Gary Don Harkey, a Fisher County 4-H'er who selflessly donated his time in assisting the 4-H Programs of Fisher County has been named a state winner in the 4-H Santa Fe Program.

He will receive an expense paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Nov. 25-30, because of his award winning record book, announce state 4-H officials with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The trip is sponsored by the Santa Fe Railway System, which provides a total of eight trips and four \$600 scholarships to outstanding 4-H members.

Gary, 17, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Harkey of Rotan where he is a senior in high school. He is a member of the Fisher County Junior Leaders 4-H Club.

The seven-year 4-H veter-

eran has participated in many leadership experiences, including the National 4-H Citizenship Short Course and Heritage Tour in Washington, D.C. and the Texas 4-H Congress. He has served his local club as president, vice president and committee chairman.

Gary has assisted other 4-H members with grooming, showing and judging cattle at many livestock shows. He also helps others choose their show and feeder beef cattle.

Gary is a Fisher County Gold Star Boy, also won the Danforth Award and was a member of the 2nd Place Livestock Judging Team at the State 4-H Roundup.

He will receive an expense-paid trip to the American Royale Show in Kansas City, Mo. this month because of his livestock judging abilities.

Gary has competed at State 4-H Roundup the past four years in livestock judging, meats identification and entomology.

An honor student at Rotan High School, Gary is listed in "Who's Who Among American High School Students."

Linda Hoodenpyle, a Fisher County 4-H member who has become an expert at identifying and classifying insects, has been named the winner in the 4-H Entomology Program.

Linda will receive a \$50 U.S. Savings Bond sponsored by the Mobay Chemical Corp., announce state 4-H officials with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Linda's state-winning record book will be entered in national competition for a trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago and four scholarships of \$1,000

She has been a member of the Fisher County entomology team for the past three years and has competed at State 4-H Roundup, this year placing first in the state. She has also been a junior leader for entomology projects and has helped her father check crops for insects.

This past summer was a busy one for Linda as she participated in the National 4-H Citizenship Short Course and Heritage Tour in Washington, D.C. Last year she attended the Texas 4-H Congress.

In addition to entomology, Linda has conducted 4-H projects in horse, child care, beef cattle, food, clothing, horticulture, health and leadership. She has competed at county and district horse shows and horse judging and has won awards for method demonstrations in horticulture, beef and foods.

The board authorized Laurie to drill the test well to ascertain the availability of water on school grounds to be used for outside watering. Until now, the school has been pumping water from a nearby creek.

In other action, the board elected Kyle Moore to serve on the County Appraisal District Board and voted to submit Roy Noles as a candidate for an at-large member.



Youth And Law

It hasn't been so long ago that young people referred to law enforcement officers as "pigs", but now, according to a study, those days are over. A 1979 University study actually shows that young people respect the men in uniform.

"There's been a dramatic turnaround in young people's attitudes toward police," said Dr. Samuel Janus. "The 'cops are pigs' syndrome is no longer."

Dr. Janus, clinical assistant professor in the department of psychiatry at New York Medical College, undertook a survey of attitudes about police in 1974 of 3,000 people, half of them high school and college age. Then he made a similar survey last January of 2,400 people.

"We discovered that from high school age on, the young now strongly believe that the police aren't paid enough, deserve strong public support, don't get enough respect, and are the last group to be blamed for the chaos in our society."

"The young are not only 'pro-cop' but much more so in many respects than the general population of older people"

According to the survey, 50 percent of young people believe police don't get enough respect, up from 34 percent five years ago. Only 10 percent of the general population feel that way, a decrease from 16 percent in 1974.

Among young people, 65 percent believe people should assist a police officer in trouble, up from 54 percent in 1974.

Only 49 percent of today's older people believe in helping an officer in trouble.

Today 19 percent of young people believe police are not dedicated enough to their jobs, a decrease from 26 percent in 1974.

Twenty-nine percent of the general population feel that way.


Fifty-three percent of today's youth believe police are not paid enough compared to only 38 percent of the general population who believe that. And only 3 percent of the young people think police are to blame for the chaos in our society while 12 percent of the general population hold that view.

Why this dramatic turn-around of the young people? "They're looking for protection, not independence these days," said Dr. Janus.

"They are seeking a sense of order and some security. They are looking to the police as their last chance of rescue from the law of the jungle."

The kids have been robbed, molested, and mugged right on the school grounds.

"They're happy now to see a policeman."

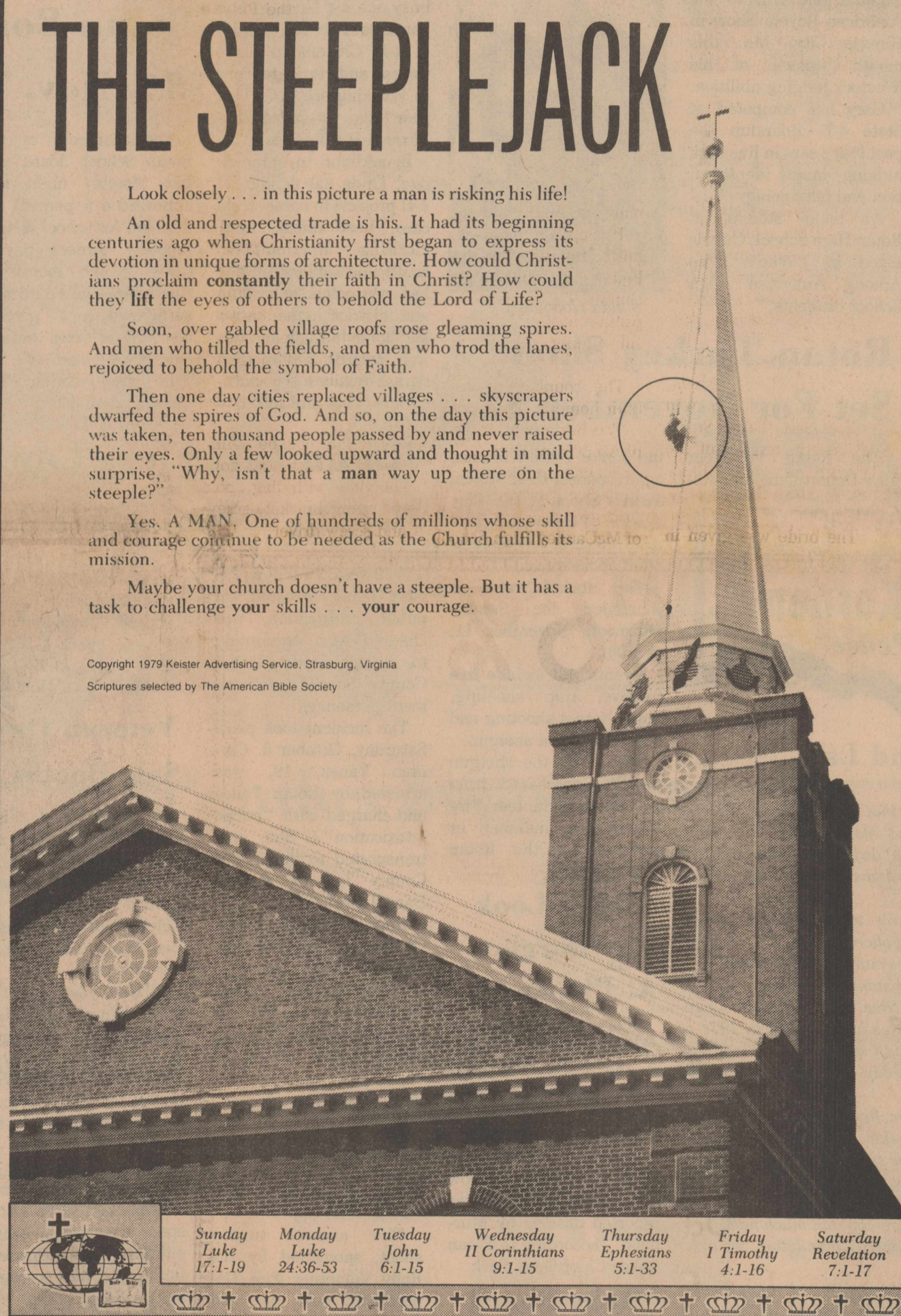

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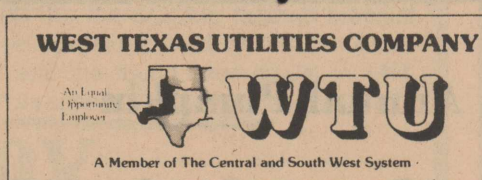

Commissioners Extend County Aging Service Contract

Fisher County Commissioners agreed to extend the contract for aging services through December 1979 after Pansy Hale, Fisher County co-ordinator and Mrs. Ann Ammons, area co-ordinator discussed several changes that are planned during the next 90 days.

The contract, signed last Tuesday by Commissioners, calls for monthly reports to be delivered to commissioners and outlines other improvements in reporting of services to

Fisher County senior citizens.

Commissioners quizzed both representatives on some of the specific programs being offered in Fisher County. Those include (1) a telephone re-assurance program, (2) counseling, (3) transportation, (4) adult and continuing education, (5) periodic health screening evaluation, (6) community service volunteer opportunity, (7) outreach program, (8) recreation, (9) escort services.

The 1980 contract comes up for approval in January.

In other action, the Commissioners directed County Attorney Rudy Hamric to notify aerial applicators at the Fisher County Airport that they were in violation of specific phases of their contract with respect to scattered debris and closing airport entrance gates.

Parker Wetsel, manager of Mid-west Electric Cooperative, appeared before

the Commissioners to discuss the joint communications building currently being shared by Mid-West Electric and Fisher County. Radio equipment for the Sheriff's Department and Mid-West transmitting equipment is stored in the building near the Roby water tower. Wetsel indicated that he had been approached by two groups requesting use of the storage facilities for private communications equipment. Commission-

ers and Wetsel agreed to draw up a contract for the two new groups, require them to share in the cost of building up-keep and set their own power meter for electricity.

In other action, G. Scherwitz of Sylvester appeared before the board asking for clarification of the status of a county road that had been closed.

In final business, the Commissioners reviewed the 1978 audit with Monte West of Snyder, auditor.

With all the injuries and sickness we had last week, it was unbelievable that the Yellowhammers could get it together to beat a good Hamlin team. Our defense played the best we've seen in many games while our offense wasn't that bad considering that about one half of the team was out or sick much of last week.

I said way back before the season started that our defense would have to be at its best to beat Hamlin this year. I believe after Friday night most will agree that our defense did not let us down. That was the first time that Hamlin has been shut out for over 2 years and, they only gained about 125 yards total offensive, which was by far the lowest they had had all year. Our team set goals for the Hamlin game, not to let Hamlin gain 150 yards rushing, 75 yards passing, 7 first downs, recover 2 fumbles, intercept 2 passes and not to let Hamlin score. Only one goal was not reached, we only recovered 1 fumble.

The defense was led by Bob McArthur, linebacker with a total of 61 points. He was followed by Willie Hays with 46 points, Eli Sepeda 36 points, Gary Harkey 32 points, Alva West 31 points, Julio Carrillo 26 points, Jeff Posey 23 points, Mike Morrow 18 points, Cecil Turner 14 points, and Wes Counts with 7 points.

The above 12 all played together to beat Hamlin 6-0. Key plays were made by Kip Pease who intercepted a pass to kill a drive deep in our end of the field, Willie Hays intercepted a crucial pass late in the game to kill another threat and Wes Counts recovered a fumble to will another drive. Dale Cox batted a pass away right before the half that could have been 6 for Hamlin, and Mike Morrow as alert to recover a fumble in the end zone four our only score.

We went into the game with the attitude that we could run right at their big people and as it worked out, we had just enough offense to beat Hamlin. I agree it wasn't anything to brag about but we still won and that's what counts when the game is over. Last year we were too open and this year we only did the minimum to keep control of the ball and not to make the mistakes we did last year. Our offense did a good job in keeping down the penalties which we only had 3 for 15 yards.

Offensively, we did not do that bad considering Mark Cade was out-weighted 100-plus pounds at nose guard. Alva West out weighed about 70 pounds at his position and Wes Counts outweighed about 40 pounds at his position. All three did an outstanding job in containing their big people. Cade graded 81 percent, West graded 72 percent and Counts graded 74 percent. Others and their offensive scores were Kip Pease 100 percent, Byron Weathersbee 87 percent, Mike Morrow 86 percent, Kieth Mullins 82 percent, Eli

Sepeda 81 percent, Cecil Turner 72 percent.

We had our worst night as far as moving the football, but you must remember, that Hamlin had a very good defense plus the fact of the injuries and sickness, we weren't full strength offensively for this game.

Lots have commented that this win was the Dist. Championship, but we cannot agree because we have 5 games left and if we let down only one game, we will probably be out of it. We must take them one game at a time and the next two weeks will be tough because we play the number one or two team picked to win the Dist., and this is Jim Ned. They haven't played up to their potential but could any week. Roscoe is getting tougher plus the fact they are open this week which allows them 2 weeks to get ready for us. It will be a demanding two weeks for us, but I think we will be ready. Physically, everyone is ready but Greg Hayes who we lost in the Robert Lee game.

Our Jv and Junior High travel to Jim Ned Thursday. Both 7th and 8th grade teams are unscored upon and look very impressive. Our JV lost a close one to Hamlin but are in good spirits this week.

The Rotan 7th grade moved their win record to three and left the loss column at zero, with a victory over Hamlin Thursday night. The score was 18 for the Hammers and 0 for Hamlin. The 7th grade has not been scored on in any of the previous three games. Rotan will play Jim Ned at 5:00 Thursday, October 11, there.

Scoring for the Hammers were Herman Lopez with two touchdowns and Charles Williams with one. Lopez caught an 18-yd. touchdown pass from quarterback Tim Carrillo in the first quarter. The second touchdown came at the end of the second quarter as Charles Williams broke over right tackle for a 8 yard score and the third touchdown was another toss from Carrillo to Lopez for 50 yards and another touchdown.

Good defense was played by Deon Sepeda, Paul Zambrano and Robert Gauna.

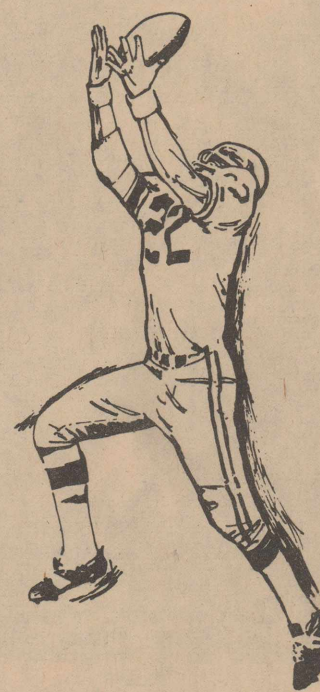
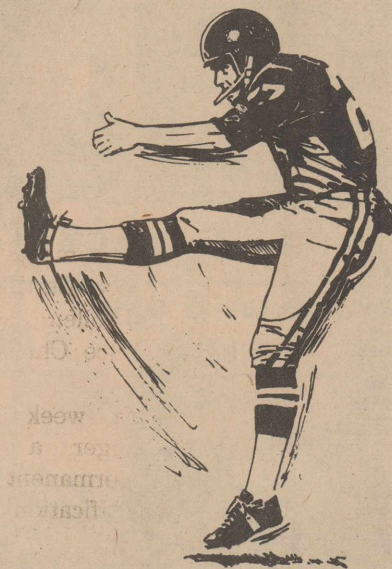

boasts some 16,200 adult leaders and more than 6,300 junior and teen leaders who give direction to specific project areas and assist 4-H members with special events and activities."

As far as 4-H projects are concerned, Texas youth are engaged in a wide range of programs that are providing meaningful learning experiences. By far the most popular project area is foods and nutrition, which is attracting more than 36,400 youth. Electric projects rank second at more than

14,370. The horse and pony project is attracting the third highest enrollment with more than 11,500, while clothing and textiles is running a close third with an enrollment of more than 11,200. Following in the top 10 listing of project enrollments are safety, creative crafts, beef, home gardens, sheep and swine.

"With the emergence of

new project areas, special interest groups and 'self-directed' programs, 4-H is reaching boys and girls from every cultural, economic and social background and is opening doors to a lifetime of personal growth and fulfillment.

That opportunity is 4-H, a youth development program for boys and girls

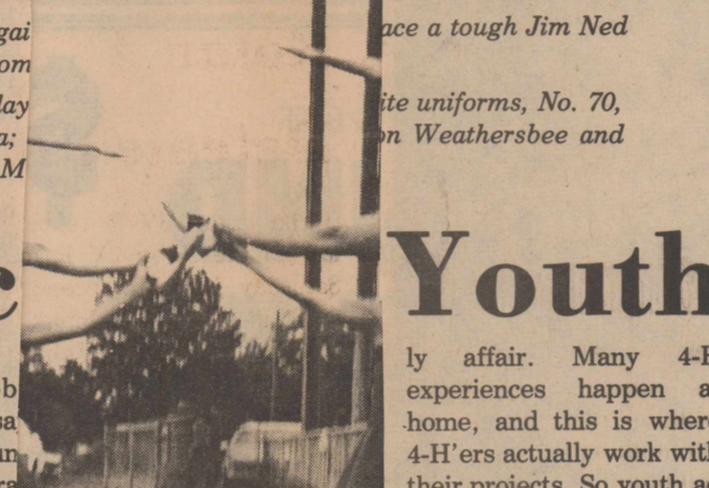
between the ages of 9 and 19 conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

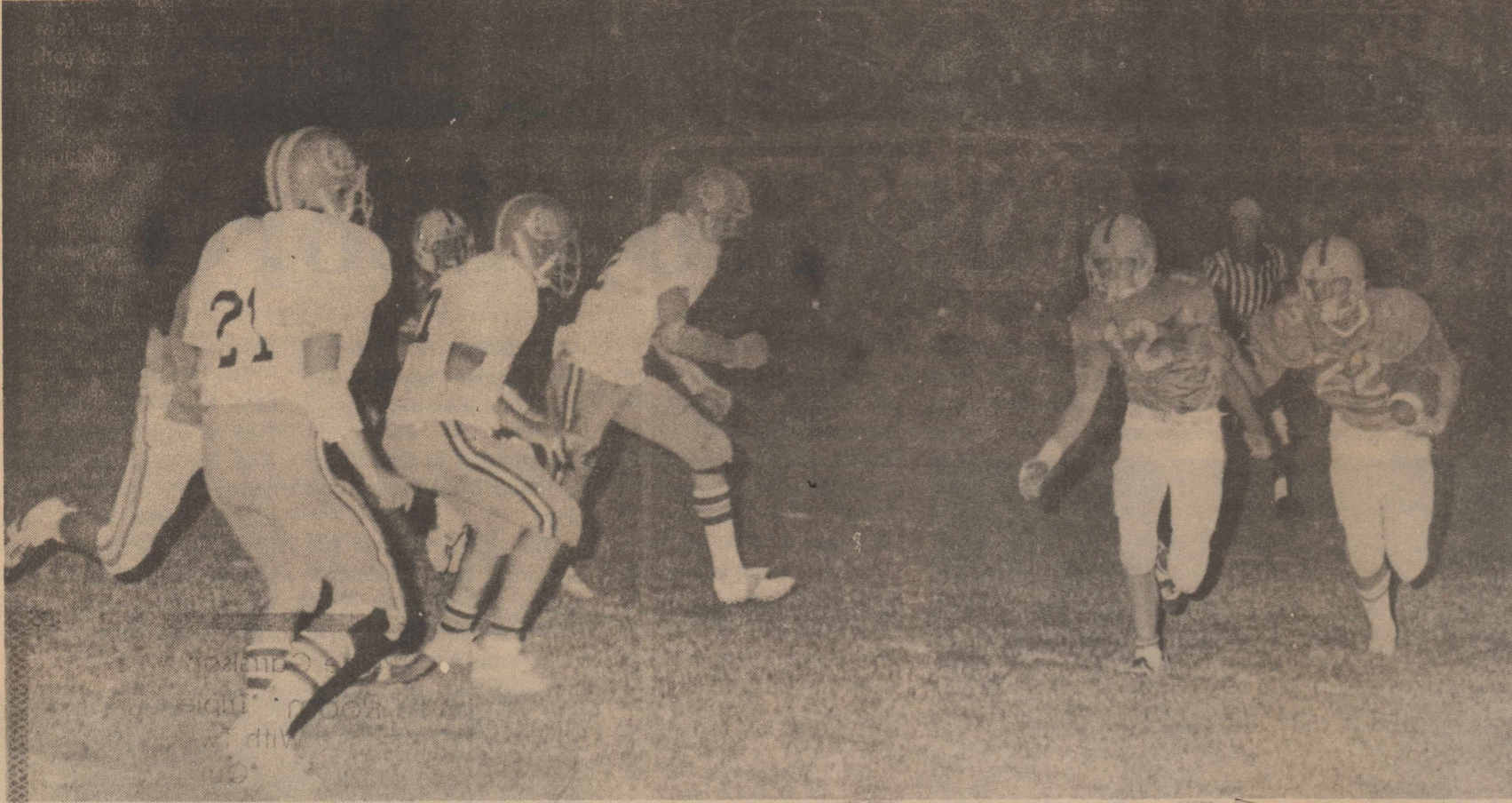

Tejas Chapter Holds Meeting In Abilene

Members of the Tejas Chapter of Colonial Daughters of the Seventeenth Century met recently at the Salad Bar in Abilene for a luncheon and program. Miss Delila Baird, Chapter President, presided at the meeting. Mrs. Kenneth G. Whisenant was in charge of arrangements.

A brief business session followed the salad luncheon. Mrs. Bernie C. McCrea introduced the speaker, Mrs. Richard Denham of Midland.

Mrs. Denham, a gifted speaker, discussed the life of Dolly Madison who is deemed the most glamorous First Lady ever to grace the White House. She was First Lady for sixteen years, serving as hostess for Thomas Jefferson from 1801 to 1809, and then for her husband, James Madison, from 1809 to 1817. James Madison and Thomas Jefferson remained close friends until death.

Dolly Madison wore clothes from Paris, France. She had beautiful feathers, ermine, satins and silks which she wore with expensive jewels. Everyone felt at ease with Dolly, and our first great American author, Washington Irving, said her parties were the most delightful of any anywhere.

Dolly was born in 1772 in Scotstown, Virginia of Quaker parents. She was named Dorthea Payne. When she was eleven years of age the Paynes moved to Philadelphia. At age eighteen Dolly married John Todd, a

young Quaker lawyer. He died in 1793 of yellow fever and left Dolly with a son, John Payne Todd.

Dolly remarried, in 1794, the shy, reserved but wise twenty-three year old James Madison who was then boarding at her mother's home. He later became a Congressman, then Secretary of State under Jefferson. During the presidency of James Madison the Louisiana Purchase was achieved, the War of 1812 with England occurred, and the Star Spangled Banner was written.

After retiring from the presidency the Madisons returned to the Montpelier Virginia Mansion where he died in 1837. After the death of her husband, Dolly returned to Washington, D.C.

Dolly Madison died in 1849 shortly after a reception at the White House. Her funeral was as elaborate as that of any President.

HOME ECONOMICS

To continue the information on what to do when your freezer stops, from last week's article, I promised to discuss emergency care and removing odors.

Generally, a full loaded, non-functioning freezer will stay cold enough to keep foods frozen for two days if not opened. In a freezer with less than half a load, food will remain frozen about one day.

If you find your freezer has stopped or the power has failed, keep it closed, use dry ice or move foods to a locker plant.

If dry ice is placed in the freezer soon after the power is off, 25 pounds should keep the temperature below freezing for 2 or 3 days in a 10-cubic foot cabinet with half a load; 3 or 4 days in a loaded cabinet.

Place the dry ice on cardboard or small boards on top of packages and do not open freezer again except to put in more dry ice or to remove it when normal operation is resumed.

If it is necessary to move food to a locker plant, use insulated boxes, blankets or thick layers to prevent thawing. Food which has been moved to the locker plant should be chilled to 0 deg. F. before moving again after your food freezer is operating normally.

Clean your freezer before refilling. Freeze thawed foods quickly. Use refrozen foods as soon as possible.

To refreeze food at home, turn the adjustable temperature control, if your freezer has one, to its coldest position. When the current comes on again, the freezer will run continuously and the food will refreeze quicker. Place the warmer packages against the refrigerated surface if possible, but place them so air will circulate around them.

After food is frozen, turn temperature control to its usual setting. If the freezer is too full, move some of the colder packages to the refrigerator, and return them gradually to the freezer.

If the food spoils in the freezer, stubborn odors may result. Wash the interior surface of the freezer with soda water, using 1 teaspoon baking soda to a quart of warm water. If the odor persists try vinegar, using 1 cup vinegar to a gallon of water.

If neither of these suggestions work, don't give up. Try using an electric fan for several hours to circulate air
