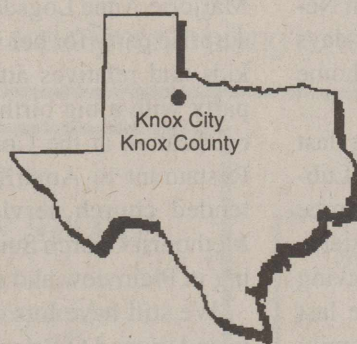

To begin duties effective Wednesday, October 1

Jane Rowan has been named Haskell County Extension Agent - Family and Consumer Science, according to Galen Chandler, District Extension Administrator, and the County Commissioners' Court.

Jane will begin her duties in Haskell County effective Wednesday, October 1.

A native of New Mexico, she graduated from New Mexico State University with a bachelor of science degree in home economics education and agriculture. She is a certified Food Protection Management instructor and Certified Family and Community Leadership trainer.

Jane is leaving the Knox County Extension Agent - FCS position after twenty years. She submitted her resignation to the Knox County Commissioners Court at their Monday, September 8, meeting.

Mrs. Rowan's work experience in Knox County has included educational efforts in nutrition, food safety, consumer education, parenting, 4-H and at risk youth.

In Haskell County, she will give leadership in Family and Consumer Sciences, and will work with Brandon Anderson, County Extension Agent-Agriculture, in developing 4-H and adult education programs through Extension

spouses and teachers at the Community Center Friday at 6:00 p.m.

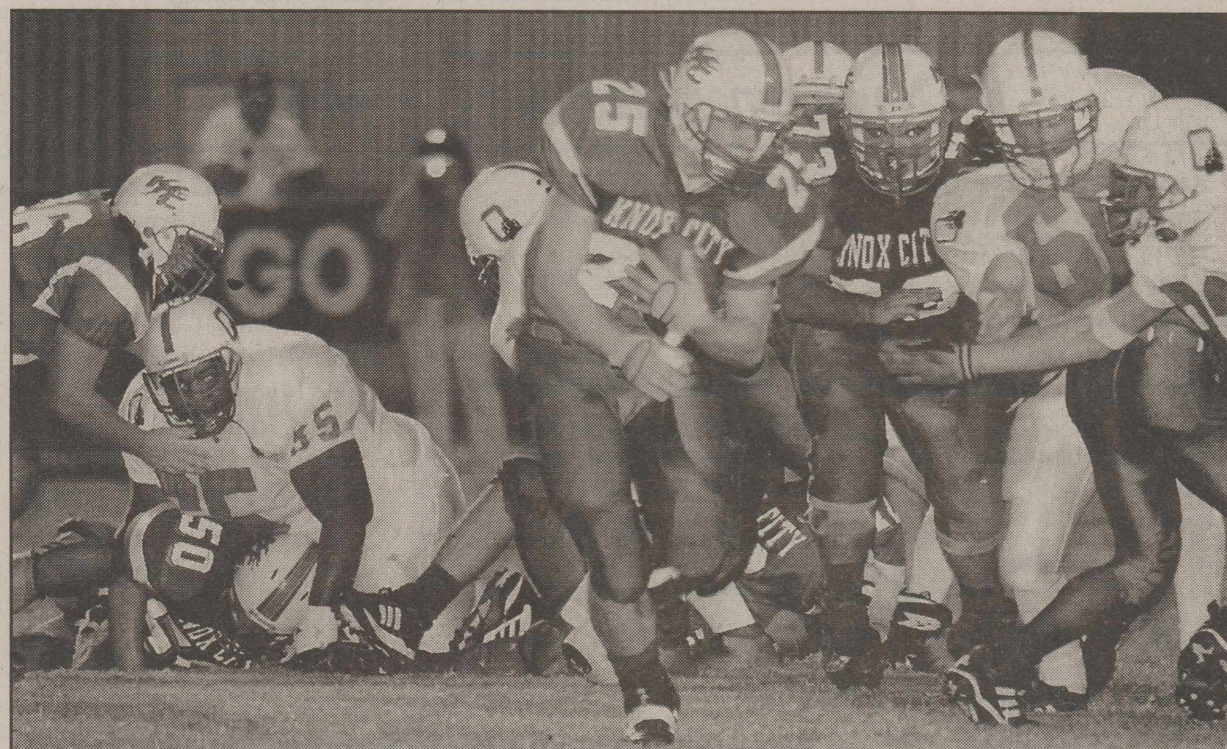
On Saturday at 6:00 p.m., the class of '53 will have dinner together at Kathie and Jack's Restaurant.

'Hounds fall to Cubs 28-20 in tough battle

The Knox City Greyhounds lost a very tough football game last Friday night here in Knox City as they battled the Cubs from Olney to a final score of 28-20.

The 'Hounds opened strong, scoring three times in the first quarter with a 4 yard touchdown run by Quentin Spells, a 1 yard touchdown run by quarterback Andy Shaver, and an 11 yard touchdown by Spells after he received a pass from Andy Shaver. That would be all the trips across the goal line for Knox City, while Olney scored a TD in both the first and second quarters, two TD's in the third quarter and a safety in the fourth quarter.

The evening provided some heart stopping moments for Knox City fans as key players for the Greyhounds were forced out of the game with injuries. Sophomore quarterback Andy Shaver (9) was not able to finish the game after he broke a finger severely. Carlos Ruiz picked up the quarterback duties and finished out the evening in that position.

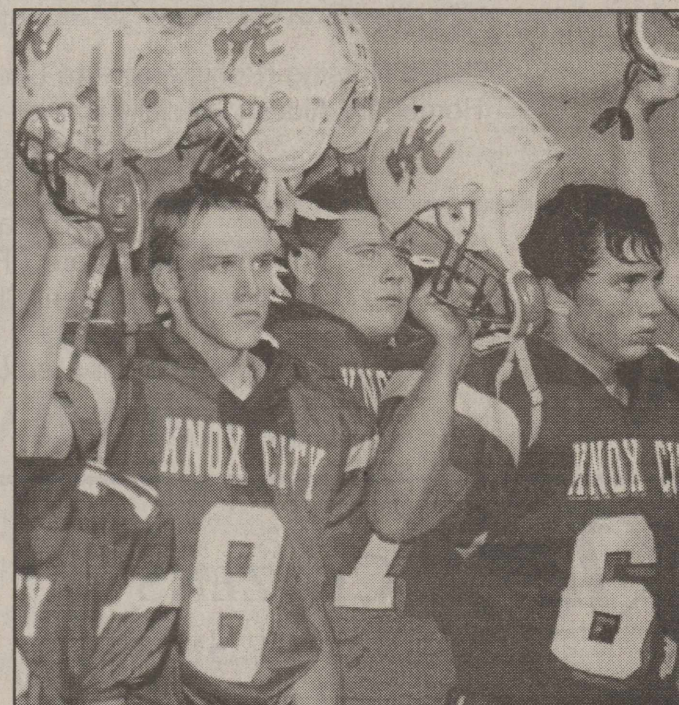

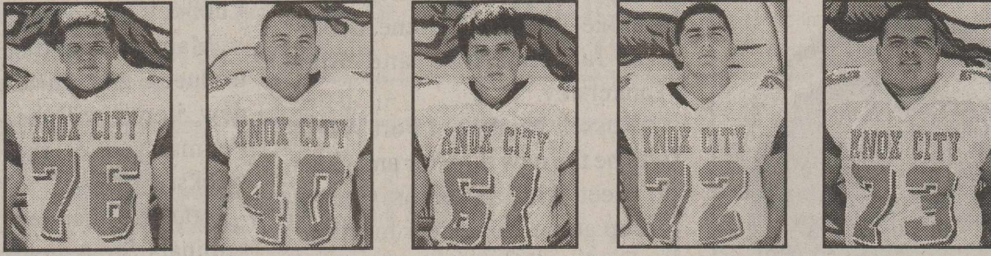

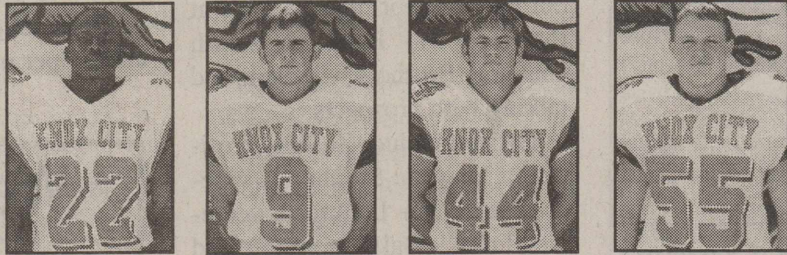

Big Block - The Offensive Line

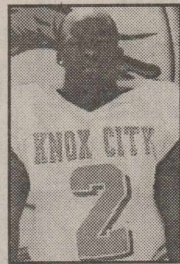

When it comes to food, sometimes it's as much about color and presentation as it is about taste and texture. The Texas bell pepper certain fits the bill in both categories, which must be why it's used so frequently in Texas cuisine.

Texas bell peppers account for more than 60 percent of the domestic pepper crop in the United States, and more than 1,000 acres of green, red and yellow bell peppers valued at \$11 million are harvested in Texas.

Bell peppers are available fresh from May to December. Though bell peppers come in a variety of colors, including red, yellow, green and even purple, most often they are sold in the mature green stage. This is a fully developed type of bell pepper, but not the ripest. As they ripen on the vine, most bell peppers turn red and become sweeter.

Bell peppers have no bite at all, compared with other peppers. They have a mild kick and a crunchy texture that makes them suitable for eating raw. Due to their size, shape and firmness, bell peppers are often stuffed whole using bread-crumbs, meat and cheese, and they are readily found in soups and casseroles as well.


Not only do bell peppers add flavor and color to a meal, they also contain a good deal of vitamins and minerals. Bell peppers are high in vitamins A and C and also very high in potassium.
