Hammers Take H-Coming Game

Rotan's Yellowhammers came thru with a very decisive win over Wall Hawks to open Homecoming festivities here Friday night. The 21-0 win set up an atmosphere for a happy occasion over the weekend.

A Walter Hargrove-Alex Colegan combination clicked twice in the first quarter to put the Yellowhammers ahead 14-0.

With 5 minutes and 45 seconds left in the first quarter, quarterback Hargrove passed 20 yards to halfback Coleman for the first TD. Hargrove kicked the extra point.

A few minutes later Hargrove again passed to Coleman for 34 yards and the second touchdown of the ballgame. Extra point kick by Hargrove was good.

Coleman took the ball over from six yards out three minutes deep in the second quarter. Hargrove again kicked the extra point.

The second half went scoreless with the Yellowhammers being penalized five times. This win gives Rotan a 2-1 record in district play.

County Goes Democratic 3-1

Fisher County voted solidly Democratic Tuesday night, with Humphrey winning 3-1 over Nixon for the presidency and Preston Smith running away with gubernatorial balloting over Republican Paul Eggers by a 5-1 ratio.

George Wallace ran a poor third with 268 votes.

Just over 2,300 voted Tuesday, slightly off the 1964 general election vote in Fisher County of about 2,400. The Democrats also won handily in that election.

Totals for the Humphrey-Muskie ticket were 1,560 with Nixon-Agnew getting 555. Smith got 1,924 votes to 388 for Eggers, and Democrat Ben Barnes, in the lieutenant governor's race, received 2,015 votes with Republican Doug DeCluitt getting 261 votes.

Savings Bond Sale Report

R. L. Springer, chairman of the Fisher County Savings Bonds Committee reports today that sales of the United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Fisher county totaled \$2,231 during September. Sales during the first nine months totaled \$32,508 and this is 54 per cent of the 1968 sales goal.

September sales in Texas totaled \$13,508,678 and the January-September sales were \$134,729,099 — an increase of 8.3 per cent over sales during the same period of 1967.

Nationally, the cash sales of E and H Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares totaled \$361 million for September and topped September sales for 10 of the previous 11 years. Holding the Savings Bonds-Freedom Shares as of September 30 total \$51,964 million.

Miss Baird is author of "A History of the Circle Bar Ranch"; a biographical book, "Tom Bond", about an early day Kent County cowboy; and a number of educational articles. She is listed in Who's Who in American Education and Who's Who in Texas. She is active in Gamma Tau Chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, Nancy Harper Chapter of DAR, the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society, and in the First Baptist Church.

Miss Baird finished high school here in 1923. received a B.A. degree in Education and M.A. degree in History from West Texas State University in Canyon, Texas.

Rep. Rosson Honored By State Bar Assn.

The State Bar of Texas has honored State Rep. Renal Rosson of Snyder for his work on the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee of the House.

State Bar director Charles R. Griggs of Sweetwater presented Rosson a gold-sealed certificate and citation at a meeting of the Scurry County Bar Association.

"This certificate of appreciation is presented," said the citation, "in recognition of his contribution to the administration of justice through his work on the Criminal Jurisprudence Committee, House of Representatives, Sixth Legislature, 1967-68."

The committee helped revise the Code of Criminal Procedure, originally enacted in 1965. Griggs also praised Rosson for his work as chairman of the House Judiciary Committee.

Cotton Harvest Slowed Wed.

Cotton gathering was slowed Wednesday in the Rotan area by the damp cold front which moved in late Tuesday night. Local gins had a total of 6,420 bales ginned Wednesday afternoon. Some trailers remained loaded on yards, but both gins expected to catch up Wednesday night. Both reported only a few bales coming in Wednesday.

Hobbs Gin reported 3,085 bales, with their yard loaded and loads coming in as fast as they could gin it off. They reported strippers running in that section, Wednesday, and no sign of the rush subsiding.

Hunting Seasons Open Saturday

Many Fisher County hunters are making big plans for opening seasons this weekend. Texas Game Commission set opening on practically all game in Texas for Saturday, Nov. 9th.

Quail hunters will take to field with the best crop in several years. Hunting conditions are expected to be rather hard in early season, ever due to dry weather making scenting conditions difficult for dogs. Rank vegetation makes dogs almost necessary. Many out of country bird hunters have leases here and they always make opening day. Deer have done well North, West and South of town and several are planning on getting their deer near home this year. Turkey had a good hatch, but are not plentiful enough to justify much hunting.

Deer and turkey hunting parties are too numerous for us to attempt to list them, but most of them are going to the Palo Pinto in Breckenridge area and to the Hill country in central Texas. Deer and turkey are abundant in the Hill country and in prime condition, due to heavy acorn crop and rank vegetation. In the Palo Pinto country, deer are plentiful, but turkey scarce.

Hunting conditions for these is expected to be rather hard opening weekend, unless colder weather moves in, as they don't move around very much in warm weather, but with the unusual amount of game, hunters should have an excellent season.

Services for the Rev. Dan D. Jones, 78 of 3012 30th St., Lubbock, a retired Nazarene minister was at 3 p.m. Oct. 31 at the First Nazarene Church, Lubbock.

Officiating was the Rev. J. R. Bell, pastor of the First Church of the Nazarene, assisted by Dr. Lyle Eckley, superintendent of the West Texas District of the Nazarene Church and the Rev. Elmer Stahly, manager of the district office of the Nazarene Church.

Burial was in Resthaven Memorial Park under direction of Resthaven-Singleton-Wilson Funeral Home. Jones died at 11:05 p.m. Tuesday, October 29 in West Texas Hospital after an extended illness.

The Rev. Mr. Jones was a Nazarene minister for 42 years, serving as pastor of churches in Kansas, Missouri, Texas and New Mexico, until retirement in 1962. He was minister of vocation for First Nazarene Church in Lubbock after retirement.

Estate Planning Is Most Vital

In recent years many changes have taken place in agriculture. One of the most noticeable changes is the growth in farm size and investment. In the Rolling Plains the average farm size is 857 acres. If valued at \$150 per acre, land investment could easily amount to \$128,500. With another 525,000 in machinery and equipment, a farmer or rancher can easily have an investment of more than \$150,000. In most cases this value represents about twice the investment of fifteen years ago.

This large increase in investment is only one reason why farmers and ranchers must consider estate planning. Estate planning is a comprise among (1) minimizing the amount of taxes due after death, (2) distributing the property to designated heirs as desired, and (3) assuring financial security during the remainder of a farmer's lifetime.

The first step in estate planning, regardless of the size of the estate concerned, is to seek counsel from an attorney and other competent advisors. One of the most effective tools of estate planning is the creation of a properly drawn will. The will can assist in the distribution of property as desired as well as take advantage of many estate settlement costs.

Since this is a part of the farm and ranch business than can be put off easily, a majority of farmers and ranchers in the Rolling Plains do not have a will or an estate plan of any type. The development of an estate plan can be one of the most important acts a manager can perform.

Stop and think about your situation. If you should meet with a fatal accident or sickness tomorrow, who would receive your property? Do you keep your business records in an orderly fashion to ease interpretation? How much of a final burden would you leave for your spouse?

If you don't know the answers to these questions, it is time for you to discuss them with your attorney or other advisor in whom you have confidence.




COUNTY AGENT NEWS

by Richard Spencer

A number of Fisher County farmers and ranchers, along with about 40,000 other Texas livestock producers, will receive a most important questionnaire during the last half of November.

It will come from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin, and it should be filled out and returned as soon as possible.

The information gained from the questionnaires, will be the basis for the official estimates of livestock numbers, cattle, hogs and poultry, for the State of Texas and for each county. The survey on sheep and goats will be made in late December.

Accurate estimates are of great importance to stockmen in planning production and marketings and for providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture.

The Texas Legislature has provided for the program of estimates for each county because state totals alone do not provide adequate information on our most basic industry. The program of estimates is a cooperative effort of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture which depends upon the reporting producers for the needed information.

Each producer who receives a questionnaire from the Reporting Service is urged to fill it out completely for his farm or ranch and return it in the enclosed postage-free envelope.

Gasoline and kerosene around a farm are dangerous things. Destructive farm fires can be reduced by using these explosive liquids carefully.

These pointers are offered on the safe use of gasoline and kerosene: These liquids should be stored outdoors and

at least 40 feet from buildings if they are to be stored above ground. The best place to store them of course, is in an underground tank.

Small amounts of gasoline and kerosene should be stored in metal safety cans... never in glass jugs. Make sure the storage containers are in sound condition and free from leaks. And be sure to label such containers plainly so they can't be mistaken for something else.

It is also advised that tractors and other gasoline-using equipment be housed in a building separate from the barn and other farm structures.

In areas where gasoline is stored, protect light bulbs from breakage and keep electrical circuits in good repair. Another thing to remember: keep gasoline and kerosene away from flame or heat, and don't smoke while handling them. Handle these liquids with care... your carelessness can prevent a tragic fire. Lawn mowers fuel tanks should also be drained for the winter.

Screwworms were reported last week on the Glen Webb farm in the Claytonville Community. Cases have been confirmed in almost all areas of the county now. It is hoped that all stockmen realize the serious ness of this problem now, and will put off all livestock surgery until after frost.





Cotton Grades- Price Down

The cotton harvest has reached its peak this week according to B. B. Manly, Jr., Officer in Charge of the U.S. D.A.'s Cotton Classing Office at Abilene. Receipts from the 22 county area served by the Abilene office averaged around 9,000 per day; the classing office processed around 6,500 per day the last seven days. As of Nov. 1, the Abilene office has a backlog of 53,000 unclassified samples. They are classing on samples received Saturday, October 26.

Beginning Monday, November 4, the Abilene office will add a night shift to their operation. Five classers are being added which will make a total of 18 classers and should process around 9,500 samples per day. Some areas, especially San Angelo, Roscoe, and parts of Howard county, are around 70 per cent through ginning to Mr. Manly expects receipts to begin dropping a little within 5 days. It may be possible that more classers will be added later, but the Abilene office is not much further behind than any other office, Manly said.

A total of 45,000 samples were processed by the class-

ing office last week compared to 10,000 for the same week last year. This brings the season's total to 111,000 samples classed compared to 28,000 for a season's total last year at this time.

Grades fell off considerably. Only 44 per cent were in the white category compared to 58 per cent for the previous week. The remainder or 56 per cent were in the light spotted category.

Staple lengths were down only slightly with 52 per cent 30; 12 per cent 29; 18 per cent 31; 7 per cent 32; 4 per cent 33; and 7 per cent 34 or better.

Micronaire readings were also changed only slightly with 84 per cent in the 3.5-4.9 or premium range compared to 89 per cent for the previous week. For the first time this season, low micronaire readings have shown up in statistics. One per cent were in the 3.3 - 3.4 range. The other readings were: 12 per cent, 5.0-5.2 and 3 per cent, 5.3 and above.

Pressley readings are still good with 78 per cent reading 80,000 PSI (pounds per square inch) and above.

The Consumer and Marketing Service, Abilene, Texas reports that the cotton market is falling off. Prices are dropping every day, especially in the higher grades. Price range from 200 to 350 points over the Government rate. This

Seniors Have NROTC Offer

Applications for the Navy's twenty-third annual Regular NROTC qualification test are now available according to Mrs. Rudy Hamric, counselor of Fisher County Schools. This nationwide examination will be given on Dec. 14, and all eligible male high school seniors and graduates may apply.

On the basis of this test, personal interviews, medical examinations, and other factors, Mrs. Hamric explained, about 1,700 young men will enter the Regular NROTC Program as midshipmen at NROTC units in 53 colleges and universities throughout the nation. Male citizens of the United States who will be at least 17 but not yet 21 on June 30, 1969, and who are now high school seniors or recent graduates, may be eligible to apply for the test. Those who attain qualifying scores will be interviewed and given medical examinations next January and February. A successful candidate receives financial aid for four

years of college. This includes tuition and educational fees, books, uniforms, and \$50.00 per month subsistence allowance. After successfully completing baccalaureate degree requirements and naval training, graduates are commissioned as officers in the U. S. Navy or Marine Corps.

Regular NROTC midshipmen participate in three summer at-sea training periods with various naval units. These periods assist them in learning about the variety of interesting and challenging opportunities available to them as naval or marine corps officers.

Registrations for the test will close Nov. 15, 1969. NROTC Bulletins containing eligibility requirements and qualifying test applications are available from Mrs. Hamric.
