City Manager There are times when it seems that we can get caught up in patting our-

selves on the back so much that the only thing that is accomplished is that we break our own arm in the process. Things have gone unbelievably well in the efforts made to improve the appearance and services to the citizens of Knox City, but there is much more to be done. Plans for future projects are constant and the projects that are currently underway need to be completed before we get spread so thin that nothing is accomplished.

There is a tremendous amount of work that comes with the Spring season. A seemingly endless number of lots require mowing across town, not to mention the ditches and airport. Brush chipping and hauling is constant throughout the town in the effort of everyone to get their trees and shrubs ready for the growing season. All-in-all that seems to be pretty much what is filling our days.

Sometimes it seems that the harder that we work on trying to clean up the alleys of brush and tree trimmings, the farther we get behind. The chipper and truck are running as hard and fast as they can to get everything cleaned up and they will get to your part of town eventually, just please be patient with us in our efforts on your behalf. The holes that the past winter caused in our streets continue to haunt us along with the grass that seems to grow out of every crack and crevice in our streets.

The swimming pool has been drained, cleaned and painted for refilling so that it will be ready for opening on May 26th. Oh yes, let us not forget that in between all of this the maintenance employees

blockages, and the general maintenance that is required to keep these services operational for every citizen to Knox City.

The street sweeper is currently being repaired from the accident a few weeks ago. We have no specific time frame on this repair, but as soon as it gets back, we will be putting it into full time service in our efforts to clean up our streets. Sometimes it seems that everything going on is completely overwhelming, but if we try to take it one step at a time and keep everything in perspective, we will never find the end to the work, but we will at least get it to a point that it are fixing water leaks, sewer is more manageable.

Terri Carnes graduates May 12 from Texas Tech University

Terri Carnes, daughter of Mr. and Mrs.. Charles Clark and the late Bits Whitten, graduated from Texas Tech University, Saturday, May 12, with a master of arts in museum science focusing on archaeology.

Terri received a three-year fellowship from the Museum Science department that is fully funded by a private foundation. This fully funded fellowship is one of the first in the nation and supports at three-year Collections Management program for the care and curation of the Adair-Steadman Collection.

Excavated in the early 1970s and retained at the Texas Historical Commission Austin headquarters in storage for over 25 years, the true importance of this material has not been realized due to limited research as the result of inaccessibility.

The Collection, a Folsom assemblage containing over 50,000 lithic artifacts, is from the Adair-Steadman site (41FS2) located northwest of Abilene. The Museum of Texas Tech University was recently selected for stewardship of the Adair-Steadman Collection due to its reputation for sound collection care and security measures.

The Adair-Steadman site is a major Paleoindian site dating from 10,800-10,300 years B.P., and represents the Folsom culture that inhabited the grasslands of the western half of the country, centering in the Great Plains. This culture is named after its distinctive projectile point that was first excavated near Folsom, New Mexico in 1926.

The Adair-Steadman Collection holds much date on Folsom technology that could prove invaluable in determining differences between Folsom and other Paleoindian technologies.


Known Folsom sites are distributed broadly and reflect bison Steadman, located along the Brazos River near Abilene, is a one-of-a-kind Folsom site.

Based on initial analysis, rock quarrying and the production of Folsom projectile points occurred at this site. The rare coupling of these two activities in combination with extensive documentation provides the basis for national recognition.



Groundwater legislation passed May 3

On May 3, 2001, Governor Rick Perry signed into law SB611. This legislation provided for a name change from Haskell-Knox Underground Water Conservation District to Rolling Plains Groundwater Conservation District.

The legislation also provides that the Rolling Plains Groundwater Conservation District consists of Baylor, Haskell and Knox Counties with equal representation from each county on the Board of Directors.

The signing of this bill concludes a process that began with the filing of public notice in November 2000. The bill was written by the staff of the House of Representatives Committee on Natural Resources, chaired by Rep. David Counts. The sponsors of the bill were Rep. David Counts and Sen. Tom Haywood. Their efforts allowed the legislation to move smoothly through both Houses of the Legislature, where the bill was among the first 60 bills passed in this session.








State spends \$2,502,864 for county welfare

ABILENE - The state spent a total of \$2,502,864 last year for major welfare programs in Knox County, according to Barbara Evans, Regional Administrator for the Texas Department of Human Services.

Food stamps worth \$383,194 were issued for the fiscal year which ended August 31, while Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) totaled \$64,053. Food stamps are funded entirely by the federal government, while the department determines eligibility of potential clients and nonclients and issues the Lone Star Card.

The state and federal governments share in the cost of TANF to families where needy children are deprived of support because of the absence or disability of one or both parents.

Nursing home costs of approximately \$1,696,350 were paid for aged and disabled residents. Community Care for Aged and Disabled spent \$284,730 for Medicaid related services and \$74,537 for non-Medicaid related services," Ms. Evans said.





and then transfer to a university where she can major in speech therapy. Later on she wants to go back to school and work on some psychology.




With the 77th legislative session well underway, many people are deeply entrenched in issues and going to bat for what they believe in. And considering the changing nature of our state, some of these issues are brand new to the table. But one issue in particular should not be new to anyone. It's redistricting: every 10 years we expect it, and every 10 years we expect it to cause a stir.

Redistricting is the revision of the geographic boundaries of legislative, congressional and judicial districts. Every 10 years following the U.S. Census, the Legislature takes up this ssue, and the boundaries are redrawn to keep equal representation based on population. Districts must have equal or nearly equal representation and they must be drawn in an unbiased manner. This session is important to rural Texas because we could end up losing this much-needed representation, which is key to preserving agriculture and rural development. The math is clear, rural Texans are outnumbered with 85 percent of the state's residents located in or around urban areas. That is why we hope rural interests as well as agricultural interests are represented when the Texas Legislature redraws district lines for state and federal offices.

Brian Correll graduates from Texas A&M, works on NASA project headed for Mars

Brian Correll, a Knox City High School graduate and son of Brenda and Sonny Correll, graduated Friday, May 11, 2001, from Texas A&M University in College Station. Commencement was held at the Dwight Look College of Engineering.


Brian's major was electrical engineering with specialties in electric power and computer engineering. His overall GPA was 3.402 with his in-major GPA at 3.85.

One of the projects Brian participated in at Texas A&M was the Mars project, known as MARIE (Mars Radiation Environment Experiment). This project is led by NASA's Johnson Space Center and is 'designed to characterize aspects of the radiation environment both on the way to Mars and in the Martian orbit'.

The mission was launched on April 7, 2001, and is scheduled to arrive in Mars orbit on October 23, 2001. This mission will last approximately one Mars year which is about 29 Earth months. Once the orbiter is in the Mars orbit, it will circle the planet once every 25 hours. Over the next 76 days, the spacecraft will gradually edge closer to Mars until it reaches a 2-hour science-mapping orbit for 917 Earth days and will also serve as a communications relay for U.S. and international landers arriving at Mars in 2003/ 2004.

The NASA website, http:// mars.jpl.nasa.gov/odyssey/technology/marie.htlm says that 'the experiment will attempt to predict anticipated radiation doses that would be experienced by future astronauts and help deter-

mine possible effects of Martian radiation on human beings'. This would be basically used to measure cosmic radiation levels during a trip to Mars. These radiation detectors are also being used on the International Space Station.

The original mission of these detectors was to measure the types of radiation and the radiation levels on the surface of Mars. For whatever reason, the Mars lander mission was cancelled; however, NASA decided to use these on this current orbiting mission. This mission is using several different types of radiation detectors, one type is the one that Brian helped build.

The project began through a professor in nuclear engineering, Dr. Les Braby, and the Nuclear Science Center (NSC). Dr. Braby acquired the project from NASA and had the NSC build the electronic circuit boards, like shown above.

The radiation detectors are controlled by circuit boards and the output is sent to the onboard computer that will relay the date back to Earth. The NSC had the individual circuit board fabricated and Brian was responsible for soldering all of the electronic components onto them. The boards are very small and the electronic components are even smaller. There are approximately 50 components on the visible side of the circuit board. Another complete board on the bottom with at least the same number of components was assembled.

In addition to this project, Brian worked on the Texas A&M Motorsports Solar-Powered Racecar that is scheduled to race from Illinois to California in July of this year.

Since his graduation from Texas A&M, he will be an electrical engineer at Callaway Nuclear Power Plant in Fulton, Missouri.




