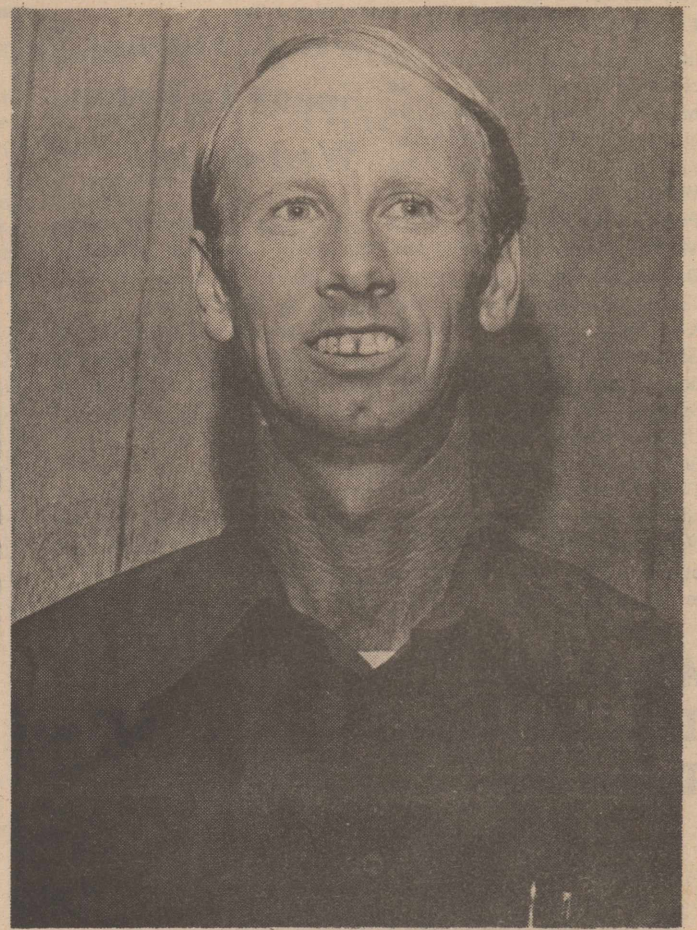

Charles Thornton Is New Rotan Postmaster

Charles Thornton, employee of the Postal Service for the past 10 years, was officially named Postmaster of the Rotan office last week. He replaces Robert Phillips who was the local Postmaster for the past 25 years. Phillips began his career with the post office 39 years ago. Thornton received notification that he had been named Rotan Postmaster while attending a training school in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The new Postmaster began his career as a substitute letter carrier on March 8, 1966. He has worked as a substitute clerk, regular clerk, assistant to the Postmaster, supervisor of postal operations and post office supervisor in the Rotan office prior to being appointed Postmaster.

Hospital Patients To Be Admitted This Week

The anticipated target date for admitting the first patient to the new Fisher County Hospital will be sometime this weekend, according to hospital personnel.

Medical and support personnel are in the process of moving live support and auxiliary systems to the new hospital this week in anticipation of the final patient move this weekend.

Members of the Fisher County Board of Directors met in regular session last Monday night for a four hour meeting.

Present for the meeting were: Ralph Ammons, Rudy Martinez, Kirmet Terry, Allan Houston, Dr. C.U. Callan, Dr. J.F. Johnson, James McCallay, Joe Dale Burk, Alta B. Hinson and Reva Hull.

The first item of business was the discussion by Hugh Cameron of the Texas Hospital Association shared safety engineer concerning a preventative maintenance program for the new hospital. The organization was interested in providing a

preventative maintenance program to the hospital for an estimated cost of \$68.00 per month. No action was taken by the board on the matter.

Joe Dale Burk led another discussion concerning the status of the insurance on the new Fisher County Hospital.

Kirmet Terry made a motion, seconded by Rudy Martinez, to purchase a lab blood bank and to also award the water treatment contract to Garrett Callahan Company.

A discussion was held by board members concerning a possible reduction in the number of employees of the hospital. The following information was made a part of the minutes concerning the personnel matter.

"In accordance with a previous request by the board, Mr. McCallay presented each board member present a copy of the work schedule of hospital employees. After careful study of the work schedules there was

some question as to whether or not there could be any reduction in the number of employees when we move into the new hospital. Mrs. Hinson and Miss Hull each explained that they could foresee no way to reduce the number of employees in their respective departments, but assured the governing board and the administrator that they would do all in their power to keep the number of employees to the bare minimum required without jeopardizing the efficiency of the hospital operation in providing adequate care for patients.

"After considerable discussion and consideration, a motion was made by Mr. Martinez, and seconded by Mr. Houston, that in accord with the by-laws of the Governing Board, Article III, Paragraph 2, that it should be the sole responsibility of the administrator to appoint department heads who would be held accountable to him and that he in turn would be held accountable to the governing board to exercise prudence and take all necessary action to see that there was no overstaffing and that all employee's time on the job should be adequately and properly utilized."

Roby School Taxes To Increase By 20 %

The Roby Board, in its adoption of a budget has been forced to raise the assessment ratio of all tax property in the district by 20 percent. This is due to the last legislature passing on to the school districts a greater share of financing the school programs. The increase for Roby this year is \$24,000.00.

All schools have been taken off commercial rates as far as gas and other utilities this past year which increases the cost of these services.

Plus, the costs of all products the school has to purchase have increased in cost the past two years about 20 to 30 percent, some even more. Roby residents can meet with the board of

equalization on August 2nd to discuss the values if they choose.

Pansy Hale Named To Swine Flu Coordinator

Mrs. Dolph Briscoe has appointed Mrs. Pansy Hale of Roby County chairperson for the First Lady's Volunteer Program, Office of the Governor. Mrs. Hale will be responsible for coordinating volunteer activities in Fisher County, working with Mrs. Sam Waldrop of Abilene who coordinates volunteer services in the 19-county area covered by the West Central Texas Council of Governments.

The First Lady's Volunteer Program was created by an Executive Order signed by Governor Briscoe in October, 1974. The order calls for the office to act as a liaison between the Governor's Office and other state agencies in seeking ways to develop and expand volunteerism and to make opportunities known to all communities.

In making the appointment, Mrs. Briscoe said, "Volunteering is a way of life in Texas; it allows people to become directly involved in solving mutual problems and working toward common solutions. The First Lady's Volunteer Program is working to let all Texans know that there are many opportunities to volunteer their time and talents for the benefit of many."

The First Lady's Volun-

teer Program is co-sponsoring the upcoming swine flu effort with state and local health officials. The Volunteer Program will recruit and place the estimated 600,000 volunteers needed to help inoculate 10 million Texans from the deadly influenza.

Volunteers of every category will be needed--doctors, nurses, aides, clerks, and for transportation, telephoning, and many other duties. County committees will be headed by the First Lady's Volunteer Program chairperson. Subcommittees will be composed of local counterparts of members of the statewide organization steering committee appointed by Mrs. Briscoe. These include: Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M, American Cancer Society--Texas Division, American Heart Association--Texas Affiliate, Inc., American

Lung Association of Texas, American National Red Cross--Texas Division, Auxiliary to the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association, B'nai B'rith Women, Texas Academy of Family Physicians, Texas AFB-Cio, Texas Association of Hospital Auxiliaries, Texas Classroom Teachers Association, Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers, Texas Department of Public Welfare, Texas Hospital Association, Texas Jaycees and Jaycee-Ettest, Texas League for Nursing, Texas Manufacturers Association, Texas March of Dimes, Texas Nurses Association, Texas Nursing Home Association, Texas Osteopathic Medical Association, Texas Pediatric Society, Texas Pharmaceutical Association, Texas State Teachers Association, Women's Auxiliary to the Texas Medical Association, State Bar of Texas.

Sen Tower Introduces P.L. 93-641 Repeal Bill

Organization for Preservation of Local Medical Services, Inc. (O.P.L.M.S.) has been notified that Senator John Tower (R-Tex.) introduced Senate Bill 3573 on June 16, calling for the repeal of Public Law 93-641 "National Health Planning and Resources Development Act of 1974".

This law, to be operated under the auspices of H.E.W., would establish Health Centers in designated areas for the mandatory treatment of all major illnesses with or without the consent of patients or their families, regardless of the present medical and surgical facilities near their homes. Obstetrics, Coronary Care, and Intensive Care are among those illnesses specifically called for to be treated in such centers.

An extensive letter writing campaign was begun in Linden, Texas in January, 1976, at which time the citizens of Cass County met and elected a committee to organize groups and individuals to work for the repeal of this law. Organization for Preservation of Local Medical Services, Inc. is now carrying on this fight on a national scale.

O.P.L.M.S. is a non-profit organization, whose directors are concerned citizens, none of whom are related to the medical field and who view this law as another federal attempt to further control local doctors and small local (rural in particular)

hospitals. Ordering patients transferred to Health Centers away from their homes would mean the decrease of income to local hospitals, eventually leading to the reduction of services offered by those small local hospitals and, in time, result in their closing.

O.P.L.M.S. has been notified that the State of Missouri filed suit in Federal Court, Washington, D.C., June 15, 1976, challenging the constitutionality of Public Law 93-641.

Missouri's entry into the fight against this law follows the action taken by North Carolina, Alabama, and the National Association of Regional Councils of Government in Washington, D.C., as well as others.

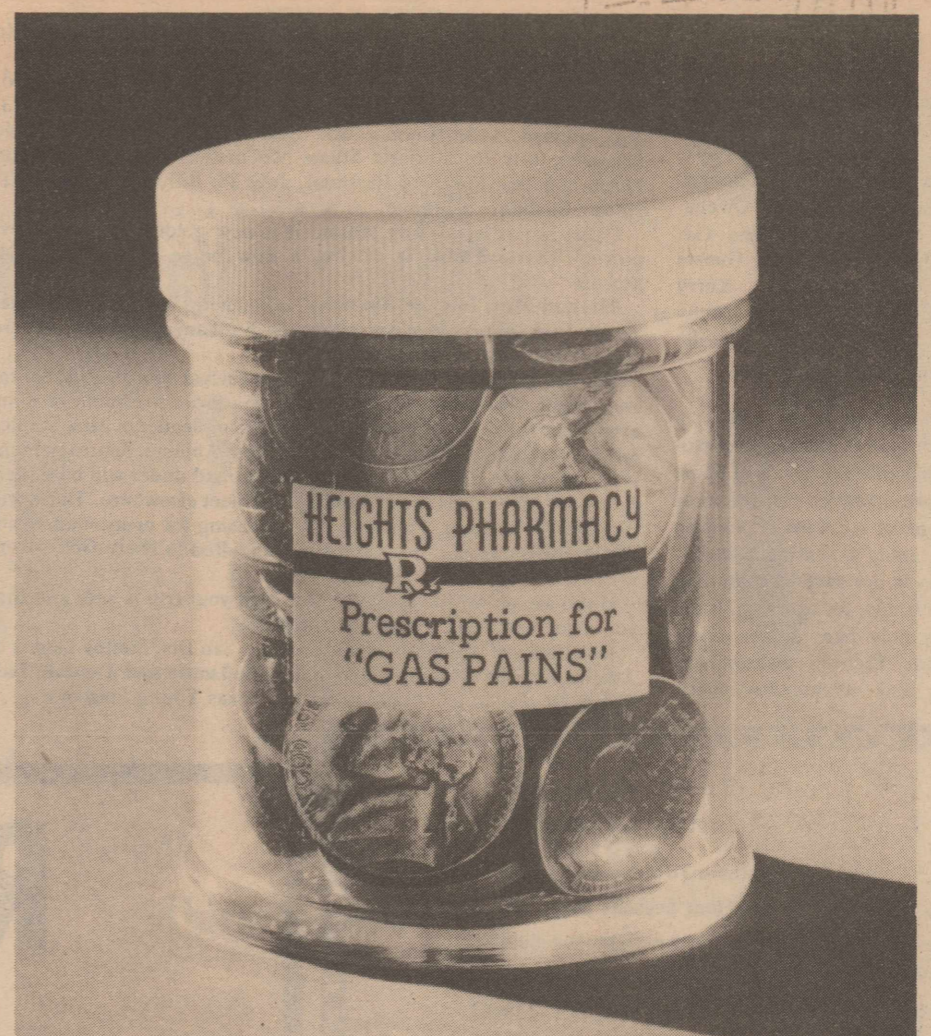

Fisher County farmers placed third in 1975 Texas cowpea production with a crop totaling 842,000 pounds, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reported.

County farmers harvested 1,300 acres with a yield of 648 pounds of dry peas per acre.

Texas production was some 6.4 million pounds of dry peas and 3.2 million pounds of green peas.

Dawson County led the state in production with a crop of 911,000 pounds.

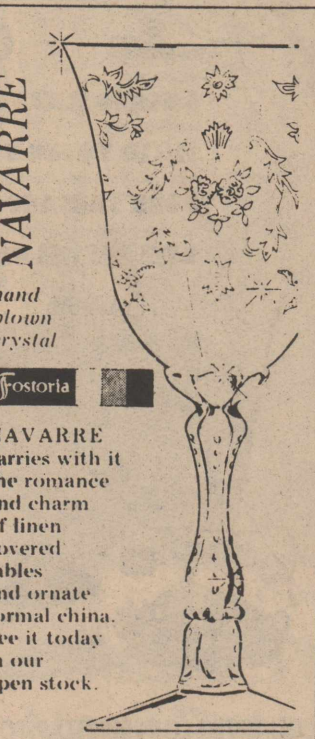

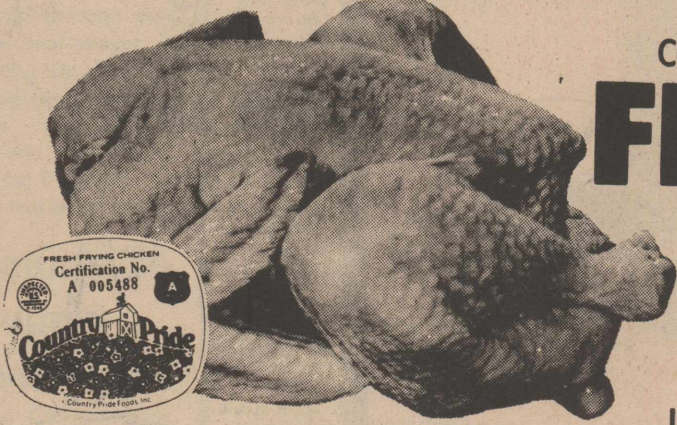
