

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE 11, 1967, at which time the bal-LEGISLATURE OF THE lot shall have printed thereon STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as fol-"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby

authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law en-forcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that while said Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff, Constable, Deputy Constable or other county or pre-cinct law enforcement official is hospitalized or incapaci-tated that the county shall continue to pay his maximum salary; providing, however, that said payment of salary shall cease on the expiration of the term of office to which such official was elected or appointed. Provided, however that no provision contained herein shall be construed to amend, modify, repeal or nullify Article 16, Section 31, of Constitution of the State of Texas."

Further plans for dedicating the Knox City Plant Materials Center on September 7, were announced today by H. N. Smith, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Ser-

Donald A. Williams, SCS Administrator, Washington, Hobbs H. D. Club; Third place D.C., will be the key speaker and Smith will be master of ceremonies. Smith said tours of the center will be conducted from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. and from

Several hundred seed dealers, growers, conservation Mrs. Jerry Hoodenplye and district supervisors, farmers, Mrs. Nina Cave, both of Roby. ranchers, city developers, sportsmen, and others interested in the plants being tested will attend. The center serves bons, Gayle Thornburg, Roby; Texas, Oklahoma and adjoining states.

Congressmen and State Representatives from the area are also expected to attend.

The job of SCS plant materials centers is to find, evalunette Cleveland, McCaulley ate, and put into use better plants to solve varied soil and water conservation problems. Planting materials being used include seed, sprigs, and rootstock.

Some 850 varities of plants are being evaluated, including grasses, legumes, forbs and woody plants.

For example, about 13 selections of alkali sacaton are held butterfly veils. They carbeing watched to try to find the best grass to plant on certain alkali soils or on land damaged by salt. Five mesa dropseeds are being studied for use on drouthy clay and

Some 95 other grasses are also being evaluated, including Kleingrass, Old World bluestem composite, buffalograss (W-2 hybrid), Arizona cottontop, Lehmann lovegrass and whiplash pappus-

Native selections of shrubs. forbs and legumes are being turkey and other wildlife. Knitted Afghan — Mrs. Turfgrasses resistant to heavy awns, commercial devloepments, parks and other recreational areas.

Other work being done at the center includes a search and at least 210 H.P. Heavy for better ways to harvest cer- duty V8 engine. 2 - 8:25 by tain grass seeds; ways to 20, 10 ply tires and 4- 9:00 make some grasses, such as vine mesquite, produce seed more consistently; and better ways to establish certain

plants. After improved plants are identified and proved at the center, they are grown in seed increase plats. After harvest, seed are used to make trial plantings on district cooperators' farms, after final tests, superior varities are identified and released to commercial seed growers who produce seed for public sale.

These growers produced about two million pounds of grass seed in Texas last year, Cucumber - Mrs. Fred mostly from strains released by SCS plant materials cen-

Groups cooperating with SCS in evaluating plants include Texas A&M University, Texas Technological College, Canned Corn - Mrs. Fred Oklahoma State University, Prairie View A&M College, and soil and water conservation districts in Texas and Oklahoma.

STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be

Section 49-e, as follows: "Section 49-e. The Parks and Wildlife Department, or its successor vested with the powers, duties, and authority which deals with the operation, maintenance, and improvement of State Parks, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general ob-ligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Seventy-Five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000). 
