

Summary of 1967 **Extension Work**

The Extension Home Economics program in Fisher County in 1967, under the direction of Mrs. Alice Ballenger, County Home Demonstration Agent, has reached numerous groups in the county.

The four Home Demonstration Clubs which meet twice each month, had programs in Clothing, Foods and Nutrition, Housing-Home Furnishings and Home Management. The agent met with the clubs to present four of these programs. She trained thirtythree women from the four clubs in programs which they in turn presented to their own clubs.

The County Home Demonstration Council, made up of fifteen women representing the four clubs met once each month. The Council coordinates the entire H. D. Program in the county. Mrs. Fred Waddell served as chairman this past year. Council also serves to train women in leadership and parliamentary procedure. In April a short course was conducted in Rotan which was for the public. Using a number of speakers, the program covered the subejct of planning for building a new home.

As a continuation of this series of educational programs on housing, a program was presented by personnel from utilities companies on Heating and Cooling the Home. This program was in Roby in November; also open to anyone interested in this subject.

Eight women and a number of 4-H girls have carried result demonstrations in Housing. Landscape .. improvement, Clothing, and Foods this past year. Result demonstrations are carried by women of 4-H members to show accomplishments and recommended practices in the particular subject matter they have selected for a demonstration. The agent visits these people, helps them to set up goals to be reached. Then visits to see progress made throughout the year.







against mite and scale insects. A dormant oil may be used any time when trees are in the dormant stage. However, better insect control may be obtained by using a dormant oil in late winter or early spring just before the buds start to crack. If a spring application is used, it chould be applied after the possibility of heavy freeze occurs. An advantage ' applying the dormant oil in late winter or early spring is the fact that the insects are in a weakened condition and are easier to kill. A disadvantage would be the fact that you have only a short time to apply the dormant oil and the greater possibility of plant







SALVATION BY GRACE

God's word teaches that there is both the Divine and human side to man's salvation. The Divine is shown by God's grace and mercy in that provisions have been made for man's salvation. The human side comes about when man ve Pumps, Motors, learns of this provision and obeys the commandments contained in God's will. To illustrate, Jesus gives us the privilege of asking, "Give us our daily bread" (Matthew 6:11). Thus God gives us our daily bread. Question: When does God give us bread? There is both the Divine side and the human side in receiving bread.

The Divine side is shown in that God puts life in the seed and provides the soil in which the seed is planted. Through His laws of nature the seed, when planted, will grow and produce. Without God's part, man cannot be saved, this is grace. Without man's part, sins will not be forgiven, this is obedience.

> The supreme manifestation of God's grace is seen in the gift of His Son, Jesus Christ, as our redeemer and the sacrifice for sin. But man, hopelessly lost in sin, needed to know the way to come to Christ and out of sin. God's commands meet man's need for guidance and are, therefore a manifestation of His grace toward man. God's commands grow out of man's needs, and every command of God is full of God's grace. Man must OBEY God to receive His GRACE (Hebrews 5:8-9: I Peter 1:22; Romans 2:8).

> Three thousand souls were saved by grace on Pentecost when they obeyed the command, "Repent ye; and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38, 41). The apostle who wrote, "For by grace have ye been saved through faith" (Eph. 2:8), was SAVED BY GRACE when he OBEYED the command "Arise and be baptized and wash away thy sins calling on the name of the Lord" (Acts 22:16).
