Carroll Murphree To Head "Kiss A Baby"

"Little more than a decade ago the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation was working to keep C/F youngsters alive long enough to start school. Now we are trying to help some of these same patients, who have grown to young adulthood, enter college or find jobs."

The encouraging words came from Mr. Carroll Murphree of Rotan, as he accepted the chairmanship of the 1976 "Kiss A Baby Campaign."

Among the programs of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation are support for over 100 Cystic Fibrosis Centers across the nation. These Centers provide diagnosis, treatment and referral to children who have these lung-damaging diseases as well as those who suffer from gastrointestinal disorders related to cystic fibrosis. In Texas there are clinics at San Antonio, Houston and Dallas.

The Foundation also funds research to find a cure and control for cystic fibrosis, the most serious of these lung-damaging diseases, and to develop better treatments for children suffering from all lung disorders.

The treatments that prolong the lives of children with cystic fibrosis also alleviate, and often cure, children with other lung-damaging diseases. Cystic Fibrosis, the number one genetic killer of children affects one out of every 1,500 babies born each year and occurs when a child inherits two genes for the disease, one from each parent.

This year's campaign begins with a Door-to-Door march in September. "When a C/F marcher knocks on your door, give as generously as you are able," said Mr. Murphree. "Remember that even today, with the improvements research and care have brought, there is

no cure for this inherited, genetic disease. It is still destroying lungs, digestion and lives."

"We don't need more reasons than these to actively support the Kiss A Baby Campaign."

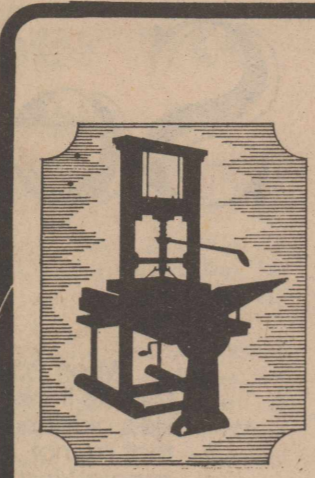

Five Seniors Return For Rotan Football

Rotan Head Coach Don Mullins and assistant Coach Ted Posey were busily hoeing weeds and working on the watering of the field last Monday morning in preparation for the start of two-a-day football workouts on August 9th.

Two-a-day workouts begin at 8 a.m. on August 9th, according to Mullins. The workouts are scheduled to last for approximately 1 1/2 hours. Afternoon workouts will last approximately 2 hours and will start around 7 or 8 p.m. according to the weather conditions.

Coach Ted Posey will be in charge of the offensive line, with Coach Rogers Lankford and Coach Don Mullins co-ordinating the offensive backfield. Coach Sid McCown will coach the receivers.

Rogers Lankford will be the designated junior high coach. He will be assisted by Coach Posey with the 8th grade and Coach McCown with the 7th grade.

The first Rotan varsity and junior varsity scrimmage will be at Baird on August 20. The following Friday night the Yellowhammers will scrimmage Anson. The site of the Anson-Rotan scrimmage has not been set.

According to Mullins, the Texas Football Magazine ranked Rotan in the bottom half of the district with Paducah, Aspermont and Knox City. The four district teams picked to finish on top of the district are Haskell, Hamlin, Munday and Crowell.

Rotan will be weak in experience and depth with only five experienced senior players returning to the 1976 squad. The services of Buddy Hooper, John Cox, Ysidro Yanez, Wes Morrow, and Jerry Carr will be counted upon heavily this year.

Rotan lost 12 seniors off their 1975 winning team.

The 1976 Varsity schedule is:

Sept. 3 at Spur, Sept. 10 at Roscoe and Sept. 17 at home with Rochester. The Hammers have an open date on Sept. 24 then get into the thick of district play on October 1 with a home game with Crowell. On October 8 the Hammers play Haskell at home then travel to Munday on October 15. On October 22nd they play Knox City at home then travel to Paducah on October 27. The final two games of the regular season are a November 5th contest with Aspermont at Aspermont and a final game at home with Hamlin on November 12th.

The girls participating played

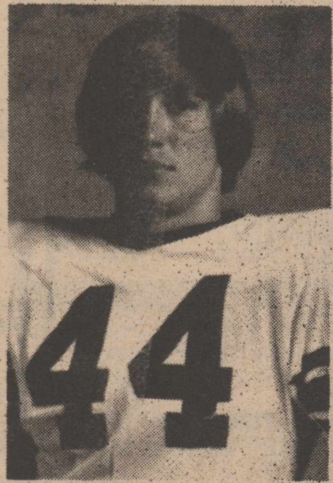
two games on July 30 and were beaten by Snyder for first place. The trophy won by the girls is on display at the First National Bank.

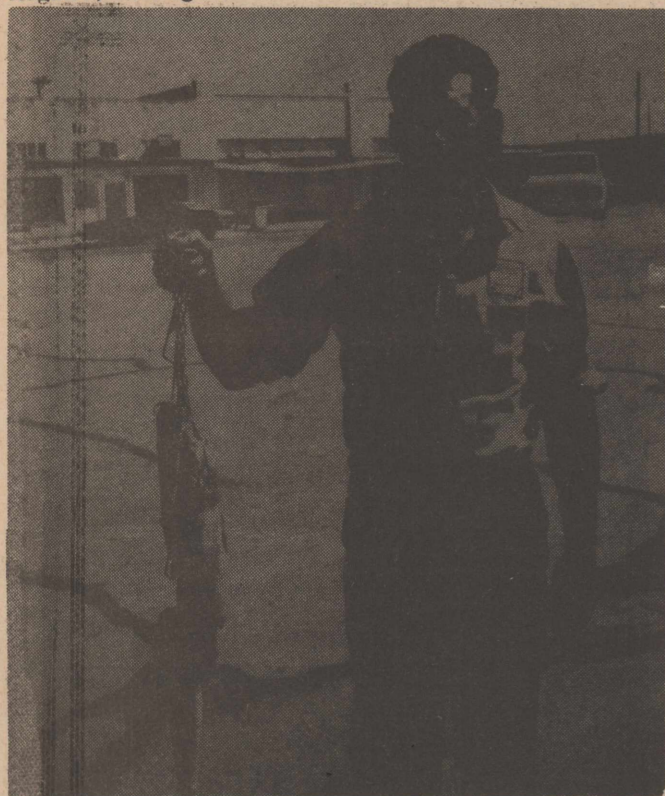

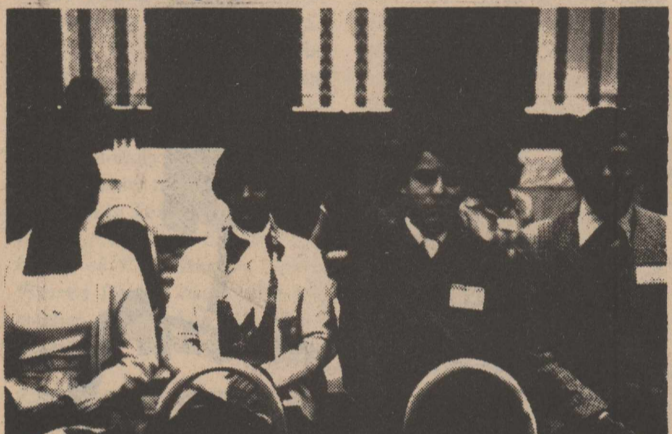

Rotan C.A.R. Members Attend Workshop

Four members and the senior president of Anne Pettus, Shelbyburne Society of Children of the American Revolution of Rotan were among the 163 attending the South Central Regional of the National Society which was held recently at the Skirvin Plaza Hotel in Oklahoma City. States included were Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Oklahoma and Texas. Texas led in number in attendance with a total county of eighty.

Following registration on Friday afternoon, members enjoyed an informal supper in the Continental Room of the hotel. At 8:00 p.m. they assembled for the first session of the workshop. The meeting opened with a Processional in which Ricky LeBleu of Rotan was the Color bearer for Texas. His was the honor of carrying the official C.A.R. flag, Ricky is president of Anne Pettus Shelbyburne Society.

Following the Processional which included Flag Bearers, National Officers and Pages, there was a panel discussion presenting ideas for carrying on the various activities of the National Society. Member participation from the floor added much in the way of interest and information on implementing the work at local level. The panel discussions were chaired by Steven Miller and members included other National Officers and Chairmen.

The opening session was followed by an informal reception and swimming party honoring the National President.

Saturday activities included the procession, the regular patriotic ceremonies, and workshop panels. Luncheon was in the Continental Room of the hotel. A most impressive and beautiful Invocation was given by Miss Daireth Hollyman, a graduate of Bacone College at Muskogee, Oklahoma. musical renditions on tape. Bacone College is one of the Indian Schools which receives aid from DAR and C.A.R. Societies. The college was first organized by American Baptists to aid Indian young people in acquiring an education, and no student is refused admittance because of lack of funds.

One of the most enjoyable activities for the C.A.R.s was on Saturday afternoon when they went by bus for a tour of the Cowboy Hall of Fame Museum. They also visited the Oklahoma State Capitol before returning to the hotel.

The closing session featured a formal banquet on Saturday night. At this meeting State Presidents made reports, awards were presented, and the Colors were retired. Randall S. McKellar of Dallas is Texas C.A.R. President.

In the words of the National President, the Regional had truly been a time of "Fun, Food and Food for Thought".

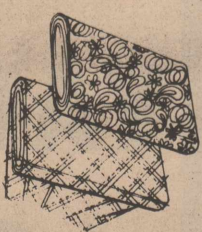
You can't replace those wonderful elm trees, so what will our little English sparrows and wasps do about a place to build their nests?

Palava Has Unique History Behind Name

Fisher County communities received the names by which they are recorded in history in various manners. Some were named for the earliest or most influential settler, some by accident, and others through the process of selecting a name acceptable to the United States Post Office Department.

Mr. Daniel states, "My family moved to what was then known as Center Point, Texas in 1900. My father built his residence and store buildings. Then an Application was filed with the U.S. Postal Department in Washington, D.C. by my mother, Mrs. Stella A. Daniel, to establish a post office at Center Point, Texas. There was quite an exchange of correspondence about what the name should be as there was already a post office by that name in the state. After some time the U.S. Post Office Department said that since there had been so much 'palaver' about the name, it would be called 'Palava'. So on July 21, 1900 the official document was issued creating the proposed Post Office at Palava, this became the name of the community."

The Daniel family came from Alabama to Texas and settled at Davilla in Milam County. The father of P.H. Daniel, James Warren Daniel, came with his mother Mrs. Ann Elizabeth Blanchard. His father, Henry

Daniel (born in the Carolinas) had died when he was only nine years old.

Mr. Daniel continues, "My father, James Warren Daniel, was married to Stella Ann Collins in Davilla, Texas December 25, 1884.

"Two children, James Wickliffe Daniel and Winnie Pearl Daniel, were born to my parents while they lived in Davilla, Texas. Then about January 1, 1890 the family moved to a farm 2 1/2 miles north of Trent, Texas. This farm was in Jones County bordering on the Fisher County line. It is here that I was born on April 10, 1892, about 1/4 mile east of Fisher County.

"The next children, Henry Brent Daniel and Quilla Joe Daniel were born on the Newman Ranch in Fisher County. From there the family moved to Center Point where the school of that name was located (District No. 8). Professor G.L. Caudle was Principal of the school at that time. After the name of the Post Office was called Palava, the community began to use that name.

"In the meantime, Tommie Deggs Daniel was born. He was the first child born in the community after it had been decided that the name would be Palava instead of Center Point. (Another child, Jennie Mae Daniel was born in New Mexico in 1907).

"I recall these names of early settlers in the Palava area: Charles Byrd, Jim Byrd, Dr. Bertram, Tom Graves, B.F. King, the DeBusks, Nolans, Kearneys, Lees, Mitchells, Williams, Langstons, Tapps, Harveys, Rudds, Halls, Neffs,

Howards, Yoakums, and Godfreys. Pete Godfrey bought our store and became Postmaster in early 1907. There were others whose names I do not recall.

"Miss Mabel Donnell taught in Palava 1901-1902, and Miss Pearl Collins taught there in 1904-1905.

"In the Newman area there were the Lodges, Shiflets, and Buck Richardsons. Mrs. Wright taught in the Newman School in 1896 and perhaps other years."

Mr. James W. Daniel was intrinsically a pioneer. As new areas were opened up and settled by farmers he also pioneered. P.H. Daniel records, "My father built and operated the store in Trent, Texas in 1898 and 1899; in 1900 he built and operated the first grocery store (plus other times usually included in county stores in those days) in Palava; and, in 1906 he moved to a farm 4 1/2 miles southwest of Texaco, New Mexico. In 1907 he built the first grocery store, which was also the first building, in the new townsite of Grady, New Mexico. The latter was sold after a few months and he opened the first grocery store in Farwell, Texas. During all of those years he

farmed and operated the grocery stores.

"I have pictures of the 1900 two room school house, our home (still standing in Palava) with store on the south side of the residence, and of the school Principal's residence. These four buildings were all that were there during our stay in Palava from January 1, 1900 to April 1906.

"Of the Daniel family, my father (James Warren Daniel), my mother (Stella Ann Collins Daniel), and the eldest child (James Wickliffe Daniel) are deceased.

"Minnie Pearl Daniel, now Mrs. Minnie Leeper, is in St. Thomas Convalescent home in Houston where her son, Woodson W. Leeper, is Superintendent. I, P. Hicks Daniel, am retired after having worked 52 years for the Santa Fe Railroad, and am enjoying good health.

"Quilla Joe Daniel married Lillie Glover in Amarillo, Texas in 1920. They have four sons. They live on a 700 acre farm (and also have cattle) about 12 miles east of Amarillo. They have enjoyed good health until recently when Quilla's health began to fail. He has served in

the First Christian Church, Amarillo, for 53 years arranging for the Elders and Deacons to serve each Sunday.

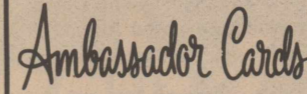
"Tommie Deggs Daniel married Lucile Thomas in Amarillo about 1922. She passed away in 1963. Tommie is in the Real Estate business in Tulia, Texas.

"Jennie Mae Daniel married Thomas R. Atkinson about 1927. He is a Minister in the Church of Christ denomination, now retired, living in Fairfield, California."

Mr. P. Hicks Daniel, who has kept in touch with friends through the years, attended the recent Palava Homecoming held in Sweetwater. It all goes to prove something about those early Fisher County Pioneers--no matter how far they roam, there is always a bit of Fisher County in their hearts!

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COUNTY AGENT NEWS

Spider mites, or red spiders as they are sometimes called, spell bad news for a garden.

There's no way to keep spider mites out of your garden, but it's a good idea to be able to recognize the pests and what type of damage they do.

Spider mites are quite small, about 1/60 of an inch long, and can be white, red or green in color. They lay eggs on the undersides of leaves and the eggs hatch in about five days. The life cycle of a spider mite lasts three weeks. Hot dry weathr is particularly favorable for their development.

Spider mites prefer beans, tomatoes and peas but will attack almost any plant.

The bugs feed by sticking their mouthparts into leaf tissue and sucking out the juice while injecting a toxic substance into the leaf at the same time.

When a plant is infected with mites it shows up as tiny spots on the undersides of leaves. Heavy infestations of mites cause bleaching and yellowing along the main leaf veins at first and later the whole leaf is affected.

After a while, the leaf's edges curl up, turn brown and eventually drop off the plant. If not controlled, spider mites can completely defoliate a plant. It is recommended to use only

spider mites. Some good diazinon, kelthane, ethion and insecticides to sue include sulfur.

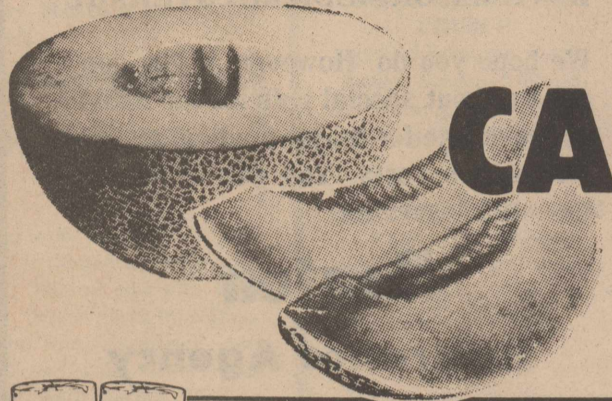
