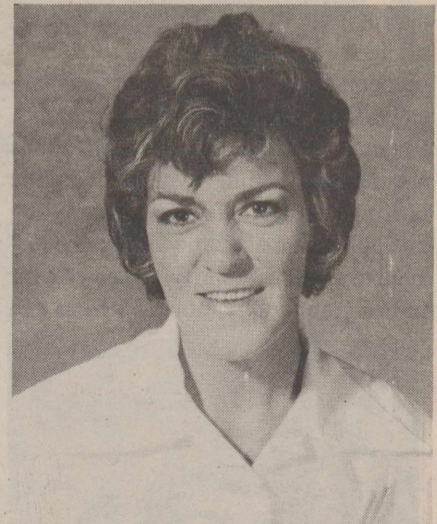
Mrs. Sue Alexander recognized as 'Outstanding Math Teacher'

This past January, the Department of Mathematics at Texas Tech University asked for nominations for outstanding mathematics teachers from area schools. Mr. Charley Chambless, Plains Elementary Principal, nominated Mrs. Sue Alexander as an outstanding mathematics teacher.

Dr. Roger W. Barnard, Professor of Mathematics at Texas Tech, made an on-sight visit to Plains where he talked with Mr. Chambless, Mrs. Alexander, her peers and her students. Upon Dr. Barnard's observations and the information provided, he and his committee awarded area Outstanding Junior Public School Mathematics Teacher Award to Sue Alexander. The award was presented at an awards banquet at the Sheraton Inn in Lubbock on April 14.

The past 19 years, Mrs. Alexander has taught math ranging in grades from fifth to eighth. It was noted that she has

endeavored to meet the individual needs of each student with genuine concern and dedication. In appreciation of Mrs. Alexander, the Plains ISD Board of Education presented her with a resolution which will become a part of the permanent record of the district in recognition of her teaching ability to motivate students to master mathematical principles.

City of Plains awarded grant for water system improvements

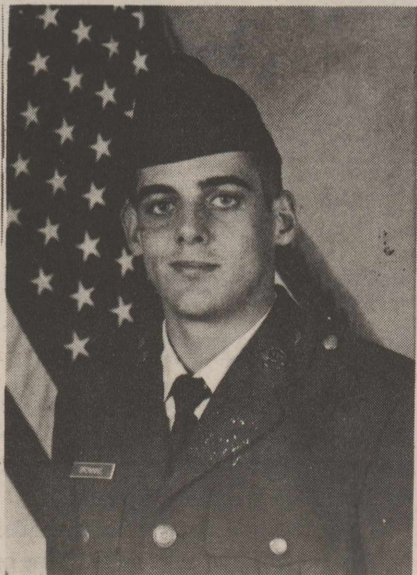
The City of Plains has been awarded a Texas Community Development Block Grant in the amount of \$250,000 for water system improvements. This grant award is made available through the Texas Community Development Program (TCDP) of the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs.

The TCDP provides Federal funds for public facility improvements, such as water, sewer and gas systems, roads and drainage, economic development, housing assistance and planning projects. These Federal funds are allocated principally to assist persons of low to moderate income. These funds are awarded following a regional competition and a state scoring process.

With this grant, the City of Plains will be able to construct a 300,000 gallon ground storage tank, secure water rights, and develop a well field for an additional water supply. Engineering and water right acquisition will begin in May with construction to begin later this summer.

The City was also awarded a 1992 TCDP grant for sewer plant improvements. Engineering and permit procurement is well underway and construction for this project should begin later this summer also.

Since 1983, the City has received approximately \$1.5 million in Federal grants through the Community Development Block Grant program for water, sewer and gas system improvements. Projects for future grant applications are currently being evaluated. Public hearings will be held prior to submitting an application and citizens are encouraged to assist in identifying projects for future grant applications. Citizens can

Turner Club begins fund-raising project

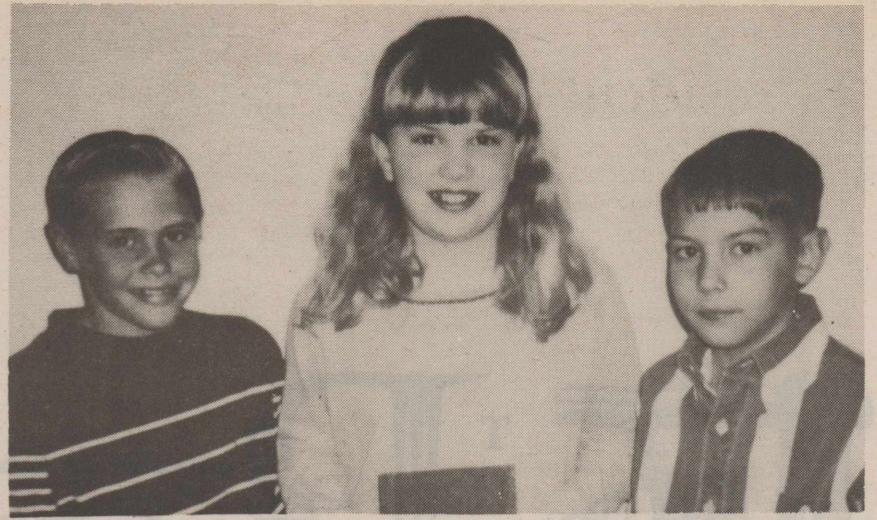
Turner Club will be at the Library on Monday, May 9 from 1:00 until 5:30 p.m. to sell assorted cutlery items.

According to a spokesperson, "these quality products are very affordable and make great gifts for any occasion - wedding, graduation, birthdays, Mother's Day, Christmas, etc."

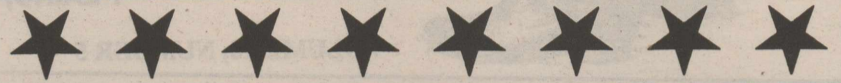
"We even have gifts that are great for the guys. So, stop by and do your shopping with us."

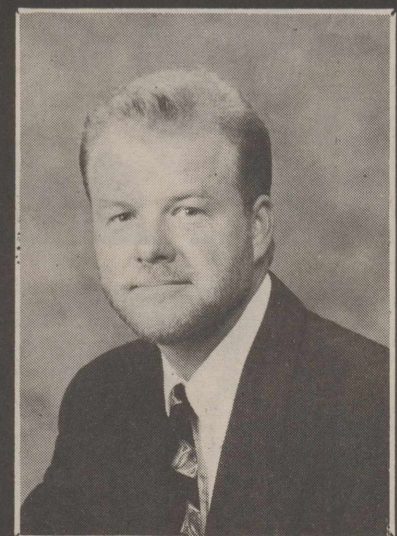

Brad Palmer elected to serve as President of Little League

The Plains Little League met at the library Thursday, April 28 at 7 p.m. to elect 1994 officers. Brad Palmer will replace Zane Johnson as president of the league, with assistance from Freddie Ramos, newly-elected vice president.

Members were informed that the District All-Star Tournament will be held in Denver City and will begin July 4.

Last season, because of a shortage of Minor League players, Plains only had a T-Ball league and a Major League team. This season the five and six-year-olds will make up the T-Ball league.

The Minor League will consist of seven, eight and nine year olds. This should ensure enough players. The Major League will be the ten, eleven and twelve year olds. This decision is subject to change on the day of sign-ups, if the number of players require it.

Sign-ups have been set for Saturday, May 7 at 10 a.m. at the Little League Park. The players fees have been set at \$15.00 per player. The players will be allowed to keep their cap and tee shirt after the season is over. Notices and applications will be sent to school to be brought home.

Guy and Karen Williams were assigned as Chairmen of the Concession Stand Committee. They will be responsible for setting up a work schedule, which will be announced at a later date.

"One problem from last year that was addressed by members was the shortage of base umpires," says Johnson. "The home-plate umpire was always available, but many times fathers of the players on the field had to be recruited to umpire the bases. The League feels that it is unfair to everyone for this to happen. A suggestion has been made that the coach and parents from the off-team (the one not playing that night) be responsible for furnishing the base umpires. This way, everyone will be able to enjoy watching their child play baseball."

In conclusion, one note for clarification, "the child's age is based on their age as of August 1, 1994.

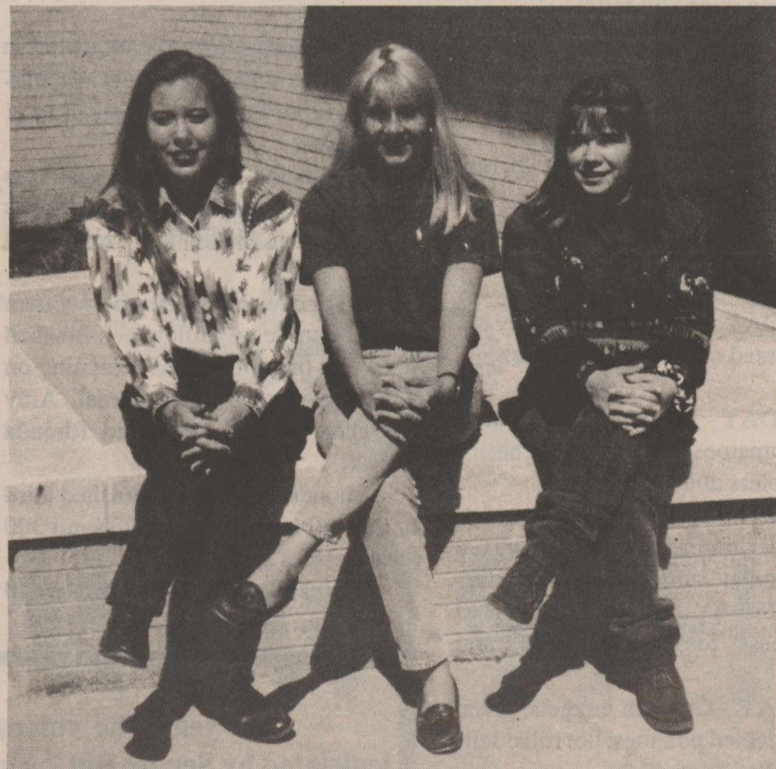

The Plains Cowgirls competed in the District 3-1A track meet and finished seventh with 50 points out of an 11 team field.

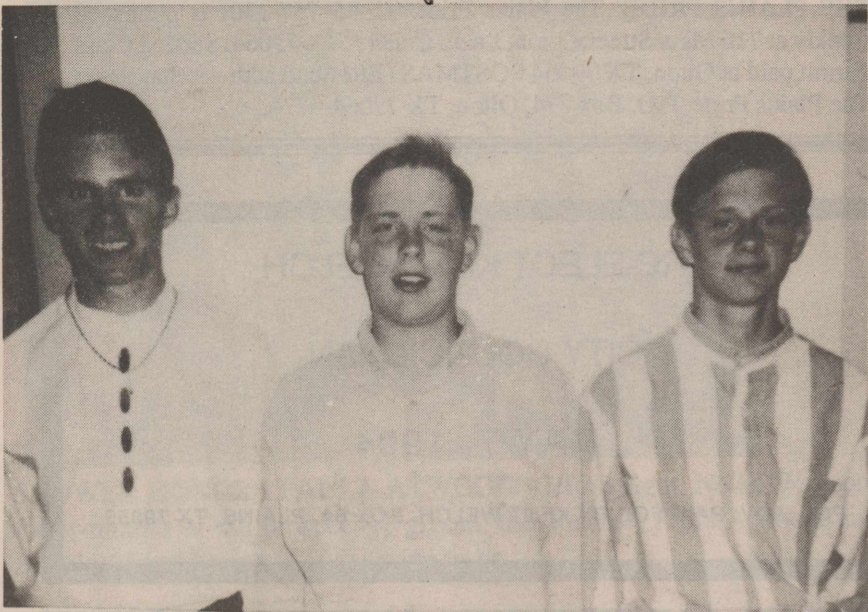

Last year, the voters of our school district approved Option 3 to reduce wealth as legislated by Senate Bill 7. Under this method, a portion of a school district's tax collections are sent directly to the state to purchase WADA from any district(s) of the state's choosing. Another means of reducing wealth is Option 4, which enables a district such as the Plains Independent School District to reduce its wealth by sending money directly to a district or districts of its own choosing. This option is more appealing this year because of recent Commissioner of Education rulings which allow more flexibility by offering the following alternatives.

1. If the voters give approval on May 7th and the board chooses to purchase WADA directly from other school districts, the contracts can be fashioned in such a way as to cause as much as 5% of the money being returned to Plains ISD. Next year this could amount to approximately \$100,000.

2. Other advantages to Option 4 would be that our board would have flexibility in choosing those districts receiving our money and require certain conditions from other districts such as a similar tax rate to ours, specific uses for the money, etc. It will be very advantageous for the Plains district board to have this flexibility. It would certainly be beneficial to have the opportunity to gain an extra \$100,000 in rebates from these partner districts. For this reason, the Plains ISD board urges its voters to vote YES to the question on the ballot allowing the board to exercise OPTION 4 in addition to the Option 3 approved last year.

Cellular Plateau announces changes in dialing process

Recent dialing changes in telephone land lines has caused Plateau Cellular Network, formerly Cellular 3, to implement 10 Digit Dialing for all their customers. The dialing change causes all phone numbers dialed by PCN customers to include an area code. Phone numbers that have been previously dialed with seven digits must now begin with the appropriate Area Code. (505 for calls in New Mexico, 806 for calls in Texas RSA 3, 915 for calls Texas RSA 12, 13 and 14.) Also, all long distance calls placed in these areas must be dialed 1 + the area code + the seven digit phone number. The dialing change will take effect on May 1 and will not effect current billing rates. It is simply a change in the way cellular calls are dialed.

New Mexico PCN customers (area code 505) are in Chavez, Colfax, Curry, De Baca, Eddy, Guadalupe, Harding, Lincoln, Mora, Quay, Roosevelt, San Miguel, Torrence and Union counties. Texas RSA 3 (area code 806) counties are Bailey, Castro, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Parmer, Swisher, Terry and Yoakum. Counties in RSA 12, 13 and 14 (area code 915) are Brewster, Crane, Crockett, Culberson, Hudspeth, Irion, Jeff Davis, Loving, Pecos, Presidio, Reagan, Reeves, Schliecher, Sutton, Terrell, Upton, Ward and Winkler.

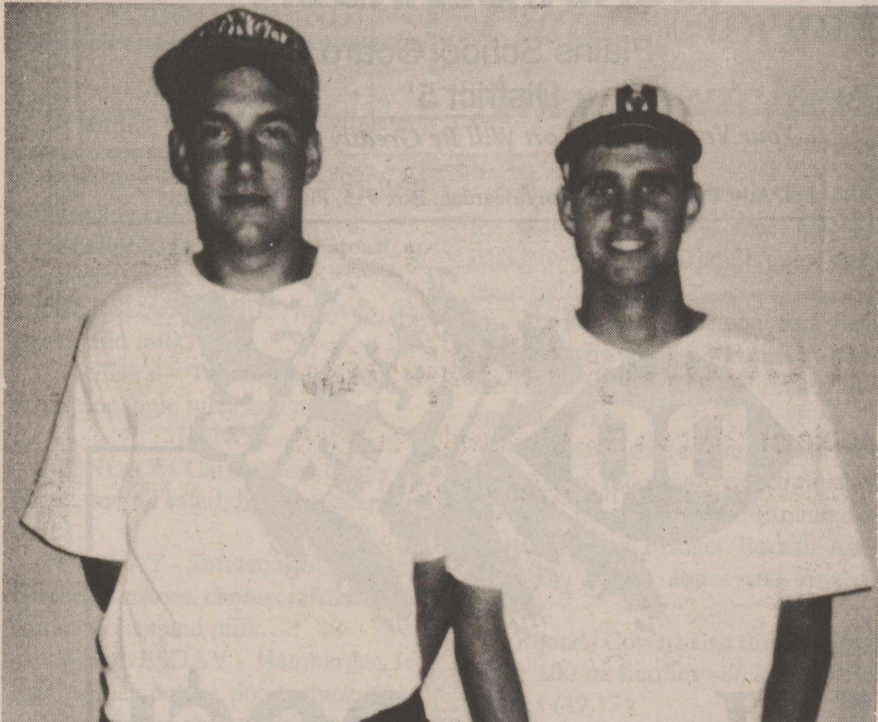

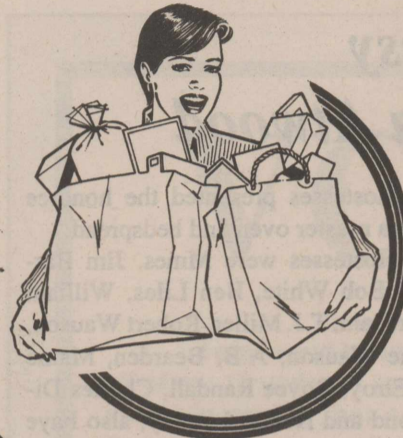
