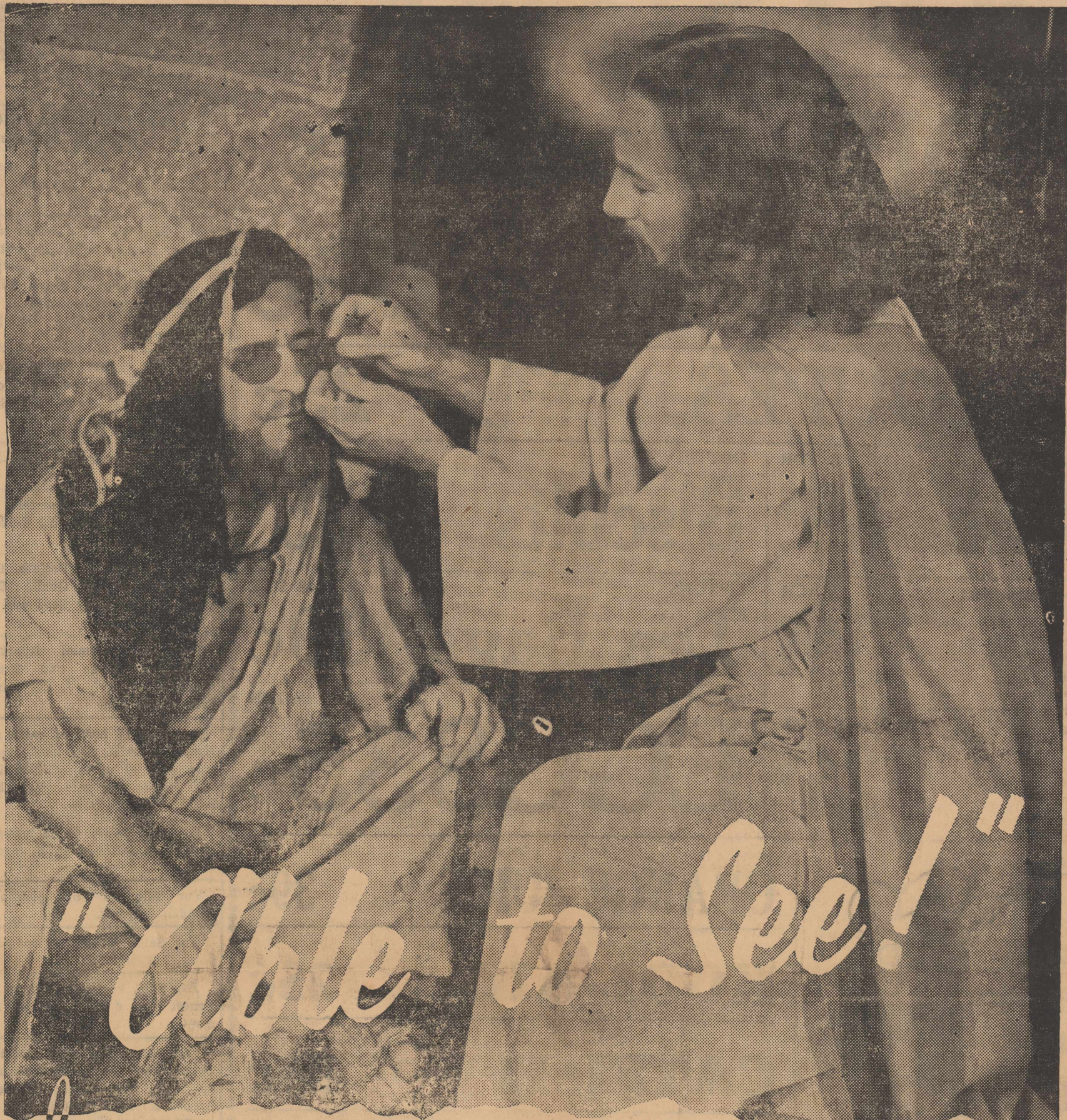

County Clerk To Approve Notaries

Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term ending June 1, 1967 must re-qualify by the payment of the required fee and the filing of a new oath and bond with the County Clerk of his residence between May 1, 1965 and May 15, 1965, inclusive.

Martin emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State. The law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve notary bonds.

Any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment should apply to his County Clerk before May 20, 1965. Application during this period will assure that the appointment will be made in sufficient time for the applicant to qualify at the beginning of the new term.

The Secretary of State further pointed out that each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must be at least 21 years of age and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The exact name and permanent address of the applicant must be furnished the County Clerk.

Summer Work Program Available to Students

To assist in meeting the expected demand for additional domestic farm workers in 18 states this summer, the Secretary of Labor intends to announce a summer employment program for athletically inclined high school students.

This program will be called "A-Team" (Athletes in Temporary Employment as Agricultural Manpower), and will be co-sponsored by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, Stan Musial and the President's Council on Physical Fitness. It will provide opportunities for summer farm work in addition to those which already may be available under other state or Federal programs.

The participating students will be employed only during their summer vacation. They will be housed in approved dwellings, fed in accordance with U. S. Department of Agriculture guidelines, and paid at a level which will not adversely affect wages of regular farm workers.

Each participating high school mya from an "A-Team" of one or more squads. Each squad should have between 20 and 31 students. If less than 20 wish to join, they will be combined with boys from another school to form a joint "A-Team."
