Author of children's books to visit schools and library

Widely known author of children's books, Bill Wallace will pay a visit to Plains Friday, May 6. He is scheduled to visit at school with grades one and two and again with grades three through six. Later that day, he will be feted with an autograph-signing party in Yoakum County Library. Time will be announced at a later date.

Author of "A Dog Called Kitty", Wallace is a native of Oklahoma and resides in Chickasha. He began teaching in 1971, after graduating with an elementary education degree from USAO. He taught fourth grade until 1974 when he earned his master's degree and began teaching kindergarten. He was principal and P.E. teacher from 1977 to 1988.

While teaching fourth grade, Wallace recalls, "I enjoyed reading good fiction to my fourth grade class. One year we had difficulty finding books to keep their interest. Since I had had some luck with articles and short stories, I decided to try my hand with a story for them to listen to. When I found how well they likes them, I began working on others."

Wallace says, "The students then talked me into sending my manuscripts to various publishers to see if someone would make us a 'real' book. 'Shadow on the Snow' was the first book I ever

wrote for my students and the third to be published. 'A Dog Called Kitty' was the third written, but the first to be published."

"A Dog Called Kitty" has received numerous awards including Oklahoma Sequoyah Children's Book Award, Texas Bluebonnet Award and Nebraska Golden Sower Award. "Trapped in Death Cave" has been recognized with the Utah Children's Book Award, Florida Sunshine State Children's Award and Wyoming Soaring Eagle Award.

Wallace studied professional writing with William Foster-Harris and Dwight V. Swain at the University of Oklahoma. He gave up teaching in 1988 to assume full time as a writer and public speaker. Prior to his visit in Plains, he will appear in Sundown, Whiteface, Denver City and Brownfield public schools.

His newest books are "Never Say Quit", published in 1993 and "River Witch", published this spring.

Book Gallery of Lubbock will be on hand during the autograph party and will have copies of Wallace's books for sale. Hardback copies will be \$13; paper back, \$3. Both prices include tax.

Sponsors of the autograph party are Tsa Mo Ga Study Club and Yoakum County Library.

Heather Bowlin wins \$125 in Lea County Electric contest

Plains to vote in City election

Plains residents will elect a mayor and two council members in a general election slated Saturday, May 7. Polling hours are 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in Plains City Hall.

Mayor T.J. Miller has placed his name for re-election. He is unopposed on the ballot. Incumbent councilmen Kent Welch and Steve Jones have filed for re-election. Pam Redman has also filed her candidacy.

Early voting may be done by personal appearance at Plains City Hall during regular working hours April 18 through May 3. Applications to vote by mail must be made to Suann Parrish, City Secretary, P.O. Box 550, Plains, TX 79355 and must be received by April 29.

Mayor appointed to TML Committee

T.J. Miller, Mayor of the City of Plains, has been appointed to the Texas Municipal League Legislative Policy Committee on Public Safety.

This committee is one of five TML Legislative Policy Committees that will meet during 1994 to assist the League in developing policy for the 1995 session of the Texas Legislature.

The Committee on Public Safety will deal with issues involving plumbing inspectors, Texas Commis-

sion on Fire Protection, animal shelters, indoor air quality and criminal justice.

Reports from this committee will be submitted to the 1994 Resolutions Committee and the TML membership for consideration during the 1994 Annual Conference.

Mayor Miller also serves on the TML Small Cities Advisory Committee and the South Plains Association of Governments Board of Directors.

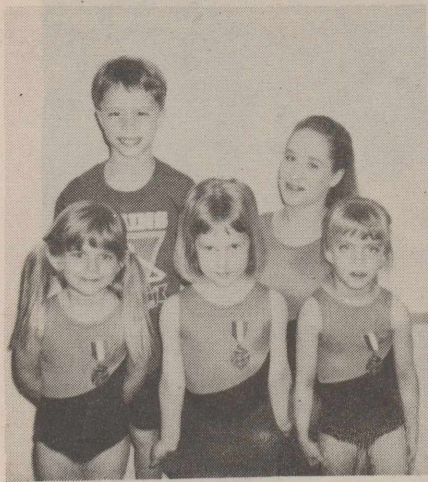

Results include a new school record for the second place finish in the 800 meter relay. Misty Willett, Rhonda Cowart, Amber Bryan and Amy Crutcher posted a 1:55.12 performance.

McMinn to teach driver's education

School board members in regular session April 11 approved the USDA Commodities Agreement for food service for the 1994-95 school year. The summer driver education program was also okayed with Larry McMinn as instructor.

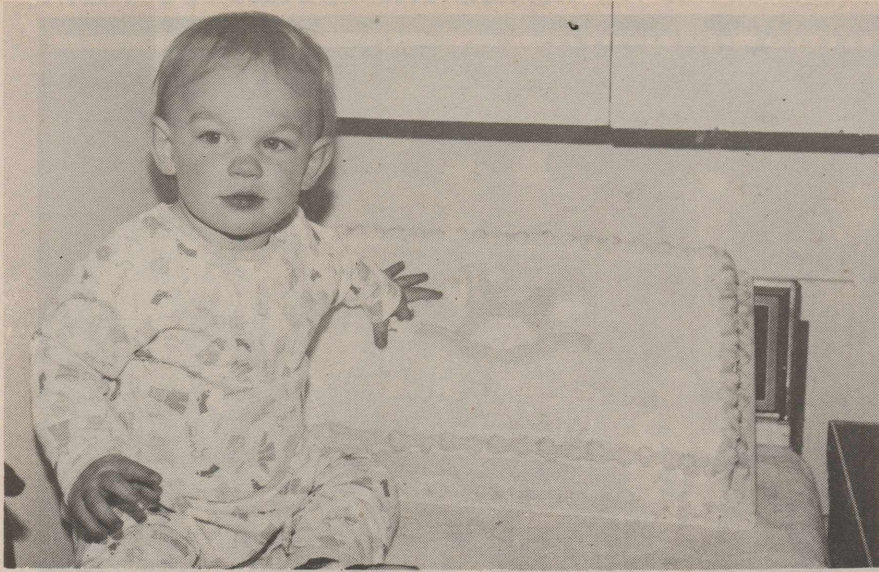

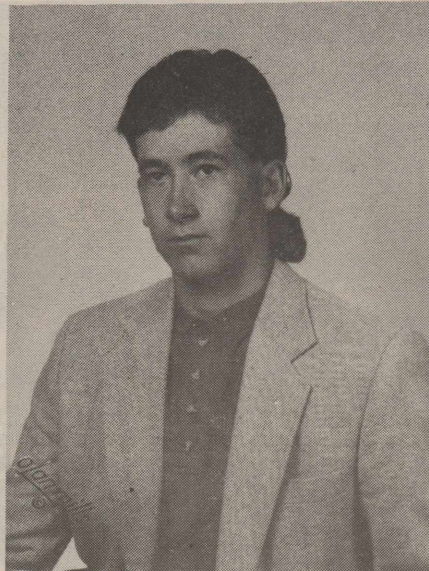
ONE-YEAR-OLD Jaaron Joseph Bell, son of Kathy and Danny Bell helps himself to a piece of his "first birthday cake".

Napkins, plates and cups were imprinted with rocking horses. Birthday cake, sandwiches, chips and relishes were served with soda pops.



Jason Wilson has been awarded the South Plains College Outstanding Student Award in auto service technology. The presentation, for the month of March, was made for outstanding achievement.

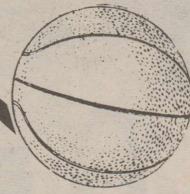

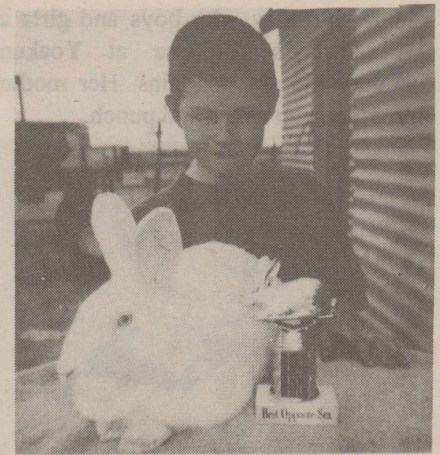

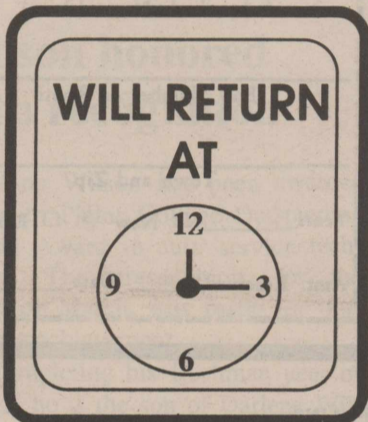
