## Oilbelt Teachers Meet Mar. 8th

"Be Concerned With Their Education" is the theme of the twenty-seventh annual and last convention of the present Oilbelt District VII of Texas State Teachers Association when the members of 23 counties meet in the Sweetwater Coliseum, March 8 at 9 o'clock.

Hazel Nunn, business education teacher in Sweetwater High School and wife of a prominent Sweetwater lawyer Charles Nunn, will preside at the general session at the Coliseum and at the House of Delegates meeting in the High School Cafeteria on the preceding evening.

Sweetwater School Superintendent Olaf G. Smith will welcome the anticipated 2000 visitors.

Dr. Dale Baughman, well-known Indiana University educator and popular convention speaker, will meet the concerns of the crowd of teachers and administrators in his keynote address "Within the Retina."

Dr. Baughman will solve other concerns of teachers when he speaks to five different groups on "Beatitudes for Beleaguered Bigwigs". He will be speaking at noon in the high school cafeteria to administrators, teachers of foreign language, librarians, science teachers, and representatives of Texas Small Schools Association.

Professors from Abilene colleges will meet with four luncheon groups: George Sorenson, Hardin-Simmons University, will address speech teachers on "Excellence in the Teaching of Speech in the Secondary School"; Dr. Clyde Jetton, from the same university, will speak to the guidance group; C. B. Darrell, McMurry College will use the timely topic "Spring Training in Rhetoric" for teachers of English; and Dr. James Bradford from Abilene Christian College will meet concerns of the teachers of mathematics.

Sweetwater men will address three of the sectional meetings: Tom Wideman, manager of Industrial Manufacturing Company, will speak to the vocational and industrial education teachers after their luncheon; Dr. A. N. Densmore will discuss "Archaeology in West Texas" with teachers of social studies; and Coach Joe Boyd will answer some of the concerns of health and physical education teachers when he answers the question "Where Are We Failing?"

Six other sections have announced their program plans. Art teachers during their luncheon at Reagan Junior High Cafeteria will hear Mrs. Juanita Tittle Pollard of Lubbock discuss "Classroom Experiences". Business education teachers will hear consultant George Lagleder from the Texas Education Agency; supervisors of school lunches have invited Andy Waters of the Lance Corporation; school secretaries will hear Mrs. Billie Gray discuss concerns of that group; vocational agriculture men will conduct a round-table discussion on their concerns for future farmers; and homemakers will hear a panel of ex-homemaking students, who are now housewives, evaluate high school homemaking courses.

All of the convention sections will conduct business meetings following their programs. Two slates of officers will be elected at each meeting, one for District IX and one for District XIV.

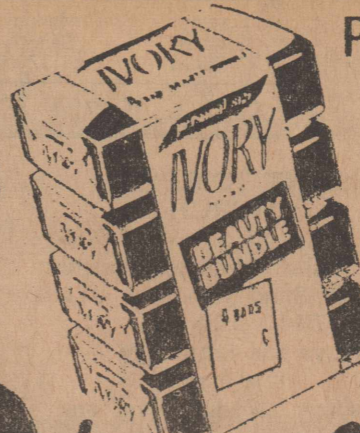

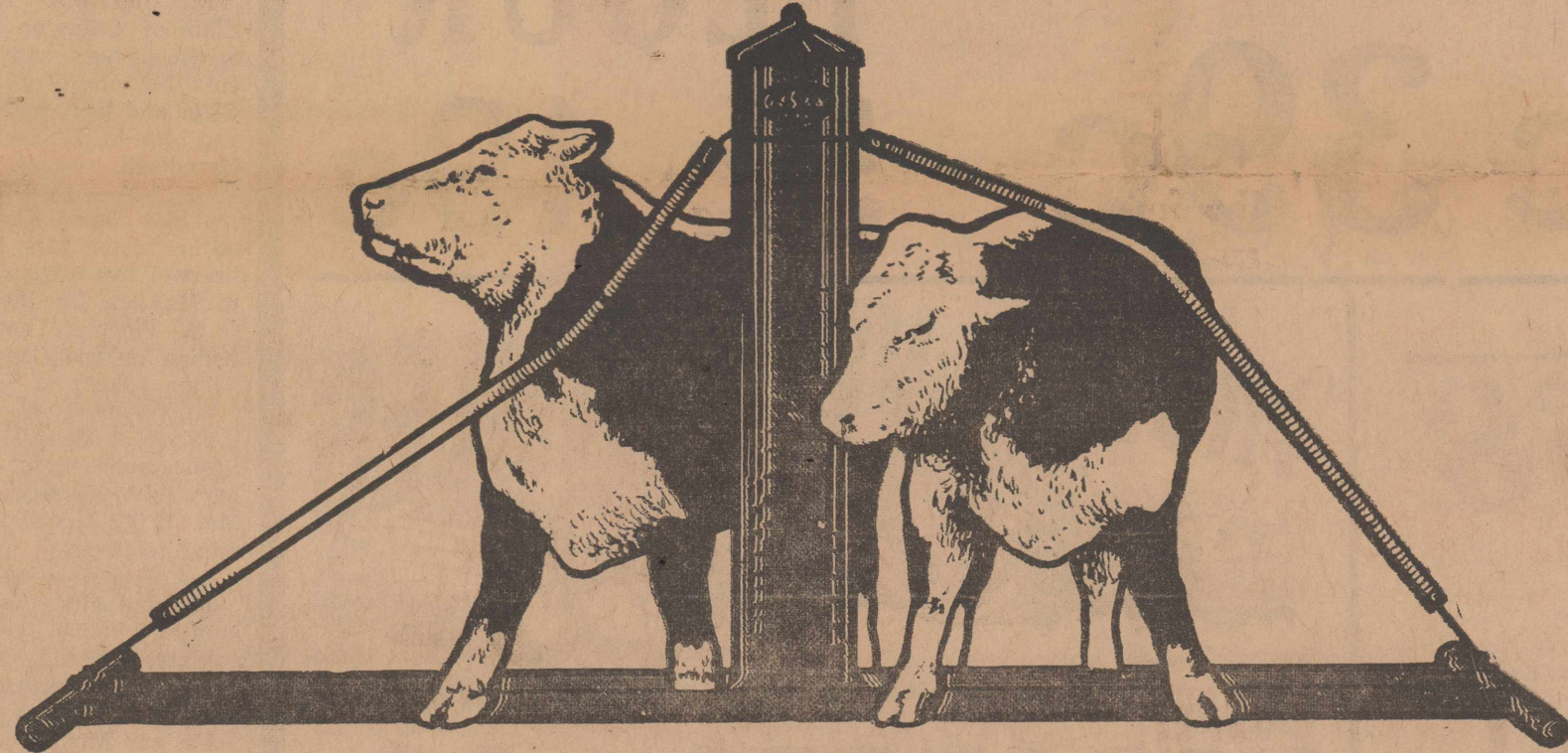
When the NMSQT scores are returned, each student will receive a handbook which will list his scores and compare them to high school students across the nation. These scores will provide helpful information for choosing a college.

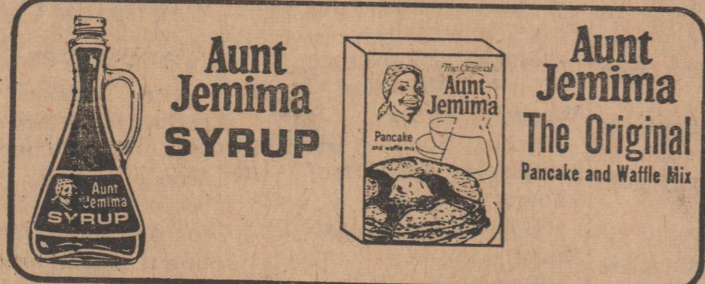

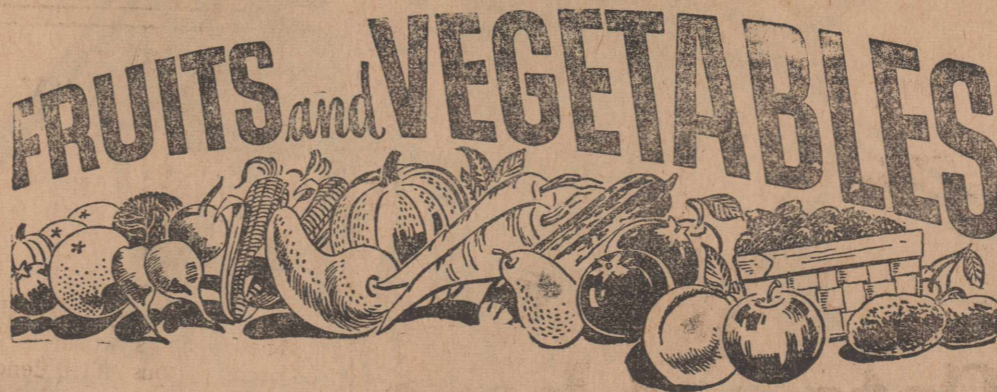

**RELIGIOUS DIVISION**

The religious world is divided into nearly three-hundred organizations called denominations, all existing separate and apart from each other, possessing distinctive names, doctrines, and practices, and each claiming to faithfully follow Christ The apostolic teaching declares, "Now I beseech you, brethren, through the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye all speak the same thing and that there be no divisions among you; but that you be perfected together in the same mind and in the same judgement" (1 Cor. 1:10). The contrast between the requirements of these inspired statements and denominationalism is plainly evident. Many divisions — NO DIVISIONS; speaking difference things — SPEAK SAME THING; different minds and judgements — SAME MIND AND JUDGMENT.

The tragedy of division is seen in that it produces: (1) INFIDELITY — Jesus prayed for unity of believers "that the world may believe" (Jn. 17:20-21). If unity results in belief, it is evident that division results in unbelief. There is no greater cause of infidelity than the tragic divisions represented by denominationalism. (2) DISRUPTED AND BROKEN HOMES of which one of the basic causes is religious division. (3) DESTRUCTION OF SOULS — No matter how sincere and honest they may be, those who belong to denominations are giving their time, talent, and material means to the support of religious division and are thus placing their souls in jeopardy of being eternally lost (Gal. 5:19-21 ASV). Jesus declared, "Every plant which my heavenly Father hath not planted shall be rooted up" (Matt. 15:13). Here in the context Jesus is referring to religious organizations which God did not establish and, therefore, do not exist by Divine authority.

Early converts were simply Christians (Acts 11:26). The same process that made them Christians made them members of the Lord's church. They were born into the family of God which is the church of God (John 3:3-5; Acts 2:36-38, 41, 47; 1 Tim. 3:15). As sons of God they exercised every privilege and enjoyed every blessing the benevolent Father had to bestow (Eph. 1:3). Simply Christians and in His church, they did all the work commanded of God (1 Cor. 15:58; 1 Thess. 1:3) and worshipped Him in spirit and in truth (John 4:24; Phil. 3:3). They were saved from sin and had the hope of eternal life. This was accomplished without the existence of one single denomination. If the same seed is planted now that was planted then (Lk. 8:11) the same result shall follow (Gen. 1:11-12). God shall be glorified, and division shall cease. Our plea is to restore New Testament Christianity.

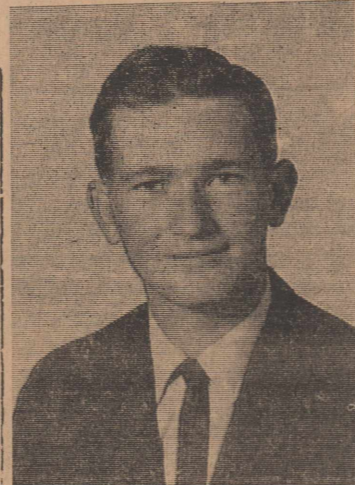
