# New Clinic Paperwork In Austin

Fisher County Hospital Administrator Perry Hunsaker left for Austin last Monday morning to hand-carry the plans and specifications on the new

Fisher County Clinic to the Texas Health Facilities Commission.

Hunsaker said that he will meet with Gene Vinyard, financial advisor

with Vinyard and Street, on Monday afternoon, go over the information on the construction of the new clinic then present the information to the THFC.

According to Hunsaker, "We'll be asking the Texas Health Facilities Commission for a declaratory ruling, saying that we don't feel like we need a certificate of need because in our opinion the propos-

ed project does not come under the criteria outlined for a certificate."

**Dean Browns Resign Posts**

**At Rotan**

Rotan Band Director Dean Brown and his wife, an English teacher at Rotan High School, have both submitted their resignations to Superintendent Tom Harkey. The Browns plan to continue their education in the Austin area.

Their resignations increase the number of key positions that will be filled prior to the start of school in September. In addition to filling the band director's slot, Rotan School Board members will be hiring a new homemaking teacher, and new students will be greeted in the fall by a new Ag teacher, and a new girl's basketball coach.

Hunsaker said that the paperwork approval leading to the actual construction is expected to take approximately 90 days. After the approval is received by the Texas

Health Facilities Commission, Gene Vinyard begins the sale of bonds, then the advertising for bids is undertaken. After a successful bid has been awarded, construction be-

gins.

The administrator said that he doesn't anticipate any problems in securing the declaratory ruling or selling the bonds and said that if all moves on

schedule the new clinic construction could be started in September of 1979.

It is expected that the clinic will cost in the area of \$185,000.00.

**Rotan, Roby Receive 1% City Tax Rebates**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said rebates to Texas cities of the one-percent optional sales tax are running about 10 percent higher this year over the same period last year.

Bullock announced that Texas cities during the first five months of 1979 have received a total of \$150.3 million, compared to receipts of \$135.5 million during the same period last year.

Bullock said the May allocation of the one-percent city sales tax for more than 900 Texas cities will

be \$15 million, compared to a 1978 statewide allocation of \$13.8 million for the month.

Rotan will get a check for \$13,598.92 which is up 11 percent from the 1978 check of \$12,206.56.

Roby will receive a check for \$2,974.30 which is up 28 percent from the 1978 check of \$2,312.34.

**Wasted Hours**

Some greedy government employees in Washington are working overtime at wasting millions of our tax dollars by putting in totally unnecessary extra hours.

Some money hungry federal works have the gall to stay late at their desks and work weekends when they can't even keep busy during normal hours. And there are numerous cases of overtime-related fraud, according to a probe by the General Accounting Office [GAO].

Incredibly, at least 1,000 government employees put in for 1,000 hours of overtime each in the course of a year. That's six months of overtime and it costs taxpayers \$12 million dollars.

The GAO noted that the total overtime bill for 1977 was a staggering 1.5 billion dollars.

Some pampered employees actually earn more in overtime than they make in salary. Among the leaders in driving taxpayers to the poorhouse are chauffeurs for cabinet officials. Consider:

-Defense Secretary Harold Brown's chauffeur, who earns \$15,000 a year, collected \$22,400 in overtime in a 12-month period.

-Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare Secretary Joseph Califano's chauffeur makes \$14,000, but ran up a whopping \$23,000 in overtime.

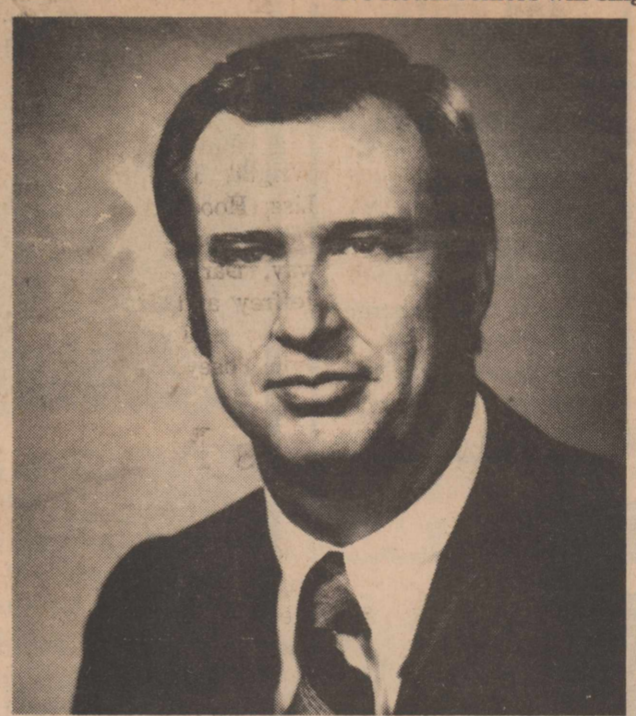
-The driver of Commerce Secretary Juanita Kreps makes \$16,000 and collected another \$19,000 in overtime.

Anna Marie Angolia discovered a whole file cabinet full of work soon after she was hired by the Department of Agriculture.

She was told the material was "overtime" work. She protested that she couldn't keep busy during normal hours, but her supervisor warned her not to make waves. Angolia was transferred several times, and finally was fired.

In another shocking case, a division of the General Services Administration found it had a \$23,000 surplus. So employees worked overtime until they used it all up.

Someone needs to send a memo to all federal workers and the subject of the memo should be "horses", the body should be about the dangers of riding a good horse to death and it should be signed by the guys that foot the bill-taxpayers.

## Tractor Short Course In Roby June 18-21

A tractor maintenance short course for adult farmers will be held June 18-21 under the sponsorship of the Roby High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Daniel, teacher of vocational agriculture, and Mrs. Laurie, Superintendent.

Mr. Richard Pivonka, tractor maintenance specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Pivonka received his B.S. degree in Mechanized Agriculture from Texas A&M University in 1975. From June, 1975 to April, 1977 he has worked for the Rio Grande Valley Sugar Growers, Inc., as a Mechanical Equipment foreman. He was respon-

sible for the maintenance of a wide variety of shop and field equipment.

The short course at Roby High is scheduled to begin June 18 at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held June 19, 20, and 21.

During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Pivonka will be available to assist farmers with individual tractor problems and to provide "on-the-farm" instruction, according to Mr. Daniel.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Daniel, or the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Laurie. An entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged.

Tractor Maintenance Short Course certificates will be presented to each individual who attends all the training sessions.

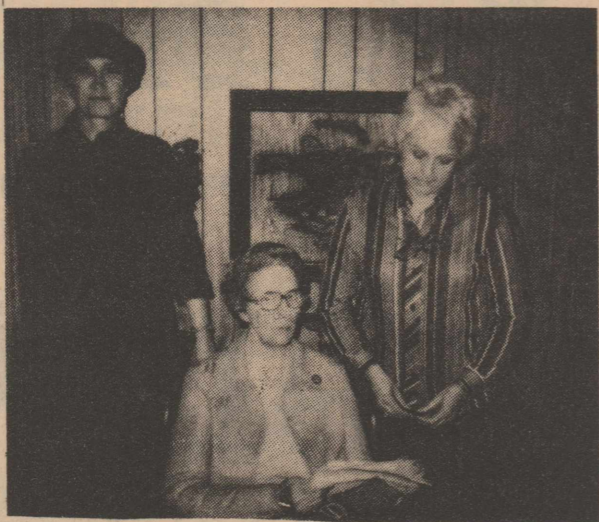

## Representative Grubbs Comments On Session and And Killer Bees

There have been a lot of words written and said recently by the news media suggesting the 66th Legislature has been something less than credible. The "Killer Bees" absenting themselves from the Senate with only ten days left in the session has been a cause to question the credibility.

This act on the part of twelve liberal senators, in opposition to the Lt. Governors legal parliamentary procedure, is likened to the little boy who got mad and took his ball and bat and went home.

When a small one-third minority in on Legislative Body and completely bring to a halt two legislative bodies of 181 elected officials, then perhaps the credibility of the system is questionable.

Our system is supposed to be a Democratic one in which the majority wishes prevail. But when a one-third minority can prevail as obstructionists to prevent legislative bodies from functioning properly during a session limited in time by our constitution, then someone needs to take another look at the rules of procedure.

There has been a lot said about a split presidential primary and this one issue was the reason for twelve senators walking out and becoming the now infamous "Killer Bees".

The matter is simple to explain. A separate, early presidential primary would be to the advantage of conservative democrats, while the presidential

primary at the same time as the regular primary would be to the advantage of the liberal democrats. In other words, a good number of conservative democrats could be replaced in the House and Senate by liberal democrats, which is what the State Democratic party and the AFL-CIO want.

The prediction is that a split primary would allow a lot of conservative Texas democrats to vote for John Connally in the presidential primary and then allow these democrats to return to their party to vote for their conservative candidates later in the Spring.

The cost of a separate primary is a phony reason to oppose it, because the liberal element in the party is not known for its fiscal responsibility and therefore is a little out of character opposing the split primary based on the cost of holding it.

All of these facts are the basis for the recent walkout of the twelve senators, and it does tend to make the entire legislature appear, in the eyes of the voters, to be somewhat irresponsible in the conduct of affairs of the State.

The final number of high school honor society members who accepted the \$100 scholarships to attend West Texas State for the 1978-79 academic year was 213.

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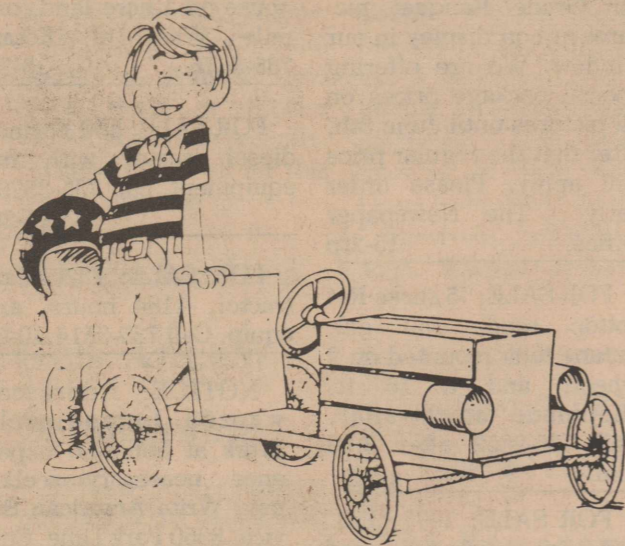

The new schedules will result in a 16.1 percent increase in the adjusted gross revenue of the company.

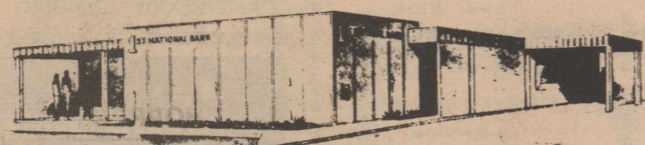

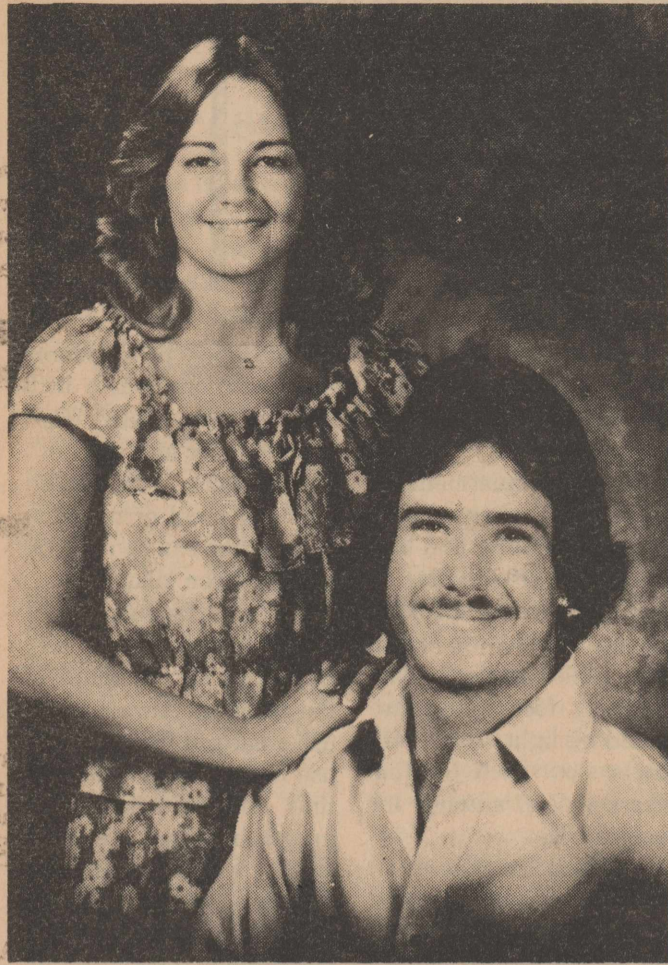

Due to good rains the past week, Fisher County Farmers should be planting cotton in full swing this week.

The optimum cotton plant stand will not only affect the yield but it can also cause increased boll weevil numbers in the fall. Result demonstrations conducted in Dickens, Kent, Jones and Fisher Counties last year showed that the best yields were obtained where there were from 3 to 4 plants per foot of row. Yields decreased at higher populations and decreased drastically where there were 8 plants per foot of row. This was the case in skip-row cotton as well as in cotton planted in 40 inch rows.

This is by no means new information. It has been known for many years that

cotton produces best when there are 30,000 to 55,000 plants per acre. However, many producers are now planting cotton varieties that have smaller seed and if the small seed size is not taken into account, it can result in a 25 percent increase in plant stand.

When the plants are crowded, they compete with each other for nutrients and some plans do not produce squares and bolls until late in the growing season. These late producing plants not only interfere with the development of the plants that will produce the cotton crop but they produce squares and bolls which become boll weevil feed late in the growing season. This allows larger numbers of boll weevils to build the fat reserves that are needed to overwinter. Soil temperature will

probably be in the optimum range for quick emergency of cotton. Therefore, based on the viability of seed, only enough should be planted to obtain a stand of 3 to 4

plants per foot of row. This plant population will result in uniform maturity of the crop, reduced competition between plants and less feed for boll weevils this fall.

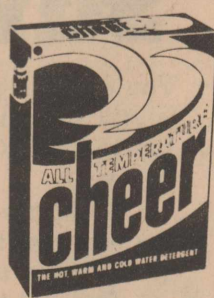

HOME ECONOMICS

Court House Roby

Sew with silks to create fashions for summer.

Silks come in a variety of fabrications from the beginner's best-bet, broadcloth, to delicate transparent chiffon, to the lustrous crepe de chine, to slightly nubby, sporty-looking noil.

Silk linen comes in weights from light handkerchief to heavy suiting. Many silks combined with other natural or man-made fibers produce lower-priced, washable blends.

When buying silk fabric, check the stability of the fabric. It should resist slipping and twisting.

Check the drape of the fabric. It should fall naturally when hung. Silk should have a dry "hand" (feel dry when touched). This makes it easy to work with and signifies the fabric has a rich body.

Cutting

In cutting silk, follow the pattern guide. Always use sharp, long-blade shears. If using snubby or coarse/crips silks, such as tussah, cut pieces singly. The folded fabric may stick to itself and not lay flat. When cutting soft, slippery, lightweight silk, pin to lightweight paper for more stability.

Notions

On fine silk dresses, use a toothed tracing wheel without carbon paper. Also, use white chalk or white carbon paper rather than wax--the grease will stain the fabric. Tailor tacks can always be used. Select a natural cotton 60's thread or cotton 50's for heavier fabric. Silk thread is acceptable for basting but not for final stitching, it is too strong. Always use a weaker thread than the fabric for final stitching so that in case of stress the

thread breaks instead of fabric tearing. Use fine silk pins to prevent pin hole markings.

Machine Adjustments  
Use size 11 sharp needle for the fine fabric and size 13 for heavier weights. To avoid puckering, machine tension should be loose and well-balanced. The presser foot pressure should be light. Use 10-12 stitches per inch for fine silks and 8-10 stitches for heavier silks.

Seam Finishes

Seam finish will depend on the amount of tailoring and fabric weight. Sheer silks, such as chiffon and georgettes, because of the fabric's transparency, should have enclosed seams such as French or flat-felled. These are used on straight or slightly curved seams only. On heavier, unlined silks, use bound seams or a Hong Kong finish. For light-

weight silks, press seams open with one-fourth inch of the raw seam edge turned under and stitched.

A plan seam with pinked edges or hand or machine overcasting can be used on firmly woven silks.

Interfacings  
Interfacings are very important for the shape of the garment. Always try to use a natural fiber. Do not use fusible interfacing on fine sheer silks. Use interfacings that are lighter in weight than the outside garment. Always remember to use quality interfacings for quality fabrics.

Pressing  
When pressing silks, use a clean steam iron with plenty of steam. The temperature setting should correspond to the component fiber with the lowest heat tolerance. Use a press cloth to prevent shine.
