

50th anniversary of Knox City tornado nears, special story planned in March

Deadly tornado struck the area on Friday, March 13, 1953

On March 13, 2003, 50 years will have passed since the killer tornado of 'Black Friday' struck Knox City and the surrounding area. The tornado struck at 2:17 p.m. on Friday, March 13, 1953, leaving four dead here in town, two dead in O'Brien, and nine dead in the outlying areas.

Thanks to Bill Baker, *The Knox County News* has received newspaper clippings, stories, and photographs preserved from that fateful day. Both in remembrance of that day 50 years ago, and as a reminder that another tornado season is rapidly approaching here in West Texas, *The Knox County News* will run a special feature on that long ago storm in our Thursday, March 13 edition.

In order to make this story as complete as possible, we are asking residents who also have pictures to bring them in prior to Monday, March 10, so we can scan them for use in the story.

Critical pre-season decisions are now facing Munday Little League

Meeting set for February 27, 7:00 p.m.

A crucial meeting of the Munday Little League is set for Thursday, February 27, at 7:00 p.m. in the fellowship hall of the First Baptist Church in Munday.

"Critical decisions need to be made," league president Jay White said, "about the future of youth baseball in Munday as we now know it."

According to White, more 12 year old players left the league after last year than will be able to be replaced by nine year olds coming into the league this year. "We have to take a realistic look at our options and make a decision that will benefit our kids who want to play baseball," White said.

Options that will be discussed at the meeting include either disbanding one of the existing four teams from the Munday league; expanding the league's boundaries

to encompass Knox City and O'Brien; or leaving Little League Baseball all together and entertaining the Texas Teenage League.

"Over the past few years, only a handful of interested parents have attended our annual meeting. Decisions of the magnitude which now face Munday Little League need to be made by a community and not by just a few people. For the sake of your kids I urge anyone interested to attend this meeting," White said.

Also on the agenda for the meeting will be a review of new regulations imposed by Little League Baseball and the election of the governing board of Munday Little League.

Officers will be elected from the board for the 2003 baseball season.

the paperwork requirements, including the federal FAFSA forms that have to be completed before their child walks on to a college campus for the first time.

Along with Mr. Lowe and KCHS Counselor Bettye Moore, a representative from Vernon College will be on hand to conduct the workshop.

Carole Keeton Strayhorn, Contralora de Texas, se ha convertido recientemente en el primer oficial del estado que comenzará a abordar el déficit proyectado de \$1.8 billones del presupuesto. Strayhorn va a reducir el de su propia agencia por un valor de \$5 millones para el resto de este año fiscal, que termina en agosto.

"Los contribuyentes de impuestos de Texas no tienen una corriente mágica de dinero cayendo del cielo en los momentos difíciles; como tampoco hay corrientes mágicas para el gobierno," dijo Strayhorn.

Los cortes representan casi el seis por ciento del presupuesto anual de la oficina de la Contralora.

Los cortes en los presupuestos incluyen la congelación de empleos, que ahorrará aproximadamente \$950,000, agregados a la congelación de los salarios que ahorrará \$800,000 adicionales de los gastos de la agencia.








Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn recently became the first state official to start tackling a projected \$1.8 billion budget shortfall. Strayhorn will cut about \$5 million from her agency's budget for the rest of this fiscal year, which ends in August.

"Texas taxpayers don't have a magic stream of money raining down on them in tough times; there's no magic stream for government either," Strayhorn said.

The cuts are nearly six percent of the Comptroller's office annual budget.

Budget cuts include a hiring freeze that will save approximately \$950,000, coupled with a salary freeze that will shave an additional \$800,000 off the agency's expenditures.





LEGAL NOTICE

On February 6, 2003, VALOR Telecommunications of Texas, LP (VALOR) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to establish surcharges to recover lost revenues and increased costs associated with seven hundred thirteen (713) Expanded Local Calling Service (ELCS) routes implemented in and between VALOR's Texas telephone exchanges and in many instances, exchanges of other local telephone companies. The application is filed based on the Commission's Substantive Rule 26.221 titled, "Applications to Establish or Increase Expanded Local Calling Service Surphages"

ELCS expands a local calling scope to include one or more additional telephone exchanges, if customers in a petitioning exchange approve by ballot, the payment of an ELCS fee in lieu of long distance charges. The costs and lost revenues associated with VALOR's surcharge application are those not recoverable through the ELCS fee.

In the application, VALOR proposes to implement on an interim basis a monthly per line surcharge of \$.99 for residential cus tomers and \$1.98 for business customers beginning with the April, 2003 bill cycle. This proposed surcharge will apply in addition to any monthly ELCS fees. If rates at or above the level of the interim surcharges are not ultimately approved by the Commission, VALOR will refund all or part of the interim surcharges, as directed by the Commission. Ultimately, VALOR seeks approval of monthly surcharges of \$3.38 for business lines and \$1.69 for residential lines to replace the interim surcharges. Additionally, the application proposes that customers currently billed ELCS fees lower than \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line, will have those fees raised to \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line.

The net annual effect on the revenues of VALOR will be zero since the requested surcharge replaces lost revenues and reim burses VALOR for the increased cost of service associated with ELCS. The estimated total lost revenues and increased costs VALOR seeks to recover through this proceeding is \$7,601,145 annually.


