City To Get Fog This Afternoon

The entire city will be given a fog spraying this evening, if the weather permits, and all residents are asked to open windows and doors and let the fog come into the houses. The fog having an oil base, such things that might be damaged by the slight film of oil left by the fog should be put away. The fog can do very little damage. Bees cannot be killed by the poison solution. Cars should not be left on the streets for the solution will leave a film on the windshield which can be easily cleaned off. The fogging machine will be on display down town early in the afternoon, where it may be inspected. The city should purchase the machine and spray the town at regular intervals. If a way to finance the machine can be worked out satisfactorily, the machine might be bought. It will cost about \$1,600 to own it. Anyone wishing to make a special contribution to this cause may do so at the city hall. There is a very real need for the city to own its fogging machine in order to protect the lives of all the citizens and prevent the spread of polio here.

A general clean-up of the town should follow the spraying operation. The Mayor is asking all citizens to clean-up their property and remove everything of an unsanitary nature. We must do all things possible to prevent the dreaded polio, and action must be taken at once. The state health officer is asking the entire state to clean-up and spray.

In connection with the sanitation of the town, the city council will comply with a request of the city park board to purchase a small tractor with mower and sweeper attachment. This equipment will enable the city to maintain cleanliness at Hickman Park, at the cemetery and on streets and alleys of the town. The cost of keeping the cemetery is running high and the mower might help to speed up the maintenance work there.

On May 24, Baird experienced a very serious fire, the burning of the O & A Garage. It was a fire that could have destroyed a large portion of the business district. For a while, it did look as though more than one building would burn, but fortunately we had plenty of water at the time and the pumping equipment was in tip-top shape, and with the splendid cooperation of everyone, we were able to confine the loss to the building in which the fire originated.

We wish to express our sincere appreciation to everyone who assisted in any way and especially to those who helped handle the hose, worked on the nozzles, etc., for the way they worked under direction of members of the department. This was the best cooperation we have ever had by outsiders, and was greatly responsible for keeping the fire confined to one building. Every one seemed willing to work and worked exactly as they were instructed, which made it possible to keep five lines of hose operating efficiently. Usually in cases like this there are some who try to take over and fight the fire in their own way and generally do more harm than good.

We don't pretend to know everything about fighting fires, but we know from experience that the methods taught by the leading fire fighting instructors have proven most successful, and we try to follow the methods so far as our equipment and personnel permits.

We wish to express our thanks to Sam Gilliland and L. L. Blackburn for their volunteer donations of \$10.00 each. We are happy that we were able to render service that is appreciated.

We also want to publicly thank our mayor and present city council for spending several hundred dollars recently in order to put our big pumper in first class shape. At the time the general overhauling of this truck was being done, it perhaps looked like quite a lot of money to be spending on one piece of equipment, but had that money not been spent, we would have never been able to play five lines of fully charged hose on a fire that took plenty of water to control, and the result would surely have been much more disastrous. After witnessing the fire and the way it was controlled, no one could say that this expenditure was not a wise investment.

We are always anxious to serve our community to the best of our ability and there are many ways you can help — "helping to keep fires from getting started is the most important!" So remember, summer time is here, water will be scarce so be careful about your trash burning and let's hold down our fire losses.

BAIRD MAN GETS DEGREE AFTER 20 YEARS

Lubbock, May 30 — Vernon M. Johnson of Baird gets that sheepskin at Texas Tech today — 20 years, a depression and a war notwithstanding.

He's taking his degree in the same field in which he started — electrical engineering.

Johnson, fresh out of Baird High School, came to Texas Tech in 1929 as one of four Baird freshman boys.

He studied two years in the engineering division at Tech before the depression forced his withdrawal in 1931. But he vowed then he would return.

Johnson stepped from college into a grocery store in his home town. He stayed in the grocery business until 1940 when he went into the Army Air Force to obtain a background in aircraft.

War changed his own training and he became an "Army school teacher." He taught several technical courses for a few years at various Army posts before being sent overseas as a flight engineer on a B-29.

His overseas experience was concentrated in the China-Burma-India theatre where he estimates he gained 500 combat hours. He was in the Army five and a half years.

After his release he went to Amarillo where he was associated with the power division of the Bureau of Reclamation as an electrical engineer.

From there he returned to Tech in 1947 "to finish a job once started and one thing I've wanted to do for 20 years."

Meanwhile, during the war, Johnson met and married Florence Greenfield of Shamrock, who also was a 1929 freshman at Tech and knew him then. She too dropped out of Tech in 1931.

Back in college, Johnson found his curriculum in electrical engineering vastly changed. He managed to salvage enough college hours to finish his degree with only two more years work.

Coupled with his academic duties has been the responsibility for a men's dormitory on the campus. He and Mrs. Johnson have lived in the hall and served as the supervisory couple. They have had charge of some 320 men students.

Johnson's parents live in Baird where his father has been employed by the Texas & Pacific railroad for 51 years.

Pipeline Bonds Voted 159 - 0

Citizens of Baird approved the issuance of \$110,000 revenue bonds for construction of a water pipeline and filter plant from the new lake to be built on Mexia Creek last Saturday without a dissenting vote. There were 159 affirmative votes cast.

The election was presented in two phases: one to approve the water supply contract between the City of Baird and the recently created Callahan County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1. The other was pertaining to the revenue bonds, which will also retire \$23,000 in bonds outstanding against the water and sewer systems.

The contract approved by the election must yet be approved by the attorney general before it can become effective. The city council and the water board recently drew up the contract in which the city agreed to pay four cents per 1,000 gallons of water with a minimum of \$300 per month. This rate is on raw water at the lake and pumping, treating, and distributing the water come after that. The contract assures the residents of Baird an abundance of good water at a very low rate as soon as the lake is built and water is available. Contractors Freese and Nichols of Fort Worth are setting up the work project and it is believed that actual construction will begin within a short time.

\$700,000 GRANT FOR TWO NEW UNDERPASSES

Ablene — The Public Roads Administration, Washington, D. C., has notified the State Highway Department that a \$700,000 grant has been approved for the construction of two additional underpasses under the T & P Railway in Abilene. According to District Highway Engineer S. J. Treadway, bids on this long planned project will be received by the Highway Department on June 24.

The two underpasses are phase 3 of Abilene's master traffic plan designed to increase the safety and speed with which traffic from the seven highways converging on Abilene is routed. Phase 1 - construction of the U. S. 83 four lane arterial

through South Abilene to the T. & P. Railway is nearing completion. Bids on the second phase of the project - the northern part of U. S. 83 - are being tabulated and it is expected that the contract will be let within 30 days. The two underpasses will link the north and south parts of U. S. 83.

The fourth and last phase of the plan will be construction of a traffic circle immediately northeast of the underpasses at the intersection of new U. S. 80 and 83. Treadway stated that since the county has already obtained the right-of-way, this project will be pushed by the Highway Department as rapidly as possible.

County Agent's Column

Grain Bins and Fumigating

Since the price of grain has dropped so low, many farmers are going to store it on the farm. To qualify for a government loan certain precautions must be taken in storing this grain.

The insect pest of stored grain breed with little interruption the year round. The important pest that we have to watch out for are weevils and moths.

Bins used for storing grain should be thoroughly cleaned of grain and dust to reduce re-infestation before storing the new crop. Sprays are useful in eliminating infestations in pockets and cracks of the bins. Pyrethrum sprays and DDT and mixtures of these products sold under various trade names are good for this purpose. Small quantities of old grain from the previous season should be fumigated, fed out or otherwise disposed of before harvest.

The sides and floors of the bins and cribs should be made as nearly air tight and rat proof as possible. The sides should be at least six inches higher than the grain after leveling off.

Fumigation is the best and most economical method of protecting grain in storage. Temperatures of 65 to 75 degrees F. are best for fumigation.

Where bins are not tightly sealed above, tarpaulin or other gas tight sheets can be used to cover the surface of the grain.

An ethylene dichloride-carbon tetrachloride mixture is cheap, non-inflammable and effective, and does not harm germination regardless of the dosage, exposure or moisture content of the grain. It is made up of 3 parts by volume of ethylene dichloride and 1 part by volume of carbon tetrachloride. Some commercial concerns sell this already mixed and ready to use.

It is applied with a watering can or sprayer on the surface of the grain at the rate of 6 gallons per 100 bushels or 5 gallons per 100 cubic feet. If the temperature is a little higher some of the liquid should be poured directly into the grain.

The ethylene dichloride-carbon tetrachloride mixture does not taint the grain, which remains palatable and safe for both livestock and human consumption.

Inspect the grain storage at least once a month and fumigate it if found infested. Accumulation of waste grain and feed around the farm building should be removed.

If this is applied in a tight building, be careful and do not inhale too much. If you get dizzy while applying this, you should get into the fresh air immediately.

Rat Control

Along with grain storage comes the rat control program. These rodents can rob you of many pounds of grain, damage the grain, and cause disease. Remember that when grain is put in farm storage and has a government loan on it, it must be kept in good condition. If the grain is delivered to the government, it must be in just as good condition as it was when it was put in storage. Rats can cause a lot of damage to grain. A continued rat killing program should be carried on at all times.
