A Typical Combat Soldier'

The following is an article received by Mrs. Mary Lou Landes, from SP-5 Ronald D. Landes, now serving with the U.S. Army in Tay Ninh, Vietnam. Written anonymously t describes the typical com bat soldier.

A SOLIDER

Just imagine most of the guys over here are 18 and fighting to make it 19. The average age of the combat soldier in many units here is $18\frac{1}{2}$. And what a man he is A pink-cheeked, tousled-haired, tight muscled fellow who under normal circumstances would be considered by sociey as half-man, half-boy, no yet dry behind the ears, and pain in the unemployment chart.

But here and now he is the beardless hope of free man, He is, for the most part, unmarried, and without material possessions except possibly for an old car at home, and a transistor radio here. He lisens to rock 'n' roll and 105 Millimeter howitzers.

He just got out of high school, received so-so grades played a little football and he had a girl who promised to be true.

He has learned to drink peer, because it is cold, and it is the thing to do. He is a private first class, a one year military veteran with one or possibly three years to go.

He never cared for work, preferred waxing his own car to washing his father's, but he is now fighting from dawn to dark, often longer.

He still has trouble spelling. and writing letters home is a painful process. But he can break down his rifle in 30 seconds, and put it back together in 29. He can describe nomenclature of a fragmentation gernade, explain how machine gun operates and use either if the need arises.

He can dig a foxhole, apply first aid to a wounded companion, march until he is told to stop, or stop until he is told to march. He has seen more suffering that he should have in his short life. 
