"I'm on the floor and I need help!"



Rosson Reports On Legislation

Tuesday of this week marked the 100th day of the 140-day Regular Session of the 60th Legislature. According to a report from the desk of Representative Renal B. Rosson, there has been 1283 bills introduced and 62 constitutional amendments offered in the House to date. The Senate has introduced 564 bills and 38 constitutional amendments.

Of the total 1847 bills introduced in the House and Senate, 55 have passed and gone to the Governor. The Governor has signed approximately 43 of these measures. Of this number approximately 23 went into immediate effect. The remainder will be effective 90 days after final adjournment of the 60th Regular Session of the Legisla-

No law passed by the Legislature, except the general appropriation act, shall take effect or go into force until 90 days after the adjournment of the session at which it was enacted, unless in case of an emergency (which emergency must be expressed in a preamble or in the body of the act) the Legislature shall otherwise direct. This direction must be by a vote of twothirds of all the members elected to each House.
