

Home opener: Anson 31, Knox City 19

(NEWS digital photo) Even though the Greyhounds gained 145 yards on the ground and another 196 through the air, the KCHS Greyhounds were unable to pull off a win against the Tigers from Anson last Friday night at the home opener here in Knox City.

Anson and Knox City both scored in the first quarter, but the 'Hound extra point had Knox City leading 7-6 at the half. The third period had Anson scoring 18 points and KC scoring another 6. Both teams scored again in the fourth and Anson's extra point kick put them ahead for the game ending score of 31-19.

Knox City lost one fumble while Anson fumbled twice and lost one. KC had 3 flags for 15 yards, Anson had 5 for 30 yards.

Senior citizens receive updated information on 9-1-1 emergency calling in Knox County

The senior citizens who were on hand for lunch last Wednesday at the Knox County Aging Services Center in Knox City received an unexpected surprise when they were greeted by a rather large fox. The costumed mascot was a part of the lunchtime presentation updating the seniors on 9-1-1 emergency calling in Knox County.

After their exercise session and visiting with one another, the seniors settled down to lunch while listening to the 9-1-1 information. Pam Reed from the local 9-1-1 office on the second floor of the Knox County Hospital had a variety of brochures and promotional items for the seniors.

Caution was stressed with regards to how calling within Knox County is made. The main theme of the presentation was the use of cell phones when placing 9-1-1 emergency calls. While normal 'land line' phones in homes and businesses display an address on the 9-1-1 office computers when a call for help is made, cell phones do not. For that reason, it is extremely important for anyone calling 9-1-1 on a cell phone to be aware of their surroundings and exactly where they are located. If someone calls 9-1-1 in a panic on a regular phone and just says "I need help" and hangs up, the dispatchers will have the physical address of the cell phone displayed on their computer screen. If the same call is made on a cell phone,

nothing shows up. For that reason, 9-1-1 personnel are making the kind of presentations like the one last week at the Knox County Aging Services, stressing the need for people to be aware of their physical location if they are See Seniors enjoy, Page 3

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
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

In an emergency, people usually have trouble remembering phone numbers and addresses. When you call 9-1-1, emergency dispatchers always ask you to verify your telephone number and location. Another very important point to remember is to make sure the address of your home or business is clearly visible from the street or






Abilene Reporter-News honors three 'Hounds







Homecoming 2003 plans are underway for Thursday, Friday


Plans are gearing up for next week's Homecoming 2003 at Knox City High School.



Amendment election set

The election to determine whether 22 proposed Constitutional Amendments become law in Texas is scheduled for September 13. Among the proposed amendments is a provision that would allow Texas homeowners to utilize Home Equity Lines of Credit (HELOC).

A HELOC is essentially a credit account based on a homeowner's equity. The Comptroller's Office estimates that homeowners could save as much as \$741 million annually on interest charges and federal income tax deductions if HELOCs are authorized by Texas voters.






