fabric. Bonded fabric is made by taking two face fabric and binding them togethe with an adhesive. This built-in facing should not substitute for lining a gar
ment, said Rheba Boyles clothing specialist. The bond ed fabric acts as backing but not a lining.
A popular misconception is can be rebonded by pressin with a warm iron. However once separation occurs, the abric cannot be re-sealed b
pressing, said Miss Boyles pressing, said Miss Boyles.
They often cause troub because one of the fabric gives more. Take care whe purchasing bonded fabric or ready-made garments of the
material. Know how to material. Know how to care
for the garment. In most cases, you run the risk of separation when you hav
your garment drycleaned. One study showed that o
ten separation of bonded fab rics will not occur on the firs drycleaning but will occur i the second or third cleaning man's experience with a high
