Absentee Voting Starts Monday Close Trustee Election Occurs

Absentee voting in First Democratic Primary will open Monday at County Clerk's office in Roby. Election date is May 4.

County Democratic Chairman Max Carriker will be delivered ballots, printed by the Advance, Friday and he will have necessary materials with the County Clerk for Monday start.

This is a rather long primary ballot 8x17 inches and in addition to the candidates it carries three proposals for the Legislature — these are not voted but will give thought of citizens on three important issues. No. 1 is permitting legal sale of liquor by the drink in wet areas after approval by local option elections. No. 2 would permit horse racing with pari-mutuel wagering, also on local option basis. No. 3 would create a Texas Dairy Commission with power to regulate and fix price of retail and wholesale price of milk.

We will publish the full text of each of these propositions in the next few weeks so voters can study the important issues.

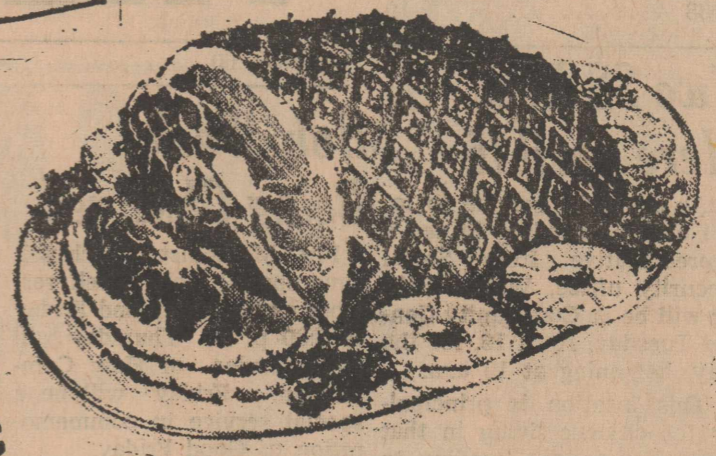

Sweetwater Jr. Rodeo April 11

Sweetwater — The nation's junior rodeo season for 1968 will open with the biggest of them all in Sweetwater during the Easter holidays April 11-13, rain or shine.

This is the ninth year Sweetwater has hosted the world's largest Junior Indoor Rodeo in the Nolan County Coliseum. Well over 350 participants are expected from Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arizona, Colorado, Kansas and other states.

The members of the American Junior Rodeo Association will be competing for prizes in bareback bronc riding, bull riding, steer riding for the under-twelve group, steer wrestling, barrel racing, pole bending, surf board riding, ribbon roping, calf roping, and other special events.

Spectators can see the exciting action at 8:00 p.m. performances on all three evenings and at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday afternoon, April 13.

The Thursday evening performances will be preceded by a parade through downtown Sweetwater at 5:00 p.m. All contestants will be featured in the parade as well as sheriff's posse and riding clubs from throughout West Texas, bands, clowns, and other special attractions.

Ikie Wilson of Sweetwater is Rodeo Superintendent, with Donald Moore and Rip Allen as his assistants. The show will be produced by Red Whatley of Crosbyton, Texas. Big John Kearney will be the announcer. The clowns without which a rodeo could not be held, will be Tommy Sheffield and Ken Pettif.

From this junior rodeo circuit come most of the professional Rodeo Cowboy Association performers. Performers in the junior rodeos range from age 19 downward. Several years ago a five-year-old girl gave the pole benders a race for the prizes in Sweetwater. Spectators can always expect to see some outstanding performances.

The show this year, as always, will be sponsored by the Sweetwater Livestock and Fair Association. The proceeds go to finance the annual 4H and FFA Livestock Show which takes place in January.

Farm Bureau Has Traffic Program

Through the concern and action of Fisher County Farm Bureau President, Lon Weems and Field Service representative, W. A. Hancock, a special traffic safety program was presented to Rotan High students on Wednesday, April 3. The program included a film, and a reaction and braking time demonstration.

Ben Bullard, assistant Farm Bureau safety director, talked to the students about the necessity of putting into practice safe driving habits. The film consisted of gruesome, real-life pictures to make students aware of the results of highway accidents. We worry about the deathrate of the boys in Vietnam, yet we fail to realize the deathrate from car accidents more than doubles the Vietnam deathrate each year.

Taking part in the special traffic safety program were Monte McKinney, driving the specially equipped car at 20 mph, and Coach Joe Ressler driving at 30 and 40 mph. At 20 mph Monte's reaction distance was 12'3", braking distance 22', and total stopping distance 34'. At 30 mph, Coach Ressler's reaction distance was 18' 7", braking distance 44' 5", and total stopping distance 63' 2". The reaction distance was the distance the car traveled from the time they were told to stop until their foot hit the brake. The braking distance was the distance the car traveled from the time the foot hit the brake until the car stopped, and their total stopping distance was the distance the car traveled from the time they were told to stop to the time the car actually stopped.

This proved the fallacy of the statement, "I can stop on a dime."

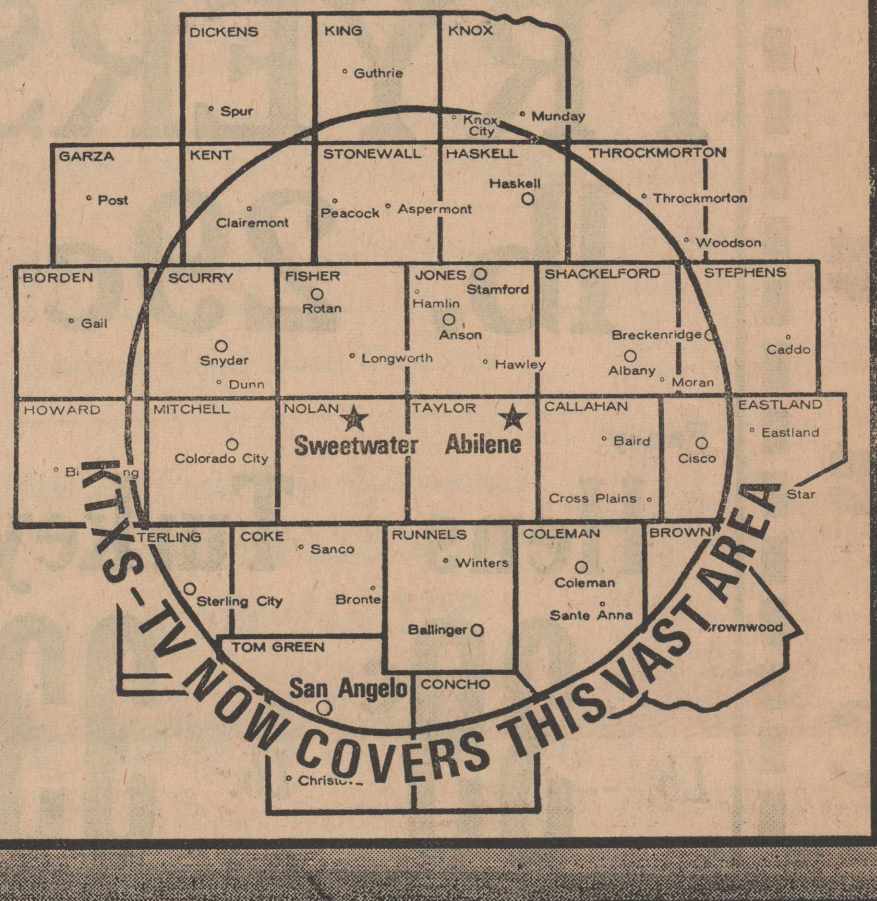

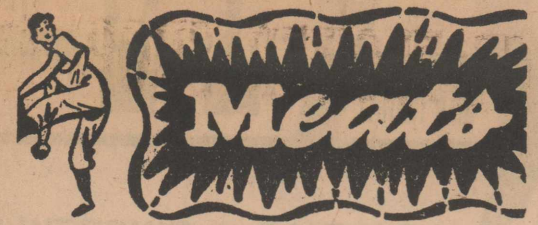

Time Short For Car Inspection

Austin — The Texas Department of Public Safety reminded motorists today that

only two days more remain for obtaining the 1968 inspection sticker with more than two million cars still in need of being inspected.

"Lines are already beginning to form," a DPS spokesman said, "and they will get longer as the final date approaches. Many drivers may find it difficult to obtain nec-

essary repairs if they continue putting off the inspection until the last minute." The DPS pointed out that only about 3,500,000 vehicles have been inspected for the 1968 sticker through March 31, and that estimates indicate more than six million vehicles will be registered during 1968.

Co. Agent News

There's really no secret to producing peaches which are worm-free at harvest time. But if you want them that way, now is the time to take action.

The insects which produce the worms can be controlled if a good spray program is carried out. Once the insects get a start and worms get into the peaches nothing can be done.

To do an effective job of controlling peach insects, trees should be sprayed when 75 percent of the petals have fallen from the blooms. Then 10 days later when the shuck splits; then three more spray applications at two-week intervals should follow the shuck-split stage spraying. This, makes a total of five spray applications.

As for the spray either use methoxychlor or malathion. These materials are readily available from feed and seed stores, drug stores or other firms which handle insecticides. Combinations of insecticides and fungicides may be used on fruit trees and make excellent sprays for use on peaches.

A control program for one tree in the backyard or many in an orchard is not only feasible but very practical.

The 1968 revision of recommendations for weed controls in Texas is now available.

Good weed control can increase yields, provide better quality crops, and reduce weeds by preventing weed seed production. Herbicides can provide cheaper weed control than hand labor. In test plots, it was found that preplant or preemergence herbicides cost from \$2.50 to \$8.50 per acre, while hand labor averaged between \$12 and \$14 for hoeing. The herbicides protected the crops from weed competition during emergence and early growth, while the untreated fields were weedy all season.

Certain mixtures of herbicides are available as preemergence treatments in grain sorghum, peanuts, and soybeans in 1968.

The bulletin, B-1029, "Suggestions for Weed Control with Chemicals," is available from the extension office. It is a joint Texas Agricultural Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment Station publication.

The recommendations of the 35-page bulletin also includes suggestions for spray equipment, information on herbicide application on non-crop site and cropland in fallow and ponds and lakes.

1968 copies of "Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects in the High Plains, Rolling Plains and Trans-Pecos Areas of Texas" and "Ways to Fight the Pink Bollworm in Texas" are available in our office. The new leaflets have several changes in control recommendations, including several deletions and additions.

Bonded Fabrics Cause Trouble

Extension clothing specialists at Texas A&M University report that homemakers have problems with bonded fabric. Bonded fabric is made by taking two face fabrics and binding them together with an adhesive.

This built-in facing should not substitute for lining a garment, said Rhea Boyles, clothing specialist. The bonded fabric acts as backing but not a lining.

A popular misconception is that separated bonded fabrics can be rebonded by pressing with a warm iron. However, once separation occurs, the fabric cannot be re-sealed by pressing, said Miss Boyles.

They often cause trouble because one of the fabrics gives more. Take care when purchasing bonded fabric or ready-made garments of the material. Know how to care for the garment. In most cases, you run the risk of separation when you have your garment drycleaned.

One study showed that often separation of bonded fabrics will not occur on the first drycleaning but will occur in the second or third cleaning.

A news story related a woman's experience with a high-styled coat which she sent to be drycleaned. Upon its returned looked unpressed and she sent it back to the cleaners. They discovered the drycleaning solvent caused partial separation of the bonded fabric.

The ruined coat was returned to the store, the money refunded and the manufacturer held responsible. But it is easier not to make the poor choice in the first place, the woman learned.

THE TRUTH AND THE ORGANIZATION OF THE TRUE CHURCH — No. 6

"And He is the head of the body, the church; who is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead; that in all things he might have the preeminence" Colossians 1:18 "and he put all things in subjection under his feet, and gave him to be head over all things to the church, which is his body, the fullness of him that filleth all in all." Ephesians 1:22, 23. "All authority hath been given unto me in heaven and on earth" Matthew 28:18. These three passages of scriptures state that Christ is the head of the church and that he has all authority in the church. Man has no right therefore, to legislate rules and laws to govern the church, Christ and his law must be supreme.

Many denominations in the world today have ignored the head of the church (Jesus) and thus assumed the right of self government. These churches meet in their "synods", "presbyteries", "councils", "general assemblies" and "conferences." In these delegations MEN LEGISLATE rules and laws to govern the various denominations as to: "how many times a year to partake of the Lord's supper", Acts 20:7 "what will be the mode (sprinkling, pouring or immersion) of baptism", Romans 6:1-6 or "the arbitrary setting aside of baptism as necessary to salvation". I Peter 3:21. All of these things have been set forth very simple and plainly in the scriptures. Therefore any man or group of men who assume the authority to change the law of God actually rebels against Christ the head of the church and supreme authority.

Furthermore the true church is to be completely autonomous or independent from any other church or centralized ecclesiastical organization. All congregations in the New Testament are to be equal and independent, each having its own elders (bishops - plural) and deacons. Philippians 1:1; I Timothy 3:1-8. Thus each congregation was separate from every other church or group of churches, subject to no authority outside the local congregation other than Jesus Christ and his apostles.

Each local congregation, when fully developed, had its own elders. Acts 14:23 says, "and when they had ordained them elders in every church." In Acts 20:17 Paul "called to him elders of the church". In Acts 20:28-30 Paul speaks of the overseers, or bishops (A.S.V.) as being given the responsibility of seeing that the church is properly fed the word of God and to protect it from false teaching. The men who do this work are also known as pastors Ephesians 4:11 and elders I Peter 5:1-4 So in each church there is to be a PLURALITY of elders or bishops and not a plurality of churches to ONE bishop. Many churches today have completely reversed this divine arrangement. The qualifications for an elder, bishop or pastor are found in Titus 1:5-9.

Helping the elders in this great task are deacons which literally means servants or helpers. Their qualifications are enumerated in I Timothy 3:8-13.

Thus we see the organization of the true church of our Lord is very simple. We also note that the divine plan has been greatly abused. May we all "speak where the Bible speaks".

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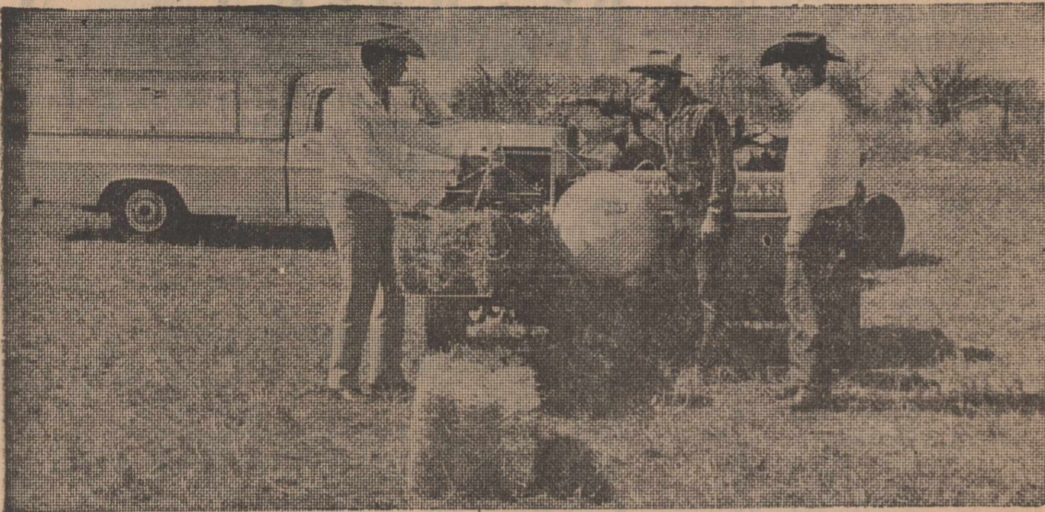
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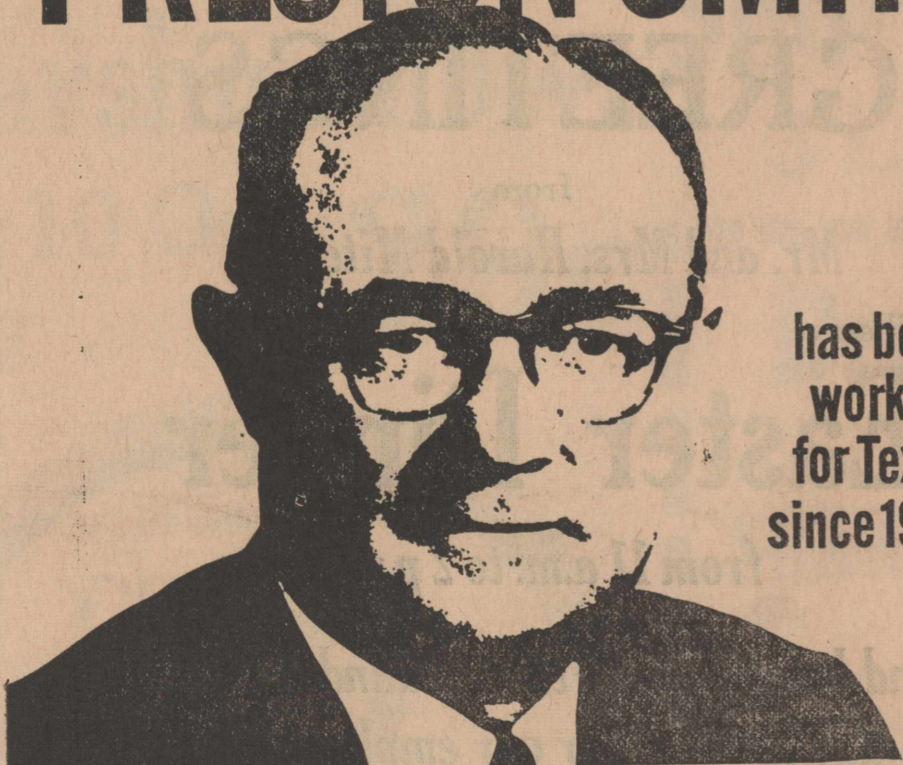
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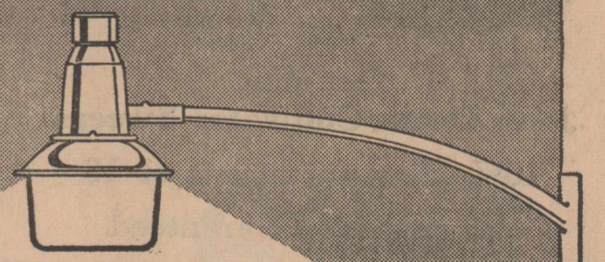
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
