An area meeting explaining the Rolling Plains Economic Program is scheduled at Community Center in Rotan Tuesday, November 21 from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. Representatives from Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Mitchell, Scurry and Stonewall counties will attend and everyone interested in the movement to improve economic stability of their area is invited to attend. Three other meetings are being held over the vast Rolling Plains area at the same time.

An intense study of the economic influences in the 28 county Rolling Plains Area has been made during the past year. This study was requested by agricultural and business leaders in the area. The purpose of the study was to determine the principal problems and the major areas of opportunities in the Rolling Plains. This has been accomplished by individual discussion with over 150 leaders and a review of research findings and other data pertaining to economic activities and resource use in the Rolling Plains.

The report, which includes suggested guidelines and program plans for more efficient use of the resources of the Rolling Plains, has been reviewed by the area committee and revisions and corrections have been made. The report and guidelines are now ready to present to you who have a keen interest in Rolling Plains business and agriculture.

This program is to attempt to accomplish mass application of the best production, marketing, precision management and conservation techniques know today.

## Shop-Mail Early

Shop early, mail early, use Zip Code — and the gifts and greetings that are delivered on time for a Merry Christmas will be yours.

By mailing gifts early the rush will be avoided and much cause for damage eliminated.

Parcels over 5 pounds sent overseas should be mailed as soon as possible. Those weighing 5 pounds or less, and greeting cards for service men overseas mailed at surface rates go by air mail on a space available basis and should be mailed by Dec. 1.

Christmas gifts to distant states should be mailed as soon as possible after Dec. 1. These may be endorsed "Do Not Open Until Christmas." Breakable items should be packed with at least 2 inches of cushioning material around and between each mail.





### Draft Calls For December

Austin, Nov. 13 — State draft boards are scheduled to forward 3,485 young men for pre-induction mental and physical examinations in December, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, announced Tuesday. The Selective Service boards are sending 4,650 for this examination in November.

The states 155 draft boards will be called upon to furnish 924 men for induction in December. Inductions are scheduled for the period December 1 through December 15.

This compares with quotas of 1,159 for November, 977 for October, 1,180 for September, 1,421 for August, and 974 for July.

Local board quotas for induction and pre-induction examination in December already have been figured and sent to the state's 155 draft boards.

The Texas quota of 924 for December is the state's share of a national call for 18,200, all for the army.

**Hats Off To Our Consumers**

Everyone is a consumer! the little girl grasping a nickel to buy candy, the elderly gentleman shopping for a second limousine and the young homemaker deciding whether to buy canned or fresh pumpkin for Thanksgiving.

This week salutes them with Hats off to Consumers during Consumer Education Week, November 6-10 in Texas.

Each constantly is struggling to stretch his dollars for the best, safest and most adequate buys. The week, sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, aims to help him.

Successful dollar-stretching begins with a spending plan fitted especially for your family and reflecting its values, needs, ways of living and wants. It is impossible to set a budget for a family of four for example, because each family is individual, extension specialists at Texas A&M University say. Your plan must be tailor-made.

But budgeting need not be a drudgery, itemizing every penny spent and balancing weekly. Use a spending plan for a year for best results. Extension specialists advise.

After a plan allows more-better spending, the consumer then chooses, uses and maintains his purchases.

State and federal laws, businessmen, government agencies, teachers, Extension workers and researchers work for the consumer to protect him and make him more aware and informed to help himself.

The county Extension office serves as a consumer center for each consumer.

Laws protect him with clean, fit food; safe effective drugs and therapeutic devices; safe cosmetics; and honest, informative labeling and packaging.

Laws also protect clothing fabric and some furniture buyers, specify that certain information about textile products be provided to the consumer.

An aware consumer takes advantage of these aids for better buys for better living.

It begins with a plan and has a happy ending. But does it?

We take for granted many consumer services, such as grading, standardization, inspection of food, laws, and labels. But the informed bene-

**Pasture Management**

"Good management of irrigated pastures pays off in higher yields and better quality forage. This means more dollars per acre," according to Bill Lewis of the Soil Conservation Service, Rotan.

With increased costs of putting in a pasture and lower livestock prices it is more important than ever that good management be practiced. Low or medium producing pastures will not be profitable.

Good management requires work and "know how." The producer must understand the proper use of grass, water and fertilizer. The grass represents the factory. The water and fertilizer are essential to make the factory produce. Sunshine, supplies the energy to run the factory. The size of the factory is determined by the amount of leaves available to catch the sunshine.

Proper use of a grass plant means leaving adequate leaves at all times to catch the sunshine and keep the factory running at full capacity. Any time a plant is stripped of its leaves, growth is slowed down or stopped. A pasture that is continuously grazed short cannot make maximum yields.

Maximum yields can only be attained when grass has periods of grazing. This can be done by dividing a pasture into two or more units and moving the livestock from one unit to another at regular intervals. In this way the grass can be grazed when the quality is at its best. High yields can be obtained because of the rapid growth that takes place during the rest period. Rotation grazing also allows for fertilizing and watering to be done when the livestock are off the grass.

This reduces the danger of nitrate poisoning of the livestock and also prevents trampling of the soil when it is wet.

Regular watering and fertilizing, coupled with proper use of the grass and rotation grazing, will result in good grass production.

The producer should also consider the type of cattle he plans to graze. Older and more mature cattle can utilize this type of pasture better.

A good example of bermuda grass pasture being properly managed is the Jim O'Briant Farm, south of Rotan.

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
