FHA Spurs Rural Progress

"Rural community progress in Texas has been spurred by the development of 436 modern water systems, sewer systems, and recreation centers through the Farmers Home Administration," Fisher County Supervisor George Dorman said today.

Dorman reported on benefits brought to the state under Rural Community Facilities programs that have been enlarged under President Johnson's efforts to improve living conditions in rural areas.

Water supply problems than 180,000 people in rural Texas through 418 water systems made possible by FHA loans and grants totaling more than \$54 million. The new systems serve both rural towns and countryside where the people have had to exist on uncertain and, sometimes, unsafe water supplies.

Dorman reported that three rural communities in the state also have new or improved waste disposal systems through FHA loans and grants approved the past two years. At present, there are 48 waste disposal projects underway in Texas from application stage to those under construction.

"We are beginning to make real progress toward the President's goal of clear, constant water for all of rural America," Dorman said. "Towns benefited by the program are able to improve living standards and accommodate new business and industry when they can offer the same kind of water service as found in the city."

"A typical effect," Dorman said, "is seen at Sylvester and McCaulley where a new gin and several new homes have been built since a community water system was completed in 1963."

Through insurance of private loan financing, the Agency also has made possible the construction of 15 outdoor recreation centers developed by community associations and serving an estimated 13,500 people in rural Texas.

The centers give rural families the same opportunity as city and suburban dwellers to enjoy modern swimming pools, playing fields, golf, boating, and other forms of outdoor recreation.

Dorman said the Agency also has made grants to 60 counties of the state for comprehensive planning of the future development of water and waste disposal services in rural areas.

Senior Graduation Plans Now Complete

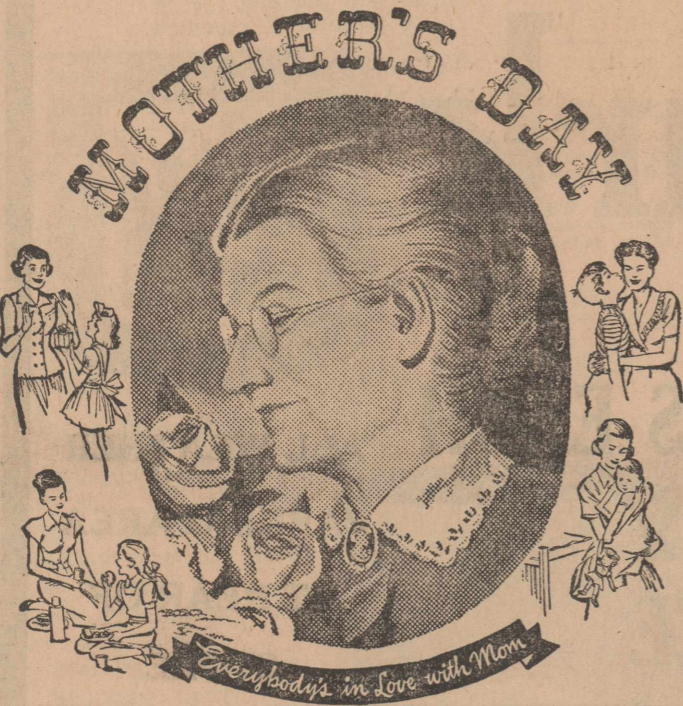
Graduation plans for this year are now complete.

Baccalaureate is set for 8 p.m., May 19 at the high school auditorium. Commencement will be May 24, 8 p.m., also at the high school auditorium.

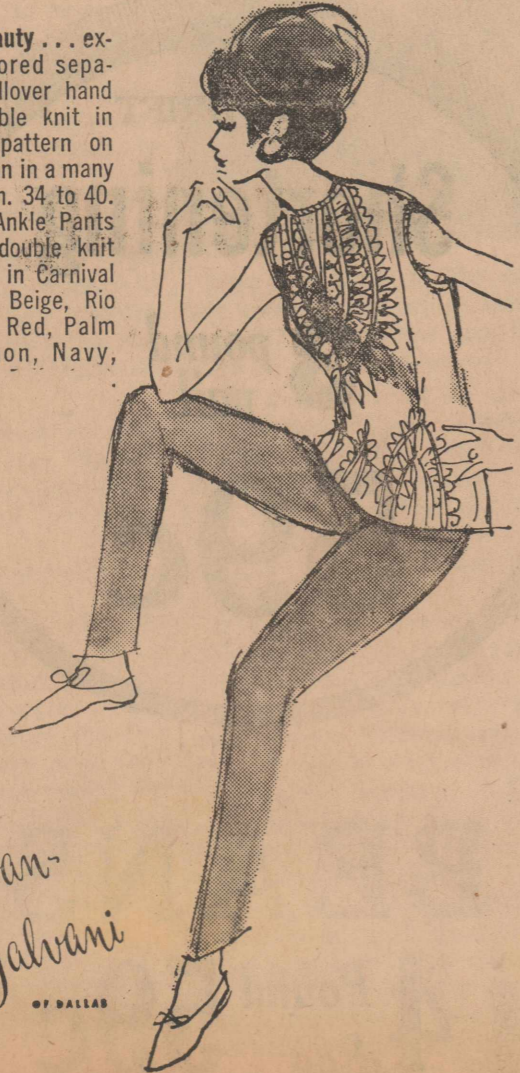

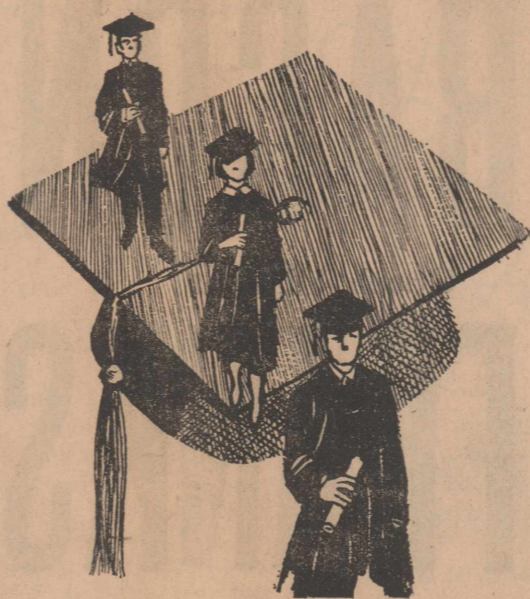

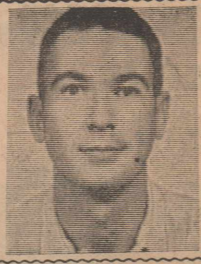

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Field trials with aerial application of atrazine and propazine on grain sorghum in 1966 and again in 1967 have given excellent control of carelessly weeds.

Results of these trials have resulted in significant changes in weed control in grain sorghum to include labels for aerial application of both atrazine and propazine.

Furthermore, the tests showed that a minimum amount of carrier to be used in aerial application would be one gallon of carrier for each pound of herbicide to be applied. Ground application studies in conjunction with aircraft trials indicate that the total amount of carrier can be safely reduced to 10 gallons per acre.

Apparently, the most important consideration when applying either atrazine or propazine is good coverage. Total gallonage of the carrier is of minor importance.

Both pre- and post-emergence aerial applications were studied. In the pre-emergence trial, one and two pounds of active ingredient of propazine per acre was applied in two and one-half and five gallons of water carrier per acre, respectively. This compared to ground applications at 32 gallons of water carrier per acre, and weed control was equal with either type application.

Atrazine worked well when applied post-emergence by airplane to six-to-ten-inch sorghum. Again, the same rate was used as with propazine and compared with ground sprayer applications at 32 gallons of water per acre. All applications at the one pound per acre rate killed one and one-half inch carelessly weeds. Watergrass control was obtained with the two-pound rate used in five gallons of water and contain-

ing five percent non-toxic agricultural oil.

Other preemergence trials were conducted with propazine using one pound of active ingredients per acre. All treatments gave 100 percent carelessly weed control. Ground applications at the same rate of propazine in 4, 8, and 20 gallons of water carrier gave a total kill of all weeds, regardless of the amount of carrier.

Aerial application of atrazine as a postemergence was also checked at the rate of one and two-tenths pounds of active ingredients per acre. The sorghum and carelessly-weeds were both about five inches tall at the time of application, and a water carrier containing one-half percent surfactant was used at amounts ranging from one-half to four gallons per acre.

All applications resulted in a complete kill of carelessly-weeds within 12 days. However, when only one-half gallon of total carrier was used, weed kill was somewhat slower. Comparative ground applications at 4, 8 and 20 gallons of water and surfactant carrier also gave complete kills.

Brucellosis regulations governing the interstate movement of cattle have been amended to provide further safeguards to animals moving through markets, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced.

Previously, cattle could move interstate when they had been tested for brucellosis at a market and found negative. Now, in addition, these animals must be from herds not known to be affected with brucellosis. This applies to animals moving through markets the same safeguards that have been in effect for many years on the interstate movement of cattle directly from one farm or ranch to another. The amendment was scheduled for publication in the Federal Register April 12 and will become effective on publication.

Experience has revealed that this additional precautionary measure needs to be initiated to protect the gains already made. Today, 92 percent of the Nation's counties have achieved a Modified Certified Brucellosis status by reducing the incidence of the disease to less than one percent of the cattle population. Approximately 31 percent of the Nation's counties have reached the ultimate goal of the Cooperative State-Federal Brucellosis Eradication effort — a Certified Brucellosis Free Status.

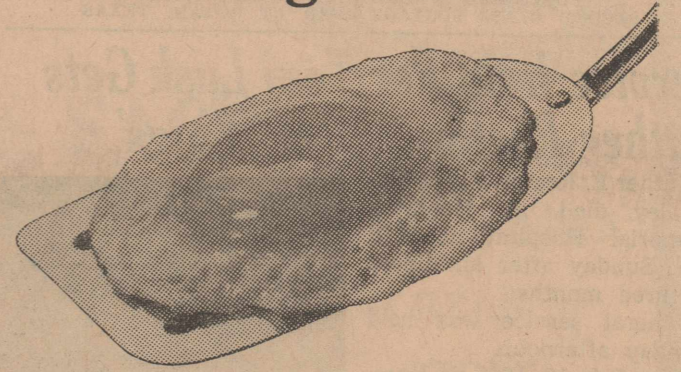

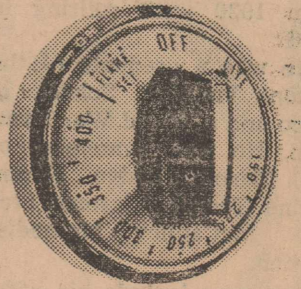

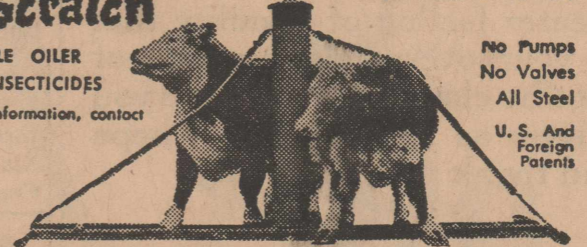
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
