Weldon Fisher, 39, of Rotan, died at 4 p.m. Friday while en route to San Antonio. He had been in ill health for several years.

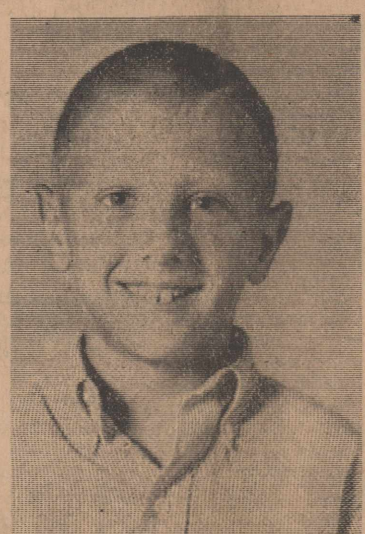

## Midwest Sponsor Free Capital Trip

Midwest Electric Cooperative will award expense-paid trips to Washington D. C. to winners of an oratorical contest they are sponsoring. This announcement was made this week by Don Waddell, Members Service Director for the Roby based Cooperative.

This contest is open to any boy or girl at least 16 years of age, but not 18 years of age prior to September 1, 1968. Winners will join winners of similar contests sponsored by other cooperatives across Texas on the fourth annual Texas Electric Cooperatives Government-In-Action Youth Tour to Washington D. C. All expenses of the trip will be paid by Midwest Electric Cooperative.

Each entrant will be required to give a 5 to 8-minute talk on the subject, "A Youth Looks At His Community." The contest will be judged on the basis of (1) Knowledge of subject - 40%; (2) Speaking ability - 30%; (3) Poise - 10%; (4) Personality - 10 percent and (5) Appearance - 10 percent.

Interested young people may obtain an official entry blank from their school or the offices of Midwest Electric Cooperative at Roby or Snyder. The deadline for submitting entries will be November 20, 1967, Waddell said.

As participants in the Texas Electric Cooperative Youth Tour, the local contest winners will leave Dallas June 6, 1968 on the 13 day all expense-paid trip. The group will travel by chartered buses to Washington, D. C., where they will spend four and one-half days visiting places of historical interest and seeing our nation's government in action.

## NROTC Test To Be Dec. 9

Applications for the Navy's twenty-second annual Regular NROTC qualification test are now available according to Mrs. Patsy Hamric counselor at Rotan, Roby, McCauley and Hobbs schools. This nationwide examination will be given on December 9th, and all eligible male high school seniors and graduates may apply.

On the basis of this test, personal interviews, medical examinations, and other factors, Mrs. Hamric explained over 1,700 young men will enter the Regular NROTC Program as midshipmen at NROTC units in 52 colleges and universities throughout the nation. Male citizens of the United States who will be at least 17 but not yet 21 on June 30, and who are now high school seniors or graduates, may be eligible to apply for the test. Those who attain qualifying scores will be interviewed and given medical examinations next January and February.

A successful candidate receives financial aid for four years of college. This includes tuition and educational fees, books, uniforms, and \$50.00 per month subsistence allowance. After successfully completing baccalaureate degree requirements and naval training, graduates are commissioned as officers in the U. S. Navy or Marine Corps.

Regular NROTC midshipmen participate in three summer-at-sea training periods with various naval units. These periods assist them in learning about the variety of interesting and challenging opportunities available to them as naval or marine corps officers.

Registrations for the test will close November 17. The 1968 NROTC Bulletins containing eligibility requirements and qualifying test applications are available from Mrs. Hamric.

County Agent**

The fall screwworm outbreak — aided by rains, winds and floods triggered by recent hurricanes in South-west United States and Northern Mexico — continues to threaten Texas Livestock Producers. The week ending October 21, 170 cases of screwworms were positively confirmed in Texas, and officials don't know if the peak has been reached yet. Locally, we are asking all producers to continue their vigilance against screwworms, and use good management practices such as spraying herds, doctoring all wounds, collecting and sending larval samples to the Mission Laboratory for identification so that sterile screwworm fly treatment can be started as all new cases are confirmed.

A new variety of winter-hardy oats has been develop-

ed by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. It is known as Norwin. Under irrigation average yields on a three year period were 115.1 bushels as compared with 108.3 for Cimarron and 98.4 for Bronco. On dryland over a 4 year period it averaged 26.4 bu. as compared to 24.4 for Cimarron and 21.2 for Wintack. Norwin products forage for winter pasture rather quickly after seeding due to its erect growing seedlings. The new variety is susceptible to both leaf and stem rust, conditions in the rolling plains will probably allow it to escape damage most seasons because of its earliness. Seed may be obtained from the Foundation Seed Section, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, College Station. Registered and certified seed may be obtained from growers and commercial seedmen after the 1967 harvest.

The pink bollworm infestation in the Rolling Plains has increased considerably during

the past season. It is believed that in some locations in this area had the pink bollworm been able to complete one more generation economic damage would have been caused by this pest. According to A. L. Broman of the Plant Pest Control, USDA, the pink bollworm can be found in rather large numbers at several gins. Pink bollworms have also been found in several fields scattered throughout the Rolling Plains.

The reason for the increase in pink bollworm populations in this area may be due to several factors or to a combination of these factors. The mild temperatures during the past winter would increase the normal winter carry-over of pink bollworms. Conditions during the past growing season were favorable for reproduction and development of the pink bollworm and other cotton insects. Moth migration from areas in South and Southwest Texas may also have contributed to the pink bollworm population in this area.

The pink bollworm is one of the most destructive cotton pests. It was first introduced in the United States in 1917 from Mexico. The pink bollworm became established in the Rolling Plains area in the early 1950's.

A. L. Broman stated that the first two infestations established in the United States were in Robertson and Liberty counties in Texas and that these infestations were eradicated. However, since that time other infestations were introduced and at this time Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and part of Arizona are considered to be generally infested. Louisiana, Arkansas and part of California are considered to be in eradication zones. Under the present federal quarantine, all cotton products and processing machinery have free movement within the generally infested area or zones. All cotton pro-

Mrs. Hubert Barton presented the program. Her topic was "Air Pollution and The Clean-Up Problem" and she discussed and processing machinery, cotton strippers, used mechanical pickers and used gin machinery must be treated before moving out of the generally infested area. Cotton products and used cotton processing equipment moving out of the generally infested area are treated by means of fumigation, heat treatments and improved fans.

The Texas Department of Agriculture and the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Research Service, Plant Pest Control Division and other agricultural agencies has done considerable work in reducing or suppressing the pink bollworm population in the Rolling Plains area since the early 1950's. All gin trash or gin waste is treated by means of approved fans before it is returned to farms. At the end of each season each gin cleans its premises to eliminate a concentration point for hibernating pink bollworms. The movement of cotton products and processing machinery is also restricted to prevent pink bollworms from moving out of the generally infested area.

The Texas Agriculture Extension Service has conducted educational programs concerning control of the pink bollworm through cultural and chemical methods. A tremendous amount of research on this insect has been carried out by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Agricultural Research Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture. Publications are available at your County Agent's office concerning the pink bollworm.

began her talk by stating that as soon as primitive man moved his fire into his cave, he certainly became aware of air pollution in the form of smoke. We have been weighing air pollution against inconvenience ever since. Now we are beginning to realize that more than convenience is involved and that the air around us is not a limitless sea into which we can continue to pour waste without serious consequences.

She continued by saying that "Effect" is the keynote in all definitions of air pollution and the simple act of introducing material into the air is not air pollution. If the materials produce or contribute to an adverse effect on the health and well-being of man or interfere with his normal and reasonable activities or use of property, it is air pollution.

The pollutants that cause effects can be considered in two broad categories, the particulates and gases, based on their physical state. Three broad classes of pollutants - common everywhere - can be generalized quite simply: (1) Gasoline engine exhaust fumes; (2) Soot, dust, chemical dust and other floating particles; (3) Sulfur dioxide gases that are products of burning coals and fuel oil. The general effects of air pollution can be considered in broad categories: general nuisance, effects on plants and animals and effects on man's health.

Mrs. Barton closed by saying that control of air pollution is a complex of social, economic and engineering problems. There is no single, simple formula. When people have recognized the problem, evaluated the cost, and decided what they wanted, the legal and administrative mechanisms to accomplish the job have usually been found. The air around us is a vital natural resource that we must preserve.

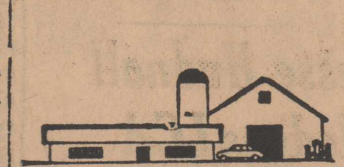
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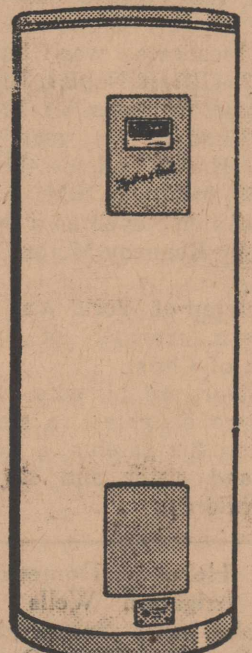

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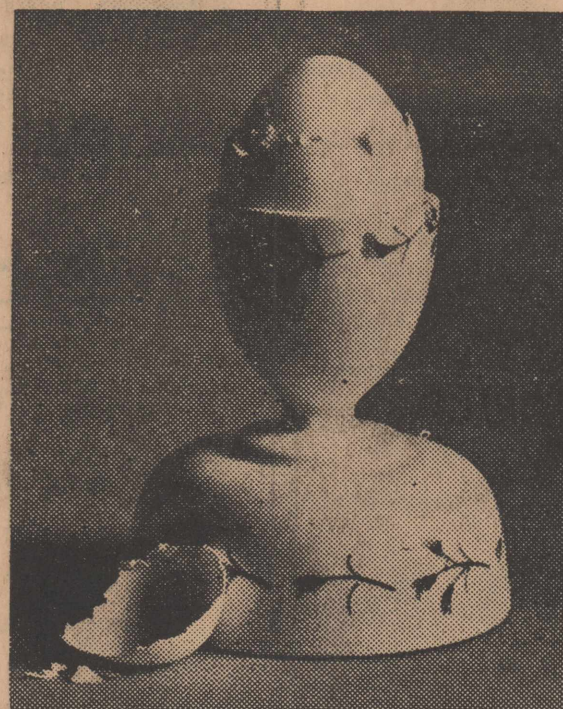
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
