County Agent News

A group of Fisher County ranchers and stockmen made the Field Day at the Rolling Plains Livestock Research Station at Spur last Thursday April 20.

Those attending were: Glen Webb, C. D. Herron, Morris Guelker, Jack McClure and Jim Harvey.

The Brucellosis re-testing is still in progress in the county. The re-testing will have to be completed by May 21 or we lose our certification.

Any cattle owner willing to have his cattle tested is requested to contact the county Extension Office or Bobby Gillis, Livestock Inspector with the State Animal Health Commission, Sweetwater, phone BE-4-4951.

The following is some information on Economic Outlook for Beef Cattle, presented during the beef cattle shortcourse by John McHaney.

The nation's capacity to produce beef for the remainder of 1967 and in 1968 is expected to show little change from 1965 and 1966 levels. The current year's total production is expected to continue around 1966's high level.

He said the revised data on beef cow numbers shows a steady climb since 1958, a 43 percent increase over the nine year period. Beef cows two years and older on Jan. 1, 1967 totaled 34.6 million head, up from the 24.2 million head on January 1, 1958. The increase from Jan. 1, 1966 to Jan. 1, 1967 was very slight, he noted.

Larger cattle slaughter during the past two years, he said, more than offset inventory additions from calf crops and live cattle imports. The economist expects some further decline in the total cattle inventory due to a further decline in dairy cattle numbers. Beef cattle numbers in 1967 are expected to increase at about the same rate posted for the past two years, moderately. Weather and range conditions will be factors to watch.

Fed cattle marketings in 1967 could equal or exceed those for 1966 without reducing the inventory of calves and yearlings carried in 1968. This, he said, results from the increase in the supply of young cattle at the beginning of the year. There were either in feed lots, available for feed lot placement or as additions to breeding herds 600,000 more young cattle than a year ago.

McHaney expects fed cattle prices to hold around current levels until late spring when a modest strengthening of prices is expected. This strength is expected to hold for the remainder of the year. Consumer demand for beef looks good, he said.

Due to the large supply of feeder cattle and the lower level of fed cattle prices, McHaney says it's unlikely that much further seasonal strengthening can be expected in feeder prices this spring. But, he adds, expanded feed lot capacity will likely maintain sufficient demand to keep feeder cattle prices above fed cattle prices for the next several months.

McHaney concludes that annual average prices for all cattle during 1967 will not differ greatly from the 1966 average.

These were the first words Mrs. Myrtle Allen heard when she answered the call on her switchboard. A telephone operator in Dallas, Mrs. Allen tells what happened next: "He could hardly talk," she recalled, "but it was evident he was stricken, on the floor helpless and had managed to dial 'Operator' for help. I told him to stay on the floor and not to worry because I wouldn't leave him."

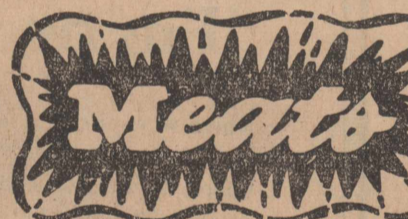

Herald of Truth Radio Program

Herald of Truth international religious radio programs are now being broadcast on KFMN Abilene Sunday 5 p.m.

John Allen Chalk, the young evangelist named to "Outstanding Young Men of America" and nominated for "Outstanding Young Man of Tennessee" in 1964, is the radio speaker.

Herald of Truth programs are currently being broadcast by 770 radio stations and telecast by 148 television stations in more than 14 countries. The program is produced by the Highland Church of Christ in Abilene, and supported by churches of Christ and interested individuals throughout the world.

Herald of Truth expanded to television in 1954 with 23 stations and has grown steadily since that time. It is now one of three half-hour religious programs in America produced exclusively in color.

Presented in an undenominational format, the Herald of Truth has a goal of world saturation with the Christian message.

Herald of Truth is the only international religious telecast produced under the supervision of a single congregation.

Starting with a program of radio sermons and a cappella music, the Herald of Truth later entered television with programs of actual worship services of congregations.

In 1960 the first dramatic series was produced, featuring Dr. Batsell Barrett Baxter, well-known minister and Christian educator, assisted by a cast of church members with professional dramatic experience.

A new concept in religious television was introduced the next year in the "Living Christianity" series, which related true-life, documented episodes of conversion and Christian development.

Today radio programs are taped with careful attention to detail and quality to ensure utilization of the new dimensions of sound available in modern radio.

3-Day Cattle Course Held

The three-day Fisher County beef cattle shortcourse ended Thursday night with an average attendance of 23 persons each night, according to James S. Norman, County Agriculture Agent.

The course opened on Tuesday night with a discussion on "Outlook for Beef Cattle Industry for the Next Several Years and the Agriculture Outlook as a Whole," by John McHaney, Economist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station, Texas.

Wednesday night's program was on "Feeding and Maintenance of the Cow and Calf," by L. A. Maddox, Jr., Animal Husbandman, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station.

The Thursday night session was concluded with a talk on pregnancy testing by Dr. Barry Allen, Veterinarian, Rotan. Talk on freeze branding and maintaining health in cow herd, by Dr. C. M. Patterson, Veterinarian, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station, Texas.

Thirteen persons attended all three sessions and received certification of Completion.

Tuesday morning, April 25, a group met at Jim Harvey's ranch southeast of Roby where Dr. Allen gave a demonstration on pregnancy testing. A freeze branding demonstration was also conducted.

Jim Harvey, Chairman of the county Livestock Subcommittee, served as chairman of the shortcourse. Other members of the committee are: James Cave, Jack Willingham, Don Campbell, Kyle Moore, Barton Willingham, and C. D. Herron.
