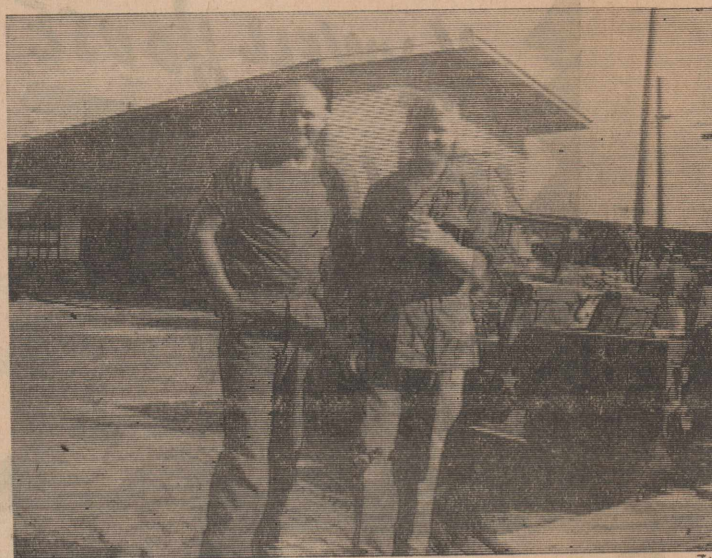

"As it looks from here"

Washington, D.C. — On February 1st of this year, the opinion was expressed in this space that some type of negotiations with North Vietnam would begin in a matter of a few months. The further opinion was expressed that at the time peace talks started the greatest danger would be created. It was stated then that captured documents showed that the Communists would start discussions of a settlement by demanding that all military actions against North Vietnam be stopped and that a "coalition" be established for South Vietnam.

This is what is happening in the several meetings already held in Paris. The North Vietnamese negotiators started out with a propaganda blast and continue to deny that they have any troops in South Vietnam at all.

Their first purpose is clearly to put this Country into a box by first getting the United States to stop all bombing in North Vietnam and particularly an assurance of a permanent sanctuary for Hanoi and Haiphong.

It is also pretty clear that they are depending on sentiment in this Country to force our negotiators into one-sided concessions while they make no concessions at all.

Our American "Doves" take the line that having once agreed to the present partial bombing halt, the United States must not even consider going back to air action against the enemy under any circumstances. This, they say, would be a shock to "world opinion" and bring great disappointment and adverse reaction to those who seek peace.

The North Vietnamese, of course, want assurances that Hanoi and Haiphong be spared any future bombing under any circumstances. If they could get this, it would release an estimated three quarters of a million work force, enabling them to send more fighting men into South Vietnam. In fact, there is pretty good evidence that they are already escalating action in this respect.

While two years of negotiations were going on to set-

tle the Korean war, the biggest Chinese-North Korean offensive of the whole war occurred in the month before the truce was finally signed. Well over a third of all American casualties of that war occurred while peace negotiations were officially and formally in progress.

In this situation in Paris, we are at least forewarned of the tactics of Hanoi's representatives. It is the most dangerous time in South Vietnam. It is obvious that the strategy started with the TET offensive and continues to the present time with varying degrees of intensity. It is reasonable to believe that as talks go on in Paris, a stepped up activity will go on in South Vietnam in an attempt to show our representatives that they are capable of an offensive to threaten our presence in the country.

Our delegation in Paris is entirely aware of this situation and although we will go on patiently seeking an honest approach to a real settlement, they will not submit to a propaganda trap that would sacrifice everything for which our men have been fighting since this conflict began.

The communists negotiators of North Vietnam should be made to understand clearly an unequivocally that we are there to produce genuine progress toward an honorable peace. At the same time, and with an assurance not to be misunderstood, we should tell them that we do not expect to while away months upon months of meaningless talks with the idea that we make all the concessions without reciprocity. We should make it unmistakably clear that we do not intend to turn the Government of South Vietnam over to the Viet Cong by any "coalition", which to the Communists means a government of their own choosing.

We should also make it entirely clear, without stating an ultimatum at this time,

that if no settlement is reached on reasonable terms in a reasonable time, that not only will the war continue but that it will take on proportions not yet exercised by our side.

They should further understand that "Peacenicks" are not yet running this Country nor will we be so sensitive to "world opinion" that we will not unloose the forces of our capability against them.

As has been said on numerous occasions, it has long since ceased to be a matter as to whether we should be in South Vietnam or not. It is a matter of either settling it through negotiations while here is opportunity or else getting it over in the way we have the capability of doing.

## Time Right For Mesquite Kill

The best conditions in 20 years now exist for controlling mesquite, reports a range, brush and weed control specialist at Texas A&M University.

G. O. Hoffman, Extension specialist, said that mesquite started budding about April 8 around Abilene, northwest to Caprock and into the Spur, Wichita Falls and up to the Childress area, and also in the Ozona-Fort Stockton area.

"It takes the mesquite tree from 30-50 days under normal growth conditions to mature before it is susceptible to foliage application of 2,4,5-T applied by airplane," Hoffman said.

Aerial spray work should begin 40-90 days after green growth at the buds is noticed. Generally, beyond 90 days after leafing begins, spraying should not be done. Spraying should be done after the leaf color has changed from light green to dark green.

"When the leaf color is beginning to change is the optimum time for spraying for best control of mesquite using 2,4,5-T," the range specialist said.

If there is an effective rain during the spray season, postpone spraying for a week to ten days or until new growth at the tips turns a dark color. Aerial spraying should not be stopped if there is only a light shower Hoffman said.

"When the leaves are light green color, they are developing and using food reserve stored in the root system. After the leaves are fully developed and turn a dark green color, the food flow is reversed from the top back to the root system," Hoffman said.

The main objective of controlling mesquite is to be able to grow more grass rather than have dead trees. Unless more grass is grown, it is not economical to control mesquite, he said.

For more information concerning mesquite control, contact your local county agent and pick up MP-386 which outlines chemical and mechanical control methods for mesquite, Hoffman advised.

## Abilene Named G. E. D. Center

The Abilene Independent School District has been approved by the American Council on Education and the Texas Education Agency as an official G.E.D. Testing Center as of June 1, according to Supt. A. E. Wells.

Connor Robinson, Coordinator of Adult Education, will serve as Chief Examiner.

"The General Educational Development Test was developed in 1945 because many students were forced to leave school during World War II to serve in the armed forces. This gave veterans, whose education had been interrupted, a chance to receive the equivalent of a high school diploma," Wells said.

"Since more than 62 million men and women over 25 years of age are without a high school education, this medium will serve to upgrade those who desire a broader educational background. Every state in the union now awards the High School Equivalency Certificate. High school certificates issued for satisfactory achievement on the G.E.D. tests are widely accepted as regular diplomas by business, industry, and civil services commissions.

"More and more, higher educational institutions are admitting adults whose G.E.D. test scores are consistent with their usual admission requirements for high school graduation," he said.

The G.E.D. tests will be administered periodically as demand dictates. The first test is scheduled for 8:00 a.m., June 4, at the Lamar Elementary School N. 8th and Hickory Streets. Adults, 19 years of age, or older are eligible to take the tests which includes individual tests in English grammar, social studies, science, interpretation of literature and math. A fee of \$10 will be charged for the test.

Those desiring further information concerning the G.E.D. testing program should contact Robinson at the Administration Building of the Abilene Public Schools.

Robinson is a native of Rotan, being born and reared here, son of Mrs. Boss Robinson of Snyder and the late Mr. Robinson.

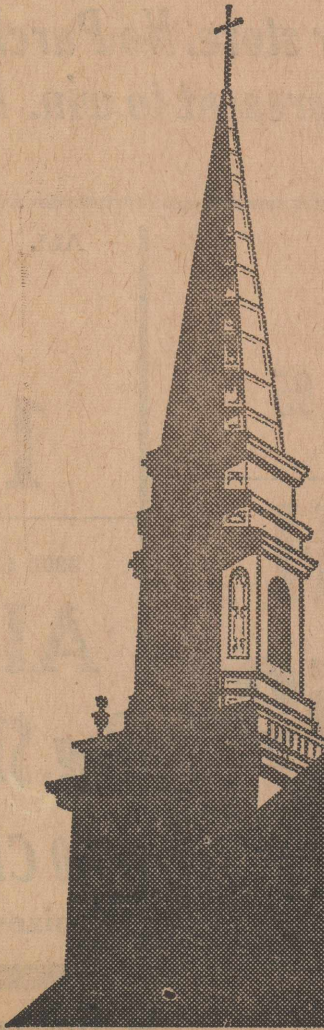

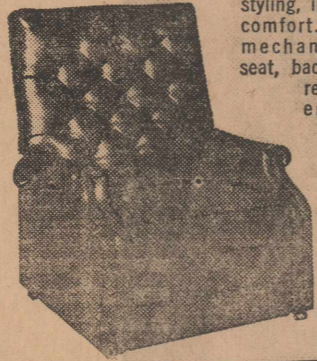

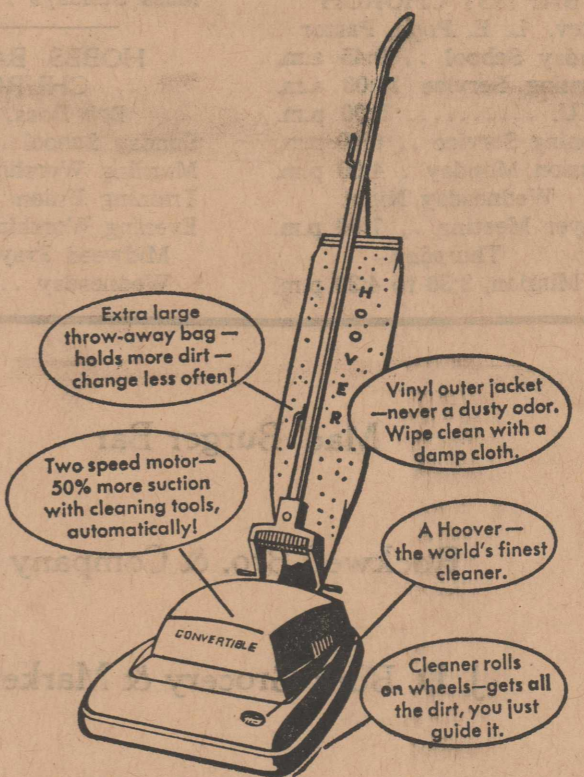
