He said that the payments on the clinic building would be approximately \$18,000 a year, adding that one doctor in one month will make the yearly payment, so the clinic will not only be self supporting but will be a definite financial asset to the hospital district.

He urged the town to "get behind us and work with us in attempting to provide the finest in medical care for the residents of Fisher Coun-

The administrator also announced to the group that Dr. V. Carandang would be taking on a partner when he moves into the new Fisher County Doctor's Clinic.

Dr. Carandang will team up with Dr. Simpiao, currently practicing in Turtle Lake, North Dakota. Dr. Simpiao, like Dr. Carandang, is originally from the Philippines.

Hunsaker closed the meeting by telling the group that "We're going to have an active campaign to recruit additional doctors for Fisher County" He haven't had a place to offer them to practice, but when the new Doctor's Clinic is finished--we'll be able to make some offers to some qualified doctors" he concluded.

She stated that the building now known as the French Legion was built by Pierre Jean Isadore Alphonse Dubois de Salingy, a secretary in the French Embassy in Washington,

Tradition says that he was in love with an American heiress and hoped to further his suit by investigating the new Republic for the French Government. He sent several reports to France. the last so enthusiastic that it brought about a French-Texas Treaty in 1839 signed by King Louis Phillipe, the Texas Senate and President Lamar. The original of this treaty is in the Texas Archives, beautifully bound in blue

For his reward Salingy was made Charge de Affaires of the new mission. On his second trip to Texas he presented his credentials to President Lamar in Austin in December 1839. famous pig incident caused him to leave Texas in a huff, but he returned in 1842 at the request of President Houston.

In the meantime Albert Sidney Burleson had negotiated with Bishop Odin's agent and though he had purchased the house; so moved in only to learn of its sale to Baker. So Burleson moved out taking with him the parlor sofa, a pair of love seats and the place-chair. In 1917 Miss Emma Burleson gave the sofa to the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. In 1935 she gave the other pieces to the Governor's Mansion. the arm-chair and other place-chairs were left in the house and passed on to the Robertson family. Moseley Baker sold the house to Dr. Joseph Robertson on May 16, 1848. The Robertson family lived in the house from 1848 until World War li when Miss Lizzie Robertson closed the

house during the war. The French Legation was purchased by the State of Texas May 31, 1945 out of the remaining Centennial Funds which had been given the state by the United States. The State placed the Legation in the hands of the Daughters of the Republic of Texas. It has been restored and opened to the

Restoration had been done carefully and thoroughly. The kitchen and carriage house long since disappeared; Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Beretta contributed funds to reconstruct the kitchen, the Texas Archaelogical Department made an excavation to locate the original fireplace and a new one was built on its foundation. Furnishings are authentic for the French-American type kitchen which the original was.



We are having more and regarding microwave ovens, how to select them and how to use them. Because of the numerous calls, we are planning a microwave educational program to be offered to all interested homemakers in the near future. However, some points can be covered here, so that is what we are discussing this week.

This is an energy saving appliance if used correctly, however, too many homemakers are making the big investment, then only using it to defrost frozen foods or warm left overs. If this is the conception you have of the microwave, you will be happy to learn it has many more uses than this.

Too, I think many people think it has to set on a counter top or a cart and may be more in the way than it is useful. However, microwaves now are available incorporated into a conventional, self cleaning oven. This may be in a single oven or as one of two ovens offered in the same range cabinet. Another alternative is to have the portable microwave built into your cabinets, this can be done to look very attractive.

The microwave oven dates back to 1940 when microwaves were found to be a source of food cookery. As with all other appliances, there have been many new innovations and improvements.

When considering buying a microwave oven, many things need to be considered. The following are things to consider. How would you use it? What are family meal patterns, do family members eat at different times? Is cooking a

pleasure or something you must do in a hurry? What size is your family? Large families do not get as much use of one as smaller families because larger amounts of food take longer to cook in a microwave.

Also consider the fact that you cannot use anything containing metal, including aluminum foil in most microwaves. Therefore, if you don't already have glass, china, wood or

paper utensils for cooking in a microwave appliance, this will call for spending more money for proper

The best way to become familiar with your microwave is to read your manual, cookbook and all other instructions that accompany the appliance.

Many companies have a microwave oven today, so if you don't already have one, do some comparison shopping before buying.



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
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Inside The Lion's Den

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

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

The increase would average 10.6 percent, and for most of the co-ops would be the first increase in base rates in 15 years. Most of them have been buying power from WTU under contract initiated in 1965.

WTU, in its filing with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission in Washington, estimated that the increase would amount to \$2,261,349 in additional revenue for the Company during the 1980 calendar year.

He said the proposed rate structure is designed not only to bring charges to wholesale customers more in line with WTU's increased cost of service, service made the increase but to encourage the

This incentive is provided in a demand charge, based on a ratchet clause which allows WTU to bill these wholesalers for up to 80 per cent of their peak demands over a 12-month period and helps level costs over the year. It also gives them the opportunity to actually decrease the

unit cost of electric energy

and minimize costs to their customers by shifting load to off-peak periods.

"We chose the demand charge because we feel it will be beneficial to the co-ops and their customers and to the overall efforts to conserve energy," Sayles said.

"Without such a provision there is not incentive

or benefit for the wholesale customers to implement load management programs."

Sayles said the proposed new contract had been discussed with all of the co-op managers and their engineering consultants before the filing was made with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

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
