## Cecil King Will Not Seek 4th Mayor Term

Roby Mayor Cecil King said that he was not going to re-file for another term as Roby Mayor.

Councilmen Archie Rivers and Jimmy Hayes were given the opportunity to sign authorizations placing their names on the ballot for re-election at the last Commission meeting, however, both declined.

Mayor King is winding up his 15th year on the Roby Commission. He has served the City of Roby as Mayor for the past 6 years. "I think that is long enough, that someone else should have the job. Some new blood on

the commission would be good for the City of Roby", said King. He has seen many changes take place since 1962. Most streets have been paved, a new park, swimming pool and tennis court have been constructed and a new garbage pick-up program initiated.

King said that although 80 percent of the streets in the City limits of Roby are paved, his only regret is that 100 per cent could not have been paved. He cited this as a high priority, in his opinion, for the new commission.

Ratliff indicated in a phone interview earlier this week, "I imagine I will re-file, as far as I know."

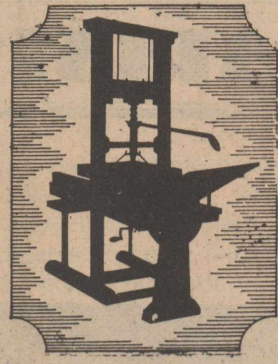
Howard Gordon said, "I have not made a decision yet", while Mickey Templeton was unavailable for comment.

## Houston, Morrow Say No To Hospital Term

Fisher County Hospital Board members Allan Houston and Wendell Morrow both indicated they were not going to seek another term on the hospital board.

Board members Kismet Terry, Ralph Ammons and Rudy Martinez will, in all likelihood, have two new members to work with when the directors' terms expire.

One paramount problem that new and old board members will be facing will be the seemingly ever existing task of balancing the books. The board is faced with payments in 1977 of approximately \$239,000.00 required to service both general obligation and revenue bonds.

In 1976 board members approved payment of \$151,000.00 in interest on general obligation bonds and \$18,000 in interest on revenue bonds. The \$169,000.00 paid in 1976 will increase by \$70,000.00 when principal payments are added into the payment for 1977.

### Rotan Book Review Club Cancels Meet

The Rotan Book Review Club meeting originally set for February 15th, has been cancelled, according to Mrs. Vernon Frazier.

A death in the family of the book reviewer caused the cancellation.

The next meeting of the club will be on March 15 when Mrs. Onida Bass of Lubbock is scheduled to address the club. The meeting will begin at 3:00 p.m., at the Rotan Community Center.

The board will also be faced with attempting to make occupancy figures level off at 70 percent, the projected figure needed to put the hospital finances on a break-even basis. Average occupancy figured less than 48 percent for the last quarter of 1976.

The deadline for filing for positions on the Fisher County Hospital Board is March 2. Election will be held on Saturday, April 2.

## James Springer Will Not Seek Mayor Post

Rotan Mayor James Springer indicated early last Tuesday that he "will not place his name on the ballot for re-election" in the April 2nd city election that will see Rotan with a new mayor and three new councilmen terms.

Councilman Lester Sescil indicated that he has not

decided to re-file for sure. He said that he has mixed opinions now, but said he would give the matter serious consideration. He was referring to his position with respect to re-filing for a council position. Informed sources say that Sescil would be a logical replacement for

## Editorial Comment

### Resignation

We understand that Rotan Basketball Coach Sid McCown has given notice to some of his players that he intends to resign.

Although no official letter of resignation has been issued and although we haven't discussed the resignation with Coach McCown, it seems to us a very inappropriate time for McCown to end his coaching career at Rotan.

He has been in Rotan longer than any other coach on the staff, even though his salary doesn't reflect it; his style of coaching is not flamboyant and crowd pleasing, but his players--one the whole--think the world of him.

He is probably the only coach in Texas that had his starting team quit shortly after the start of the season. He refused to compromise his principals in the case of the mass exodus and now, when it seems as though justice should prevail, it appears as though the coach's possible resignation will only serve to satisfy the "I told you so" group.

McCown is sensitive, concerned, hard working and for my money, one heck of a coach.

There are those that will criticize him because his basketball team hasn't demolished anyone by 92-35, but that doesn't make him any less of a coach.

He is a guiding light, a stable Christian example and a respected man in the lives of a host of young men that he comes in contact with daily.

His won-lost record has suffered recently, but when all the dust settles... who cares?

I don't care how many games his team wins, but I do care that his players are learning something valuable, win or lose, from their playing experience.

I don't care if McCown's team goes 0-26 for the year, as long as his players are able to salvage something from him as a coach that will make them stand straight and tall as adults.

McCown won't scream at a boy, he won't belittle a boy, he won't cuss a boy, he'll just use his own good judgement to mold that boy into the kind of young man that parents are proud of.

Whether you agree with my reasoning or not is unimportant--that you satisfy your conscience is the only thing that really matters.

I feel like we are at the brink of losing one of Rotan's best coaches... and I really don't know the reason, but that is immaterial.

The school board members hired him and they will be the one that accepts his resignation... should that time come. So no one misunderstands my personal opinion... I hate to see the guy resign.

If your personal opinion of the guy is the same, or differs, I think you owe it to him, yourself, and the board members to make your opinions known. How else will the board have any basis for a decision from the people that elected them?

Roby Commission members voted a 7 percent across the board pay increase for all employees of the City of Roby, effective February 1st.

In other action the commission heard a report from City Manager Jimmy Price concerning the new street signs and his recent trip to Dallas concerning the Federal Revenue Sharing meeting that he attended.
