ASCS Announces Disaster Payment Program Here

Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service will administer a crop disaster assistance program to compensate eligible producers for crop losses caused by drought, flood and other natural disasters in either 1990 or 1991.

"To be eligible, producers with crop insurance must have had losses greater

than 35 percent," said ASCS official Jerry Harris, Chairman of the Texas State ASC Committee. "Producers without crop insurance must have had losses greater than 40 percent."

Program applications may be filed from February 3 through March 13.

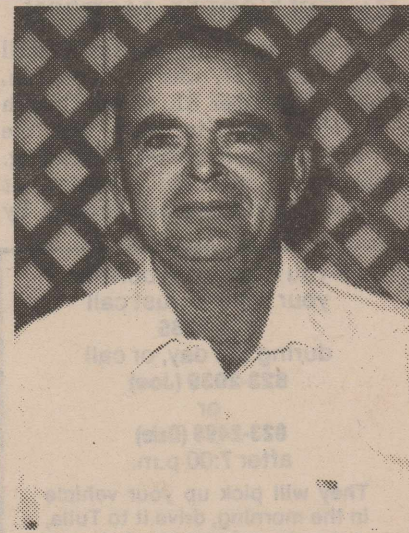
The 1990-91 crop disaster program provides cash payments for production

losses on participating program crops of wheat, feed grains, upland cotton, extra long staple cotton, and rice; non-participating program crops; peanuts, soybeans, sunflowers, sugar beets, sugar cane and tobacco; and all commercial non-program crops.

Producers who intend to file should begin to assemble their records now, so they will be ready when the program opens. Farmers will receive a special mailing with specific information on the program this month. If a producer does not receive the disaster program information in the mail by February 3, he or she should call the county ASCS office.

A producer may not file on one crop on a farm for one year and a different crop on the same farm for the other; however, the producer may request benefits for 1990 on one farm and for 1991 on another farm.

The ASCS official said disaster payments would be computed according to the 1990 Farm Bill, and expects to begin issuing payments to farmers by April 16. Further details of the disaster payment program may be obtained from the local ASCS office.

Mobile Mammography Unit Coming to Silvertown January 23

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit from Odessa will be at City Hall in Silvertown on Thursday, January 23. Appointments for mammography may be made by contacting Janice Hill or calling 823-2318.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality and breast dose. The unit is accredited by American College of Radiology, and this accreditation must be renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammograms and that dedicated mammographic equipment be used. The American College of

Radiology received an American Cancer Society Control Grant which was used to pilot test the Accreditation Program.

Breast cancer will strike one in 10 American women. The American Cancer Society predicts that about 41,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. As there is no way to prevent the disease, early detection and treatment offer the greatest hope for survival.

The American Cancer Society recommends that women do monthly breast self-exams and have regular physical breast exams by a doctor. It further recommends mammography on the following schedule:

★A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35 and 39.

★A mammogram every one or two years between age 40 and 49.

★An annual mammogram from age 50.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, ● even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.
