Cotton Insect Report No. 1

This is the first issue of the 1968 Rolling Plains Cotton Insect Report. This report will be prepared on Monday of each week for the purpose of reporting the cotton insect situation in the Rolling Plains area. The accuracy and usefulness of this report will depend largely upon the number of local situation reports received.

Situation at a glance—
About fifty-five percent of the cotton acreage in the north Rolling Plains area has been planned. Most of the planting in this part of the area has been accompanied during the past few weeks. Cotton is up to a stand in a few counties, with little insect activity. Beet armyworms and cutworms are damaging young cotton in some areas.

Thrips—
Light infestations of thrips were reported from Fisher County.

Beet Armyworms—
Damaging infestations of beet armyworms were observed in fields in Fisher, Hardeeman and Taylor counties. Control measures are being carried out against this pest in a few counties.

Cutworms—
Cutworms were observed damaging fields in Jones and Fisher Counties.

For control recommendations, refer to L-508, Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects in the Righ Plains, Rolling Plains and Trans-Pecos Areas of Texas. Copies of this guide may be picked up at the office of the County Agricultural Agent.

The information used in the Rolling Plains Insect Report is compiled from local reports sent in by County Agricultural Agents, personnel of Texas A&M University System, branches of the USDA, chemical companies, and cotton producers. We hope that everyone who does any field checking will send us a report of the situation as he finds it.

Peace Corps Tests Slated

Fisher County area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement Test at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday, June 15, at Abilene; Room 2201, New P. O. Building.

The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test, which takes about an hour and a half, to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. The test requires no preparation and is non-competitive — an applicant can neither pass nor fail.

The Application form, not the Placement Test, is the most important factor in the selection of Volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the test. Applications may be obtained from local post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D.C. 20525.

12,000 Peace Corps Volunteers are currently serving in Asia, Africa, Latin America and the Pacific Islands, working with the people of those nations in self-help projects in agriculture, health, education and community action. Many more volunteers are needed for projects which will begin this summer and fall.

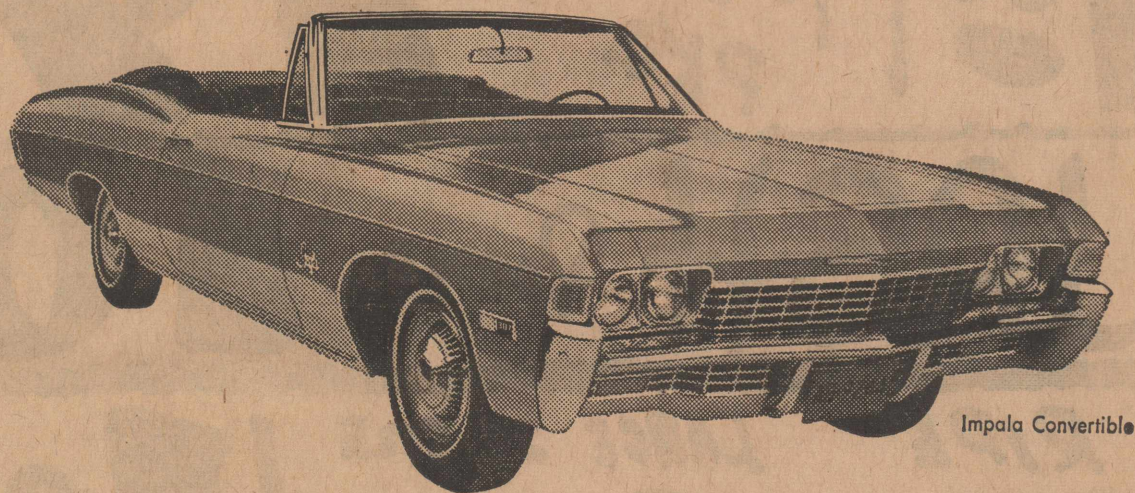

COUNTY AGENT NEWS

But armyworms are beginning to show up in cotton fields in the county. The following is a brief description of the worm, how he works, and control measures. Start with 1.

Greenish color, from size of pinhead up to 1 inch long. 2 black dots on each side of the second body segment with white stripe down side of body with black stripe above the white stripe that begins to turn darker as the worm ages. The adult moth lays eggs in clusters from the size of a dime up to a quarter, usually 75 to 100 eggs per cluster - grey in color.

2. How he works. Biting, chewing insect that devours the foliage of young tender plants and also older plants, sometimes will completely eat stem and all, on young plants.

3. What are his favorite foods?

Cotton, Pig weeds, sugar beets, vegetables and alfalfa nearly anything that is green and succulent.

4. What kind of weather does he favor?

Hot weather is his favorite. This worm normally shows up in August and September instead of early in the year like it has this spring.

5. What is his life cycle?

Life cycle 34 days, larvae or worm stays 18 to 23 days which is when they do the most damage. Pupal stage 4 to 10 days. We can have as many as 8 to 10 generations per year.

6. How long does it take him to devour a field of young cotton?

In fields where the population of this insect is very high, the entire crop has been destroyed in 2 to 4 days.

The Extension Service recommends Dylax and Methyl Parathion for its control. The cost is from \$1.50 to \$3.00 per acre. More than one application may be needed to control this insect.

After spring flowering bulbs have finished blooming, allow the foliage to mature and turn yellow before removing. Some gardeners try to help nature along by removing the foliage in order to tidy up the garden. This

is not a recommended practice since the bulbs need this foliage so long as it is green. The foliage manufacturers food which is stored in the bulb for next year's flowers.

Spring and early summer storms frequently cause considerable wind damage to trees. When should this damage be repaired? Damaged branches or limbs should be removed immediately. Make the cut flush with the tree trunk or limb from which it is growing. Paint all wounds with a good tree wound dressing to prevent the entrance of disease and-or insect.

A few suggestions for removing a heavy limb to prevent tearing of the bark include — the making of a cut from the underside about 8 inches from the main trunk. Make this cut at least one-third of the way through the branch or until the saw binds. Make the second cut from above and several inches further out on the trunk. Continue until the branch is removed. Make the final cut flush and parallel to the main trunk. Apply tree wound dressing to the exposed surface.

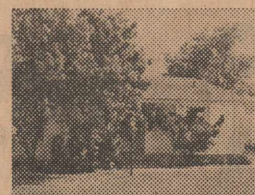

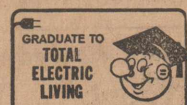

Christian Scientists In World-Wide Meeting-Boston

Today's world of destructive upheaval and tremendous change calls men to be spiritual builders.

This appeal from the Christian Science Board of Directors was heard today by over seven thousand Christian Scientists, gathered from around the world for the Annual Meeting of the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts.

The message from the Board of Directors, read by Arthur P. Wuth, its new Chairman, stressed individual effort as the first step in any attempt to help solve the world's ills.

"Poverty, ignorance, war, racial conflict, immorality, civil disorder, mental and physical enslavement exemplify standards torn down, spiritual ideals desecrated, the best of civilization fallen into disuse," Mr. Wuth said.

Nehemiah's example as a spiritual builder was cited as still vital and useful to Christians today. In rebuilding the wall of Jerusalem, Mr. Wuth explained, Nehemiah was making practical his own understanding of God and His kingdom.

"Is not the need then for individuals dedicated to their work, committed and concentrated to the task of spiritual building?" he asked.

Mr. Wuth then quoted the disciple Peter: "Ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house, an holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ (I Peter 2:5).

"Lively stones imply more than building blocks," he continued. "Liveliness denotes action, action resulting from spiritual unfoldment, action that is inspired, rightly motivated, God-supported, God-sustained."

Singling out war and racial conflict as two of the major problems which the Church must confront, Mr. Wuth said:

"The Church must fulfill the requirements of peace by teaching the practicality of the great commandments — love for God and love for one's neighbor. It must teach the allness of God, good, the impersonality of evil, and the ability of the individual, whatever his race or color, to demonstrate this.

"Harmony, order, and peace know no color line. They belong to the spiritual heritage of each individual; and it is the responsibility of Church to assert, demonstrate and maintain this standard."

The healing and uplifting work of Jesus, Mr. Wuth said, attested the practicality of spiritual building by means of prayer and inspiration.

Mary Baker Eddy, who discovered and founded Christian Science, taught the need for each individual to contribute to the progress and regeneration of society through spiritual building, he said.

Gordon V. Comer, newly-elected President for the coming year, said that whatever the turmoil of the present times spiritual values and all the blessings they bring to humanity will survive.

The Christian Scientists visiting Boston this year noticed many changes resulting from the large building project now underway. Considerable demolition and foundation work has already been completed. Construction is expected to begin this month on a new Administration Building, a new Sunday School building and a large multi-purpose building.

At present the activities at the headquarters of the denomination are carried out in eight different buildings, so that centralization of facilities and personnel is long overdue. The new Church Center is expected to be under construction for about two and one-half years.

Snyder C of C Reading Project

The Snyder Chamber of Commerce is bringing to this area for the first time the famous Evelyn Wood Reading Dynamics Program.

The late President John F. Kennedy invited Mrs. Wood to teach this course to his staff in Washington. From there it has spread into nearly every major city in the U.S. and Canada.

Reading Dynamics will guarantee to increase the reading efficiency of each student by at least 3 times with good comprehension. They will refund the entire tuition of any student who does not obtain at least the tripling of his reading efficiency as measured by the beginning and ending tests. This refund is conditioned upon the student's having attended all of the required classes or having made up missed sessions with the teacher.

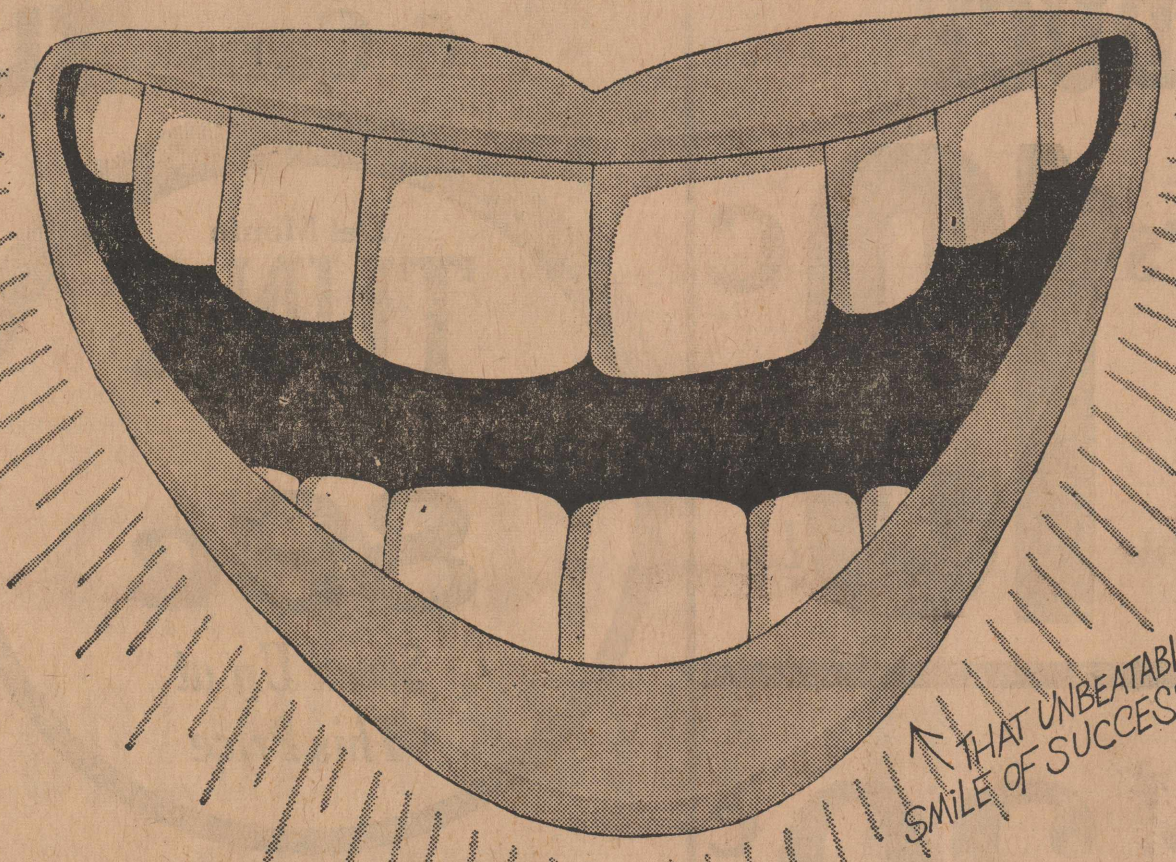

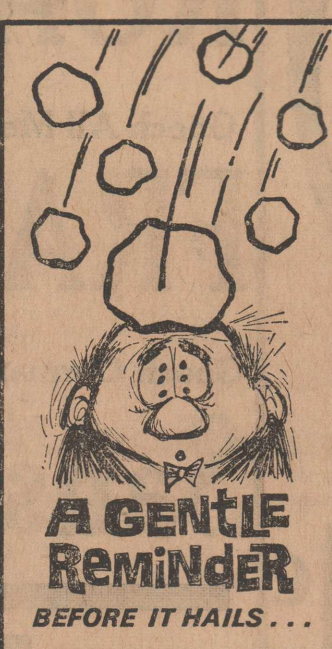

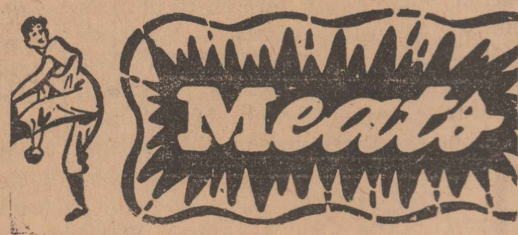

Attends DAR Meet in Wash.

Mrs. Wade E. Forester of Sweetwater was the Delegate for Nancy Harper at the recent four day meeting of the National Society of Daughters of the American Revolution. The event was the 77th Continental Congress convened in Washington D.C. Theme of the convention was "Progress is the activity of today and the assurance of tomorrow," taken from an Emerson quotation.

Mayor Walter E. Washington of the capitol city spoke at the opening night session. He urged the DAR to apply the Spirit of '76 in solving today's turbulence. He continued that now as then we must form a federation of all groups in America because as then, only in unity can we emerge victorious.

The speaker stated that our challenge for the future and for progress should be that of rebuilding America and rebuilding our citizens. Our goals have been with us since 1776.

The President General read a message from President Johnson in which he urged the DAR to "commit yourselves to the goal expressed by our founding fathers — an America of equality and justice for all.

In her opening address, Mrs. William H. Sullivan Jr., the President-General of NS-DAR, predicted that the DAR's 183,000 members will use their ballot box privileges to lead the way to a better America. She said the DAR must act decisively because of a "huge vacuum of leadership in our country, politically, intellectually, and morally."

The resolutions adopted at the DAR's 77th Continental Congress included such things as opposing the Federal urban renewal programs and urging use of "every available means" to curb law-

Washington, D. C. — In 1970 a new census of an estimated 205 million people will be taken in the United States.

Pre-Test questions are now being tried out in South Carolina and Wisconsin. A certain number of people in the State of Connecticut have already had all or part of the approximately 100 questions submitted to them to test reaction and response.

Some of the questions proposed for the 1970 census are too embarrassing to put in public print. Some of them compare to Dr. Kinsey's Report of a few years ago and definitely invade the privacy of the individual.

Test questions going into the states on a trial basis include:

Do you share your bathtub or shower?

What is your telephone number?

How much rent do you pay?

How many hours did your husband work last week?

How many babies has your wife had?

Do you walk to work or take a taxicab?

How much money did you make last year.

Over the last several years some in Congress and others outside Government have proposed that there be established a National Data Center which would use the Census Reports as a basis for a dossier file on every American.

No one argues that there should not be a census and, in fact, there are good and substantial reasons why the right kind of Census should be taken every five years instead of ten. There is a vast difference, however, in accounting for the number of people, their age, sex and occupation, and those which invade privacy and to which people should not be subjected.

The U. S. Census is authorized by the constitution and must be conducted for certain necessary purposes. We, of course, must know what our population is and, in fact, this is what the Constitution originally provided. Originally, it was intended for the purpose of apportioning the U. S. House of Representatives. To quote the authority contained in the Constitution suggests the simplicity intended: "The actual enumer-

ation shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such a manner as they shall by law direct." Of course, this leaves room for an expansion of information in accordance with the times, but the times never require people to reveal intimate data about themselves which is not the Government's business. In addition, they want to impose on those who refuse to answer for any reason, a fine of \$100 and a jail term of up to 60 days. The vast majority of people probably not object to some form of compulsory requirement to respond to essential questions.

For the purpose of identifying the citizens of our Country and so serve the interest of business which needs certain information, it is suggested that seven questions on a simple form, mailed to each household; sex; date of birth; race or color; marital status; and visitors in home at the time of Census.

Instead of this simple requirement, the pre-test forms and those which may be submitted unless legislative action prohibits it, will contain more than 100 questions.

A Bill now before the Congress would require this basic information on each individual but would permit the answer to numerous other questions on a voluntary basis.

One after another who have studied this question in depth feel that much more accurate and useful data would be obtained if given on a voluntary basis. Market research firms have found that any element of coercion tends to invalidate the results of survey research. Certainly, the same thing would apply to the Government's effort to

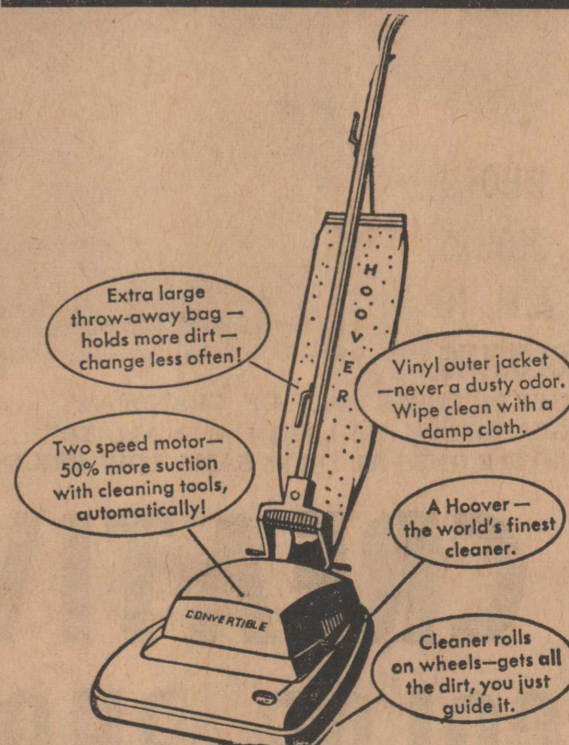
