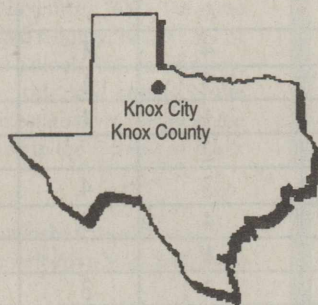

The class members voted to have their next reunion in five years - 2006.

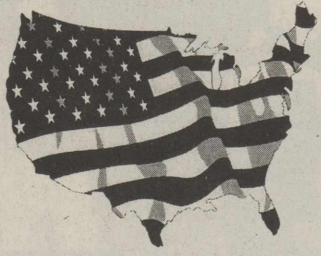

County sheriff issues appeal to businesses

Responding to the increasing number of businesses wanting to assist law enforcement officials and build a stronger partnership in the fight against crime, Sheriff Dean Homstad announced that Knox County businesses are being invited to become members of the Sheriffs' Association of Texas. Membership appeals will go out in the mail shortly. The funding provides critically important technical resources, training and legislative support on key criminal justice issues.

In addition, dues will be used to support crime prevention and awareness programs, promote public safety, fight drug abuse, provide additional training for sheriffs and their deputies and provide scholarships for children of law enforcement officers. "With government funding becoming increasingly difficult to secure, the Business Membership drive has taken on greater importance than ever before," Sheriff Homstad said. "The funding is vital to helping us carry out our mission of making our communities safer places to live, work and play."

The Business Membership Program was begun to provide businesses with an opportunity to lend support to more effective law enforcement and to better help local sheriffs protect the lives and property of citizens. "As the need for building stronger public-private law enforcement partnerships in this county continues to escalate, programs such as this continue to grow in importance," Homstad said. "I encourage every business receiving a membership appeal to consider joining forces with us by becoming a Business Member. It is a valuable investment in our future."

A Golden Time

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Researchers at Harvard have known for some time that Down Syndrome patients who survive past 30 tend to develop brain lesions & dementia like Alzheimer's Disease suffers. Downs patients are extremely sensitive to the pupil dilating drug tropicamide, use by ophthalmologists to look inside a patient's eyes. Using the drug on the eyes of Alzheimer's patients found that the eyes of those people dilated 13% vs only 4% for a control group of non Alzheimer's people.

Work has finally resumed on the cemetery fence. With the brick being laid and preparations being made to start erecting the iron fence that will be the single greatest compliment to this facility since it was originally established. Many of you have contributed to this effort, but there continues to be a need for your help. For us to achieve the results that we have in mind, it will require many more hours of work and your financial support. Once these goals are reached it is the desire of the City Council to establish a cemetery association that can oversee the operations and maintenance of the facility. This will give anyone who is interested the opportunity to take an active part in the continued operation of the cemetery which is a very important part of our community from a historical aspect as well as being the final resting place of those who have been so important to us in the past.

Maintenance demands continue to keep everyone busy. The patching machine is making progress across town filling in the holes in our residential areas. Due to the fact that nearly every street is in need of attention, we have not established any priority areas beyond what has been repaired. The operators are starting at one end of town and trying to systematically cover every street in town. Once we have the holes filled, the City Council will provide us with a priority list of streets for complete coverage and we will begin with those in the greatest need combined with the greatest traffic. Eventually every street will get covered including some of our streets that have never been paved. This obviously will not happen quickly because on top of trying to run the patching machine, we are expected to repair water and sewer problems, try to find the time to run the brush chipper through the alleys in an effort to keep them cleared, dispose of dead animals around town, along with the seemingly endless list of daily activities that go along with keeping our town operating.

One of the biggest challenges that I have before me at this time is to find someone to work in the maintenance department. The City desperately needs a qualified individual who can operate the equipment that is used on a daily basis. If you know of someone who can operate a backhoe, loader, tractor and shredder along with some specialized equipment that is in service for the City, Please have them contact City Hall for an application. If you do not have all of the qualifications described in the position announcement you find in the classified ads, it will be difficult if not impossible for us to consider you for employment.

Finally, the City of Knox City wishes to thank Mrs. Doris Crownover for her many years of dedicated service to the Chamber of Commerce and welcome Mrs. Sheri Baty into her position as the new manager of the Knox City Chamber of Commerce. We have all been fortunate to have people in this community that are willing and able to keep Knox City moving forward and I believe that Sheri will prove to be one of the true leaders of our community. 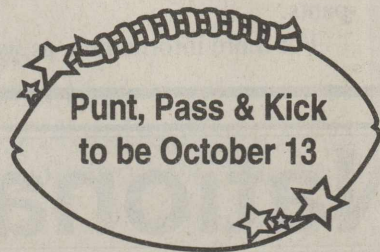

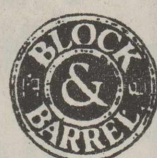

Criminal docket is a busy in district court

Last week was a busy one on the criminal docket of the 50th Judicial District, with action in all four counties - Baylor, Knox, Cottle and King counties, according to District Attorney Bill Neal.

Called for arraignment and/or pretrial in the Baylor Co. District Court were John Julius McKinney of Goree, charged with felony DWI; Shedric Fulbright, Seymour, Possession of Controlled Substance with Intent to Deliver; Henry Thomas Bruhn, Olney, Possession of Controlled Substance with Intent to Deliver; Otis Dixon, Seymour, Possession of a Controlled Substance; David Morris of Taylor, Theft over \$200,000.00; Christopher Hendrix of Seymour, Credit Card Abuse and Fraudulent Use of ID Information; Billy Joe Scott Perez of Seymour, Forgery; Raymond Flores, Seymour, Murder; Johnny Morrison, Seymour, Murder; and Jerry Grimes Jr., Seymour, Murder.

In the Knox Co. District Court on Wednesday, Kimberly Rene Smith, 23, of Merkel, plead guilty to indictment charging her with Intoxicated Manslaughter. She received a 10 year probated sen-

tence, with the special condition that she be admitted in the substance abuse felony punishment facility, by District Judge David Hajek. Other defendants called for pretrial were Eddy DeLosSantos of Knox City, Assault and Linda Lee Jenkins of Seymour, Felony Theft.

Thursday in the Cottle Co. District Court, Julio Gallardo, 48, of Paducah plead guilty to indictment charging him with Unauthorized Use of a Motor Vehicle. Gallardo was given a five year probated sentence, \$500.00 fine and court costs. Entering a plea of guilty in the Cottle Co. Court was Eulogio Martinez Guerrero, 69, of Abilene. Guerrero plead guilty to felony DWI and was placed on a 10-year probated sentence. Guerrero also has to serve a mandatory 10-day jail sentence. In the King County Court, a pretrial hearing was held for Joshua Seth Bortnick of Tuscon, charged with Possession of Marijuana over 50 pounds but under 2000.

Rep. Counts: Voting reforms ensures all ballots count

AUSTIN - On November 6, Texas voters will go to the polls to determine the outcome of 19 proposed amendments to the state constitution. Last spring, legislators in Austin developed solutions to ensure that no Texan faces an obstacle to voting. Rep. David Counts (D-Knox City) encourages all Texans to head to the polls and exercise their rights.

Following the presidential election last fall, states across the country were alerted to potential problems with election systems. To ensure that every Texan has the opportunity to cast a ballot fairly and without intimidations, the Texas legislature enacted several new election reforms.

Among those revisions were the creation of a toll-free hotline that voters may use to report irregularities or problems at a polling location. Election administrators are required to post this number prominently at each voting location. The hotline will give voters a place to turn if they experience unfair or even intimidation behavior from an election supervisor.

The legislature also enacted legislation that requires counties

to verify the accuracy of voter lists produced by private companies. Often times, counties contract with private companies to cross-reference numerous databases, such as arrest records and credit reports, to produce lists of individuals who are "likely ineligible" to vote. These individuals were often automatically purged from the voter rolls prior to this legislation. Now, counties must double check a person's eligibility before denying them a ballot.

Legislators also directed the Secretary of State to conduct a full-scale review of every county's

voting system to find irregularities and problems. The Secretary of State is also required to determine to effectiveness of adopting a uniform election standard for the entire state.

Rep. Counts reiterated the importance of casting ballots in the election this fall. Texans can vote early from October 22 through November 2 and they can submit a ballot by mail through October 30.

Finally, Rep. Counts reminds voters that if they do not vote early or submit a mail ballot, vote on Election Day - November 6.
