OVER TWENTY KILLED IN BATTLE

Mexican Insurgents Make Stand Against Regulars.

FIGHT COUPLE OF HOURS

Eighteen Revolutionists Clash at Point on t e Rio Grande River Opposite Comstock, Tex., With a Force of Seventy.

Over twenty men were killed in a desperate battle between Mexican government soldiers and a small part revolutionists on the bank of the Rio Grande river opposite Comstock, Tex The insurgents had but eighteen men. but over two hours they held at bay seventy rurales and the same number of regular infantry. When darkness ended the battle the insurgents left the field, withdrawing to their mountain headquarters, carrying along bodies of their two comrades killed and the seven of their men wounded.

E. S. O'Reilly, an Associated Press correspondent with the insurgents, re-ceived a slight wound in a thigh. The rurales twice charged insurgents' po-sition, once coming within fifty yards but each time they were repulsed. The Associated Press correspondent count

Associated Press correspondent counted 18 soldiers carried from battlefield during the fight.

The arrival of twenty more insurgents in the last few minutes of the engagement doubtless saved their comrades from annihilation.

It was stated the insurgents had a strongly fortified camp in the mountains, more than 150 men being under

Another report stated the insurgen held the regulars and rurales at bay three hours.

The report, emanating from Mexican government sources, that a detachment of insurrectos had crossed the river to the American side was declared untrue Only one man crossed the press correspondent—and he did not do so until two hours afterward, and under cover of darkness. During the battle it would have been imposs ble to have done so, as the ford is the only place it can be done, and at the time it was literally churned with the rain of bullets.

RECORD OF TEXAS IS WISHED BY

Some Parties In the East Who Are Dealing In Bonds

ASK OFFICER OF DALLA

Result of Ruling as to Securitie That May Be Invested In Withou There Being Liable to Be Affect ed by Certain Act.

An eastern bond firm wrote Commis sioner Gillespie of Dallas on matte of interest. The inquiry was based on a recent ruling, in effect that say ings banks could not invest in th bonds of cities in any state that ha repudiated any indebtedness since th

In his reply Mr. Gillespie stated was a difficult matter to obtain suc information as to Texas. He quote a ruling made by Assistant Attorned a ruling made by Assistant Attorned Ge eral Ward in 1890 as to the validity of state warrants issued in 189 and 1894, in which aid warrants we held null and void by reason of a co held null and void by reason of a constitutional amendment of 1866 in whice the legislature was forbidden to make provision for the payment of an debts contracted by the state betwee January, 1861, and Augnst, 1865. In commenting on the ruling Mr. Git lespie says Texas is placed in an unfortunate attitude by reason of these conditions.

He states he is unable to find when the state has defaulted in the payme of any bonds, and that in his judgment the failure to meet the paymon of any state warrants was confined to the issues mentioned.

"If, in your judgment," the letter concludes, "an official statement of the facts, coupled with a list of the warrants (if it can be procured) will suffice in any way toward clarifying the situation I shall be glad to pursue the matter further and do anything. sue the matter further and do anythin possible in the premises, for it would be a pleasure to remove any embarg against the securities of our cities an of our state.
