

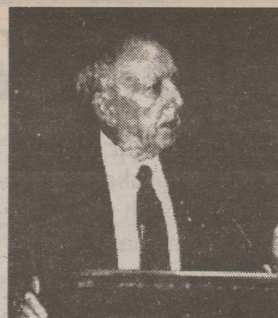

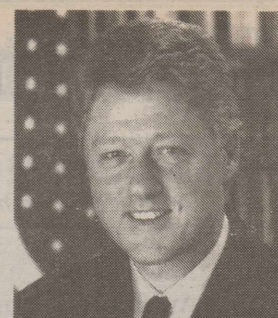

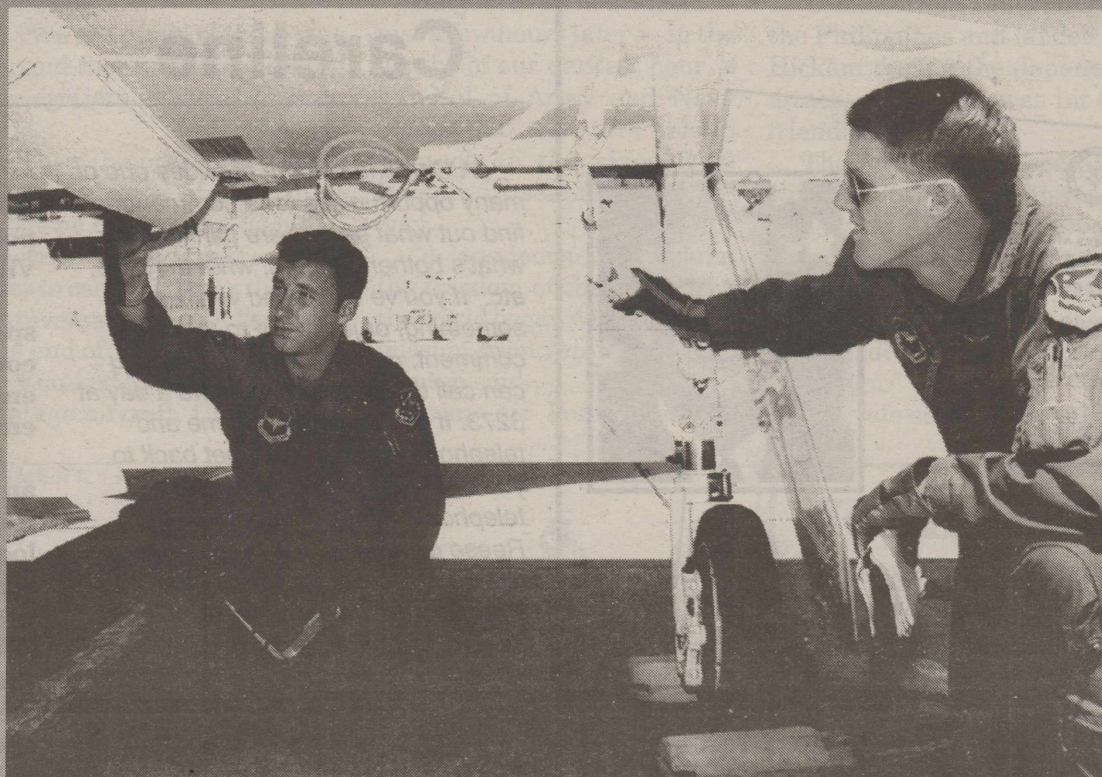
Class 95-14 to graduate here today

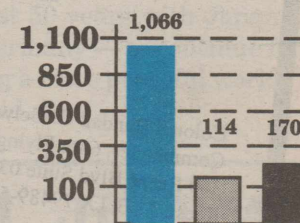

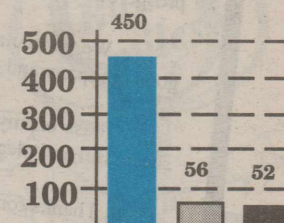

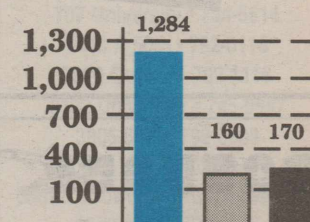

This opportunity is open to all personnel to report fraud, waste and/or abuse of government resources.

All disclosures will be held in confidence, except to the extent necessary for corrective action.

It is also a chance for us to get even better.

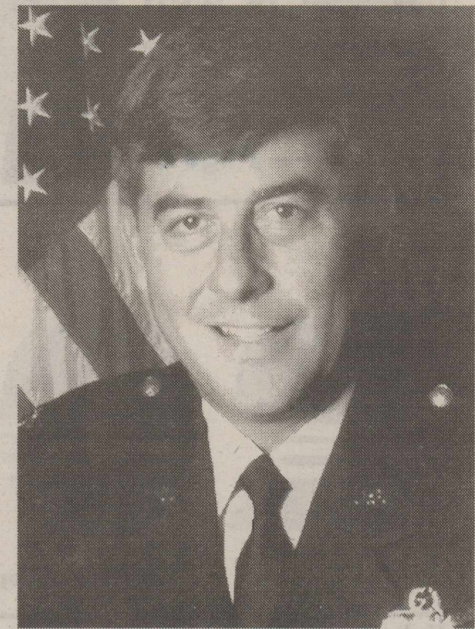
When your respective inspectors




Dear Randy

President warns Bosnian Serbs to end fighting

Air Force participation in NATO response to shelling praised

HICKAM AIR FORCE BASE, Hawaii (AFNS) — President Clinton warned Bosnian Serbs to end their civil war the same day he kicked off events to honor the end of World War II.

Greeted by a cheering, flag-waving crowd of about 700 people on the base flightline Aug. 31, Clinton said NATO bombing strikes against Bosnian targets were "the right response to the savagery in Sarajevo."

"The massacre of civilians in Sarajevo on Monday (Aug. 28), caused by a Bosnian Serb shell, was an outrageous act in a terrible war — and a challenge to the commitments which NATO has made to oppose such actions by force, if necessary," Clinton said.

The president defended the bombing campaign, in which Air Force planes from Aviano Air Base, Italy, took part.

"The campaign will make it clear to the Bosnian Serbs that they have nothing to gain and everything to lose by continuing to attack Sarajevo and

other safe areas and by continuing to slaughter innocent civilians. NATO is delivering that message loud and clear.

"And I hope you are proud of the role that the members of the United States armed forces are playing in delivering that message," Clinton said.

But the president said the war in Bosnia must end on the negotiation table, not the battlefield. "Just two weeks ago, we lost three of our finest American diplomatic representatives in a tragic accident in Bosnia as they were working for a negotiated peace. Today our negotiating team is working well.

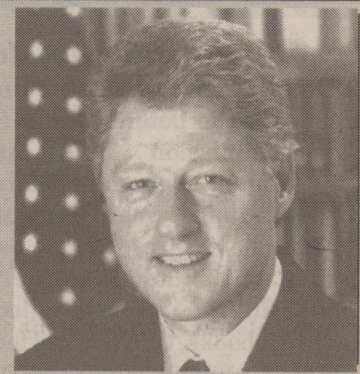
"We are proud of those who fly and those who are seeking to negotiate a peace," Clinton said.

Then the president turned to the purpose of his trip to what he called "this island of peace" — three days of ceremonies to commemorate the 50th anniversary of V-J Day and the end of World War II.

Flanked by a World War II vintage aircraft, Clinton said

Hickam was a fitting place to begin the commemoration since all 231 aircraft at the field were damaged or destroyed in the surprise Japanese attack of Dec. 7, 1941.

But just a few hours later — just a few hours later — in the depths of our darkest hour, a handful of Army and Navy planes that were still able to fly took to the skies from Hickam in search of the enemy.

"A long journey to reclaim the freedom of the Pacific for the world began with that first mission from this very field," Clinton said.

Army Air Forces veteran

Albert E. Brawley and his wife, Helen, of Sun City, Fla., attended the arrival ceremony in matching Hawaiian flower-print shirts. On Dec. 7, Brawley was helping ferry a B-17 bomber from California to the Philippines and landed at Hickam during the Japanese attack. His plane was hit by friendly fire.

The former radio operator with the 38th Reconnaissance Squadron of the 19th Bomb Group said the V-J Day events were important. "People should never forget the sacrifices made during the Pacific campaign."

His wife says. "I certainly

hope this (commemoration) signals a new beginning and that people will learn from the past and change things for the better in the future."

The president's visit is great for Hawaii and the rest of the world, Katayama said. "It's nice to see this kind of revival of patriotism and remembrance."

But Katayama also believes with these V-J Day ceremonies it's also time to close out the war. "We must keep moving forward — as we have the last 50 years with Japan and Germany — to continue forming a more peaceful world," he said.

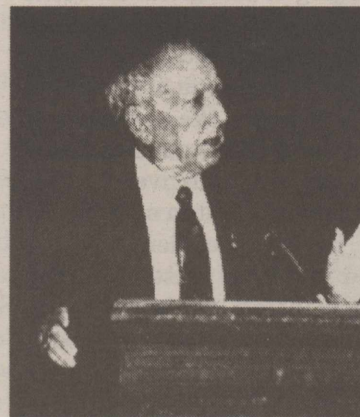

Pilot of DC-10 crash at Sioux City discusses five factors for survival

"Listen, take it serious and learn it," said the captain of the United Airlines flight which crashed in Sioux City, Iowa, July 19, 1989.

Now retired, Al Haynes was at the helm of fateful Flight 232. He spoke at length about five factors which can be credited for the 184 survivors during a special safety presentation at the Reese Club Aug. 30.

These factors were luck, communications, preparation, execution and cooperation and allowed what at first appeared to be a non-survivable accident to become one in which most of those aboard survived.

Luck involved the facts that the airplane remained flyable, weather, location and time of day. Quick and total response by air traffic control, cockpit and cabin crew training, proper intracommunications training

among ground units, and proper use of available facilities contributed to the communications factor.

"In order to have a successful operation, you have to have a good set of communications," said Haynes. "Everyone must work off the same page," he said regarding United's standard operating procedures. "That's how you stay in tune with your airplane."

A live drill leading to improvements and better planning for a disaster coupled with

thorough training of the cabin and cockpit crews prepared everyone for the seemingly impossible disaster. Everyone responded as their training dictated and exerted a total team effort said Haynes.

Cooperation from every agency involved as well as the general population completed the team effort he said.

He stressed safety issues throughout the briefing. "Flight attendants are mandated by law to be aboard for passengers' safety. I never see anyone listen to their briefs. People need to pay attention. Not all airplanes are the same."

Haynes, a former Marine Corps aviator, flew with United Airlines from 1956 through 1991.

Closing his briefing, Haynes said, "Get out and involve people in disaster training so they can be part of the solution, not part of the problem. Be prepared to respond to a well-planned disaster plan."

DOD prepares for 'serious possibility' of budget impasse

WASHINGTON (AFNS) — The Department of Defense is developing "very explicit" contingency plans to continue operating due to the "serious possibility" that fiscal year 1996 — which starts Oct. 1 — will begin with no approved budget authority from Congress, according to DOD Comptroller John Hamre.

Hamre said though it's an "unlikely" and "remote prospect" that an extended impasse would occur, active-duty service members would be expected to perform their duties even though paychecks

could be delayed if budget authority is not granted by mid-October.

The last guaranteed paycheck for military and civilians is the end of September. He added that he will be contacting banks to ensure they understand the nature of possible delays that could affect allotments for such things as mortgages and car payments.

Active-duty service members are protected by law and therefore guaranteed all back pay due to them when the authority is granted, he said.

For many civilians — not

determined as essential — an extended period without the authority from Congress could result in unpaid furloughs from work. The specifics are still being worked out, Hamre said.

The overall plan will not be complete until mid-September, but Hamre outlined three broad areas that would be exempt from shutdown if the budget authority is not forthcoming.

The first is activities that ensure safety of life and property, Hamre said. These activities include medical services, air traffic control, utilities on

military installations and security police and fire protection.

The second "more complex" areas exempt from shutdown are commissaries, nonappropriated fund activities and "many" morale and welfare functions funds, and retirement checks. It also protects research and development projects operating on previous year funding.

The third "and by far the most important" area is directly related to the president's constitutional prerogatives as commander in chief regarding

ongoing military activities and to contingency plans for potential military activities, Hamre said.

Defense Secretary William Perry "gave us very specific instructions," specifying that DOD will be able to carry out all ongoing and any contingency operations that might come up during this period, Hamre said.

The federal government has entered two fiscal years in the last 20 without budget authority. The most recent time was 1990 and the impasse lasted three days, he said.

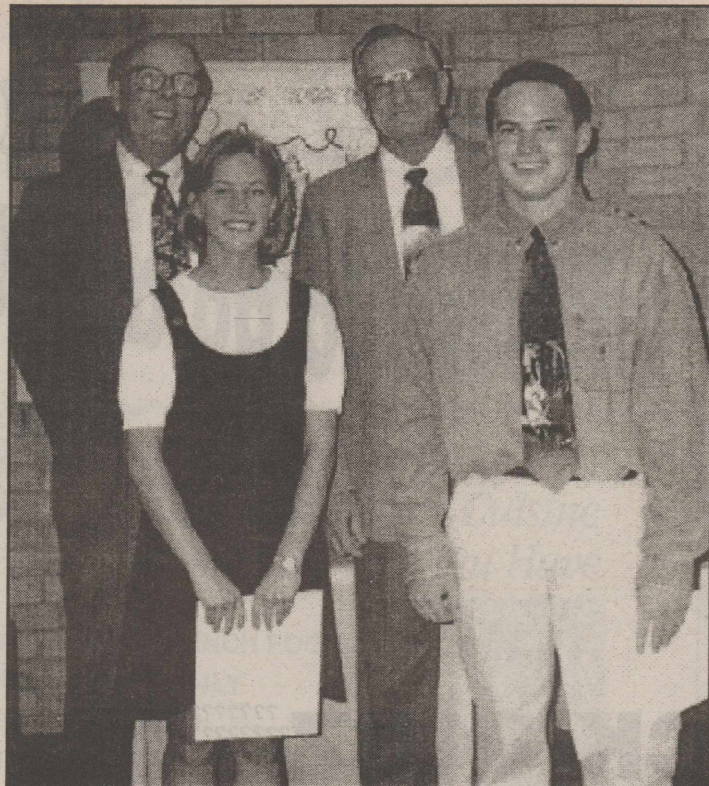
Reese Federal Credit Union recently awarded \$500 academic Scholarships to two worthy students for pursuit of higher education.

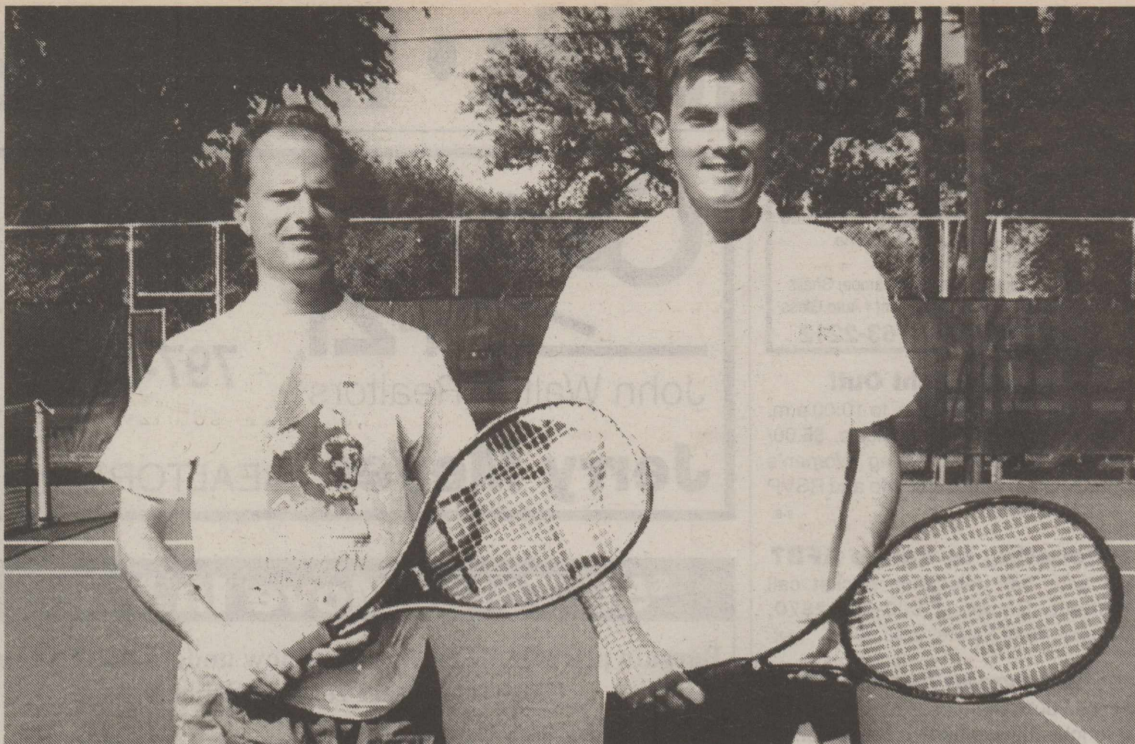
