



## Cotton Insect Report No. 2

Situation At A Glance:

Producers continue to plant and replant cotton in many Rolling Plains counties. Because of heavy rains and hail in some areas, many producers are replanting. Beet armyworms are damaging cotton in several Rolling Plains counties, with little other insect activity.

Thrips—Light infestations of thrips were observed in Knox, Baylor, Jones, Fisher and Schleicher counties. Thrips normally cause heavy damage from plant emergence until early squaring. Producers will need to watch for damage by this pest during the next three or four weeks.

Beet Armyworm—Beet armyworms were reported damaging stands of young cotton in Stonewall, Fisher, Jones, Hardeman and Wilbarger counties. This insect is a general feeder which attacks the foliage, stem and sometimes the roots of field and vegetable crops, as well as various weeds. Generally, heaviest damage is caused to cotton when the beet armyworm attacks it just after the plants have emerged. Insecticide applications should be based primarily on the amount of damage caused by the beet armyworm.

Cutworms—Cutworms were observed damaging young cotton in Jones and Tom Green counties.

Grasshoppers—Heavy infestations of grasshoppers were observed in the west part of Schleicher County.

For control recommendations, refer to L-508 (1968), Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects in the High Plains, Rolling Plains and Trans-Pecos Area of Texas. Copies of this guide may be picked up at the office of the County Agricultural Agent.

The information used in the Rolling Plains Insect Report is compiled from local reports sent in by County Agricultural Agents, personnel of Texas A&M University System, branches of the USDA, chemical companies, and cotton producers. We hope that everyone who does any field checking will send us a report of the situation as he finds it.

## COUNTY AGENT NEWS

A 100 percent calf crop is now possible and should be every cattleman's goal. Improved management practices including pregnancy testing and semen evaluation greatly help cattlemen to reach this goal.

Semen evaluation of the herd bull prior to the breeding season will help reduce normal uncertainties of the final outcome of next year's calf crop. Competent veterinarians can accurately predict the breeding ability of bulls with a semen test.

Many conditions influence the semen quality of a bull. Hot weather, sickness, and long periods of inactivity can produce undesirable semen. A veterinarian will weigh conditions such as these before grading semen satisfactory, unsatisfactory, or questionable.

Factors other than semen quality affect a bull's ability to settle cows. These factors, referred to collectively as breeding soundness, should be evaluated at the time of semen collection.

A bull should receive a physical examination to uncover any defects in feet, legs, or other areas that will limit his effectiveness.

Don't forget to pinch the

tips from the growing chrysanthemum plants in order to induce additional side shoots. A good rule to follow is to pinch off the top two sets of leaves as soon as three to four pairs of leaves are visible on the shoot. This prevents tall, leggy plants and develops strong, stocky plants that will be able to hold up the weight of the flower buds in the fall. Stop pinching about mid to late July in order to obtain a good crop of flowers.

Grass along a chain link fence or under a wooden fence can become very unsightly if allowed to grow too tall. Hand pulling is about the only way to remove grass that has grown up through a chain link fence. This tedious and time consuming task can be eliminated by spraying a six-inch band at the base of the chain link fence with Naptha. Naptha is an expensive spray that kills plant tissue on contact. Care should be taken to prevent the Naptha from reaching the base of the trees and shrubs or from contacting the leaf surface of any desirable plants. Using a hand-operated, low pressure sprayer, the grass and weeds can be controlled by applying Nap-

tha every four to six weeks. If used before the grass becomes too large, the effect is hardly noticeable; and it maintains a neat appearance in a well-cared-for lawn.

Many prize plants are killed or badly damaged when excessive water from an evaporative cooler is allowed to drain into the flower or shrub border. If the soil remains saturated with water, there is insufficient oxygen present in the soil for good growth and development. The loss of roots will cause symptoms very similar to nitrogen deficiency or iron chlorosis. The first reaction is to apply additional fertilizer rather than correct the situation caused by overwatering. This only adds to the problem.

Don't forget to fertilize your rose bushes every four to six weeks throughout the growing season in order to insure good strong growth and abundant flower production. Use about one-half cup of complete fertilizer per rose bush and broadcast over the entire bed area or place in a ring around each plant at a distance of 15 to 18 inches from the main stem.

Be sure to protect the foliage from black spot and mildew throughout the growing season in order to have strong bushes and abundant flowers this fall. A fungicide containing folpet will be effective against both black spot and mildew if used every week to ten days throughout the growing season.



**4-H Keeps Its Members Active**

4-H members are widely known as "doers." As a matter of fact, 4-H pioneered the "learn-by-doing" method of informal teaching.

Today an estimated 3 million boys and girls between 9 and 19 years of age are engaged in some 50 different projects. These projects have been developed over the years by the Cooperative Extension Service which supervises all 4-H work. The majority of the projects—or programs—are suitable for urban as well as rural 4-H'ers.

For example, agricultural projects such as livestock, crops and marketing are designed for farm youngsters who make up about 39 per cent of the national enrollment. Projects and activities in science, consumer education, home and money management, home economics, health, safety, leadership and mechanics are suitable for all 4-H members.

The projects are set up so the 4-H'ers can advance in an orderly fashion under the guidance of volunteer adult leaders and experienced 4-H junior leaders.

When projects are completed, 4-H'ers are encouraged to evaluate their own achievements. Not only is it possible to compete with other 4-H'ers engaged in like projects, but there is a special program called "achievement" which considers progress in their total 4-H efforts.

It is the national 4-H Achievement program sponsored by the Ford Motor Company Fund. Annual awards are offered for the best overall records submitted in country, state and national competition.

Last year, for example nearly 9,000 members in 50 states, qualified for county medal awards. The top state award is a trip to the National 4-H Congress held in Chicago the week after Thanksgiving.

From the 1968 state winners, 12 will be chosen for national \$500 scholarships. A special award of an engraved silver serving tray, presented in the name of the President of the United States, will be given to the highest ranking girl and boy from among the national winners.

# Garbage Ordinance

Being an ordinance adopted for the preservation of health, sanitation and safety of the public and providing for the collection, removal and disposal of garbage, trash and rubbish within the City of Rotan, Texas; Defining terms; requiring all owners, occupants, tenants, or lessees of residences, churches, schools, colleges, lodges and commercial industrial business or other buildings within the city to provide containers and receptacles with covers for garbage, trash and rubbish; specifying that containers and receptacles be placed at convenient locations on the premises where they may be emptied and the contents removed at regular intervals; Prohibiting anyone except employees of the City of Rotan or their duly authorized representative from emptying containers or receptacles or transporting the contents on the streets and public thoroughfares; fixing schedules of reasonable charges to be made against owners, occupants, tenants and lessees of buildings and premises receiving the service, requiring the director of the Department of Public Health to make periodic inspections of buildings, prem-

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ises and all places where garbage, trash and rubbish may accumulate and enforce and administer the provisions of the ordinance; providing a saving clause in the event any part of the ordinance should be declared unconstitutional; fixing a penalty for the violation thereof; repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith; and providing an effective date.

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Rotan, Texas:

SECTION 1. The accumulation of waste, refuse, trash, rubbish and other deleterious substances on the premises of private residences, commercial institutions, vacant lots, and in streets and alleys constitutes a public menace and nuisance and greatly increases the danger of the spread of infections, contagious and epidemic diseases, and it is imperative and urgent for the preservation of health, safety, sanitation, peace and public welfare that proper and adequate regulations be adopted to require property owners, tenants, occupants or lessees to secure containers and receptacles of sufficient size and material in which to deposit garbage, trash and rubbish for collection and removal at regular intervals.

SECTION 2. Garbage, trash, rubbish, refuse defined. The term "garbage" as used in the ordinance shall be held to mean all animal and vegetable matter, such as waste material and refuse from kitchens, residences, grocery stores, drug stores, butcher shops, restaurants, cafes, hotels, rooming and boarding houses and other deleterious substances.

The term "trash" as used in

this ordinance shall mean waste and refuse material such as feathers, coffee grounds, paper of all kinds, boxes, barrels, crates, grass, weeds, shrubs, yard cleanings, grass clippings, leaves, tree trimmings and sweepings from sidewalks.

The term "rubbish" as used in this ordinance shall mean waste and refuse material such as tin cans, bottles, glass, rags, rubber, pieces of wood, scraps of iron, tin wire and other metals.

The term "refuse" as used in this ordinance shall be held to mean all substances included in the terms "garbage", "trash" and "rubbish".

SECTION 3. Garbage Cans and Trash Receptacles Required: That every owner, occupant, tenant or lessee using or occupying any building house or structure within the Corporate limits of the City of Rotan, Texas, for residences, churches, schools, colleges, lodges, commercial business or other purposes shall provide and maintain garbage cans or receptacles of sufficient number and size, as hereinafter specified, to hold the garbage, trash and rubbish that will normally accumulate on the premises.

SECTION 4. Garbage, Trash and Rubbish Can Size and Construction. Every owner, occupant, tenant or lessee shall provide a container or containers for garbage and rubbish of not less than five (5) nor more than thirty-two (32) gallon capacity, constructed of metal with a tight fitting metal lid.

SECTION 5. Construction. Garbage containers that have deteriorated to the extent of having jagged or sharp edges capable of causing injury to the garbage collectors or others whose duty it is to handle the container, or to such an extent that the

lids will not fit tightly or securely will be condemned by the City of Rotan, acting through the Superintendent of Garbage Department or by the Health Department.

SECTION 6. Those Allowed to Empty Contents of Cans or Receptacles. It shall be unlawful for anyone except the employees of the City of Rotan or their duly authorized contractors to empty garbage cans or trash and rubbish receptacles or convey or transport garbage or trash and rubbish on the streets, alleys and public thoroughfares of the City of Rotan.

SECTION 7. Lids or Covers to be Kept on Cans or Containers: The lids or covers of all containers shall at all times be kept secure and fastened so that cats, dogs, rodents, flies and other insects may not have access to the contents thereof and said lids and covers shall only be removed while the containers and receptacles are being filled or emptied as the case may be.

SECTION 8. Location of Containers. In residential areas, receptacles as required shall be placed inside of the property line at the edge of the alley where there is no alley fence, and where there is an alley fence the receptacle or receptacles must be placed against the outside of the fence. Where there is no alley, the receptacle or receptacles must be placed in front of said property between the sidewalk and curb at a place most accessible to the collectors. Under no conditions will City vehicles or Employees be allowed to enter private property for the purpose of picking up garbage.

SECTION 9. Business Establishments. Business establishments which have wet garbage are required to use the same type of containers

as for residences and such containers shall be placed in the alleys where there is an alley and where there is no alley, containers must be placed on or near the curb line of such place of business. Business establishments having such quantities of waste paper to make use of barrels impracticable are required to prepare waste paper in containers easily accessible to the garbage collector.

SECTION 9. Requirements on Weight and Length of Units. The total weight of each garbage can and contents of each trash and rubbish receptacle and contents shall not exceed seventy-five (75) pounds so that each can or receptacle may be removed conveniently; in the event trash and rubbish is of such a nature that it cannot be put in the receptacle, it shall be carefully prepared in units or pieces under seventy-five (75) pounds in weight and placed at such point as the representative of the City shall find and designated to be the most accessible for collecting and removing. Tree limbs, shrubs and hedge cuttings shall not exceed five (5) feet in length and shall be prepared in pieces or units under seventy-five (75) pounds in weight and placed in an orderly manner at such point as the representative of the City shall find and designate to be the most accessible for collecting and removing.

SECTION 10. Burning of Trash or Garbage. It shall be unlawful for any person or persons to burn trash or garbage within the City Limits of Rotan, Texas.

SECTION 11. Charges for Trash or Garbage. The Collection and removal of garbage, trash and rubbish from houses, buildings and premises used for residential purposes shall be once each week. Fair and reasonable charges for this residential service shall be and are shown in terms of dollars and cents in a column for a calendar month as follows:

- Single family Residence \$1.00
- 2 Family Dwelling (2 accounts) each \$2.00
- 3 Family Dwelling (3 accounts) each \$3.00
- 4 Family Dwelling (4 accounts) each \$4.00

The basis of the above service charge is the collection and removal of the normal accumulation of all garbage of each family unit once each week, and the collection and removal of the maximum of eight (8) cubic feet or the volume of two (2) thirty-two (32) gallon cans or receptacles or trash and rubbish once each week.

SECTION 12. Charges for Commercial and Business Service. The collection and removal of garbage, trash and rubbish from houses, buildings and premises used for commercial and business purposes shall be daily, six days each week. Charges for this commercial and business service, which are fair and reasonable shall be a minimum of \$2.00 per month. The basis of the service charge will be on the number of collections each week and the cubic yardage of such garbage, trash and rubbish. The representative of the City shall determine the cubic yardage of garbage, trash and rubbish and the service charge, which shall be approved by the City Manager.

SECTION 13. City Garbage Superintendent's Office to be Notified of "No Service". Every owner, occupant, tenant or lessee of a house or building used for residential, business, or commercial purposes is required to maintain constant supervision and surveillance over the garbage can and trash and rubbish receptable on his premises and if either the garbage can or trash and rubbish receptacle should not be emptied and the contents removed by a representative of the City of Rotan, or by other duly authorized person, for a period of seven (7) days, he must notify the City Garbage Superintendent by telephone or in writing, of this fact within seven (7) days.

SECTION 14. Wet Garbage. All garbage or trash and rubbish that is mixed with water or liquids shall be

drained before being put in the can or receptacle. All garbage, which has been drained, shall be well wrapped in paper or other combustible material before being deposited in can.

SECTION 15. Heavy Accumulation of Packing Houses, etc. The places of wholesale accumulations such as packing houses, killing and dressing plants for fowls, wholesale fruit and vegetable houses and storage, business houses and other places where the daily accumulation of garbage, trash and rubbish is more than the ordinary quantities, are not included in the service furnished by the City Garbage Department. are required to notify the City Superintendent of the City of Rotan, who shall direct the disposal of such accumulation in a satisfactory manner.

SECTION 16. Heavy Accumulation of Broken Concrete, Etc. Heavy accumulation such as brick, broken concrete, rock, stones, ashes, lumber clinkers, cinders, dirt and plaster, sand or gravel, automobile frames, dead trees and other bulky, heavy material shall be disposed of at the expense of owner or person controlling same under the direction of the City Garbage Superintendent.

SECTION 17. Heavy Accumulation of Manure, Etc. Manure from cow lots, horse stables, poultry yards, pigeon lofts, and waste and oils from garages and filling stations, shall be disposed of at the expense of the party responsible for the same under the direction of the City Garbage Superintendent.

SECTION 18. An Offense to Violate Ordinance. The Health Ordinance requires all premises, both vacant and occupied be kept in a clean and sanitary condition at all times. The City Garbage Department will not make collections of garbage, trash, or rubbish or tree limbs and shrubbery cuttings, where same is not prepared for designation by the terms of this Ordinance and failure to comply with this provision will be an offense and each day's failure to comply will constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 19. Disposal Places. The disposal of garbage, trash and rubbish and that designated under Sections 14, 15, 16 and 17 of this Ordinance or any kind of rubbish in any place within the City Limits of Rotan, Texas, except as authorized by the City Garbage Superintendent, is prohibited.

SECTION 20. The meddling with garbage cans, trash, or rubbish receptacles in any way, pilfering, scattering contents and junking in any alley or street within City Limits of the City of Rotan is prohibited.

SECTION 21. Protection of Cans or Receptacles. The contents of all cans and receptacles shall be protected so that the wind cannot blow out and scatter same over the streets, alleys and premises of City.

SECTION 22. Service Charge Place on Water Bill. To avoid duplication in billing and as a convenience to the public, fees for the service herein provided for shall be billed on the monthly water bill and shall promptly be remitted to the City of Rotan monthly as the same accrues. Failure to pay such fees when due shall be considered as if the water bill is delinquent and the City, may at its option, discontinue water service until the delinquent fees are paid.

SECTION 23. It is hereby the duty of the Superintendent of Garbage and the Director of the Department of Public Health of the City of Rotan or his representative, to make inspection trips at regular intervals to determine whether or not the garbage trash and rubbish is being properly collected, removed and disposed of as required by the provisions of this or any other applicable health ordinance, and in the event it is found that the Ordinance is being violated, appropriate and timely action shall be taken to insure a full compliance with its said provisions.

SECTION 24. Complaints. Do not enter into controversy with workmen concerning garbage collection. To make a complaint, call the City office 735-2251. In making a complaint, be sure to give name and correct address.

SECTION 25. Saving Clause. Should any part, section, sentence, paragraph, clause or phrase contained in this Ordinance be held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of the Ordinance, but in all respects shall remain in full force and effect; and the City Council hereby declares that it would not have passed the unconstitutional or invalid part had it known it was invalid and that it would have passed the remaining part that is not invalid.

SECTION 26. Repealing All Ordinances or Parts of Ordinances in Conflict Herewith. This Ordinance shall be held and construed to be cumulative of all other Ordinances affecting the health, safety, peace and sanitation of the public in the City of Rotan, except in the instances where the provisions of this Ordinance are in conflict with the provisions of Ordinances heretofore passed, and all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are expressly repealed.

SECTION 27. Penalty for Violation of Ordinances. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00), and each offense and each day's continuance of failure to comply with the Ordinance shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 28. Effective Date of Ordinance. That this Ordinance become effective and in full force and effect three (3) full days after publication of same.



## "Ye Shall Know The Truth"

John 8:32

### ASK YOUR PREACHER — (No. 3)

Every person has a "frame of reference" to which he consciously or subconsciously refers his questions as to what he shall or shall not do, or what he shall or shall not believe. However, this "frame of reference" is not always dependable, worthy, or intelligent; and the purpose of preaching is to call people's attention to the fact that God's word is the standard to which they must conform, if they would enjoy the blessings he has prepared for them. Every one who has any conception of what it means to be loyal to Christ readily understands that all preaching which meets with God's approval must be in harmony with the doctrine of the New Testament. Thus to see if the doctrines proclaimed by your preacher are the same as those recorded in God's word, ask him:

#### WHERE THE BIBLE TEACHES INFANT BAPTISM.

The Bible teaches that before one can be SCRIPTURALLY baptized: (1) He must be taught the gospel—"Go TEACH all nations, baptizing them . . ." (Matthew 28:19); (2) That it is the believer who is to be baptized—"He that BELIEVETH and is baptized . . ." (Mark 16:16); (3) Furthermore, it is the penitent believer who is to be baptized—"REPENT, and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins" (Acts 2:38); (4) And again that the proper subject for baptism is one who is able to make the "good confession" (1 Timothy 6:12). In answer to the eunuch's question "What doth hinder me to be baptized?" Philip said, "If thou believeth with all thine heart, thou mayest." And he answered and said, "I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God." And he commanded the chariot to stand still: and they went down both into the water, both Philip and the eunuch; and he baptized him" (Acts 8:36-38). Thus, pre-requisites to scriptural baptism are: HEARING the word, believing the word, REPENTING of sins, and confessing faith in Jesus Christ as the Son of God. An infant can do none of these, and therefore IS NOT a proper subject for baptism. An infant, who is WITHOUT SIN, cannot qualify for baptism which is "FOR the REMISSION OF SINS" (Acts 2:38).

If an infant is baptized, he is baptized: Without faith, without repentance, without confession, without desire, without love, without Divine authority, without consent, without Divine example, and without expectation.

The practice of infant baptism grew out of the false doctrine of "Infant damnation" or "Inherited sin," "Inherent Depravity" or "Adamic Sin" whichever you choose to call it. It was not practiced until several centuries after the apostles, who gave us the final revelation of God (Jude 3), had passed from this life.

Now ask your preacher for his authority for practicing infant baptism. It is to the word of God that we must give account in the last day (John 12:48).

#### WASHINGTON

"As it looks from here"

Washington, D.C. — On August 25, 1959, I introduced a Resolution in the Congress which would permit two companies of Marines to patrol the streets of Washington, which, of course, is a Federal City, in conjunction with the police.

Again on February 26, 1963 and July 14, 1965, the same Resolution was introduced and each of these was referred to the Armed Services Committee where it was opposed by the Defense Department. In fact, Departmental reports, including the District of Columbia Commissioners, were adverse to the passage of this measure.

As time went on it is common knowledge as to what happened and, finally, the Marines and Soldiers were called in to quell riots and looting.

On three different occasions the House of Representatives passed legislation which would have the effect of nullifying many of the Supreme Court's decisions affecting arrest and prosecution of criminals. The Senate did not act.

At last, they have done so, and last week a bill was passed which has as its purpose to override certain Court judgments which have handicapped law enforcement and providing assistance to police enforcement in the States.

Title I of the bill provides planning grants and action grants to State and local law enforcement agencies to develop and strengthen the total service. Title II of the Bill seeks to give authority back to the trial courts that they may not be handicapped by these decisions which have given encouragement to the criminal as against the public interest. The tendency of

the Federal courts, and especially the Supreme Court, to disrupt the finality of State court decisions has eroded respect for law and diminished the fear of punishment.

Another important part of Title II says that the Supreme Court can not review the question of the voluntariness of a confession when the voluntary aspect has already been settled by the highest court of a State. Under the proposed legislation, the standard for admitting confessions as evidence will return to the time-tested standard of true voluntariness. It sets aside the inflexible and technical rules established in the so-called Mallory, Escobedo and Miranda cases.

Title III, to which much opposition developed, is concerned with permitting wiretapping in the investigation of serious Federal crimes. This section allows a court to order electronic surveillance under the "lawful search" provisions of the Fourth Amendment to the Constitution. This power will give much needed assistance in the war on organized crime. The Justice Department has identified an estimated 5000 members of the Cosa Nostra but has succeeded in indicting only 200 and convicting only about 100 since 1961.

Title IV prohibits interstate mail order sale of handguns. It does not affect rifles and shotguns and does not limit the right of the person under the Constitution to keep and bear arms. It does prohibit all sales of handguns to persons under 21 and to non-residents of the State. It requires gun dealers to be licensed by the Federal Government and to keep records of acquisition and disposition of their sales.

This is a section which gives considerable concern to many of us who have been opposed to the Federal Government injecting itself into this Constitutional right of the individual but as a "take it or leave it" proposition, with the other desirable provisions of the Law, it was acceptable to the House of Rep-

resentatives. Personally, I would prefer not to see this sort of license power given to the Federal Government, feeling it is a "foot in the door." On the other hand, the so-called Dodd Bill in the Senate imposes far-reaching restrictions, and the action in the Bill approved by the Congress and sent to the President may stop this further infringement by the Federal Government on gun control.

The omnibus crime control act already bears the imprint of many restrictive changes and additions. If America is to be made safe for its citizens, this is a long step in the right direction.

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
