

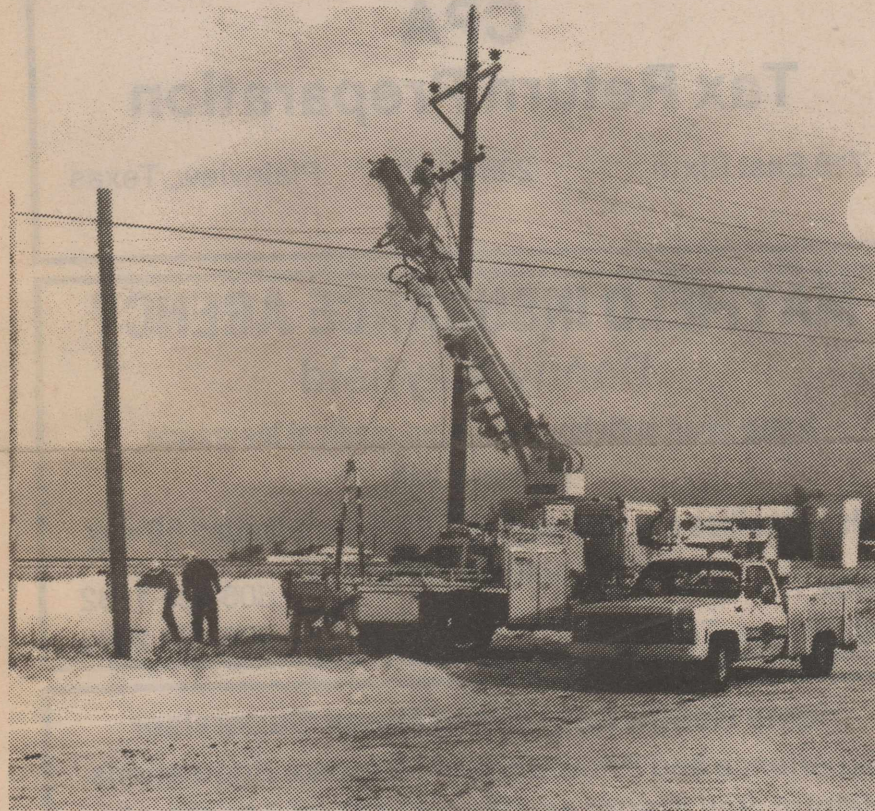

Annual Livestock Show Planned Here January 25

The annual Briscoe County Livestock Show has been scheduled Saturday, January 25, at the County Showbarn in Silverton, under the sponsorship of the Briscoe County Livestock Show Board.

All livestock must be weighed in and in place between 12:00 noon and 6:00 p.m. Friday, January 24.

A meeting of the board of directors will be held at 8:00 p.m. that Friday night at the showbarn.

Judging begins at 8:30 a.m. Saturday with the sheep show. This is to be followed by the steers at 10:00 a.m.; beef heifers at 10:30 a.m.; dairy heifers at 11:00 a.m.

The swine prospect show begins at 12:00 noon and the swine market show is at 2:00 p.m.

Pee wee showmanship will be featured at 4:00 p.m.

A brisket dinner is to be served at 5:00 p.m., followed by the premium sale at 6:00 p.m.

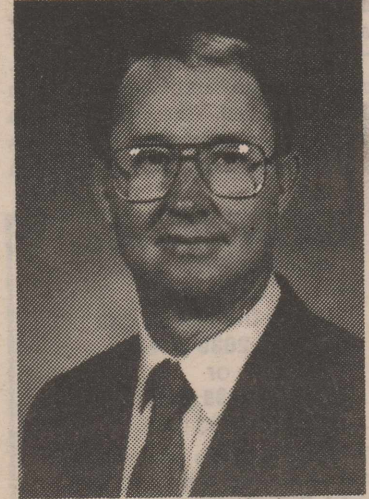
Presentation of the sixth annual Don Burson Memorial Herdsman Award, sponsored by the Burson family, will be made at noon on show day. This award is presented to the outstanding 4-H'er or FFA member who excells above all in the areas of feeding, fitting, showmanship and personal effort throughout the entire feeding program.

The sheep show will be broken into the following classes: fine wool, fine wool cross, medium wool, southdown and championship.

Divisions of the swine show will be: Berkshires, Chester Whites, Durocs, Hampshires, Yorkshires, Spot/Polands, crossbreds and championship.

Superintendent Leaving Silverton To Accept Midland Position

Silverton School Superintendent David Cavitt has announced that he will be presenting his resignation to the board of trustees at their regular meeting tonight, and that he expects the board will act on his resignation and will consider the employment of an interim superintendent.

Mr. Cavitt said that applications are being accepted for a new superintendent who will be expected to begin work on or before July 1.

Mr. Cavitt's last day in the Silverton Schools will be January 31.

He is going to Midland as the Field Service Specialist for the Region 18 Education Service Center. He will serve as a liaison for the Texas Education Agency, Education Service Center and school administrators in Region 18, which encompasses 19 counties in the Midland-Odessa area.

"It will be an interesting job," Mr. Cavitt told the Briscoe County News. "It will be a promotion in that I will be consulting with superintendents. It will be an opportunity for us to be near family and a potential place for our retirement."

"We appreciate the support we have received in Silverton, and will miss a lot of people here," he continued.

"I wish Silverton the best and pray that God will bless the Silverton School," he added.

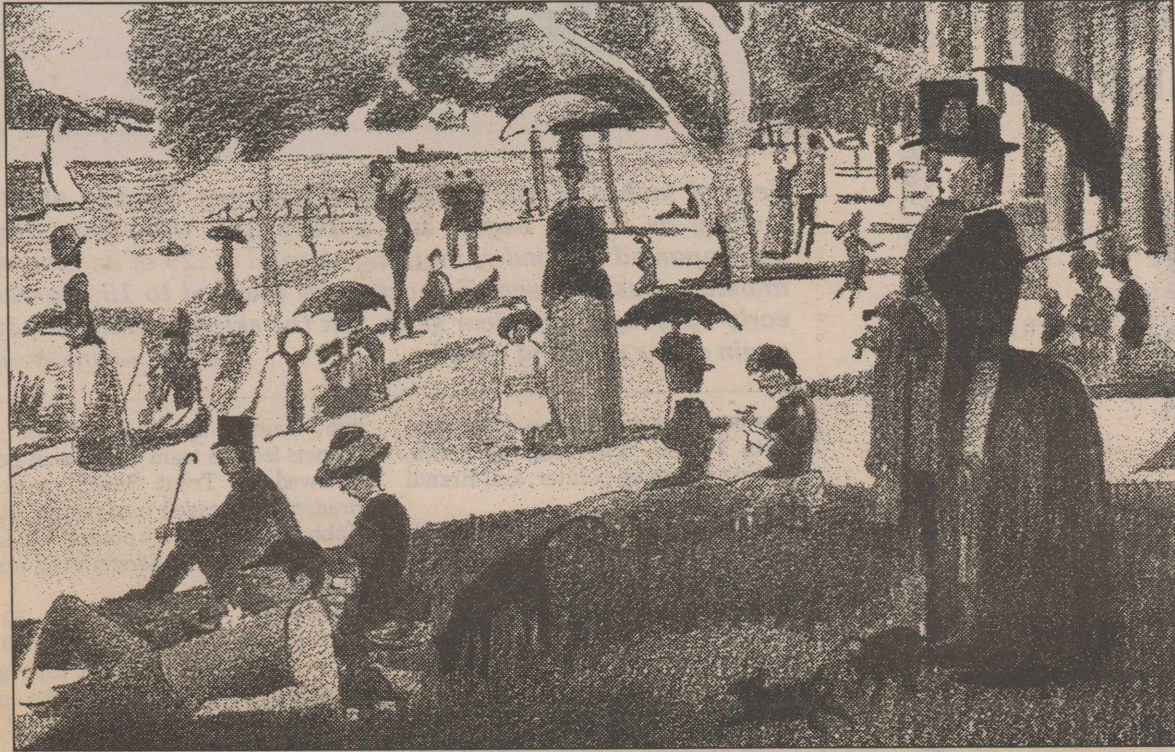

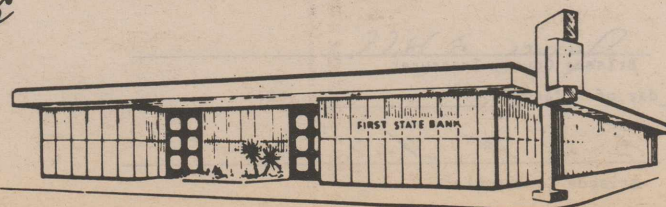

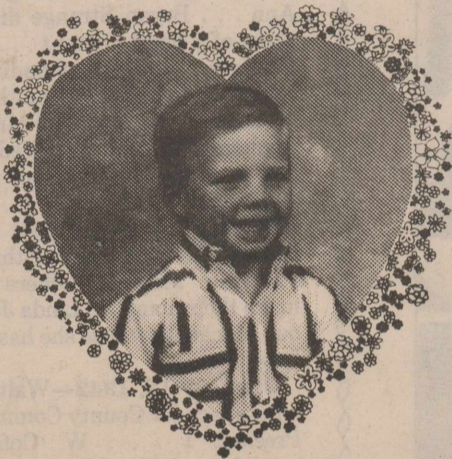

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of five women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, ● even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.
- V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$65.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

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December Was Wet, Warm on South Plains

The weather across the Texas South Plains during December 1991 was set

with above-normal temperatures. Temperatures averaged 1.2 degrees above normal and ranged from 2.8 degrees above normal at Snyder to 0.4 degree below normal at Lamesa. Silverton's temperatures averaged 40 degrees, which was 1.6 degrees below

the South Plains average. Maximum temperatures averaged 2.0 degrees below normal and ranged from 0.2 degree above normal at Snyder to 4.2 degrees below normal at Seminole. The highest temperature of the month was 77 at Jayton and Paducah on the

8th. Silverton's maximum temperatures averaged 51.7 for the month, .80 of a degree below the South Plains average. Silverton's highest daytime temperature during the month was 72 degrees on the 8th.

Minimum temperatures averaged 4.4 degrees above normal and ranged from 6.1 degrees above the long-term average at Lubbock to 2.8 degrees above normal at Lamesa. The lowest temperatures of the month occurred during the first few days of the month with Dimmitt reporting the lowest of 14 on the morning of the 2nd. Minimum temperatures in Silverton averaged 28.3, 2.30 below the South Plains average. The lowest temperature recorded during December was 20 degrees on the 2nd, 4th and 5th.

Precipitation was frequent and heavy averaging 2.58 inches above normal while ranging from 4.16 inches above normal at Post to 1.58 inches above normal at Abernathy. Much of the precipitation occurred as rain during the middle of the month with many stations reporting over an inch on the 22nd. The only worthwhile snow caused a white Christmas for much of the area as especially western counties were treated to several inches Christmas afternoon and evening. Some of that snow lingered into the day after Christmas with the heaviest total of six inches reported at Littlefield on the morning of the 26th.

Silverton's precipitation measured 2.41 inches, which is 1.72 inches above normal and .81 of an inch below the South Plains average. An inch of snow was estimated from the rain/snow mixture that fell on December 24.

Teams Lose Pair Of Games to Lazbuddie 'Horns

Silverton's Junior High Owls and Owlettes dropped their games to Lazbuddie here Monday night, the girls dropping a close 37-31 decision and the boys losing 49-11 to their tall opponents.

It looked like the Owlettes would win their game, but it wasn't to be. They trailed the Lady 'Horns by only a point at the end of the first quarter, and trailed 17-12 at halftime. By the end of three quarters, the Lazbuddie girls were ahead 27-22.

Dedra Johnston led the scoring for the Owlettes with nine points, closely followed by Molly Bomar with eight. Shannon Weaver dropped in five points, one being a three pointer. Vanessa Martin added four; Lori Brannon and Teri Rodgers, two points each, and Kara Kingery tossed in a point from the line.

Arnold Garza and Jeremiah Brooks caged four points each for the Owls and Zeb Holt rang up three points. The Owls were behind 17-3 at the end of the first quarter and were down 25-5 at the midway stop. By the end of three quarters, they trailed 39-9.

The teams will go to Happy on Thursday, January 23, for their next round of district games.

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Naming Cutting Horses is Fun Art

National Cutting Horse Association Hall of Fame member Billy Cogdell and his son, Dick Cogdell, get a kick out of finding unusual names for their horses.

One of the latest is Rattlesnake Jones, the 1991 NCHA Derby reserve champion with about \$50,000 in career earnings. In Fort Worth on December 16, Rattlesnake Jones, with rider/trainer Shannon Hall, posted a solid score of 216 as the Will Rogers Futurity began its six-day run at John Justin Arena.

Many riders who competed in the NCHA World Championship Futurity, which concluded its 13-day run Sunday, December 15, were staying in Fort Worth the rest of the week to compete in the Will Rogers event.

Rattlesnake Jones, a second-year competitor, advanced to the four-year-old open division second go-round.

"This is the first time he's been shown since September," Cogdell said. "He's been standing around in the barn getting fat. I was tickled to death with the way he worked today."

How did Cogdell come up with a name such as Rattlesnake Jones?

"When he was a little colt, he was long-necked, would keep his head low and would move his neck around a lot," Cogdell said. "He would move his neck before he would move the rest of his body. He reminded me of a horse named Snake who did the same thing."

"His father's name is Lance Jones. So I put the two together and came up with Rattlesnake Jones."

There are several other Cogdell-bred horses with unusual names. Crackin finished seventh in the 1991 NCHA Futurity's open division. Cogdell sold her in last year's Futurity Sale to Greg Williamson of Fort Worth. Crackin has several sisters—Swingin, Twistin Cee, Shakin and Sneakin and a brother named Cattin.

Rattlesnake Jones has a brother named Jitterbug Jones and he will be shown in the 1992 Futurity.

"I enjoy raising horses," Cogdell said. "But I enjoy coming up with names that nobody else would."

DigiLine Service uses a 144 Kbps facility, typically divided into two 64 Kbps B Channels and one 16 Kbps D Channel to provide access to and from the public switched telephone network for circuit-switched voice communications. DigiLine Service also provides transmission of circuit-switched data and packet-switched data within the customer's service office area only. This service allows the simultaneous transmission of voice and data over a single residence or business telephone line from a serving office equipped for DigiLine Service.

The monthly recurring charges for DigiLine Service consist of three major rate elements: Basic Interface Facility (\$19.00); Basic Interface Equipment (\$12.00); and, an Integrated Services Network Component for each B Channel (rate varies from \$1.90 to \$7.25 per B Channel depending on the customer's class of service and location.) Other charges may also be applicable depending on the options requested by the customer.

DigiLine Service operates only with compatibly-equipped FCC Part 68 registered equipment. The service will be offered initially in the following exchanges and within the following serving offices:

Southwestern Bell expects DigiLine Service to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$236,000.

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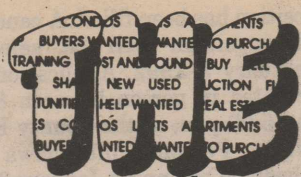
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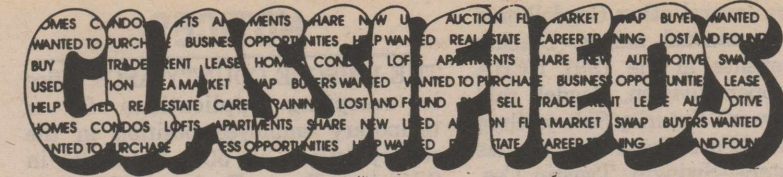
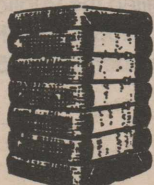
