66 th session, the Texas Legislature also finally Legisiature on a state budget, school finance plan and tax relief legislation.
Hurridly pumping out minor bills and putting the inishing touches on major egislation on the 140th and final day of the session is the traditional way of doing thing

On the way to th ours of lawmaking, legisd matters as a presidential primary, alterations to the onsumer protection act and a change in the usury iling. But with the presiden killed by the flight of the "Killer Bees" in the enate, and with changes the consumer protection act already passed, and with the usury ceiling ped to a maximum of 12 percent, lawmakers spent he final day of the session greeing on the budget, details of how public chools would be financed and approving legislation implement the tax relief amendment passed by oters last November The state budget for Houses after some expect d haggling over different provisions of the plan would cost $\$ 20.7$ billion.
That's a 19 percent ncrease over the last he Legislature drew up in 1977 during the 65th

When you consider that inflation, it appears law makers succeeded in keep ing spending levels as low as was humanly possible. But, the $\$ 20.7$ budge Clements for his signature is $\$ 1$ billion higher than what he suggested to the egislature in his budget message earlier in the session. Clements wanted to return an additional $\$ 1$ billion to taxpayers. Indications are that lements will approve the spending plan, although
some Capitol observers warn that the governor might end approving one ear of the biennial spending draft and then call lawmakers back for a special session to write or the one-year budget iennium.

"Passage of this tax relief bill will save farmers
and ranchers of Texas an and ranchers of Texas an year now, and more
importantly, will guarantee that they will be taxed fairly, not injustly, in the future," Chaloupka said. Chaloupka said final passage of the measure culminated efforts of more
than a decade to give tax than a decade to give tax
relief to some farmers relief to some farmers
whose oppressive ad valorem taxes were forcing them out of business.
The bill, as signed into law by the Governor
Thursday, will be in effect for 1979 unless local taxing authorities choose an option of postponing it until 1980. Public hearings would have to be held, however, before such a
local resolution could be local res
passed.
