





#### School Board Candidate Guide Printed

"So you want to be a School Board Member: A Candidate's Guide" is available for veteran and potential school trustees through the Texas Association of School Boards, Austin.

The guide includes procedures for running for office, filing for office, and complying with the Texas Election Code. Two bills passed during the 64th Legislature, HB 4 and HB 275, amended the Texas Election Code with regard to campaign disclosures and election dates, respectively. The candidate's guide explains the implications of both for school board elections.

Generally, school trustee elections ar the first Saturday in April. Candidates must file 30 days prior to that date. Therefore, citizens in most counties interested in filing for a school board position must file on or before March 5 for the April 3 election.

The candidate's guide is a result of action taken by the TASB Delegate Assembly at its annual meeting. The Assembly adopted a resolution providing for an information campaign on school trustee elections. Members of the Association agreed that in order for qualified citizens to continue to seek offices of school trustee positions an explanation of the duties and requirements was needed.



tank had frozen over. We kids decided to "skate" on it, with just our shoes, of course, we didn't have any skates. The others were staying near the edge but I was brave and decided to go straight across the middle. To this day, I've never been fond of swimming in ice water. When I crawled out on top of the ice, I expected the grownups to come running to help but they didn't. They had to stay with their work. I ran fast to the house. Ice was frozen all over my clothes when I got there. It took most of the day sitting in front of the fire for me to warm up. It also took most of the fun out of that hog killing day

#### Cotton Market Report Given

Cotton market acitivty was moderate to active during the week ending February 5, according to B.B. Manly of the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene. Prices were steady, with declines and advances in the latter portion of the week. The decrease in price was on cotton in the upper mike range, 3.5 and better. Very low mike 2.4 and 2.5 showed an increase up to 2 cents per pound.

Grade 42, staple 31, mike 3.5 and higher, sold for 49 to 51 cents per pound, or 181/2 to 201/2 cents above the Government loan rate. Grade 43, staple 31, mike 2.4 to 2.5 sold for 351/2 to 391/2 cents per pound, or 13 to 17 cents per pound above the Government loan rate.

Cotton quality continued mixed, with grades ranging from White to Yellow Stained. About one-half was within the Light Spotted grade category, 37 percent was Spotted and 9 percent Tinged. Grade 42 continued predominant at 24 percent. Fifty-six percent was reduced in grade due to bark. Fiber length was 43 percent 31, 34 percent staple 30, and 17 percent staple 32 and longer. Micronaire readings showed 16 percent in 3.5-4.9 range, down from 21 percent a week ago. Twelve percent miked 3.3-4.9 range, down from 21 percent a week ago. 
