Hospital Board At Brink Of Awarding Clinic Bid

The members of the Fisher County Hospital Board spent over three hours talking with two representatives of construction firms concerning the building of the new Fisher County Doctor's Clinic at the Fisher County Hospital. At last Monday night's meeting, Lanny Wadleigh of Wadleigh Construction Company in Snyder, and Larry Oweings of Ramcon in Odessa construction bids, time needed to complete the project, references and changes that could be omitted to save money on their original bids.

The bids from Wadleigh Construction Company and Ramcon were the only two received and opened on September 6. Board members did not

Hospital directors have already authorized Gene Vinyard, financial representative of Vinyard and Street in Austin, to begin selling bonds for the construction of the Doc-

tor's Clinic in the amount of \$175,000.00.

Heat Or Air

Big Orange Rolls Past Merkel 38-12

The Rotan Yellowhammers, after falling behind 6-0 on the the second play of the game, came back to post their second win of the season and completely dominate the Merkel Badgers. The Hammers won 38-12 while amassing 516 total yards to only 175 for the Badgers of Class AA.

Merkel won the toss and elected to receive. On the first play from scrimmage the Badgers ran a straight dive off tackle for one yard. They turned the second play into six points by running a "flea flicker" pass that caught the secondary flat footed.

Rotan took the kick-off on their first offensive series and marched 65 yards in 15 plays to even the score 6-6. Byron Weathersbee, Kieth Mullins and Mark Nowlin picked up the ground yards while Greg Hayes snagged a 20 yard pass to set up a 3rd down and two yards needed from the two yard line. Weathersbee tossed a pass to Gary Don Harkey for the touchdown then lofted another 2 point extra-point pass to Mullins to put the Hammers ahead 8-6 with 6:27 left in the first quarter.

The Orange defense shut down Merkel on the next series, forcing them to punt on 4-5. With 4:29 left on the clock in the first quarter, Rotan began their second offensive march, but it was stymied as Weathersbee tossed a 4-10 play to Mullins that only yielded 8 yards.

Defensively, Eli Sepeda, Willie Hayes and Robert Montez teamed up to sack Merkel's signal caller for a

second score.

Facing a second down, needing 15 yards for a first down, Kieth Mullins took a pitch, ran right, then cut across the grain, dashing 65 yards to post another 6 points on Rotan's side of the scoreboard. The extra period ended the Hampoint conversion added 2 more points after Weathersbee hit Gary Don Harkey in the end zone.

the lead was chopped on the next play as Merkel's Randy Marin ran 63 yards on the kick-off return that narroed the score to 12-16. Mark Harris took Mer-

kel's kick at the 18 yard line and slashed to the 42 before being stopped to open Rotan's next offensive series.

A Rotan fumble two plays later ended the drive.

Rotan's defense stopped the Badgers on their next series and with 2:52 left in the half, the Hammers began their final first half drive that ended in a Merkel pass interception with 8 seconds on the clock. End Greg Hayes pulled down another 25 yard pass from Weathersbee and receiver Mike Morrow pulled in an 8 yarder just before the half ended.

Rotan scored on their first possession of the second half after covering 62 yards in 5 plays. Mullins returned the kick off from the 15 to the 38 yard line. Hayes caught a 46 yard pass that gave Rotan a first and ten at the 19 yard line. Mullins picked up 5 yards over left tackle to the 14. Mark Nowlin added 3 yards to the 11 yard line and Byron Weathersbee ran around left end for the 6 points. 


