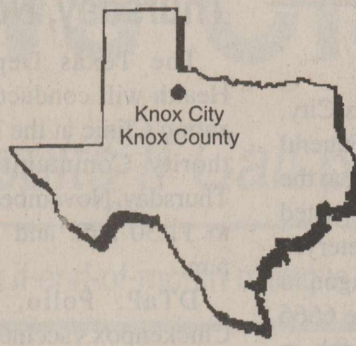

'Hounds clip Yellowhammers, 39-6

Weather a big factor in last Friday night's district game against Rotan

Once again, the Knox City Greyhounds ran their way to another district victory last Friday night, despite a whole lot of slipping and sliding along the way. Playing in weather that was best described as 'awful', the 'Hounds and Yellowhammers turned the center of the field at Greyhound Stadium into a muddy bog.

Knox City lit up the scoreboard first with 2 points from a safety, then senior Scooter Thompson added 18 points in a row with touchdown runs from 27, 6, and 4 yards. Rotan managed one score in the game that came off a 3 yard run by Presley Gasper early in the second quarter. The 'Hounds continued their domination of the game with touchdowns by senior Dominique Collier on a 35 yard run, senior Sedrick Roberson on a 6 yard run, and senior Kendrick Green on a 20 yard pass reception from Sedrick Roberson.

The Greyhounds picked up an impressive 269 yards on the ground from 36 rushing plays, and added another 85 yards through the air with quarterback Sedrick Roberson completing 5 out of 8 passes with 1 touchdown. Still hampered by yellow flags littering the field, Knox City was penalized 12 times for 85 yards.

The Rotan Yellowhammers ran for 151 yards on 45 carries and picked up another 11 yards through the air with quarterback Dave Mullins throwing 8 times with 2 completions and 1 interception.

The win last Friday night advanced KC to a perfect 4-0 district record.

Greyhounds travel to Munday this Friday for District Championship

Tied with perfect district wins of 4 wins each and no losses, the Knox City Greyhounds and the Munday Moguls will square off this Friday night, November 8, in Munday for the final game in District 9A. Even though both teams will advance into the playoffs, this all important game will decide who will advance in the playoffs as the District Champion and who will advance as the District Runner-Up.

With the kickoff scheduled for 7:30 p.m., Knox City fans are urged to get to the game as early as they can if they desire a seat in the smaller capacity visitors bleachers. Always a hostile environment for visiting teams, Munday's football stadium is sure to be packed with a standing room only crowd on Friday night. Even though fans from both communities are solidly behind their teams, the annual 'Battle of Highway 222' always draws a larger than normal attendance.

Both the Greyhounds and the Moguls have strong running and passing games, and both defensive units have done a fine job of stopping their opponents during the last four district games. In spite of pre-season rankings that showed Hamlin, Knox City and Munday to be the top three teams in district 9A, Hamlin was eliminated with losses to both the Greyhounds and Moguls.

Knox City fans attending the game are reminded to wear red or blue and be prepared to make as much noise as possible when the Greyhounds are on defense.

Taking place in the downtown business area, the pep rally will also feature the KCHS Greyhound Pride band, and the cheerleading squads from both Knox City High School and O'Brien Middle School. Another renowned squad will also be on hand to help with the cheers, but their name was not released as of our press deadline here at *The Knox County News*. A fireworks display is also planned.

Gold Star Mother to place memorial wreath at County Veteran's Memorial

Knox County Veteran's Day ceremonies to take place on Saturday and Monday in Benjamin

Mrs. Manuela Rios of Knox City will place the memorial wreath at the Knox County Veterans Memorial Service on Veterans Day, November 11, 2002.

The Gold Star mother will represent all the parents and families of the 65 Knox County veterans whose names are on the memorial arch.

Her son, Sp/4 Paul Rios Jr., was killed in action at 2:05 p.m., May 25, 1970 while serving with Company C, 299 Engineer Battalion, 937th Engineer Group, 18th Engineer Brigade in the Vietnam conflict.

He is buried in the Knox City cemetery.

Paul Rios Jr. was born February 18, 1949 in Knox City to Pablo Paul DeLos Rios and Manuela (Gonzales) DeLos Rios. He attended Knox City schools, was a member of the Catholic church, and was employed at Bob's Super Save Grocery over a year before entering the U.S Army June 24, 1969.

Rios took basic training at Ft. Bliss, Texas with Company E, 2nd Battalion, Second Brigade, and completed combat engineer training

with Company A, 32nd Battalion, First Brigade, Ft. Leonard Wood, Missouri, on October 24, 1969.

He left for Vietnam November 17, 1969.

Paul Jr. is not the only Rios listed on the 2,564 name Knox County memorial. His father, Paul Sr., served in World War II. He was in Battery B, 958th Field Artillery, U.S. Army.

Paul Sr. was inducted at Abilene, Texas, November 30, 1942 and was discharged at Ft. Bliss November 16, 1945. He served in Italy at operations at Naples, Foggia, Roma, Arno, and Po Valley, receiving the EAME Campaign ribbon and a WW II Victory Medal.

Mrs. Rios will place the wreath at the 11 a.m. Benjamin ceremony honoring all Knox County veterans, Monday, November 11, 2002.

The Rios and Gonzales families plan a family ceremony at the Memorial on Saturday, November 9, at 2 p.m. with a meal after at the Benjamin Ex-Students Center.

John R. and Frances Munoz, close family friends of the Rios family,

have done much of the organizational work for the Saturday event.

They report over 150 adults have pre-registered for the day, not counting the children. Many are planning to stay over for the Veterans Day service at 11:00 a.m., on Monday, November 11.

Counts loses State House seat

In late breaking news following Tuesday's elections, Texas State Representative David Counts of Knox City heard the very sad news that he lost his re-election to the Texas House, representing District 68.

Campaigning in new territory this election, Counts' old district was divided up by the state's realignment of districts earlier this year. He was forced into a race with incumbent, Rick Hardcastle of Vernon. The new district is comprised of Baylor, Clay, Cooke, Cottle, Dickens, Foard, Hardemon, Haskell, Jack, King, Knox, Montague, Motley, Throckmorton, Wilbarger and Young counties.

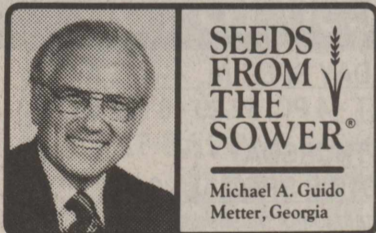

Veteran's News

Readjustment Counseling Service

The Texas Veterans Commission is always in need of qualified referral sources for veterans and their dependents for a wide variety of needs. One of these sources in Texas is the VA's Readjustment Counseling Program - "The Vet Center."

Vet Centers were established by Congress in 1979 to provide services to Vietnam Era veterans and dependents. The program has been expanded in size, scope and services since then. There are 206 Vet Centers nationwide with at least one located in each of the fifty states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. Texas now has thirteen Vet Centers with a staff of over 60 veteran counselors, social workers, sexual trauma counselors and psychologists.

The goal of Readjustment Counseling is to provide veterans and their dependents a community based location to resolve war and sexual related trauma issues and help them return to a successful civilian life.

Counseling assistance can include individual, family and group therapy in the areas of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD), social services, employment, education, veterans benefits, substance abuse and sexual abuse counseling. The Vet Centers may also provide readjustment counseling services in areas where there are no Vet Centers through contract private health care.

Any veteran is eligible who served during a wartime or conflict zone period and received an 'other than dishonorable' discharge. These periods include World War 11 (Dec 7, 1941 to Mar 2, 1946), Korea (June 17, 1950 to July 27, 1954), Vietnam (Feb 28, 1961 to May 7, 1975), the Gulf War (Aug 2, 1990 to a date to be determined) and the campaigns in Lebanon, Grenada, Panama, Somalia, Bosnia, Kosovo and Afghanistan.

Vietnam era veterans who did not serve in Vietnam are also eligible, provided they request services at a Vet Center before January 1, 2004.

County Veterans to be honored November 11 in Benjamin

Veterans of Knox County will be honored at an 11:00 a.m. program at the Knox County Veterans Memorial, Monday, November 11, 2002.

The Knox County Historical Commission is interested in information about veterans of all wars and conflicts. Those with letters, war souvenirs, and other memorabilia are invited to display them in the courthouse on November 11. A table will be set aside to display photographs of veterans.

A hamburger, beans and cobbler meal will be served at noon that day at the Benjamin Ex-Stu-

dents Center to help support ongoing projects related to the Veterans Memorial. These include engraving additional names and the collection of information about each veteran for their future book. A search through the 1966 Knox County History provides information wanted about Knox County veterans. The following is an example.

In World War I, Michael Watson Perry served in the "36th Infantry" of the 90th Division while his brother, Charles Stuart Perry was in the Quarter Master Corps, U.S. Army. Sending the two brothers to service was not all

the J.J. Perry family contributed to the war effort. The two girls in the Perry family entered government service in Washington, D.C. in September 1918. They were Katie Finch (Dorothy) and Elizabeth (Bess) Perry.

Plans were underway for a new hospital building at Knox City when the U.S. entered the war and many doctors and nurses were called by the army, delaying the building of a county hospital until 1926. Rufus McClain and Henry Jones bought a Knox City drug store in 1916, but in 1917 they closed their store to answer Uncle Sam's call to WWI.

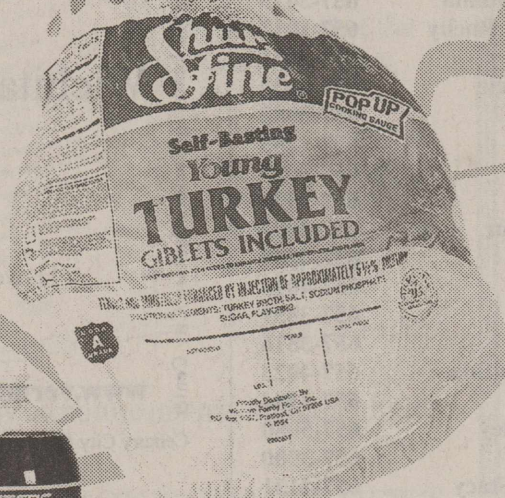

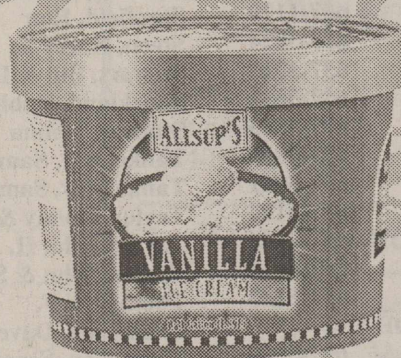

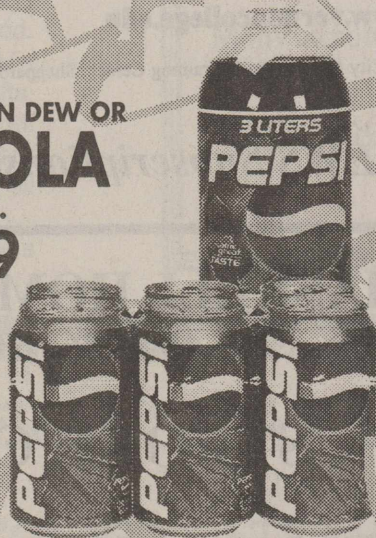
