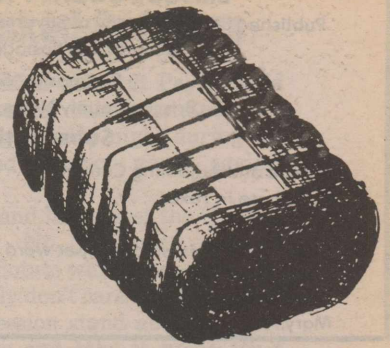

## Caprock SWCD Taking Orders For Windbreak Trees

Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District is once again taking orders for windbreak trees. In addition to the regular selection of trees, several varieties of fruit trees also are being offered.

All varieties of evergreens are \$1.50, hardwoods are 75c and fruit trees range from \$5.00 to \$8.00.

A limited number of wildlife seedling packets for quail, pheasant, deer, turkey and squirrel also are available for farmstead plantings.

Minimum orders are required on windbreak seedlings, but the SCS will work to try to get what you need. Order early, because many of the more popular varieties sell out fast.

Windbreaks properly located and containing the right tree species will provide wind and snow protection for farm homesteads as well as livestock. Living windbreaks also provide nesting places for small insect-eating birds as well as food and cover for numerous High Plains game birds. Windbreaks for shelter or wildlife habitat are permitted under CRP contracts.

Advanced planning is very important for the successful establishment or

renovation of windbreaks. The installation of a drip irrigation system for windbreak establishment is highly recommended.

Technical assistance is available from the Soil Conservation Service in planning and designing your windbreak, drip irrigation system and windbreak management. Drip irrigation systems and information on installation are available through the Caprock Soil and Water Conservation District.

Come by the Soil Conservation office in Silverton for a complete list of tree varieties. For any additional information, call 823-2320.

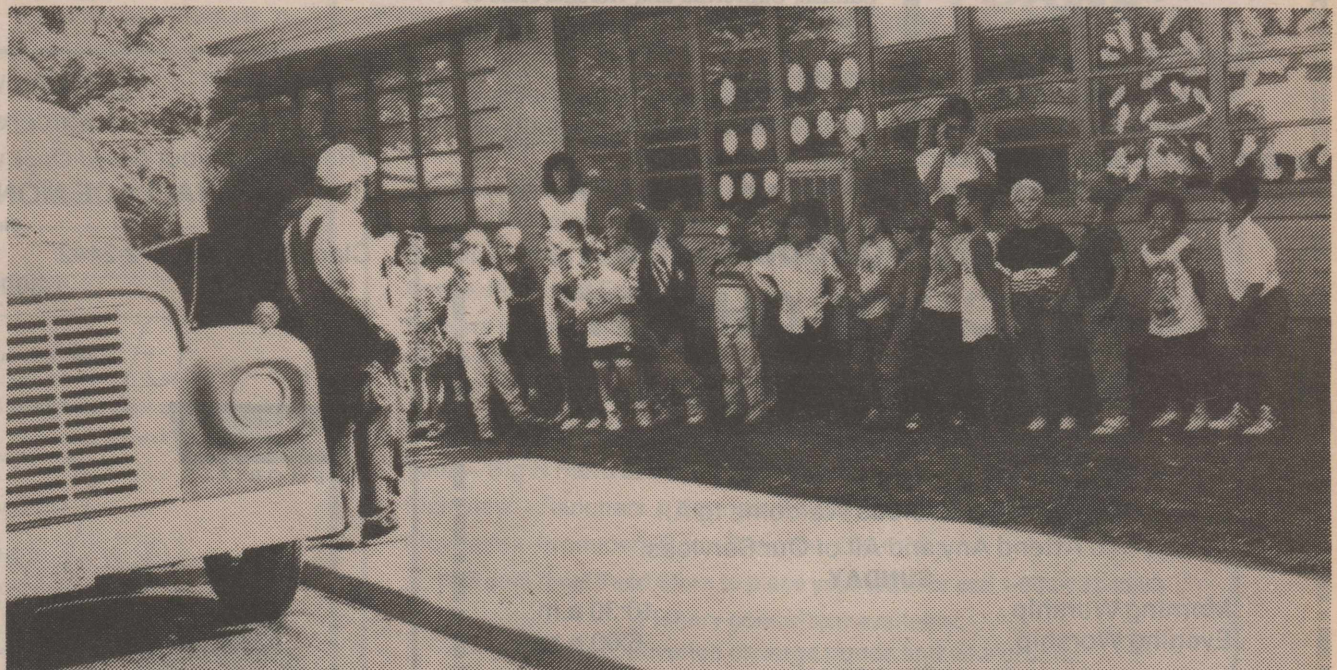

He was preceded in death by a son, Joe David Hale, and a brother, Billy Joe Hale.

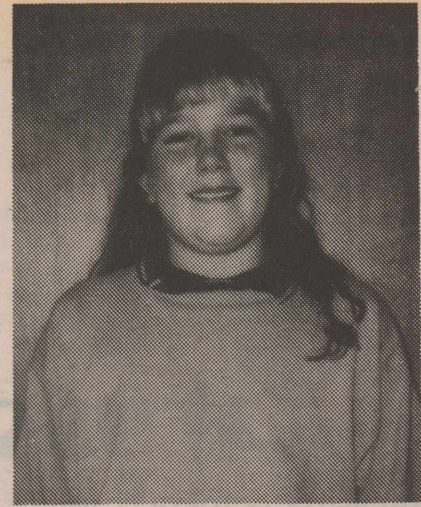
**4-H Banquet Set Sunday**

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will host the South Plains Wildlife

Symposium on Wednesday, November 13, 1991. It will be held at the Texas A&M Agricultural Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock.

The symposium will focus on basic principles of wildlife enhancement for

land managers on the South Plains. Topics that will be addressed include enhancement of pheasant and quail habitat, waterfowl and sandhill crane management, deer management, managing CRP land for wildlife,

windbreaks for wildlife and how to market wildlife resources.

The symposium will start at 8:00 a.m. with registration. It will conclude at 4:00 p.m. and at that time an optional tour of the Texas Forest Service nursery will be held. # Owls Open District With 52-6 Defeat of Three Way Eagles

If you weren't there to see the Owls 45 the Eagles last Friday night, you missed a terrific game! Last season when Three Way came here, the Owls were lucky to escape with a 6-0 victory, but last Friday night it was all Owls! Both defensively and offensively, the Owls did a great job.

The first two touchdowns were scored in less than two minutes. When the Owls kicked off to Three Way to open the game, the Eagles fumbled, and Frank Ramirez, jr., Langdon Reagan and Casey Frizzell were there to make sure the Owls recovered. This time when the Owls kicked off, Three Way downed the ball on their 21. Ramirez threw them for a three-yard loss on their first play, and Reagan and Lance Holt held them to five yards on the next try. After an incomplete pass, the Eagles punted to the Silverton 10. This time the Owls were unable to move the ball, and punted away.

Three Way made a first down on the Silverton 25 with 5:14 showing on the clock, then Martin intercepted an errant aerial and carried it back to the Three Way 30 and the Owls were back in business again. Josh Brooks lateraled to Martin, who ran 11 yards, then carried the touchdown with 4:10 remaining in the first period. West kicked the PAT, and the Owls moved ahead 20-0.

When the Owls kicked off, the Eagles carried it back to their 35. A complete pass gained two yards, there was an incomplete pass, and then they made another yard. An incomplete fourth-down pass gave the ball back to the Owls on the Three Way 37.

Martin ran for seven and Ivory carried for a short gain. A quarterback sack moved the ball back five yards, and a pass from Brooks to Bryan Breedlove moved the ball for a little, but the ball went over on downs.

Reagan stopped a pass completion and Ivory got a sack that lost several yards for the Eagles. As the second quarter dawned, there was an incomplete pass and the Eagles punted to the Silverton 25.

This time West ran for four yards and Martin completed a pass to Frizzell for a first down on the Three Way 25 with 8:55 remaining in the first half. Martin carried the touchdown, then the Owls were penalized back to near midfield. Martin ran for five yards, then the Owls fumbled, Martin picked it up and went to midfield. An incomplete pass caused the ball to go back to the Eagles with 6:33 remaining on the clock.

The Eagles fumbled and recovered for a loss of five, then completed a pass. Needing 19, a quarterback sack moved them back to their own 10 on an outstanding defensive play by Holt, and Martin took their punt back to the Three Way 14 with 4:30 remaining to be played in the first half.

Martin scored on the first play, there

was no PAT, and with 4:24 still on the clock, the Owls led 26-0.

Silverton kicked off and it went into the endzone where the Eagles grabbed it and carried it out to the 12. The Three Way offense stalled, and they punted to Martin, who carried to the 35. The Owls moved through a first down on runs by West, Ivory and Martin, and Martin scored with 1:11 still to be played in the first half. There was no PAT, and the Owls had extended their lead to 32-0.

The Eagles were unable to move the ball before halftime.

When the Eagles kicked off to open the second half of play, the Owls fumbled, the Eagles recovered on their 25, and saw Frizzell intercept their pass on the next play. West carried to the 30, then Martin went to the Three Way 35 for a first down. Next play, Three Way intercepted an Owl pass on the Silverton 15.

On their third play from scrimmage, Three Way fumbled and Ramirez recovered for the Owls. The offense was unable to move the ball, and Three Way went back on offense. They passed for a first down at midfield, then made another first down on a major penalty against the Owls. They scored with 5:13 remaining in the third quarter. There was no PAT, and the score became 32-6.

Three Way attempted an onside kick which went no where, and the Owls took over at the Eagle 33. Martin, Ivory and West made runs for a first down at the 13, and Martin carried the score with 3:06 still on the third-quarter clock. West's PAT kick was blocked, and the Owls extended their lead to 38-6.

The Eagles began picking up first downs and moving downfield as the fourth quarter began. There was a quarterback sack, and Reagan picked up the loose ball and went to the Silverton 15. West ran for a first down, followed by Martin who went for a first down on the Three Way 33. Martin passed to Breedlove for a first down on the two. West scored with 8:42 remaining in the game, then kicked the PAT to give Silverton a 46-6 lead.

Silverton kicked off to Three Way once again, and held the return at the eight. The Owls defended well and

forced a punt to the 38 on fourth down. Taking possession again, Martin went for a first down on the Three Way 15, after which Breedlove carried for six. There was a quarterback sack back to the 15, then the ball went over on downs.

On Three Way's third play, Frizzell intercepted a pass and carried out to near midfield. Martin ran for a first down, then the Owls were penalized, then Martin carried for a first down on the 20. West took to the 15, and Ivory made a first down on the one. Martin scored with 49 seconds remaining on the clock to end the game under the 45-point rule.

The Owls had tremendous stats for the game. They rushed for 306 yards and passed for 72 for a total offense of 378 yards. Three Way rushed for 58 yards, passed for 127 yards to accumulate a total offense of 185 yards. Silverton made 21 first downs in the game as compared with seven for Three Way.

Martin rushed the ball 20 times for a total of 220 yards. West carried 14 times for 70 yards, Ivory rushed seven times for 16 yards and Holt rushed once for a 10-yard gain.

Breedlove caught two passes for 35 yards, Frizzell caught one for 26 yards, and Martin caught one for 11 yards.

Frizzell, Ivory, Ramirez and Reagan recovered Three Way fumbles.

Frizzell intercepted the Eagles twice and Martin intercepted them once.

Whatever it takes, Coach Clyde Parham hopes the Owl winning streak continues this week when the Owls host Whitharral, which suffered its first defeat last week at the hands of Lazbuddie, 59-14. "They're 5-1 just like we are," Coach Parham said of Whitharral. "They are a high-powered team. They have one super talented kid, Michael Cirilo, who plays quarterback and running back."

Of the Three Way game, Coach Parham said, "I figured we would win but I didn't think it would be anything like that. I told them before the game if they wanted to make the playoffs 'you'd better buckle it down,' and they did. Defensively we were outstanding."

The coach praised running back Brian Martin (220 yards, five touchdowns, one interception) and cornerback Casey Frizzell (two interceptions, one fumble recovery) as well as the entire offensive line.

This week's game will be an important one. Pep rally is at 3:00 p.m. and kickoff is at 7:30. Be there!

# Junior High Loses 31-26 to Three Way Eagles

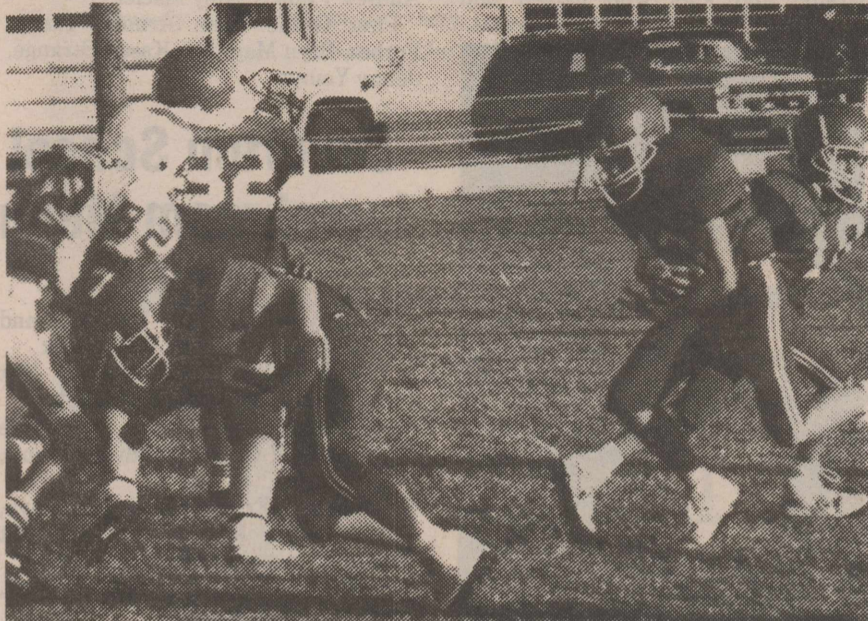

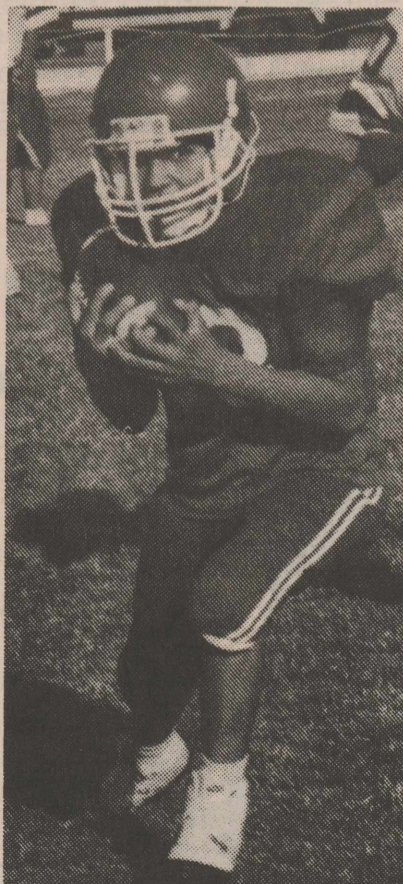
and moved into a 6-7 lead.

Time ran out before further action could result.

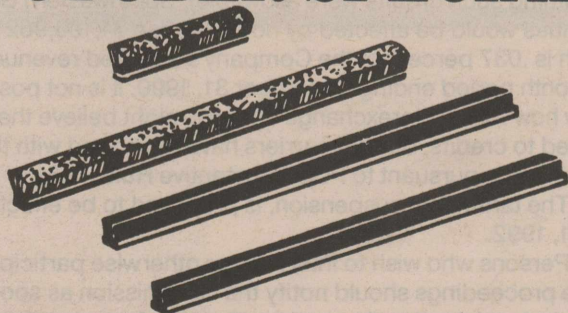

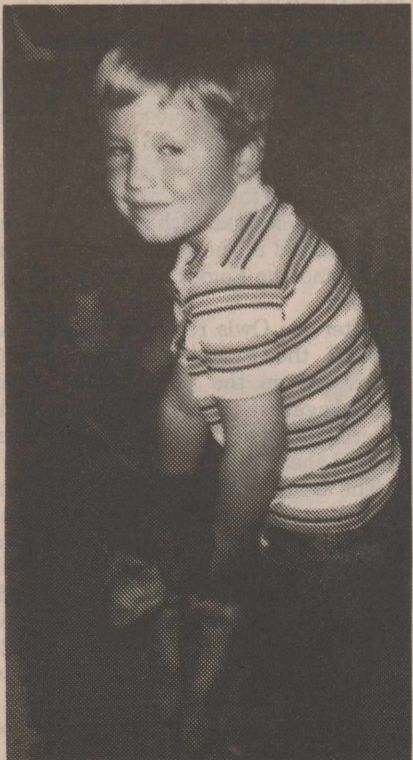

## Public Notice

On July 1, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas that proposes to delete Paragraph 3.4(G) from Section 3 of Southwestern Bell's intrastate Access Service Tariff, which concerns credits where a customer uses Switched Access Service to furnish a service which has been defined to be an exchange service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10463.

Because Southwestern Bell is not aware of any customers who presently use switched access service to furnish an exchange service, Southwestern Bell does not believe its revenues will be affected. However, certain interexchange carrier customers of switched access service have made claims under the aforementioned tariff. Such customers, but only to the extent they provide an exchange service using switched access, would be affected by this application. Based on claims made for credits (assuming such credits were allowable), Southwestern Bell's revenues would be affected by no more than \$1,168,962 annually, which is .037 percent of the Company's adjusted revenue for the 12-month period ending December 31, 1990. It is not possible to know how many interexchange carriers might believe themselves entitled to credits, but 189 carriers have registered with the Commission pursuant to PUC Substantive Rule 23.61.

The tariff, after suspension, is proposed to be effective May 1, 1992.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible, but no later than November 15, 1991. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Blvd., Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. 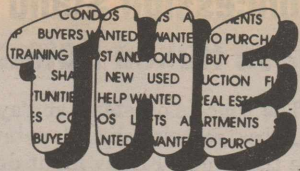
