

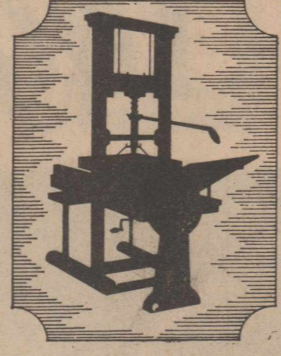
Roby Firemen Take In \$2,300 On Turkey Shoot

McCaulley Shuts Down Hobbs In Final Quarter

Last Friday night the McCaulley Eagles defeated the Hobbs Panthers 65-20 for a three-way tie for the district. The teams the Eagles tie with are Highland and Trent. Highland will represent the district in the playoffs.

The Eagles got the ball on the Hobbs 16 following a poor punt. Earl Williams got 10 and Alton Hawthorne got the last six and the TD. Robert Morales kicked for the 2 points conversion with 8:17 left in the first quarter. The score was 8-0. Three plays later the Panthers fumbled and McCaulley's Max Kemp came up with the loose ball at the Hobbs 4. E. Williams got 3 tough yards and Hawthorne got his 2nd TD from one yard, the PAT was not good. With 6:56 left in the quarter the score was 14-0. Hobbs took the kickoff and started on their own 28 and went to the McCaulley 24 before giving up the ball on downs. The yardage was made by Raymond Soto, Johnny Medrano, and Mark Anderle. McCaulley started at the 24 and went to the Hobbs 23 before losing the ball on a fumble where Panther Mark Anderle recovered. Hobbs moved to the 40 then lost the ball on downs. Fifteen plays later James Kemp scored from 10 yards out. Morales kicked for the 2 points

and the score was 22-0 with 8:13 left in the second quarter.

Hobbs got good field position at the 40 and Andele lost 4, on 2-19 at the 36 Soto went 44 yards for the first Hobbs TD. Randy Etheredge's kick was good, with 6:58 left in the half the score was 22-8. Hobbs' Don Denman intercepted a pass to end the next McCaulley drive. But McCaulley made 3 TDs in the next 3:24 and Hobbs made one for a halftime score of 40-14. Hawthorne scored for McCaulley from 12 yards out then he scored from 36 yards and with 1:41 left in the half Soto scored for Hobbs from 1 yard out and with :09 Kenny Smart went 45 yards on a KO return for the final TD of the half. The halftime score was 40-14. McCaulley.

Opening the third quarter, McCaulley took the Hobbs kickoff and went 35 yards in 3 plays. Hawthorne scored from 27 yards out with &:25 left in the quarter. The score was 46-14. Medrano recovered a loose ball for Hobbs at the McCaulley 36. Anderle passed to Willis Ogden to the 3rd and Soto got the last 3 for the last score for Hobbs with 7:18 in the quarter. The score was 46-20 then it was all McCaulley. With 7:01 Morales scored from 40 yards which made

the score 52-20.

Max Kemp intercepted a Hobbs pass at the Hobbs 11 for 3rd and goal. From the 10 Morales scored with 5:24 left in the 3rd period. Hobbs moved the ball down to the McCaulley 30 before giving up the ball on downs and one play later Hawthorne went in for the final score. With 2:15 left in the 3rd period, the game was called due to the 45 point rule.

ROTAN FACES CROWELL IN BI-DISTRICT GAME

The Rotan Yellowhammers will meet the winners of District 7A in bi-district play this Friday night. Crowell and Rotan will meet on neutral ground at Stamford in a contest set to get underway at 7:30 p.m. November 21.

Head Rotan coach, Don

Mullins, indicated that Crowell has a 9-1 record and will run a lot of their offense from the "Dead T". On defense Crowell will use a five man front with a 4 deep secondary. "They are a physical club, have a lot of big boys and just line up on offense and try to run over you." The Crowell team

uses mainly power plays on offense. They don't do a lot of fancy razzle-dazzle things, they just wear their opponents down with brute force.

The two halfbacks, David Bell and Rocky Glasscock are experienced runners and will both go over 200 pounds, said Mullins.

Don Mullins and assistant coach John Harbison have logged many hours in preparation for Crowell contests in the past four years. When Mullins was head coach at Knox City he played the Prentice Gidney coached Crowell squad for three years. Harbison played Crowell two years prior to joining the Yellowhammer coaching staff.

Defensively, Crowell has only allowed 14 points by a single team as a maximum scored against them by a single team. They have defeated Haskell 14-6; Knox City 20-14; Paducah 34-7; Munday 48-0 and Aspermont 45-0.

Coach Rogers Lankford scouted Crowell at Munday last Friday night in their romp over the Moguls.

Mullins indicated that the team as a whole was healthy and ready for the Friday night bi-district clash.

County Clerk Had Brush With Death On Thursday

Fisher County Clerk John Ashley had a narrow brush with death last Thursday, November 13, when he was found by Roby Volunteer Firemen unconscious in his automobile.

Roby Firemen, responding to a call from a passing motorist, found Ashley unconscious in his automobile. The car was parked in the garage and the ignition switch was on. The garage door was open about two feet. The car was not running and steam from a busted anti-freeze hose was billowing from the garage door.

Jimmy Price, Larry Randolph, Charles Doty and Wayne Pursley were some of the first firemen to respond to the Ashley house. They pulled Ashley from the car, administered emergency treatment and called Weathersbee Funeral Home in Rotan.

Ashley was given further

emergency treatment by Weathersbee Funeral Home personnel on the way to the Fisher County Hospital. After receiving oxygen, Ashley regained full consciousness and was talking by the time he was admitted to the hospital.

Fisher County Attorney Rudy

Hamric indicated last Monday afternoon that Ashley and his wife both voluntarily admitted themselves to the Big Spring State Hospital for further treatment. Ashley was confined to the Fisher County Hospital from Thursday, November 13, until Monday, November 17.

County Game Warden Spoils Hunters Day

Fisher County Game Warden, Jim Riggins, arrested three Scurry County residents at Scott's Corner in Fisher County Sunday night, November 16, and charged them with "possession of a doe deer". The trio allegedly shot the doe in the Rough Creek area.

Riggins said the incident took place at approximately 9:00 p.m.. He was on patrol in the area when he received a radio call relaying the particulars concerning the incident. "The first car I stopped on my way toward Rough Creek had the freshly killed doe in the trunk", said Riggins.

Riggins brought the three individuals, identified as Albert M. Highfield, 44; Steven R. Highfield, 17; and Bobby R. Armstrong, 28, all of Snyder, to

the Rotan office of Justice of the Peace Ernest Roberts. All three paid a \$200.00 fine each.

Riggins seemed very concerned that doe were being shot in a buck only county, saying, "We

are trying to build the deer population and this incident and others like it sure don't help."

Riggins asked for the assistance of Fisher County residents in reporting hunting violations.

but you must be present to win, said Wester.

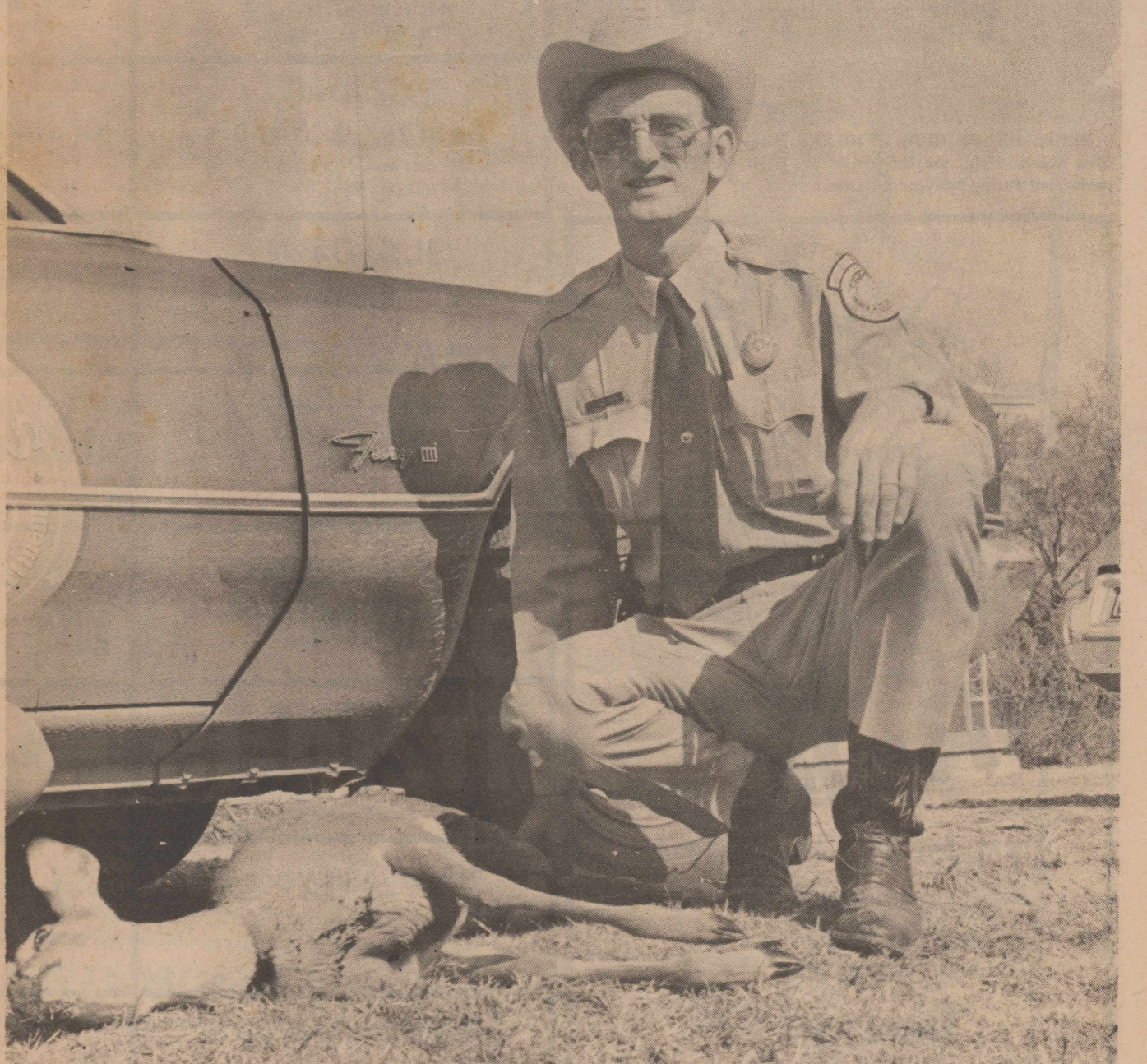

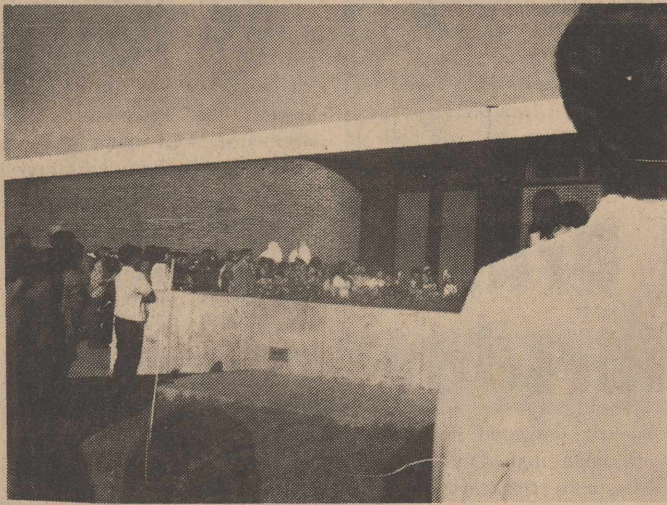

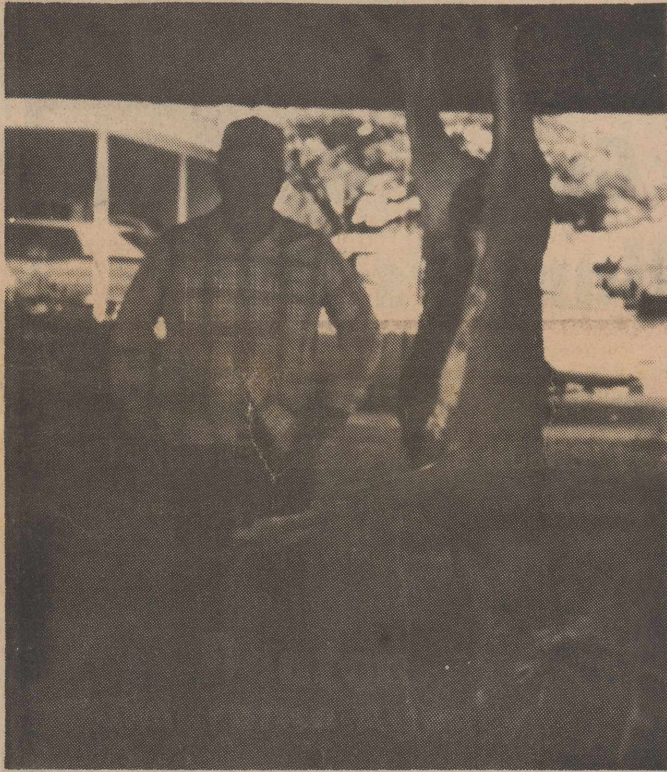

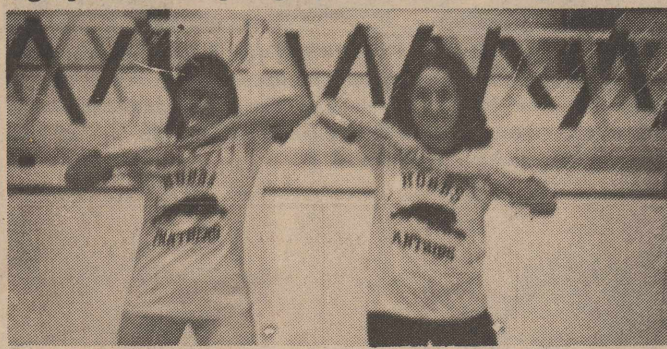
BIG CATCH: Mr. and Mrs. Horace Arrington of Rotan recently caught, near Rotan, 12 fish which weighed two and one half pounds each.

Rotan Board Approves Audit, Book Committee

The Rotan Independent School Board met in regular session last Monday night and spent over two hours reviewing the 1974-75 school audit with James Rodgers, CPA of Hamlin.

Rodgers broke the audit down into a 25 page booklet and reviewed every page with board

members. The audit practices are being changed and Rodgers was careful to explain the changes and make sure each member understood the reporting practices.

The board also approved the consolidated application audit with the regular 1974-75 school

audit. A breakdown of some of the expenditures can be found in another section of this weeks paper. Rodgers was very complimentary of the bookkeeping procedures used by the Superintendent's office, superintendent's secretary and tax assessor-collector, Betty Wilfong.

The board approved the textbook committee for 1976. The books to be studied by the committee include: Social Studies for grades 1 and 2; spelling for grades 1 through 6, and math for grades 1 through 6. The members appointed to serve on

the textbook committee include: Tom Harkey, M.T. Hill, Ray Womack, Mrs. Pat Cox, Mrs. Jewell Edwards, Mrs. Charles McCall, Mrs. Don Mullins, Miss Verna Mae Pittman, Ruth Witherspoon, Walter Miers, Mrs. Candy Dycus, Mrs. Leon Donham, Mrs. Betty Strayhorn and Sid McCown.

The board also authorized the superintendent to accept bids on the sale of the old Rotan Yellowhammer Band uniforms.

In final action the board members discussed the progress being made in the distribution of "Golden Hammer Club" cards to senior citizens within the Rotan Independent School District. Any person, age 65 or over, is entitled to free admission to any home activity including sporting events. Further information on the securing of cards can be obtained from the Superintendent's office.

The Yellowhammers finished the regular season last Friday against Jim Ned to end the season with a 7-3 record. 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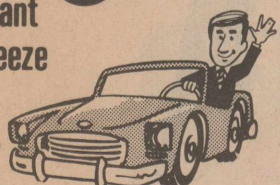

Our great nation is the result of what has been referred to as

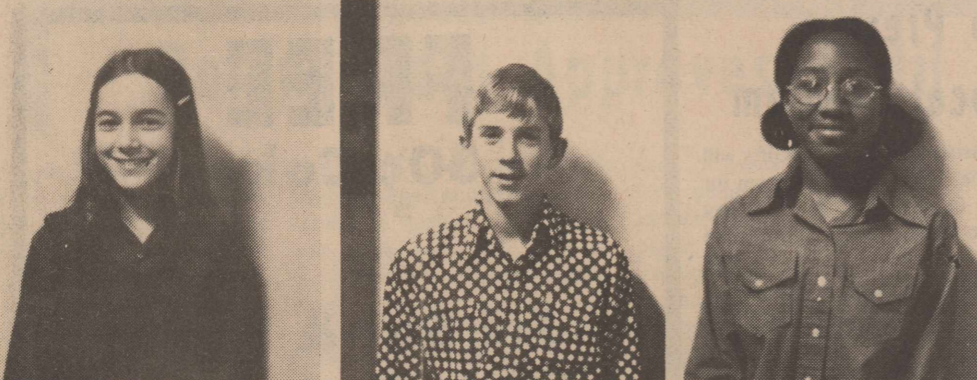
"The Great American Dream". In reflecting on the achievements of almost two hundred years, what is your dream for the future of your country?

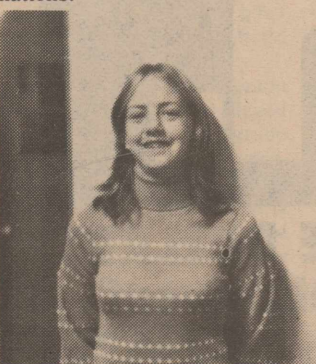

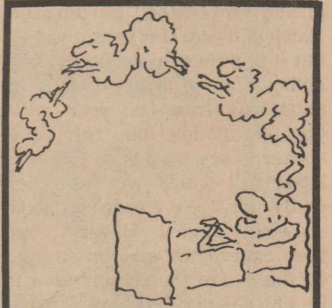

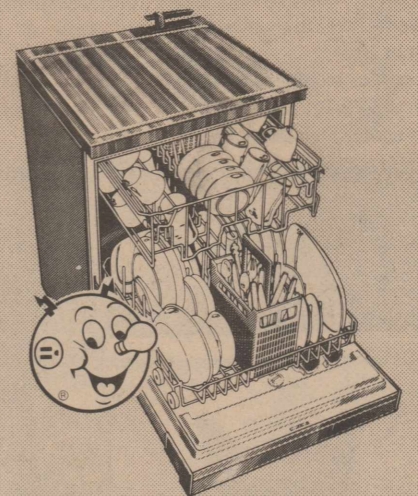

rice; orange slices as garnish. Cook apple and onion in butter or margarine until onion is transparent. Combine flour, curry powder, salt and ginger. Sprinkle over apple and onion mixture and blend. Stir in broth and milk. Heat slowly and stir to prevent burning. Simmer five minutes. Add turkey and lemon juice. Season. Cover and keep hot five minutes. Serve on hot

rice garnished with orange slices. Makes 4 servings. Turkey-Noodle Party Casserole 4 ounces noodles (2 cups); 1 10-oz. package frozen broccoli spears; 3 tablespoons butter or margarine; 1 teaspoon salt; 1/4 teaspoon prepared mustard; 1/4 teaspoon pepper; 2 cups milk; 1 cup grated processed American cheese; 2 cups cooked cut-up turkey; 1/3 cups sliced almonds, toasted.

Cook noodles in boiling salted water, drain. Cook broccoli until just tender and drain. Dice broccoli stems, but leave flowerets whole. Melt butter or margarine in saucepan, stir in flour, salt, mustard, pepper and milk. Cook and stir until thick and smooth. Remove from heat and add cheese, stirring until it melts. In a greased casserole or baking dish, arrange noodles, broccoli stems and turkey; cover with cheese sauce. Arrange broccoli flowerets on top, sprinkle with almonds. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees F. for 15 minutes or until bubbling hot. Serves 4-6.

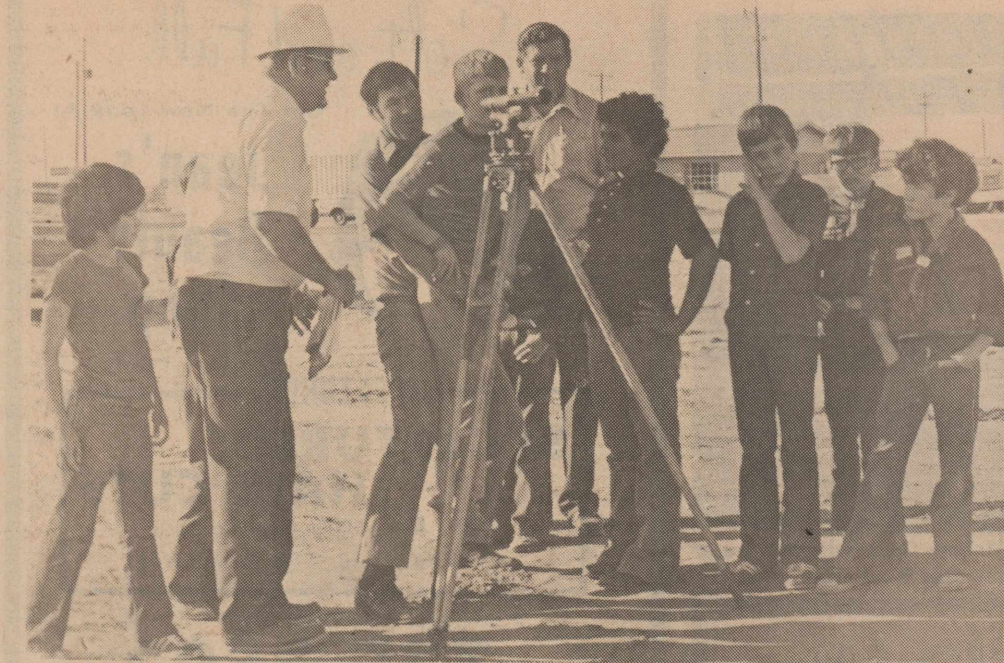

Farm Bureau Expecting Big Convention Group

Some 1,500 persons, including more than 1,000 voting delegates are expected to attend the 42nd annual meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau at the Convention Center in San Antonio Nov. 30-Dec. 3.

Highlighting the convention will be an address by Gov. Dolph Briscoe at the general session on Monday morning, Dec. 1. TFB President Carol Chaloupka of Dalhart will also speak at the session.

Policies to guide the state's largest general farm organization next year and recommendations on national policies will be adopted during the final two days of the meeting. Election of directors and president will be the final order of business.

The Texas Farm Bureau has 180,470 member families in 210

organized county Farm Bureaus. The number of voting delegates from a county is based on the total number of members in that county.

The convention will get under way with registration beginning at 2 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 30 in the Convention Theater Lobby.

The Vesper Service, which traditionally opens the TFB annual meeting, will be held at 6 p.m. that day, featuring the Providence High School Choral Group from San Antonio. Speaker will be Rev. Delmas L. Luedke, pastor of Hope Lutheran Church in San Antonio. He was recently named Texas' 1975 "Rural Minister of the Year".

District finalists will compete in a state Discussion Meet that evening with the winner representing Texas at the annual

meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation in January in St. Louis.

The state finals of the TFB Talent Find will be held immediately following the Discussion Meet. A representative from this competition will be selected to perform at the national meeting in St. Louis.

The Monday morning general session, which features speeches by the Governor and TFB president, will also include a report by Reed Lang of Rio Hondo, TFB secretary-treasurer.

The First Lady of Texas, Mrs. James S. Briscoe, will speak at a ladies luncheon on Monday at the Hilton Palacido del Rio Hotel.

Seven special conferences are scheduled for 1 p.m., Monday. These include Livestock and Animal Health, Community Services, Cotton, Poultry, Wheat and Feed Grains, Rice, and Farm Bureau services.

Conferences slated for 3:30 p.m. that day are Field Crops, Research and Education, Farm Labor, Young Farmers and Ranchers, Natural Resources, and Dairy.

The annual Queen Contest, with 12 district winners competing for the state crown, will be held at 7 p.m.

Tuesday morning activities will begin with district caucuses at 8:15 a.m. and the convening of business session at 10 a.m. It will continue through the remainder of the day.

The Awards and Recognition Program will be held at 7 p.m., Tuesday, and will be followed by the annual dance.

The business session will reconvene at 9 a.m. on Wednesday and will continue until all proposed resolutions have been disposed of. Final order of business will be election of directors from odd-numbered districts and the president. Following adjournment, the TFB Board of Directors will meet to select a vice president and secretary-treasurer.

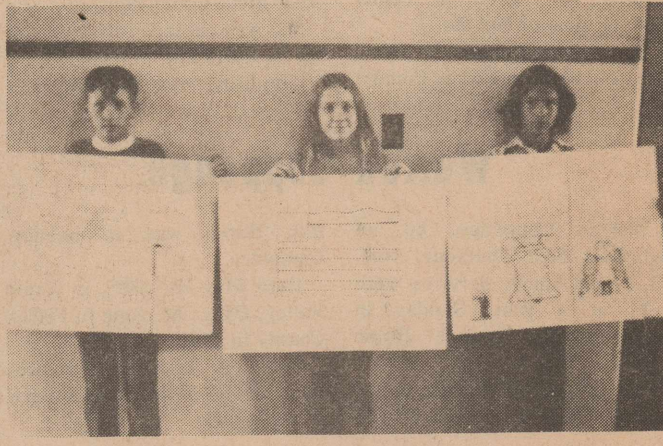

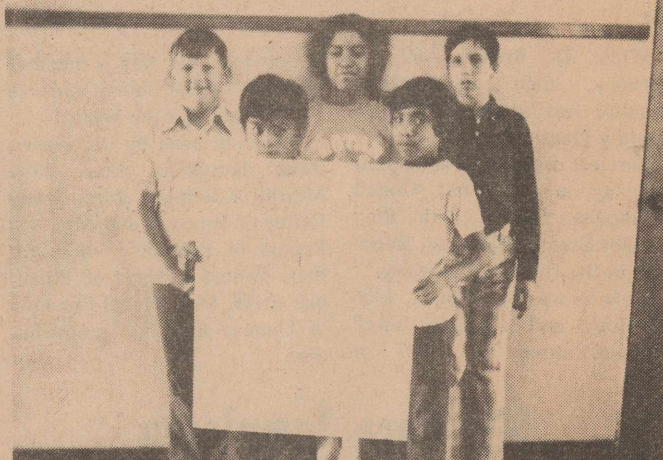

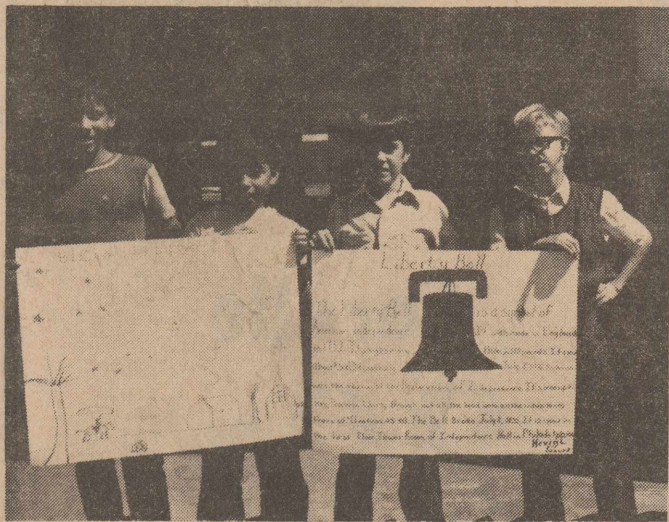

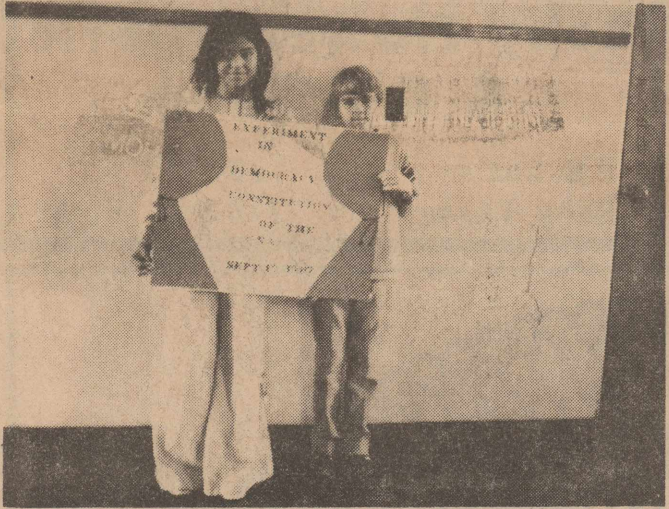

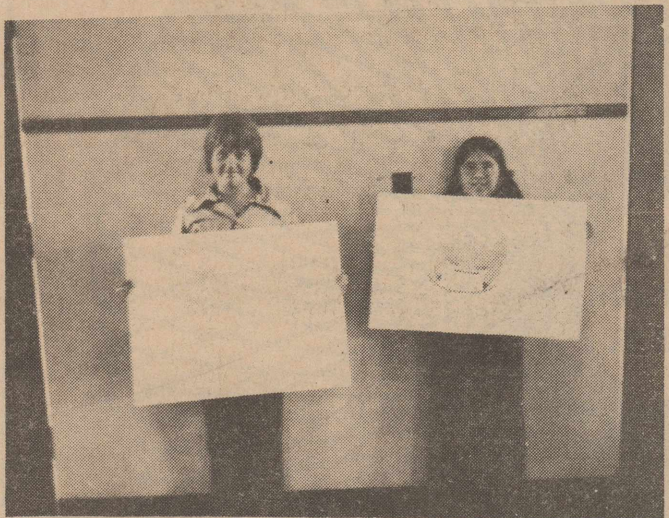

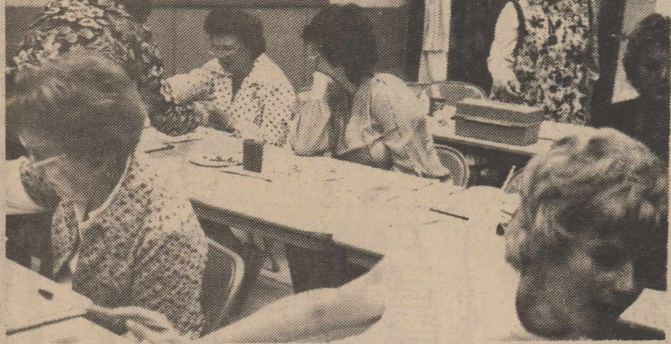

In reading the Gospels the man of faith is impressed over and again with the supreme importance of coming to salvation. "What does it profit a man to gain the whole world and suffer the loss of his soul?" When Jesus visited his good friends Martha and Mary in Bethany the elder sister busied herself with the duties of hostess, while Mary sat at the feet of Jesus and listened to his words. When Martha complained Jesus replied: "Martha, Martha, you are troubled with many things. But only one thing is necessary. Mary has chosen the better part, and it will not be taken from her."

So very often people come to the minister of God to complain that God does not hear their prayers. It would be presumptuous to imagine that we can know why God does not grant the prayers of some particular individual. But I think it can profit all of us to meditate a few moments on some reasons God can have for not answering some prayers. Many such reasons

come to mind, but I think the most important of them could be that to grant this particular prayer would not help this person to act according to Jesus' teaching that "one thing is necessary." Rather, many might conclude that all must be right between himself and God "Because God heard my prayer." Many would consciously or subconsciously reason as follows: "I never go to church, I never pray, I don't worship God, I don't keep holy the Lord's day, but this must not be so important because he answered my prayers anyway." Of Course, the Christian who knows the God of love knows that "He makes the rain to fall on the just and the unjust", but he also knows that most people need to have it impressed more deeply in their hearts that "only one thing is necessary". And one way to impress that all-important truth is to deny them what they pray for till they "set their house in order", turn to God in true repentance and change their lives so that they come to salvation, the only thing that is necessary.

Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District, 400 East 24th Street, Big Spring, Texas 79720, who holds License No. 76-5 of the State of Texas, issued December 18, 1974, and renewed September 1, 1975, intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial methods the natural development of atmospheric cloud forms for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District P.O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79720, and will conduct the program of weather modification designed to increase precipitation by means of the aerial application of silver iodide or other artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over, or within which, equipment may be operated shall include the counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Dawson, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Martin, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Glasscock, Sterling and Coke.

2. The target area within which the precipitation is intended to be enhanced, can be described as follows:

The boundary may be described by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lames, thence north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County, thence east along the north border of Dawson, Borden and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence south-southeast to Maryneal; thence southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence south-southwest to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

3. The materials, equipment and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 square miles include a 3 cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei

considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.

4. The person in charge of this program shall be Owen H. Ivie, Colorado River Municipal Water District, Big Spring, Texas.

5. The program will be operational during the period from March 1st to November 30th during the years 1976, 1977, 1978, and 1979.

6. Any persons who feel they may be affected in some adverse way by this program may file a complaint with the Texas Water Development Board, P.O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.
